The regular monthly meeting of the Town Council of the Town of Newcastle was held in the Police Court Room on Thursday, March 18th 1920 at 8 o'clock p. m.

Present, Mayor Doyle, Ald. Crocker, Durick, Fish, Jeffrey, and Russell

A notice from the County Secretary, St. John with a copy of proposed Bill, "An Act to amend an Act relating to Public Hospitals and to the St. John County Hospital" was read and it was moved by Ald. Durick, seconded by Ald. Russell and carried that the communication be received and filed and that the Town Clerk acknowledge receipt of the notice.
 The resignation of Thos. M. Malt-

by and C. P. McCabe as assessors were read, and on motion of Ald. Crocker, seconded by Ald. Durick were received and accepted.

The proposed bill of Alfred V. Tracey-Gould in relation to the development of water power at the White Rapids on the South-west Miramichi was submitted, with proposed petition from the Town Council in support of the same and it was moved by Ald. Durick, seconded by Ald. Fish and carried, that the petition be endorsed by the Council and forwarded to the Lieutenant-Governor and Legislative Assembly. The Finance Committee recommended payment of Mr. A. A. Davidson's account for \$168.00 which was passed and ordered paid.

The chairman of the Police Committee recommended the appointment of A. L. Barry and George Stables as assessors to fill the vacancies.

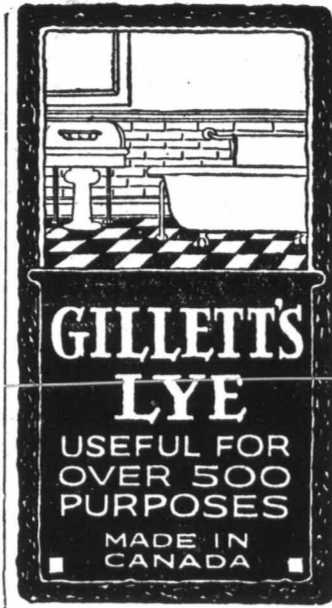

MUSICAL TALKS

By C. C. Laugher, Mus. Bac. Bowmanville.

One of the most interesting subjects in the Theory of Music is Form. Form is the plan or design upon which a composer builds his ideas. Think of a builder just building and having in mind no particular shape, does not even know how many rooms to have, and he is building just the same, the result will be no form, no order. A composer must work on his composition according to the plan he has in mind. We must also analyse the form of a composition in the same way that you investigate the size of a house or building. Just for a moment, think of a piano composition, just a short piece, it may have two parts, if so, we call it binary form; again it may have three separate parts known as ternary form. Each part is more or less complete in itself just the same as each room of the house may be complete in itself and the two or three rooms will form a complete, compact little house. While speaking of a house, let us continue on this subject; each room of the house must have a doorway or door through which to pass from room to room, the door is termed in music a Cadence or Close, partial, temporary or final.

A period in music is like unto a sentence and in length usually about eight measures, again this period may be divided into phrases, it is well to remember a phrase as the guiding principle of all compositions. A section is considered a musical thought usually consisting of two measures, and again this may be divided. The smallest sub-division or musical germ is called "The Motive" which at times consists only of two or three notes.



Various kinds of Form is used, such as Vocal Form, Instrumental Form with Vocal Form.

Again Instrumental Form may be divided into separated something like—Cannu "Contrapuntal Composition"; Fugue "Subject", a large Composition for Solo Instrument.

As building structures vary in size such as a small dwelling house, a large house, the Mansion, and the Castle; so do the composition structure vary in size. Let us study a simple MARCH, the kind we hear every day. We will analyse it first; we have four measures introduction which usually suggests the kind of make up of the March, following the Introduction we are led into the first part or MAIN portion, then into the second part also important; same size but different Melody and Harmony, then we return to the MAIN part again, next to this we have the TRIO, a different structure, a different tone of key, we do not dwell there long but return to the MAIN portion and wind up right there. How much like the small Dwelling is this March; note the likeness—first the HALL (Introduction), then the LIVING ROOM (main portion) in the KITCHEN with its different make-up; again we return to the MAIN LIVING ROOM in order to pass to the PARLOUR (trio) we again return to the LIVING ROOM (main theme) and wind up right here with a FINALE or CODA (satisfaction).

Master Singers
Early in the 14th century there was an organization called the Minnesingers, a band of musicians made up from the common people. A little later another organization was founded calling themselves "The Master-singers." This association being much more particular as to membership, also forming rules in music regarding the observing of these rules as the all important thing in music. The arranged tournaments and their schools were conducted with great pride and solemnity.

These organizations originated in Germany but soon spread to other countries and was soon in general formation.

Development
Form in Instrumental music, and Harmony soon developed with the improvement of the Organ and Keyed instruments. The Choral "hymn tune"; the Motet "sacred part-singing without accompaniment".

Each great Master made some improvement to Form, according to their gifts particularly those of the eighteenth century, such as Bach who invented different Forms and was afterwards known as the Father of Modern Music, who tempered and tuned the scale, so that all keys sounded equally well. Bach was also well known for his Gavottes. Gilbert who wrote the words to the Operas "Pinafore" and the "Mikado" got a pun at the expense of a gushing, but ignorant young lady, who asked Mr. Gilbert if Mr. Bach had been writing any more of his charming Gavottes lately. Mr. Gilbert replied, no madam, Mr. Bach no longer composes he is de-pose.

Oratorio Form was greatly enlarged by Handel, his works show Grandeur and Solemnity combined with Melodic simplicity.

The greatest Form in Instrumental music "Sonata" and invented by Papa Haydn; he also invented the String Quartette and the Symphony. Haydn is known as the Father of Modern Instrumental Music and of Musical humor. The greatest tone-poet that ever lived was Beethoven, he enlarged upon the symphonies, creating a unity of ensemble, making his work unique. Wagner was known as a peculiar man in some respects particularly his expensive way of stimulating his imagination. If his compositions of works were to be true and bright, the world would have to be painted in purple and gold flowers around him; if his work was to be dark and gloomy he would have everything draped in black.

In this chapter I have endeavoured to

explain in a simplified manner the architecture or Form in Music; although compositions are many and varied, yet all are built up with regard to the rules and methods laid down. Read the following verses on a child's view of music:—

"Learning to Play"
Composers must be funny men
At least that's what I say,
Because they write down notes and notes
For us poor things to play.

Now don't you think it would be nice
If they would never try
To write their music in a book?
You know sometimes it's dry!
To play it just exactly right
Is very hard for me—
If I could only play it wrong
How easy it would be!
But still I'll try to do my best
And learn each tiny note
And never make a single slip
But play just what they wrote;
For they're the men that made the tunes
And so they ought to know
The way the music's meant to sound
And how it ought to go.

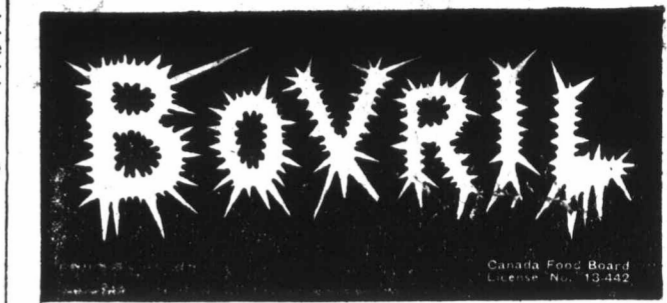
Bartholomew Notes

Hatless M. P.'s

Among the changes noticeable in this house of commons is the absence of the hat when members are in the house itself. Formerly hats were universally worn when members were seated or in the lobby. Only the whips were hatless in the lobby; that marked them out from the others. Now nearly the only members who still retain their headgear—both glossy silk topers—are Mr. Chamberlain and Sir Frederick Banbury. Both make great play with it. Sir Frederick raises his hat when a minister answers one of his questions or when, in the fencing phrase, he is touche in debate. The chancellor of the exchequer takes his off when he rises to speak and puts it on the table in front of him, and when listening to a speaker sits with it well forward over his eyes and his feet planted high up on the side of the table.—London Morning Post.

Week of Fasting Advised.

Fayette county, Pennsylvania, physicians are advising a fast of one week to cause a reduction in food prices. The physicians state that anyone above sixteen can fast a week with beneficial results and that a half-million dollars would be saved by Fayette county folks in that time.

The physicians suggest that only water be taken in the six-day fast. In discussing the proposed fast, a physician said:

"Such a fast will positively not injure anyone. I would be willing to undertake a trial fast of a week simply to demonstrate the feasibility of the plan and its beneficial results physically. Water, of course, is to be taken, but, thank heaven, that costs little. If there are any persons who desire to join me in a trial fast I am willing to start any time."

Belgians Retain Old Customs.

When the Germans invaded Belgium, several of the fleeing families sought refuge in Staten Island, New York, says Popular Mechanics magazine, where they have settled permanently, adopting many American ways, of course, but clinging to certain home-land customs which are of much interest to their neighbors. One of these is the use of dogs as draft animals. Dog teams are hitched to two-wheel carts, loaded with milk or vegetables, which are made like hundreds of others to be found in Belgium. The animals wear muzzles of special design, which do not interfere with eating and drinking. A special collar, made in part of pronged egg-shaped units, is used in training the dogs to work.

Recognize God's Guidance.

The hand of the Lord is to be recognized officially in South Africa. A resolution unanimously passed the provincial council at Pretoria, calling on the government to amend the South African act in such a way that it clearly appears therefrom that the guidance of the Lord is acknowledged in all matters of the Union of South Africa.

Boys Discovered Cavern.

Boys snooping around at Lock Haven, Pa., found a hole fifteen feet wide and twelve feet deep extending under the state road near the Clinton County line. They could hear water dripping and it was thought that the cave had been made by the outflow of a large spring from an underground stream.

Department of Finance Dominion of Canada

Your Income Tax Return Should be Filed at Once!!

All persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:

Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919, received or earned \$1,000 or more.

All other individuals, who during the calendar year 1919, received or earned \$2,000 or more.

Every corporation and joint stock company, whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

CLASS 1

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 31st of March, 1920:

Trustees, executors, administrators, agents, and assignees must use Form T 3.

Employers making a return of the names and amounts paid to all directors, officials, agents or other employees must use Form T 4.

Corporations and Joint Stock Companies making a return of all dividends and bonuses paid to shareholders and members during 1919, must use Form T 5.

NOTE.—Individuals comprising partnerships must file returns as their individual capacity on Form T 1 or T 1 A.

PENALTY

Every person who is required to make this return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of \$10.00 for each day during which the default continues—and all such penalties shall be assessed and collected from the person liable to make the return in the same manner in which taxes are assessed and collected.

CLASS 2

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920:

All individuals other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

Farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1 A.

Corporations and Joint Stock Companies must use Form T 2.

PENALTY

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provisions of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100.00 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

General Instructions

Obtain Forms from the Inspectors or Assistant Inspectors of Taxation, or from Postmasters.

Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in.

Prepay postage on letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.

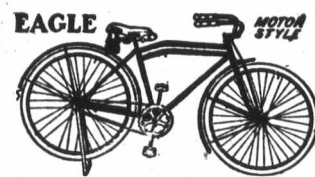

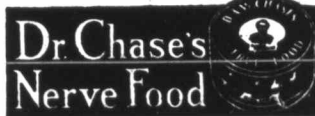

NICK'S HARD FATE

One Romanoff to Whom Country Has Been Ungrateful.

Story of Great Russian Military Commander Most Amazing Romance of the War—His Splendid Generalship Is Recalled.

From March, 1917, till October, 1918, Grand Duke Nicholas Romanoff, former commander in chief of the Russian armies and one of the most brilliant generals of the great war, was a prisoner in the town of Yalta in the Crimea. He is now in Milan with his family, humbly housed. The story of "Big Nick" is one of the most amazing romances of the war, the Pittsburgh Gazette-Times states.

When the bolsheviks gained control of Russia Nicholas was residing at Tiflis, where he had been governor under the czar and under the Lvoff regime. He was summoned to Yalta by the bolshevik authorities and obeyed the summons. His brother, his wife, his sister-in-law and other members of his family and his suite were imprisoned with him. Twenty-five bolshevik soldiers were detailed to guard the distinguished prisoners.

Late in the summer of 1918 it was decided by the Yalta soviet to execute all the prisoners. The bolshevik guards absolutely declined to permit the sentence of death to be executed and sent the firing squad back to headquarters. Three times thereafter executioners were sent to kill the prisoners, but in each instance the guard prevented the carrying-out of the sentence.

When the Germans came to Yalta Nicholas declined to permit the Germans to enter the house that had been his prison, declaring his utter loathing of all things German. Soon after this the allies took Yalta and Nicholas was rescued.

All the private fortune of the grand duke has been lost. His lands have been confiscated. At Milan he lives comfortably, but very unostentatiously.

Democracy owes much to Grand Duke Nicholas. He was, in fact, a staunch upholder of the old Russian absolutism. But first of all Nicholas was a Russian. He knew Russia's salvation depended on the vanquishing of Germany. He was a leader of consummate skill and it is more than probable that only his splendid generalship prevented Germany from winning the war in the early stages. His retreat before the tremendous attack of Mackensen and Hindenburg, which resulted in the saving of the Russian armies, was one of the most notable chapters of the war.

Between the bolshevik Russia of today and the old autocratic Russia for which Nicholas fought, practical students and statesmen find little choice, but it must be admitted that the autocracy produced great men, while the gutter communism has found only scoundrels for its leaders. In the awarding of justice there should be some provision for this gigantic Russian, who in 1914 and 1915 prevented Germany from marching to easy victory.

No Horses on Largest Farm.

A 200,000-acre farm, the largest in the world, which is the direct result of the government's efforts to stimulate the growing of wheat, is described by Robert H. Moulton in Everybody's.

"The farm is devoted entirely to wheat, and if it produces somewhere around the country's average of twenty-eight bushels per acre, which is practically certain, it will add approximately 5,650,000 bushels to the 1919 wheat crop," says the writer.

"All of the work is being done with tractors. Last fall when the first ground was broken, there were fifty monster machines at work tearing up the prairie sod. They plow on an average of one acre a minute for the working time. A record was made one day of 1,880 acres turned and broken. All the seeding, harvesting, etc., will also be done by tractors, and then, of course, there are the thrashing machines. Hence, the absolute no-accountness of horses about this place."

Price of Labor.

An Indiana suffragist, who is a widely-known speaker, went to her door the other morning to buy some blackberries of a young country woman, reports the Indianapolis News. The berries were fine, but the suffragist wished them at a lower price than they were offered. "Why, they just grow along the roadside so plentifully that all you have to do is to pick them," she told the woman. "Don't you think you are charging a rather exorbitant price for your labor?"

The country woman put her boxes back into her basket. "I've known of higher-priced labor," she retorted testily. "Words are more plentiful than blackberries and yet our club had to pay you \$25 last winter for putting a bunch of them together."

His Resolve.

"It is better to do your losing early in the season," said the base-ball manager, "but if I happen to win a few games I'll endeavor to bear it with resignation."—Louisville Courier-Journal.

TRAVEL IN JAPAN

Hotel Customs Somewhat Embarrassing to Europeans.

Taking Bath in Public, in Water That Would Boil a Lobster, is, or Used to Be, in the Nature of Torture.

With the advent of the "modern hotel" in Japan the old inns, or rest-houses, have been to a large extent relegated to obscurity, but some still survive in parts where European travelers seldom penetrate. The kind of welcome accorded to visitors in one of the village inns is very far removed from western ideas of hospitality. Here is the interesting experience of a traveler as related in The Caterer and Hotelkeepers' Gazette:

"As soon as I arrived I was conducted by the polite hostess into the chief guestroom, which looked out upon the cool orchard of a temple.

"Cushions were brought in, and bright kimonos. I took off my dusty English clothes, and put on first the lower kimono, made of cotton; and then a gaudy silk one, bright with the colors of the hotel.

"The room, like all Japanese rooms, was bare except for a single decoration. There is always a special corner for the room's ornament, which is sometimes a vase of flowers, sometimes a piece of china, sometimes simply a painting upon silk or a woodcut. The subjects are not seldom such as bring a blush to the European cheek, but they have no such effect on the Japanese, who seem more concerned with the arrangement than the subject of the ornaments. There are strict rules for decoration; it is laid down, for example, that flowers of different colors should not be mixed in one vase.

"At length, because I was famishing, a low table and a brazier were brought in and set in front of me and my cushions.

"Every time I thought I had finished, the hostess or one of the maids would trip in with another tray of dishes and put them before me on the table. Had I not been able to use chopsticks before, I should certainly have become expert by the end of that meal.

"A little while after the meal—for it did end at last—I was told that the bath was ready. I was taken to the open courtyard and introduced to the arrangements there.

"Two huge barrels were sunk in the earth, one filled with hot, the other with cold water. There was a thin screen on two sides—not against prying eyes, but simply to keep off the wind. Indeed, as I began to take off my kimonos an interested audience of both sexes turned to watch me. This was unpleasant, and I did my best to dodge their gaze behind the screen.

"I might have saved myself the trouble. A moment later, in reply to the calls of the Innkeeper and his wife, their daughter came up hastily to bathe me, as her duty was. She was not in the least embarrassed—and I soon had other things to worry me, for when, at the young lady's direction, I let myself down into the hot tub I discovered that, in the usual Japanese fashion, the heat of the water in it was not less than 115 degrees Fahrenheit.

"Up to my neck in that hot bath I suffered exquisite torture, which turned to the most exquisite agony when I stepped on the still hotter kettle lying on the bottom of the tub. The Innkeeper's daughter pulled me out, red as a lobster and very nearly boiled. She dropped me, more dead than alive, into the cold tub, pulled me out again, and dried me.

"Then she bowed politely, and left me to return to my room."

Husbands Are Hoping.

Recently an Irvington woman invited a few of her friends to play cards during the afternoon. There was a strong intimation that the highest score would be rewarded with a prize. That stimulated interest to a degree.

The women had visions of the ordinary prizes given for card proficiency. One of them thought of a nicely hemmed towel, another saw visions of a cut-glass tumbler, and still another dreamed of something else. There was but one table and as the hostess was barred the contest was wholly between the remaining three. Finally the games were over and the scores tabulated. Then the hostess came in with a big glass of currant jelly and presented it as the prize of the afternoon. She picked the currants in her own garden and had made the jelly herself.

There is hope in the hearts of some Irvington husbands that the fad of giving real food as prizes will grow. Then, if their wives are good enough bridge players there may be something to eat when husbands come home in the evening.—Indianapolis News.

No Jugo-Slav Race.

There is in strictness no such thing as a Jugo-Slav. There are Serbs, Croats and Slovenes, all of whom speak the same language, with variations, and are now of the same nationality. 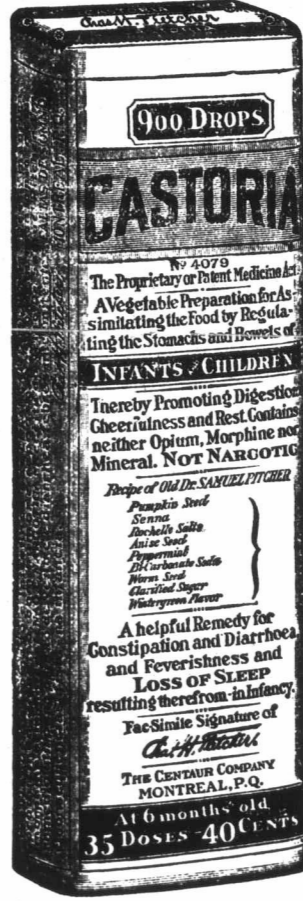

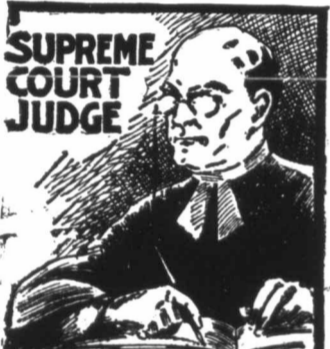
