

He will form a government and then a long prorogation will follow, during which time he will be able to mature his home rule scheme. He has said that he had the scheme so drafted that a few minutes would be all the time required to put it in shape for presentation to the house, but it must be remembered that it was formed before the election took place, when Mr. Gladstone and his friends expected a far larger majority. It is conceded on all sides that the Irish representatives hold the balance of power and they will have much to say as to what form the home rule bill will take. They will pledge themselves to nothing till this question is settled to their satisfaction. Mr. Blake is steadily gaining ground in the affections of his constituents and fellow members, and it is believed that he will heal all differences in the Irish ranks. Should this be so it will not only give Blake greater influence but will make Gladstone's standing more sailing ship and escaped. certain.
