had given us personal responsibility it was not hidden away in the dark folds and coils of the alimentary canal where we could not control it. This fault or faults must be committed before the food was swallowed. I felt instinctively that here was the key to the whole situation. The point then was to study the cavity of the mouth, and the first thought was: "What happens there?"

"The answer was: Taste, smell (closely akin to taste, and hardly to be distinguished from it), feeling, saliva, mastication, appetite, tongue, teeth, &c. I first took up the careful study of taste, necessitating keeping food in the mouth as long as possible to learn its course and development, and as I tried it myself wonders of new and pleasant sensations were revealed. New delights of taste were discovered. Appetite assumed new leanings.

"Then came the vital discovery which is this: I found that each of us has what I call a food-filter—a discriminating muscular gate located at the back of the mouth where the throat is shut off from the mouth during the process of mastication. Just where the tongue drops, over backward towards its so-called root, there are usually five (sometimes seven, we are told) little teat-like projections placed in the shape of a horseshoe, each of them having a trough around it, and in these troughs or depressions terminate a great number of taste-buds, or ends of gustatory nerves. Just at this point the roof of the mouth, or the "hard palate" ends; and the "soft palate" with its uvula at the end of it, drops down behind the heavy part of the tongue.

The Act of Chewing.

"During the natural act of chewing, the lips are closed, and there is a complete closure at the back part of the mouth by the pressing of the tongue against the roof of the mouth. During mastication, then, the mouth is an air-tight pouch.

"While the food is being masticated so that it may be mixed with the saliva and chemically transformed from its crude condition into the chemical form that makes its possible digestion and absorption, this gate will remain tightly shut, and the throat will be entirely cut off from the mouth.

"But, the food becomes creamy, so to speak, through being mixed with saliva, or emulsified, or alkalisized, or neutralized, or dextrinized, or modified in whatever form Nature requires, the creamy substance will be drawn up the central conduit of the tongue until it reaches the food-gate.

"It is found by the taste-buds then located around the "circumvallate papillae" (the teat-like projections on the tongue which I mentioned just now) to be properly prepared for its acceptance and further digestion, the food-gate will open, and the food thus ready for acceptance into the body will be sucked back and swallowed, unconsciously—that is, without conscious effort.

"I now started to experiment on myself. I chewed my food carefully until I had got everything out of it that there was in it and until it slipped in unconsciously down my throat. When the appetite ceased, and I was thereby told I had had enough, I stopped, and I had no desire to eat any more until a real appetite commanded me again chewed carefully, eating always whatever the appetite craved.

"Fletcherism."

"I had now found out five things—all that there is to my discovery, and to the fundamental requisite of what is called "Fletcherism":—

"First: Wait for a true, earned appetite.

"Second: Select from the food available that which appeals most to appetite, and in order called for by appetite.

"Third: Get all the good taste there is in the food out of it in the mouth, and swallow only when it practically "swallows itself."

"Fourth: Enjoy the good taste for all it is worth, and do not allow any depression or diverting feeling to intrude upon the ceremony.

"Fifth: Wait, take and enjoy, as much as possible; Nature will do the rest.

What I Eat.

"What do I eat? When do I eat? How much do I eat?"

"My answer to all these questions is very simple: I eat anything that my appetite calls for; I eat it only when it does call for it, and I eat until my appetite is satisfied and cries: "Enough!"

"With my New England food-preferences, my range of selection circulates among a very simple and in-

expensive variety—namely, potatoes, bread, beans, occasionally eggs, milk, cream, toast and butter, &c. and combinations of these, such as browned potatoes, potatoes in cream, potatoes au gratin, baked potatoes, fish-balls mainly composed of potato, occasionally tomato steved with plenty of powdered sugar, oyster stew with the flavour of celery, escalloped oysters, &c.

Three Rules for Eating.

"First rule: Don't take any food until you are 'good and hungry.'

"Second rule: From the food available at the time take that first which appeals most strongly to the appetite.

"Third rule: The moment appetite begins to slack up a bit, the moment saliva does not flow so freely as at first, the moment there is any degree of satisfaction of the appetite, stop. Rest is the antidote of 'that tired feeling.'"

Annual Meeting of Board of Trade.

At 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon the first annual meeting of the Board of Trade was held. President Winter and Vice-Presidents Harris and Gosling occupied the platform. There was no election of officers. They will hold office for 1910, as the Board has only been in working order a few months.

The business of the meeting was the presentation of the Annual Report, a somewhat lengthy report, but intensely interesting, as it embodied the work and views of the committees of the Council which have been at work on specific subjects.

The Secretary, Mr. Fearn, read the report. It dealt with a great variety of subjects, but of course the cure and marketing of fish occupied prominent and extensive space. It dwelt on the cure of fish, the purchase of fish tacks, the inspection of fish, the question of an official form of contract for sales, a standard of cull, a recommendation as to the lobster fishery.

The question of steam sea communication also came under consideration and references were made to the desirability of improvements in regard to the Old Country, New York and St. Lawrence services and with St. Pierre. The Tourist Traffic and improved hotel accommodation in the city and outports were also touched upon.

The desirability of improvements in the telegraph and telephone services was emphasized, and the linking-up of important centres not at present in telegraph communication was recommended. Reference was made to the Royal Commission visiting the West Indies and the case for Newfoundland which the Council had prepared in conjunction with the Government, and which Mr. Cashin will present to the Commission. The question of the cost of coopers materials had occupied the attention of the Council, with a view to decreasing prices without diminution of wages. Data as to steam trawling on the Grand Banks was being obtained, with the object of its curtailment by international agreement. The gauging of molasses had also been considered as also the accommodation provided in foreign ports for our fish exports. The question of uneven duties was also considered. The Manufacturers' Association and the Importers' Union had been invited to amalgamate with the Board of Trade, which had now 289 members. Extended reference was made to the industries at Grand Falls and Bishop Falls and to agricultural development.

It was stated that \$2,000,000 worth of Agricultural produce was imported, much of which could be raised locally. The extent of the manufacturing interest may be gauged from the fact that a million dollars is paid out annually in wages. The Secretary concluded his report by reading the Treasurer's report.

After some discussion on motion of Mr. W. B. Grievie the report was ordered to be received and printed for circulation among members for discussion next week. Mr. McKay seconded the motion which was carried unanimously.

On motion of Mr. C. Steer, seconded by Mr. J. C. Marshall, a vote of thanks was passed unanimously to the President, Vice Presidents and other officers of the Board.

The meeting then adjourned till Monday next.

A Good Dividend.
Yesterday at noon the annual meeting of the shareholders of the Nail Manufacturing Co. was held when the reports of the Secretary and Directors showed that the year had been a successful one. A dividend of 5 per cent. was declared and something placed to the credit of the reserve fund. Last year the dividend was small, only 3 per cent. being declared, and the work of the past year is very satisfactory to all concerned in the Company. The rolling mill, which contains machinery valued at \$15,000, has not been working for some time, but this will soon be rectified. Last Year's Directors were all re-elected.

Hockey.
The Victoria hockey team practised last night at 6.30 in the Prince's Rink. This is their final practice preparatory to the match to-morrow night. They were much admired by their friends. The Crescents went out at 10.30, the ice being in splendid condition. The club showed fine combination and gave promise of putting up a good fight to-morrow night.

Paper-Making at Grand Falls.
Experienced non-biased American paper makers state that the like of the newspaper now being turned out at Grand Falls cannot be surpassed. For a new mill the results are surprising. In Canada or the United States at the start they never turned out as "good" a paper. The wood being used is burnt and dry wood. This is the wood that was condemned by the New York experts. Results show that Newfoundland burnt and dry wood can make a very superior paper. When green wood is being used it is expected that Grand Falls will turn out the best paper from wood in the world. Fifty tons of paper is made daily. The machines roll off 530 feet per minute, or 6 to 7 miles of paper in length per hour. Every thing around the mills under the strict supervision of Messrs. Riley, General Superintendent, J. Gaitely and others, is progressing very favourably. Magistrate Fitzgerald has been a very busy man the past few days, and returns to town the first train. Under his careful supervision all the shebeens have been cleared out, and Grand Falls now boasts of being one of the driest towns on this side of the Atlantic.

Fire at Grand Falls.
On Friday last, at 10.30 a.m., the domestic living with M. Sullivan, Esq., E.E., Grand Falls, discovered a slight blaze of fire in one of the rooms. She thereupon ran from the house and called "fire!" A lady living nearby telephoned the paper mills, and at once Tom Judge, electrician, had the fire alarm whistle sounded. Lieutenant Lee Phillips and a number of men had the hose carriage to the scene in rattling time. Superintendent of mills, J. P. Riley and a number of mill hands and strangers worked energetically with buckets, &c., and kept the blaze from increasing until the water came through the hose. "Colonel" Jim Berwick (as he is familiarly called) was at the electric water pumping station and gave a good head of water. Colonel Jim is very popular and is right in it when a fire takes place.
The fire company commanded by Captain Johnnie Gaitely did yeoman work. Gaitely is a born fire-fighter. Mike Shallow looked after the branch and axe men, and it is needless to say that he did his part. After about one half hour the "all out signal" was sounded, and whilst the damage might be greater it speaks well for the efficiency of Capt. Gaitely and his brave firemen that they did their work as well as could be done in any growing town elsewhere. A system of fire alarms and an up-to-date company is in contemplation for next summer. Under Gaitely's guidance and Colonel Berwick at the water power station, Grand Falls will be secure from any serious fires.

The Polling Yesterday.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Jan. 17.
Clear weather and a host of workers on either side using thousands of motor cars and carriages to convey delaying voters to the stations gave promise of a record poll at today's elections. In doubtful districts the party organizers were reinforced by an army of canvassers and very few voters escaped. In all 164 seats were contested to-day; of these 31 were London constituencies and 73 provincial. Last year the Unionists held 36, the Liberals 52, and the Laborites 16. The proportion for London alone was: Unionists, 17; Liberals, 12, and Laborites, 2. The City of London itself is quite safe for the Unionists, and A. J. Balfour and Sir F. G. Bannister doubtless will receive majorities even larger than they had at the last elections. There are a number of prominent members of the last house whose seats however are in danger. John Burns, President of the Local Government

Board, is having a hard fight against A. Shirley Benn, the Unionist candidate for Battersea and Clapham Battersea division; T. J. McNamara, Liberal candidate for Camberwell North division; A. Bonar Law, Unionist for Camberwell Dulwich division, and W. H. Long, Unionist of the Strand, are quite secure. The Liberals doubtless will lose Greenwich and other London districts. Among the provincial seats contested to-day are Blackburn, held at present by Philip Snowden, Laborite, one of the leaders of the Labor party, Bristol, where A. Birrell, Labor, and Hobhouse hold seats, and in which districts both sides profess confidence in making a clean sweep, and Portsmouth, where the Unionists are depending upon Admiral Beresford for their denunciation of the Liberal naval policy. Two Welsh and four Scottish boroughs are heretofore Liberal strongholds and will also vote to-day. John F. Redmond for Waterford City and six other Irish Nationalists were returned unopposed to-day.

Yesterday's Returns.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Jan. 17.
At the conclusion of to-day's polling in the General Elections the parties stood as follows: Unionists, 92; Liberals, 77; Laborites, 16; Nationalists, 13; net gains for the Unionists, 23. The Government fared much better to-day than their most ardent supporters expected. The Unionists gained 19 seats, the Liberals 4, and the Laborites 1; making a net gain for the Unionists for the day of fourteen, one less than they gained at fewer elections on Saturday. This practically assures the return of the Liberals with a fair majority, for among the places still to poll are those in Scotland and Wales, which are always solid Liberal. There cannot be said to have been many surprises to-day. Some expected that John Burns, President of the Local Government Board, would be defeated, but he was not. Other state officials who had to fight for their seats and were successful were Augustus Birrell and C. E. Hobhouse, and Dr. T. J. MacNamara. Their majorities were inconsiderable. A Canadian, Joseph Martin, former Premier of British Columbia, was successful in winning the seat for St. Pancras East. The Liberals also won back the adjoining constituency of Haggerston, which was represented by the Hon. R. Guinness, Unionist, he being defeated by P. G. Chancellor. The Unionist leaders who ran to-day, including A. J. Balfour, were A. Bonar Law, Walter Paine Long and Sir Wm. Bull. Sir William is the man who caused a division by engaging in a fight recently with a hecker. They held their seats by increased majorities. The polling was remarkably close in many constituencies. H. E. Duke won Exeter from the Liberals by a narrow margin of 26, while in the Beckham division of Camberwell Henry Cubitt Good, who secured a majority of more than 2,000 in the recent bye-election, retains his seat by a bare hundred. The North is solid for the Government, the midlands section, especially in the vicinity of Birmingham, favors Tariff Reform. Portsmouth gave the Unionists two gains—Admiral Lord Charles Beresford and C. B. Paine both being elected by huge votes. Polling will take place to-morrow for forty-six members—fourteen in London and thirty-two in the provinces. Numbers of the residents of Woolwich employed at the works of Vickers, Sons and Maxim, a few miles out, were brought to town in autos to vote. Crooks were beaten by 200 votes, whereas in the previous election he defeated Major Adams. The result was no surprise for the Government had turned out many laborers by reducing the work at Woolwich Arsenal, and they and their friends were sworn to revenge.

William Rice Killed by Pile Driver.

In the second place you are looking when you are self-consciously scrutinizing yourself in a mirror is quite different from what it is under ordinary conditions. I have noticed myself that people when they look in the mirror produce a peculiar set of wrinkles in their foreheads, and beauty doctors tell them that too much self-scrutinizing does a great deal of harm in this way.

So cheer up the next time you think you are the least desirable of all mortals.

But nobody knows what Finkelstein thought, unless it be Isador Garbus, his brother-in-law, who reported his disappearance to the police yesterday. Isador lived in the same tenement with Finkelstein, but though he is detained as a witness there is no proof that he had guilty knowledge of the tunnel.

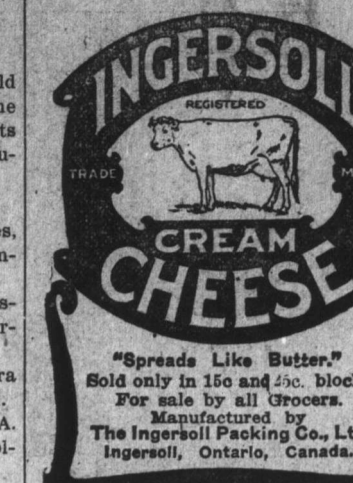

Annual Meeting of the Nfld. British Society.

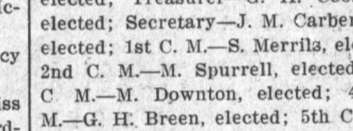

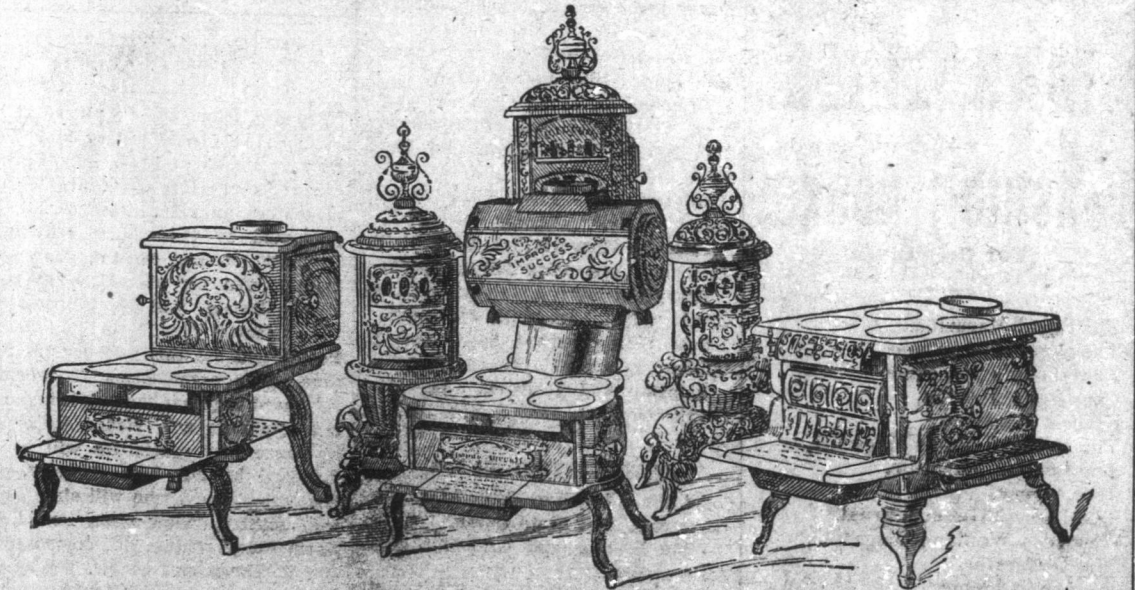
