



Things are no better than they were and I haven't done anything yet. I'm just kind of waiting for something to turn up."

So a friend, who has long been dissatisfied with the conditions that surround her, wrote me in answer to a query as to whether she had taken any steps towards bettering them.

What a common attitude she described. How many dissatisfied, restless people we meet everywhere, who continually fret and chafe against the conditions that surround them, but never take any decisive steps towards changing these conditions.

There are a few things more beautiful than the right kind of hope—the hope that cheers a man on to do his best and believe in ultimate success, no matter how dark the outlook or how heavy the odds against him.

There are a few things more harmful than the wrong kind of hope—the flabby, fold-a-hands hope, that makes a man continually procrastinate any effort, and cheats him with the foolish expectation that some turn of circumstances, some stroke of luck will surely end his misfortunes and bring

him everything he wants. There was once a young man in the newspaper business who graduated from one good position into another. In the space of five years, he made four steps upwards in his profession and finally graduated from it into an excellent position in safer and more remunerative work.

All the men who knew him said, "Did you ever see such luck as G. has?" When he made the final step into the desirable niche, just at the time when the paper he had worked for was crashing into financial ruin, one of the men who had been thrown out of work by the crash, and didn't know where to turn, said to him, "Well, I guess you were born under a lucky star. It's just your luck that that position should turn up right now."

"Luck your grandmother," retorted the indignant G. "Turn up nothing. I've been gunning for that position for some time. I can tell you, my friend, that I never dare to wait for things to turn up. I always have to go out and turn them up myself."

There are undoubtedly such things as unsought opportunities, but they usually come to men who have attracted them by repeated demonstrations of their unusual worth. And, as the epigram maker has it, "Most men make more opportunities than they find." After all, home-made opportunities, like a good many other home-made things, are apt to be the best.

Make your own opportunities, go out and turn them up. Instead of emulating Micawber, and I think you'll be astonished at the progress you will make.

LONDON, Feb. 11.
The Rev. Dr. Fairbairn, Principal Emeritus of Mansfield College, Oxford, is dead; aged 74.

HALIFAX, Feb. 11.
The Government steamer Aberdeen was ordered by the Marine Department on Saturday to proceed to Cape Race on lighthouse work, but eighteen of her firemen went out on strike and refused to go. They allege a trip to that vicinity this time of year is dangerous on account of ice. Up to tonight no substitutes had been secured.

LONDON, Feb. 11.
The morning papers of yesterday connect Churchill's speech at Glasgow with the mission of Viscount Haldane to Germany, and consider the address and the visit of the War Minister to Berlin as not a mere coincidence. Conservative papers are pleased with Churchill's patriotic tone, while the Radical organs think that it was ill-advised at such a critical moment to flourish Britain's naval supremacy. The Times, editorially, thinks that the speech of Churchill and the visit of Haldane are part of an arranged plan, and says that a careful study of the speech should curb the imaginative flights of those journalists at home and abroad, who connect Haldane's mission with impracticable pacific proposals.

PARIS, Feb. 11.
The ratification of the Franco-German accord with the concurrence of the Chamber of Deputies was signalled to-day by a dramatic speech of ex-Premier Clemenceau, during which he characterized the treaty as "a diplomatic monster." He attacked the concessions and said that the negotiations should not have been conducted under the threat of the Panther's guns. He doubted if the accord would be an instrument of peace, as he saw no indication of good will or moderation on the part of Germany, which five times since 1870, had menaced France with war, without the slightest provocation. Clemenceau closed the debate with a severe criticism of the treaty, which he declared could not possibly be defended. France had her finger on the trigger, and should have said no to the negotiations conducted under the guns at Agadir.

The Tories of Carleton, Ont., at their annual meeting, passed a resolution bitterly opposing Home Rule for Ireland. Why did they not oppose Home Rule for Canada?

Household Notes.

Lemon syrup, made by baking a lemon for twenty minutes and then squeezing out the juice in half a cup of sugar, is excellent for hoarseness and to break up a cold.

When baking an apple pie, put a teaspoonful or two of strong cold tea in the filling; also try the same in your apple sauce or baked apples, and notice the improved flavor.

The white mayonnaise prepared by foreign chefs calls for cream, lemon juice and the white of egg, instead of the oil, vinegar and egg yolks of the ordinary mayonnaise.

Sandwiches prepared in advance of serving time can be kept as fresh as when made by wrapping them in a napkin wrung out in hot water and then placing in a cool place.

In baking biscuits, have the oven quite hot at first, but lower the temperature just a little before the biscuits are ready to take out. This will add materially in making the biscuits light.

Mint sandwiches are tasty for supper or afternoon tea. Mince the leaves from one or two bunches, season with oil, vinegar, salt and paprika and spread between slices of bread and butter.

The objectionable sputtering and frying of hot fat when eggs, hominy, apples and like things are dropped into it to fry, may be prevented if a little flour is sifted into the fat just before they are added.

Tie a narrow ribbon bow just above the handle of your umbrella. Leave a loop long enough to slip over your arm when you go shopping. This is a good way to avoid losing your favorite umbrella.

Housekeepers who have tried both ways say that it is far better to trim the selvage from material before making it into pillowcases. The cases will be much smoother and will not wrinkle along the seam.

If a picture be crushed in the mail, dampen the creases, press with a warm iron and then place under a press or weight for a short time, having first protected the picture side by covering with white paper.

Fish scales may easily be removed by pouring hot water on the fish slowly until the scales curl, then scraping quickly. Wash in several waters, having the last cold and well salted, and no slime will be left.

When buttons are taken from an old dress they should be loosely strung on a thread before being put into a button box. This is a time-saver and keeps the buttons from getting lost, or several of the set from being used.

A resident of Philadelphia who is married and addicted to irregular hours, has arranged the mechanism of the clocks in his house so that on lodge nights the hands stop at 10.45, while the clocks keep on ticking.

State of Streets.

There can be no doubt that the City Council will come out badly this winter in its bargain with the Reid Street Car Co. to clear the part of the street abutting the belt line. Last week the state of Water Street was about as bad as it could well be, and there was little attempt to make the section to the south of the car branch passable for vehicles. That side of Water Street was nothing but a succession of hillocks and gulches. It is now up to the City Council to keep the streets passable, and vehicles should not be subjected to the conditions which existed on Water Street last week. It was a most pitiful sight to see horses endeavouring to drag catamarans and their loads over the hillocks and through the gulches which existed. Traffic is greatly impeded, drivers are harassed, and horses are put to strains which are cruel. Even though the City Council should be called upon to spend far more this winter than they bargained to receive from the Reids, it is up to the Municipality to clear the streets and render traffic more possible than it was last week.

T.A. & B.S. Savings' Bank.

The regular monthly meeting of the T. A. & B. Society was held yesterday afternoon and was largely attended despite the bad weather prevailing. One member of the Juvenile branch was transferred to the parent body and 19 new members were added to the roll. The scheme for a savings bank for the Society, mentioned by the Telegram some time ago, will come into effect in about 3 months' time. A cashier and a financial secretary will be appointed by the Society and it will also extend to the Juvenile Society. The mothers, sisters and other relatives of the boys can make deposits for them, and the institution of a bank will be of great benefit to the members of both organizations.



NEW "BRUCE"

In Port --- She is Termed 'Marvel of the Clyde.'

The Reid Nfld. Co's. new steamer Bruce steamed through the slob in the Narrows at 8 o'clock this morning, having left Greenock last Saturday about 6 p.m. Much delay was experienced owing to fog coming down the Clyde, the ship having to anchor five times. The last sight of the Irish coast was not lost to view till Monday at 11 o'clock, when the course was taken from Mullin Head. The ship made 15 knots all next day as the sea was smooth. This speed was kept up all the time, except that about 11 p.m. every day the Bruce would be slowed down to free the pumps from coal dust. About eight hours altogether were lost in this way. Saturday's storm considerably retarded the ship's progress and heavy seas swept over the bows, coating her with ice. In the change of the watch a big sea swept over the ship and broke down the door of the mail room and did considerable damage. Sunday morning the gale increased but the Bruce behaved splendidly, the ice on the top seems like a duck. The ice was struck 150 miles E. by S. from Cape Spear and the captain slowed her down to half speed. It was a favorable opportunity to try her qualities, as the ice was partly heavy. She ploughed her way through it beautifully and proved her ice-breaking qualities to the satisfaction of all the crew. A hurricane blew all last night with thick snow, but the Bruce kept moving in her halcyon mood and when the weather cleared up early this morning Cape Spear was in sight. The passengers who came over, viz. Hon. M. P. Cashin, Dr. Patterson and W. S. Monro, speak in the most enthusiastic terms of the ship and report that in Greenock she is called "The marvel of the Clyde."

Crowds of citizens visited her at the Reid Nfld. Co. pier to-day, there being a regular procession going to the dock all the forenoon. And indeed the new Bruce is really worth seeing. She is 250 feet long, 36 feet in width, 25 ft. 3 in. deep; gross tonnage, 1,700. She is specially strengthened in the bows for working in ice, and has triple expansion engines with cylinders 25 in., 42 in. and 68 in., with 45 h.p. stroke. There are four boilers of large bore, 180 h.p. pressure, and the speed is 15 knots. Like the old Bruce she is rigged as a two-master schooner but is much superior in accommodation, having a very fine promenade deck where there is a large and exquisitely fitted up ladies' sitting room finished in bird's eye maple. The furniture upholstering in red plush is very rich looking and suggestive of the acme of comfort. A self-playing musical instrument is also here, which adds to the attractions. The Marconi room and several other private apartments are also on the promenade deck. The saloon and the ladies' cabin are on the main deck. The former is an imposing and spacious apartment and allows room for three rows of tables. The upholstery is finished in blue leather and blue plush. There are sixty berths in the saloon, but there is accommodation for 75 first class passengers provided amidships in the state-rooms. There are ten berths in the ladies' cabin, all fitted up in the most elaborate style. The saloon is finished in polished hardwood and there is a complete system of heating and electricity throughout. The men's smoking room on the promenade deck is a splendid room and is finished in white oak. It is a spacious apartment, measuring 18 x 16 feet. The steeage for ladies contains 30 berths and the men's 120. The officers' quarters are very fine, as well as the galley, the kitchen and pantry. Provision seems to have been made for every requirement and the past experience in the old Bruce has enabled the company to supply the smallest requirement. It is likely that she will go out for a trial spin to-morrow.

Terrible Blizzard

WITH INTENSE FROST SATURDAY AND SUNDAY.

A snow storm began about 2.30 p.m. Saturday and by 11 o'clock that night had reached the intensity of a blizzard with a hurricane of wind from the N. N. W. The blizzard raged until about 10.30 last night and few people were able to get to the city yesterday and 20 below at the Quarry, while all over the country the temperature was very low, and the storm piled snow to a great height. The trains along the railway line were stalled and the weather was the worst recorded for several years past.

Chinese Republic To-Morrow.

Special to Evening Telegram.
PEKING, To-Day.
An edict establishing the Republic will probably be issued on Feb. 13th, is the statement from the Chinese Foreign Board. The statement says the Republicans are harassed by dissensions. There is no fear of the transfer of the capital from Peking, although that point has not yet been absolutely agreed upon. The delay in the issuance of the edict of abdication is due largely to the necessity of an amicable settlement of the details of the new organization in order to secure prompt recognition. Assurances are given that Yuan Shi Kai, the Imperial Premier, is now in full accord with the Republicans and actually advising with respect to future plans and looking to the effective co-ordination of all the provinces and factions in making arrangements for the machinery of the Republican Government.

Searching for Missing Man

In connection with the non-appearance of Mr. Patrick Flynn, alluded to elsewhere, Mr. Wm. Ring, keeper at the Lunatic Asylum, who knew Mr. Flynn well, says that he was with him at the railway station Saturday evening before the 6 o'clock train left, and that the man, whom he accompanied out on the platform of the station, boarded the train to go to Waterford Bridge, which place he would leave for his home on the Topsail Road. He lives past the Asylum grounds, and to reach his residence would have to go up by the side of the river or through Hamlin's field. Mr. Ring communicated with his friends and this morning a search party left the West End to look for the missing man. Mr. Flynn was a man well known in the city and has many relatives living in the extreme West End, including his mother, who is in deep trouble over his disappearance. His wife is also greatly grieved over the occurrence and it is hoped by some that the man having missed his way reached another house

Man Falls on Street.

While walking up Victoria Street Saturday afternoon in the storm a man named Way was seized with a sudden illness and fell to the ground. He appeared to be dangerously ill for a while and people passing bore him into the Imperial Tobacco works where Mr. Perkins and others gave him stimulants and after a while he recovered. He was then driven home in a sleigh, accompanied by Const. Turk.

People Were Frostbitten.

Owing to the intense frost and fierce blizzard which prevailed yesterday the congregations at most of the city churches were small. Many of those who were brave enough to leave their homes suffered greatly from the cold and not a few were frostbitten about the ears and face. People who noticed their condition when they arrived at the church entrances rubbed the affected parts with snow, restoring animation.

In order to emphasize the importance of the proper disposal of lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes, Commissioner Johnson, of New York, had an automobile fire engine equipped recently with large signs reading:—"Throwing away lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes, and endangering life and property, is now a misdemeanor and will be prosecuted." The Commissioner sent the engine to Broadway and Wall Street, with the hope of bringing out its importance by reason of the Equitable ruins being close by.

New Earl of Fife a Policeman.

But All He Inherits is a Title Which May not Change His "Beat."

New York, Feb. 1.—A London cable says: The Duke of Fife's successor to the Earldom of Fife will be Jekyl Chalmers Duff, who has been for several years a policeman in Australia. Duff will inherit not only the title of Earl of Fife, but also the titles Viscount Macduff and Baron Bracom. No property goes with the title, and the peerage doesn't carry with it a right to a seat in the House of Lords, as it is in the Irish Peerage.

C. E. T. S. Celebration.

The time was come when a decision should be made as to whether we should cut off the limb that is diseased or allow it to work our ruin. The preacher believed that we should have a more drastic remedy like Local Option. He urged all to join the Society and to pray for the good cause. He warned all from ridiculing the drunkard. They should rather pity and pray for him and help to save him and his family. The sermon was listened to with deep attention and made a strong impression.

Sightless Eyes See Again.

A Remarkable Operation Performed by Dr. Magtrot in Paris.

Paris, January 27.—An experiment, resulting in the partial restoration of a blind eye, has been reported to the Academy of Science by Professor Dastre, on behalf of Dr. Magtrot, who performed the experiment. He grafted on the cornea (the transparent membrane covering the eyeball) of one eye of a man blind in both eyes a piece of the cornea from another man's eye, and part of the blind eye's vision has now returned.

Dr. Magtrot had two patients suffering from eye trouble. One of them had completely lost his sight. The cornea of one eye had been burned by quicklime, and the scar which followed obstructed vision. The other man was suffering from glaucoma, a disease of the eye which causes blindness, although the cornea may be perfectly sound. One of this man's eyes was removed, but Dr. Magtrot preserved a small portion of the healthy cornea in a serum and kept it "alive" for eight days.

Meantime, in the scar on the other man's cornea he cut, as it were, a tiny peephole about the twice the size of a pinhead, and then applied the preserved part of the healthy cornea as the "window pane" for this peephole. Within a few days the healthy tissues joined up. A few weeks afterward the bandages were taken off, and the patient was able to see sufficiently to find his way about. The ophthalmist watched his patient's progress for six months, and now he is able to report to the academy that one-tenth of the man's normal vision has been restored.

Found in Drifts.

Shortly before midnight Saturday, when the blizzard raged with particular violence, Head Const. Peet while on his rounds found a man named Thomas Stamp, aged 65 years, lying in the drift in the West End, and had he been left a short while longer must have smothered. The man had taken some liquor and was making his way home when he fell and lay in the snow. The "Head" with the assistance of other men of the force brought the unfortunate to the police station, where his clothes, which were filled with snow, were taken off and put near the stove to dry while the guard and the other men wrapped him in blankets, and putting him opposite the stove, in which was a big fire, he gradually came round. The man was miserably clad to be out in such weather and the belief is that he had very little food during the day, as he is not in the best of circumstances. Yesterday he was feeling very unwell as the result of the exposure he suffered.

Sweeper Damages Tram.

Saturday evening in the height of the blizzard as one of the street cars was turning into Holloway St. from Water Street, a sweeper coming over the latter thoroughfare crashed into the front of the tram and badly smashed it. Neither of the motormen saw the cars in which they were advance owing to the thick snow which fell, and when the cars came together both men narrowly escaped serious injury. The tram was badly smashed and will need considerable repairs.




