Rules Relating to Private Bills.

36 All petitions for Private Bills must be presented within fourteen days after the commencement of the session exclusive of adjournment.

37 No Private Bill shall be brought into the House, but upon a petition first presented, truly stating the case at the peril of the petitioners for such Bill, and such petition must be signed by the said parties.

38 A committee shall be appointed at the commencement of every Session consisting of five members of whom three shall be a quorum, to be nominated. The Private Bills Committee to whom shall be referred every Private Bill, and no proceedings after the first reading shall be had upon such Bill until such Committee has reported thereon to the House.

39 So soon as the Committee has reported any Bill, such Bill together with any amendments that may be suggested by the Committee, shall be printed at the expense of the parties who are petitioners for such Bill and printed copies thereof delivered to the members before the second reading if deemed necessary by the Committee.

40 No Bill for the particular interest of any person or persons, Corporation or Corporations or body or bodies of people shall be read a second time until all fees be paid for the same into the hands of the Clerk of the House

41 No Bill moving for the object of vesting in or conferring upon any person or persons, Municipality or Body corporate the title to any tract of land shall be received or read in the House unless at least four weeks notice containing a full description of the land in question has been published in the Royal Gazette and one other newspaper in this Province of the intention of such person or persons Municipality or body Corporate to apply for such Bill.

**Canadian-West Land Regulations**

The sole head of a family (21 years of age or over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war and who has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties—six months residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section pre-emption. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Reside six months in each of three years after entering homestead contract and cultivate 50 extra acres. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as a homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption patent, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and rest a bonus worth \$300.00.

When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agent's Office (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.

Holder of entries may consent time or employment as farm laborers in Canada during 1921, as residence duties under certain conditions.

**Unity and Co-operation.**

The results of the first session of the League of Nations are eminently satisfactory, Sir George Foster tells the Star, upon returning to London. A splendid spirit of unity and co-operation was manifested, without preventing an independent expression of opinion. General sanity of judgment united, at last, on a practical solution, as shown by the ultimate conclusions. The Canadian delegates, assigned to important commissions, performed their work to the Assembly's satisfaction. They felt no difference in their status from other members—Canada was appreciated as an independent and integral part of the Assembly.

There were many views as to the betterment of the Covenant and Constitution, but there was no spirit of iconoclasm which might have caused a premature change of the instrument which was the product of the thought of eight nations at the Peace Conference. The consensus of opinion was the Covenant and Constitution should be tested before alteration is attempted. The concrete results of the Assembly were neither few nor insignificant. The organization is now completed, and the League functions through commissions and otherwise. It passed practical resolutions and cultivated sentiment leading to practical measures. By creating the International Court of Justice alone the League justifies its existence and guarantees its future work.

Hon. N. W. Rowell supplements Foster's statement, emphasizing the international friendships formed at the Assembly. The chilly atmosphere of the opening day changed to intimacy on the closing day—they spent a full half hour shaking hands on leaving new friends. All were inspired by the unity of purpose, which gives confidence in the future of international co-operation through the agency of the League. The organization was a big task, involving much time. An interesting development was the definition of the relation of members of the Council to States nominating them. Two views were held. The first was expressed by Titoni, the Italian, who considered that they only held advisory mandates from their Governments; the second declared that they actually represented the States—decisions they reached would be taken as the decisions of the States. The latter view was unanimously accepted. Hereafter the League's decisions will have the same weight as the Supreme Council's, and the Powers having permanent membership will be entitled to the credit of success and bear the responsibility of failure.

Canadian Products And Sales

Reference has been made a year ago to the fact that Canadian exports now consist chiefly of manufactured goods, instead of agricultural produce as used to be the case.

It is shown that at the end of the fiscal year 1919 Canada's foreign trade had reached the position where manufactured articles represented 45 per cent. of the total exports, and agricultural products only 22 per cent.

Of course, the figures of exports to, or, in other words, of Canadian sales to other countries, represent only a part of the case. What is the consumption at home? In other words, although we sell abroad more of manufactured goods than we do of farm produce, is it not possible that we use in Canada more of our own farm produce than we do of the goods which we manufacture?

The development of both agriculture and manufacture in Canada during the past ten years has been astounding. In the year 1910, the total output of Canadian manufactures was \$1,165,975,000. Last year the output was \$3,451,000,000.

The following news despatch came by the Associated Press, Dec. 21: "Newburn, N. C., Dec. 31.—Salaries of the office force at the Newburn Iron Works and Supply Company were immediately reduced 10 per cent. yesterday when the plant was turned over to the wage-earning employees for operation on a profit-sharing basis.

The plant is one of the largest of its kind in this section of the state. "Recently a 10 per cent. wage reduction was followed by a walk-out. The men returned, however, but when a second reduction of 10 per cent. was announced they conferred with the management and suggested that they be permitted to operate the plant and receive all profits above actual operating expenses. The plan was agreed to by the management."

The next chapter in the story came later by hardly more than a week. Despite the reduction in office expenses so promptly effected by the labor management, the result on Dec. 28 is told by the Associated Press, thus: "Newburn, N.C., Dec. 28.—'Employees of the Newburn Iron Works and Supply Company voted today to disregard the profit-sharing agreement recently

Will it? Not if our fiscal and business conditions are upset by interference with the national protective policy.

Not if, instead of paying two or three thousand million dollars annually to our own manufacturers for goods made in this country, and to manufacturers who will spend the money in this country, we send the money to American manufacturers to be spent in the United States.

Uncle Sam's Navy

By getting prominent statesmen and world leaders to declare that they favor a truce in armament building, the New York World is engaged in praiseworthy attack upon the gigantic naval plans of its country. It is noteworthy, however, that the statesmen and leaders whose names the World has thus far published, are all outside the United States.

The curious thing is that this combative gesture originated with a party that has boasted of its anti-imperialism, whose traditional policy has been peace, retrenchment, and reform, and whose most distinguished figure today is Woodrow Wilson, a professed antagonist of war.

Forty bundles of rags, shipped by a New York bag company to a Chicago iron and metal concern, yielded forty cases of whiskey the other day when prohibition agents searched several railroad shipments. Prohibition agents at Chicago have been ordered to inspect all large bundles at every freight house.

Gold valued at \$1,560,000, consigned to Kuhl, Loah & Company, arrived at New York on December 30th, on the steamship Kronland. This shipment has brought the firm's gold imports for 1920 up to approximately \$50,000,000. The metal originally came from South Africa and was purchased in the London open market.

Canada led all other countries supplying the colony of Trinidad with foodstuffs in 1919, complete trade statistics for year which have been published show importation of foodstuffs from Canada of over three quarters of a million dollars greater value than in the previous year amounting to \$4,205,000 as against \$3,405,400. The bulk of this consisted of flour, salt and fish.

In conclusion he exhorted the faithful to renewed and increased zeal in the discharge of their religious obligations and extended to all best wishes for a happy New Year.

Rules Relating to Private Bills.

36 All petitions for Private Bills must be presented within fourteen days after the commencement of the session exclusive of adjournment.

37 No Private Bill shall be brought into the House, but upon a petition first presented, truly stating the case at the peril of the suitors for such Bill, and such petition must be signed by the said parties.

38 A committee shall be appointed at the commencement of every Session consisting of five members of whom three shall be a quorum, to be denominated the Private Bills Committee to whom shall be referred every Private Bill, and no proceedings after the first reading shall be had upon such Bill until such Committee has reported thereon to the House.

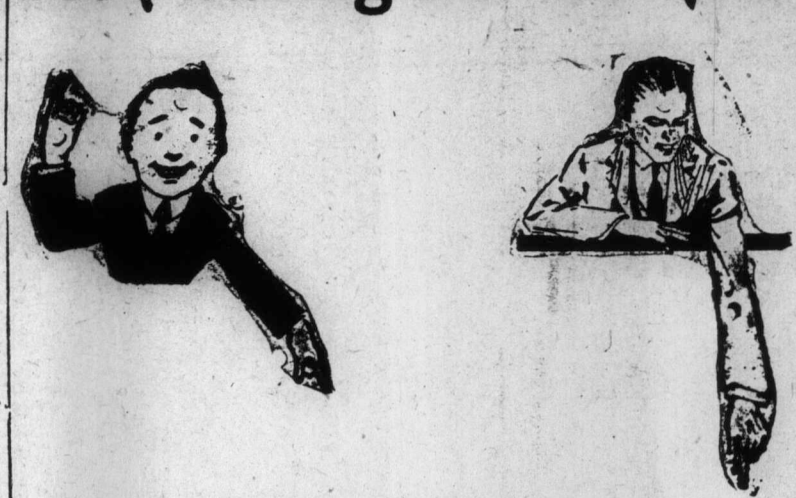
39 So soon as the Committee has reported any Bill, such Bill together with any amendments that may be suggested by the Committee, shall be printed at the expense of the parties who are suitors for such Bill and printed copies thereof delivered to the members before the second reading if deemed necessary by the Committee.

40 No Bill for the particular interest of any person or persons, Corporation or Corporations or body or bodies of people shall be read a second time until all fees be paid for the same into the hands of the Clerk of the House.

41 No Bill having for its object the vesting in or conferring upon any person or persons, Municipality or Body corporate his title to any tract of land shall be received or read in the House unless at least four weeks notice containing a full description of the land in question has been published in the Royal Gazette and one other newspaper in this Province of the intention of such person or persons, Municipality or Body Corporate to apply for such Bill.
