For man must work and woman must weep And the sooner it's over the sooner to sleep— And good-bye to the bar and it's moaning.

"Oh, I wish I were a man. I could do so much more in my work." It was Molly, the little stenographer I had, who enunciated that sentiment. She made her moan before a group of half a dozen women, and four out of the six promptly echoed her sentiment.

"Just imagine being able to ask anyone you wanted to marry you, and not simply sit and wait to be asked," said the author's wife. "Aren't they lucky?"

"Wouldn't it be great to be able to travel around anywhere you liked and see the world and have adventures and never have to think about propriety?" mused the butterfly girl.

The other two didn't give any reason, just said they'd always wished they'd been born boys instead of girls.

Have you ever noticed how often you hear this sentiment expressed among women, especially of the younger generation?

"How I wish I had been born a man!" Why, to one young woman I've heard say she was heartily glad she was a woman, I've heard ten say they wish they had been born on the other side of the fence.

Incidentally, I can't recall that I ever heard a man say he wished he had been a woman. Can you? Isn't it queer?

And yet I can't quite condemn the attitude, because I must confess that

I've been one of the ten sometimes. But I do think there is a good deal more on the reverse of the medal than many of us who envy men their freedom and their opportunity to do big things realize.

For instance, I've often heard one of these would-have-been men say with a sigh of relief when the work went badly, "Oh, well, I suppose I shall get married and stop work some day."

Please turn over the medal, madame. Please remember that a man, no matter how strenuous and exhausting the competition, no matter how disagreeable the conditions of his work may be, he cannot look forward to any such relief. Marriage means to him merely the shouldering of new and tremendous responsibilities. He cannot fall now, he cannot drop out of the ranks. He must keep on, no matter how tired and weary of it all he may be, once he has given "hostages to fortune," in the shape of a wife and children.

Again, we think it must be splendid to be able to seek out the one you love and woo her, instead of sitting with folded hands hoping against hope that the right man will come for you, which like as not, he never will.

But turn the medal over again. Isn't it wonderful to know that the one who lays his heart at your feet has chosen you out of all the human beings he knows to be his mate? The man can only know that the woman has chosen him out of the few who has sought her, not out of all. There is one joy in having the right to choose out of all the world, but there is another joy in being chosen out of all the world.

These are but two ways in which the medal you thought had only one side can be turned over. Doubtless you can find others for yourself.

Dondon to Have Great Traction Combine Soon.

Central Committee to Take Over Control of Vast Transportation Interests.

LONDON, May 20. London is about to witness the formation of the biggest municipal transportation combine in the world. An arrangement has been reached between the General Omnibus Company and the companies controlling the underground railways and private street car lines by which the management of all these will pass into the hands of a central committee. The combination will operate 1,400 omnibuses, 200 miles of underground railways and fifty-five miles of street car lines.

"Nobody," said the manager of the General Omnibus Company, "need be alarmed lest the trust in cases of transportation was created to squeeze the public. The object of the new arrangement is to amalgamate the transit facilities, to adjust fares, to devise more convenient routes of travel and bring into being a system of universal transfer tickets on the American model. Although London has widespread facilities for quick transit, so poorly are these adapted to one another that the freedom of general travel is seriously restricted."

Some of the Advantages. "One buys a ticket on a certain omnibus or underground railway, or street car, goes a little distance and then finds one's self up against another system with facilities working independently and so requiring the passenger to make a fresh start as regards both the buying of a ticket and the catching of a bus, train or car. We propose to survey the whole field of transportation and introduce harmonious working among all the properties concerned."

"Apart from the street car lines controlled by the London County Council no line worth considering will be outside our scheme. Our problem is to transport with the minimum of trouble to the passengers considerably more than 650,000,000 persons a year."




Parade of Over- Sea Troops.

Two hundred Army officers of all nations have entered for the competitions at the Coronation Horse Show at Olympia. The British representatives number 128.

The directors of the show have arranged a special display on the morning of June 13 on behalf of the troops of the Over-Sea Dominions who are in London for the Coronation. This will be the first opportunity the public will have of seeing the 2,000 men in a body. The troops (with the exception of the Indian contingent, who will come from their quarters at Hampton Court by special train) will march with their officers and bands from the Duke of York's School to Olympia.

The officials have been compelled to close the list of costermongers' entries earlier than usual. There are 132 donkeys entered (as against last year's 57), and 52 entries in the new competition for the best and neatest costermonger's pony turn-out.

Festival of Empire.

RECORD ATTENDANCE.

Amid manifestations of enthusiasm that have never been surpassed, the King and Queen made their first public progress through the streets of London yesterday. The occasion was one that appealed to the popular imagination, for the Festival of Empire, which their Majesties inaugurated at the Crystal Palace, embodies sentiments and hopes that are uppermost in the minds of every British subject, no matter where his habitation.

London gave expression to these sentiments not only in the crowds that thronged the route from Buckingham Palace to Sydenham, but also in the loyal addresses that marked the most important stages of the royal progress. Nothing was wanting to the success of so memorable an event. Even the sun dispelled the morning clouds, to give unwonted brilliance to the crowded scenes of enthusiasm and to the long chorus of loyal greeting, in which many thousands of children joined to the delight of their Majesties.

The number of people who visited the Crystal Palace yesterday was late at night officially given as 144,224, a record since 1851, when it was opened.

Voice of the Empire—Mighty Chorus of Welcome.
A brilliant and animated scene met the eyes of the King and Queen as they approached the Crystal Palace. About the North Tower were assembled thousands of people, whose cheers shook as with a breeze the purple and white pavilion under which their Majesties passed. Between saluting ranks of West Surrey Territorials and blue-uniformed boys from the Royal Hospital School at Greenwich.

Waiting to receive their Majesties at the entrance to the Palace was a distinguished company, among whom were the Princess Royal and the Duke of Fife, Princess Louise and the Duke of Argyll, Princess Christian, Princess Victoria of Schleswig-Hol-

stein, Prince Alexander of Teck, the Duchess of Albany, the Duke of Marlborough, the Earl of Londsdale, and Viscount Hill.

The first and formal welcome over the King and Queen with the Prince of Wales and Princess Mary, were ushered to the royal box overlooking the central transept of the Palace. Here was the great heart of the event which the Empire was celebrating. Over the heads of ten thousand people who stood and turned with one accord as the trumpets sounded a greeting their Majesties saw the packed balconies and the great orchestra with its bands and its 4,500 singers.

Empire in Miniature.
It was no ordinary assembly that rose to cheer them. Here were men and women from every part of the Empire, of every shade of colour and of all the tongues that make the language of the British Dominions. Ambassadors and Ministers were there; representatives of the Dominions, official and non-official; members of the Government and of Parliament; soldiers and sailors famous in name and deed.

Standing side by side, with their children visible in the shadow of the royal box, the King and Queen bowed to the roar of the cheers that welcomed them.

Their Majesties have heard the National Anthem under many conditions and in many places both at home and abroad, but never have they heard it sung with more fervour or under conditions that gave to the familiar words a deeper significance. It was the voice of the Empire that rose from that mighty chorus and from the massed bands. None even hearing the distant echo of it could be unmoved by the triumph and the supplication with which the words and the music are instinct.

The imperial note reverberated through every phase of this harmonious prelude to the Festival of Empire and found an echo in the hearts of the people.

Special Evening Telegram, LONDON, May 30.

R. Hunt, the Unionist member for Shropshire, who has made it his special business to bait Sir Edward Grey on the subject of President Taft's Arbitration proposals, returned to the charge in the House of Commons this afternoon. Mr. Hunt suggested that the great expectations which had been raised by President Taft's original offer, had whittled away, as its ratification by the Senate was required; and that the proposals could no longer be regarded as a basis for a treaty of unrestricted arbitration. May we, hope, he added, that in future the Government will not allow itself to be bamboozled by Foreign Powers? Sir Edward Grey, as on previous occasions, declined to comment on the proposed treaty until he had thoroughly digested it. The full text of the drafted treaty had just been received. "I have not seen it," he said, "and intend to pay it the compliment of giving it my full consideration before I make any detailed comment concerning it. The draft treaty has a tentative character, and would form the subject of discussion on the part of the two governments. After consideration the British Government would make its suggestions to the United States Government, the author of the Treaty."

Special Evening Telegram, LONDON, May 30.

Newspapers of this city state that a serious plot has been discovered at Ponte de Lima, on the northern frontier. A number of conspirators had been furnished with arms by rich Portuguese, and were held at a very important point, ready to march at the first signal of the monarchists, who have taken refuge in Spain. The Portuguese Government, of learning of the plot, despatched infantry, which dispersed the conspirators, who fled to the mountains.

A. Parsons, R. Goodridge, W. W. Blackall, H. LeMessurier, D. M. Browning, J. L. Slattery, C. Hutton, W. Edgar and C. Woods.

Sir William Horwood was moved to the chair and explained the object of the convention. Mr. R. F. Goodridge was appointed Secretary. Much interest was taken in the proceedings and Mr. Clift hoped that something would be done which would redound to the credit of the Colony and exemplify its loyalty to the Throne, stated that he with Mr. F. J. Morris had interviewed many leading citizens and had suggested the holding of a concert in the Prince's Rink with a capable conductor in charge and with the assistance of the Brigade Bands. All had given their word that they would be delighted to assist and he thought it advisable to hold the celebration on the night of the 23rd June, when no other amusements would occur to interfere with it.

Mr. J. R. Bennett promised his co-operation and support, and Mr. J. L. Slattery proposed that the concert be held on Friday, June 23rd, which motion Sir J. S. Winter seconded, and who also spoke of the excellent music-cale given at the Prince's Rink when "Their Majesties visited us as Duke and Duchess of Cornwall."

This motion was carried and Mr. Hutton was given charge of the programme.

A financial committee was then appointed, consisting of the Chairman, Secretary, Hon. John Harris, Sir J. S. Winter, Mayor Ellis, J. A. Clift, F. J. Morris, W. R. Howley, J. R. Bennett, A. A. Parsons, A. J. W. McNeill and D. M. Browning.

Plans were discussed for the accommodation of those attending, and the giving of a free band concert in one of the parks. Plans were discussed for giving the children a share in the celebration, but nothing definite was done, and the meeting adjourned at 10 p.m.

Germany Ready.

Special to Evening Telegram. BERLIN, To-day. The Zeltung in an announcement of the steps taken by Germany towards arbitration, says that after the States had indicated to Germany her readiness to negotiate a broader Arbitration Treaty with other Powers as well as England. The newspaper says Germany expressed a wish to see the draft of the arbitration proposal and also indicated her readiness to take up the study of the propositions in the draft treaty to arrive here shortly. To the above statement can be added the semi-official expression of opinion that Germany, like Britain and France, is most sympathetic towards President Taft's Arbitration proposal. The leading newspapers welcome the news of the suggested Arbitration Treaty, finding that the project is open to improvement in some important points.

Reciprocity Unrest.

Special Evening Telegram. OTTAWA, To-day. Rumors of elections, cabinet changes, and other political matters, floating around, kept members of the Government and other liberal politicians busy filling denials. Mr. Fielding issued a statement to the Press, respecting his trip to England. He declares he booked a passage ten days ago and that he merely intends to pass through England on his way to the Continent, and may not meet Premier Laurier at all. Government supporters are frankly pleased by despatches from Washington which indicate the Reciprocity issue may be removed from Canadian politics by the Senate of the United States.

Motorist Meeting.

Some time ago a meeting was held of the owners of motor cars and motor cycles with a view of discussing the desirability of organizing a society. Last night, under the chairmanship of Mr. H. D. Reid and the secretaryship of Mr. G. M. Barr, a second meeting was held in a room of the Board of Trade. A desire was expressed to give full publicity to all their doings and to welcome reporters at such meetings. It was expressed that the general desire among motorists was to form a public opinion which would exercise control over individual drivers who might be inclined to be rash and reckless, and to promote good feeling among motorists themselves and friendly relations with the public in general. There are now some 119 motor cars and cycles in the city, and in the interest of the motorists themselves and the public, it is well that such an opinion should prevail as would assist the police and the municipality in enforcing the rules of the road and the regulations of speed. It was decided to proceed no further with the organizing until copies of bye-laws and constitution had been received from similar societies in England and the States.

The Brilliant Here.

H.M.S. Brilliant, Capt. Woolcombe, arrived here early this morning from Bay St. George via St. Pierre and will sail again Sunday for St. George. The ship left St. Pierre yesterday and had a good run to port. When at St. Pierre the commander of the ship called upon the Governor of the Island and an exchange of courtesies took place. The ship will celebrate Saturday, the King's birthday, with a Royal Salute and will be dressed out in bunting. She will also be here to participate in the Coronation festivities.
