A New Volume of Poems.

"Poems: Sonnets, Lyrics, Miscellaneous," is the title of a small volume just published from the pen of Mr E. Blackadder, B. A. Very neat and tasty is the little work in appearance, and in the matter we note a striking advance over that of his first volume published a few years ago. The sonnets "To Sir John Macdonald" and "To the Fathers of Acadia College" are especially good. The little lyric, "The Gaspareau," is a gem and is in our opinion the best thing he has written in this line. The last poem, "The Fate of the Gods," is doubtless the best piece of work that has appeared from Mr Blackadder's pen. In lines which often reach near to the Olympian deities,—made immortal, in name, at least, by the famous bards of old,—on the introduction of Christianity. The volume reflects much credit on the author, who is rapidly making a name for himself as a writer and poet. We commend the little work to our readers, and trust that it may find many purchasers.

Several of the New York papers have recently commented upon the fact that the Canadians now in their city taking in the yacht race were all intensely English in their sympathies and were hoping to see the English boat carry off the cup. This appears to be rather a surprise and disappointment to our American cousins, especially those who have been persuading themselves that the people of the Dominion were just yearning for annexation.—Exchange.

Married. Mr W. C. Archibald has begun his packing of fruit in tins. He purposes to fill six thousand tins this year with tomatoes, plums, and crab and Gravenstein apples. Besides his own production, which this year has been exceptional good, Mr Archibald will require limited quantities from outside growers. The plums are almost invariably picked too green for this use as well as for the general market. Growers who have fruit to dispose of for this purpose will bear in mind that the plums must be well ripened and the crab apples picked from the tree by hand—free from spots and bruises.
