Canadian Patriotic Fund Association.

I would request you to be good enough to make known as publicly as possible the purpose of this Association, and I would also earnestly solicit your interest and active co-operation by taking what ever steps you may consider advisable for augmenting the fund.

The patriotic and benevolent purposes of this Association are such as commend themselves forcibly to every Canadian, and I have no doubt that its appeal for assistance will meet with a ready and generous response from the people of Nova Scotia.

AIMS AND OBJECTS.

The object of the Canadian Patriotic Fund Association is the creation of a fund for the following purposes, viz:

1. For the benefit of the widows, orphans, and other dependents of officers and men of the military forces of Canada, who may unfortunately lose their lives in or in connection with the war operations in South Africa.

2. For the benefit of the soldiers themselves or others (whether combatant or non-combatant) on duty in South Africa with the authority of the Government of Canada, and their families or dependents, who may have been disabled by wounds, sickness, etc.

3. For the benefit of the wives and children and dependents separated at home from those serving in South Africa.

In order to effect the above object, it is necessary that public sympathy with this truly national and patriotic endeavor must be fully aroused, and every opportunity afforded whereby the contributions, however limited in amount, of every citizen in the Dominion may be readily received and duly acknowledged.

With this end in view, it has been arranged that subscriptions will be received at any Branch of any chartered Bank in the Dominion, at any Government or Post Office Savings Bank, or at the office of any Loan Company, and transmitted to Ottawa as per.

It will be the earnest endeavor of the Association to insure that no deserving case shall go without the fullest relief which its funds can afford; and the Association therefore confidently appeals to the citizens of the Dominion for their co-operation and generous support.

At the Front.

LETTER FROM PRIVATE REGAN WITH THE CANADIAN CONTINGENT.

Belmont, Jan. 1st, 1900.

DEAR PARENTS.—Are still at Belmont. Nothing new has happened since I last wrote. We still have lots of work to do. We were paid to-day. I got \$9.70. I invested about a dollar in grub and had the first good meal I have had for some time. You ought to see the train loads of provisions and guns that go through every day to get an idea of what an expensive thing war is. We have an English Colonel over us now. We were given a test march the other morning—got up at 4 o'clock, were given a drop of coffee and a biscuit, and then we started, marched out about five miles, had a picnic battle and came back again. We got back at ten o'clock, having done ten miles. Some of the men dropped out. We were given great praise by the Colonel for the way we marched and carried out the manoeuvres. 250 of the Queensland Mounted Infantry arrived to-day. The English are making great preparations for the coming battle at Spytfontein, which will be one of the greatest battles of the century. I have learned more about soldiering since I came here than I would learn in the militia in five years. It seems to be the general opinion that we will not get away before six months, as we have been here nearly five weeks now and there has been scarcely anything done. We expect to make an attack on a party of Boers at Douglasfontein, a place about 40 miles from here, in a day or two. I can't understand how it is that people make a living here. What they call "veldt" is nothing but sand, with scrub growing on it, and a few house sticks here and there over it, and yet the farmers are all well off, keep 20 or 40 servants and do no work themselves. You can travel for miles and never see a tree or a bush over two or three feet high.
