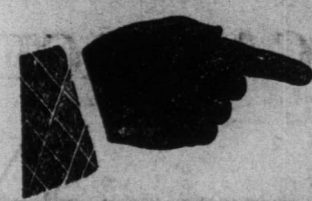

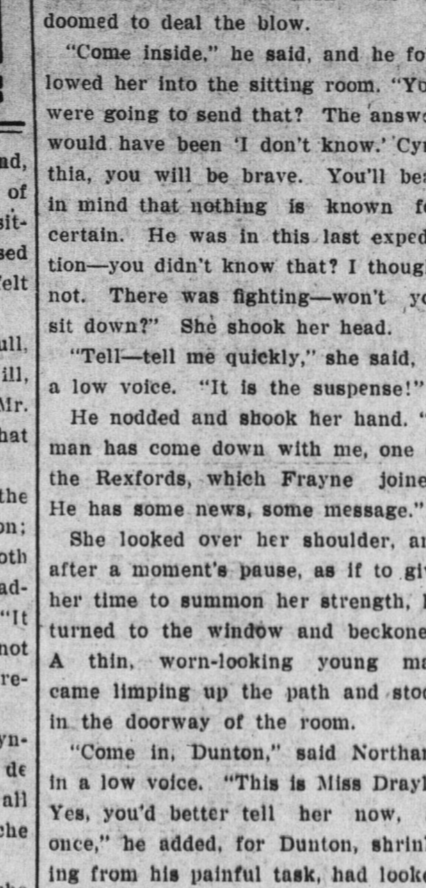

And thus it goes, an endless chain, so all our swatting is in vain unless we do that swatting soon, in Maytime and in early June. So, men and brothers, let us rise, gird up our loins and swat the flies! And sisters, leave your cozy bowers where you have wasted golden hours; with ardor in your souls and eyes, roll up your sleeves and swat the flies!

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Walking as a Tonic And Pastime.

Walking, says Omega, which also means standing erect, with shoulders thrown back, lungs expanded and head well poised, is the best tonic that can be prescribed for exhausted brains, weakened muscles and worn-out nerves. It strengthens the digestive organs, drives the blood away from the tired brain, and is one of the best cures for nervousness.

There is no better way of curing rheumatism than by a walk in warm weather. You have all the advantages of the Turkish bath without the danger of breathing impure air. Physicians have cured the worst kinds of rheumatism, stubborn forms of indigestion, aggravated cases of insomnia and all sorts of nervous diseases by exercises in breathing and walking.

There is a famous medical man of Munich, who has formulated a system of breathing and walking by which asthmatic patients are taught to walk without using breath, while suffers from weakness of the heart and nervously exhausted persons are cured. No matter how long the walk or how steep the climb, no one need "get out of breath" who follows this simple system, the breathing and walking being in time together.

In ascending a stair or path one should take one breath for every step, and the fuller the breath the better. In walking along a level stretch, one should take two steps to every breath, thus the inhalation and exhalation always begin as the same foot touches the ground.

That tired feeling which walking brings on is natural, and in a few weeks' practice one is able to walk a mile or more without fatigue. The walking is of itself a recreation, and a great help to the development and preservation of physical symmetry. Its tonic effects are much better when one walks correctly and at regular times.

In order to walk correctly, one should stand quite erect, and breathe in a proper manner, then swing the leg from the hip. By so doing the muscles which are strongest bear the strain, and the length of the stride is increased several inches. The heel touches the ground first, and the toe, and a slight spring is given from the ball of the foot to aid in making another step.

Woman Jumps Over Niagara.

Niagara Falls, May 15.—Under the gaze of at least fifty men, women and children, Mrs. Ches. M. Schmidt, of 128 Woodward Avenue, Buffalo, yesterday threw off her coat, flung her purse away, and leaped into the American Rapids a few feet above Prospect Point. As the crowd looked helplessly on the woman was speedily swept over the brink to her death.

An engraved visiting card, bearing the name and address of the suicide, was found in her purse. Word was sent to Buffalo, and a brother of the woman came here last night and identified the coat and purse. He said that Mrs. Schmidt had been ailing for about two weeks. She was 44 years old.

THE TREPASSEY BRANCH.—Work on the Trepassey Branch railway is proceeding apace, and the graders are now within one mile of Trepassey, while the rails are only two miles from that terminus. Quite a number of men at work there are leaving every day to engage in the fishery and some are going abroad.

Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram.

BERLIN, May 21.
True Hohenzollern weather and brilliant sunshine and cloudless skies have set in for the wedding festivities of Princess Victoria Luise, the daughter of the German Emperor, to Prince Ernest August of Cumberland, which takes place on Saturday, May 24. The official reception began this morning, with the arrival of her bridegroom, and the state entry into Berlin of King, George, and Queen Mary, who, when they alighted from the train, were greeted with the customary cordial embraces by the Emperor and other members of the Imperial Family. King George and Emperor William then jointly passed in review of a guard of honor drawn up on the platform. Thus coupled the two monarchs together, and the Queen and Empress side by side drove in open state to the castle. Each carriage was escorted by a squadron of cavalry with pennant lances.

CALGARY, Alberta, To-day.
Cameron, the special agent of the C.P.R., who has just returned from the flood-stricken district of the Mississippi Valley, states that thousands of farmers in that locality are preparing to emigrate to Canada West.

PHILADELPHIA, To-day.
The striking stevedores and longshoremen have been advised by the shipping interests that they can return to work if they will accept an advanced rate of 30 cents an hour, agreed upon last week. The dock men have not yet met this offer but are standing firm for their demands of 35 cents an hour. Meanwhile much ocean-going shipping is at a standstill and coastwise traffic is crippled. Trans-Atlantic liners are being sent to other ports for cargoes, while vessels at sea have been notified by wireless to hold off until a settlement can be completed for them to be unloaded. Shippers say they cannot pay 35 cents an hour. A disorder, which is attributed by the police to be the result of the longshoremen's strike, broke out near Specimens Sugar Refinery to-day. One man was taken to hospital, badly beaten and his life in danger.

LONDON, May 21.
According to letters received from Madrid, there is only the faintest hope that Prince Jaime, King Alfonso's five-year-old son can ever be cured of deafness and dumbness. Helen Keller has been summoned by the Queen to proceed with all haste to the Royal Palace, every specialist of note in Europe having failed to help the child. The wonderful American deaf mute will give the Prince a course of the treatment, which was so successful in her own case.

Western Fishery.
In connection with the fishery between Harbour LaCoe and Braziels the Board of Trade are in receipt of the following:—"Codfish is getting scarce and a good many of our boats have gone to Cape Breton. There was plenty of bait during the latter part of the week. The lobster fishery to date has been very poor. On Saturday we had the strongest gale for years, and many of the fishing boats were driven off, but managed to reach the shore after the storm abated. The prevailing winds lately have been north-east and salmon is very scarce, the fish passing up offshore. The catch of codfish for the week was 200 qts."

Mr. J. Cunningham wrote of the fishery between Connoire Bay and Red Island, as follows:—"Prospects are not very good. There is plenty of herling ball, but codfish is getting very scarce. Nothing has been done at the lobster fishery up to the present. About 12,000 pounds of fresh halibut have been shipped to market."

Mr. T. Soper writing on the 10th from Channel, says: The weather for the previous week was very poor, high winds and intense cold prevailing. The prospects for a good catch of codfish are poor, and some are giving up the winter voyage. The total catch is 3,236 quintals, and for last week, 123. At present the outlook for the lobster fishery is not bright."

New Gauging Rods.

The new and improved gauging rods, recently introduced by the Chief Inspector of Weights and Measures, have arrived from England, and are now to be had from the principal dealers. These rods have been approved of by the public gaugers, as well as by the several master coopers on the mercantile premises. In the past considerable disputes have arisen in the gauging of oil, molasses, etc., owing, no doubt, to the various makes of rods in use. The new rods are made of the best material, and have been registered and passed by the British Board of Trade. These rods will in the future give better satisfaction to buyers and sellers of oil, molasses, etc., than those which were formerly used for such purposes.

Supt. Burke's Report.

Mr. Burke complains that "it is practically impossible for any man to do the work of an educational department and at the same time inspect 220 schools, or in all 255 departments, in 200 school days. He points out that it is only the balance of the time left after keeping up the administration work to date that is devoted to school. We have always contended that the time and energy of the Superintendent which should be devoted to control and inspection of schools, counsel with teachers and boards, and attention to children and their school courses is largely diverted to work which could be done in a central office by ordinary clerks.

We notice that Mr. Burke has a tilt against home lessons. He gives as his invariable experience that "children of the lowest standards are compelled to do overtime work, after having done a day's work in school." He says: "I shall not urge the abolition of home lessons in the higher classes, yet I most strongly recommend all teachers within my superintendence to set no home tasks to children in the Primary, First and Second Standards." We congratulate Supt. Burke on the stand he has taken, and he might with advantage go further and urge fewer home tasks for the older pupils.

Commenting on the Household Science School, which has 200 girls on its roll, who receive one lesson a week, Mr. Burke suggests that the classes should be held during ordinary school hours. He points out that the work is just as important as any other school subject. He fears that the overtime called for will eventually

cause the classes to be unpopular, and as a remedy he recommends that one session out of the ten be devoted to Household Science.

Mr. Burke commends the pioneer labours of Miss Wright, who has charge of the school, and publishes her report. In it Miss Wright puts down the total cost of the training at 2 cents a week per pupil. As to the course, Miss Wright says: "five methods of cooking were taught, viz.: Boiling, Simmering, Baking, Sauteing and Frying, with dishes to illustrate each method." She hopes to make provision for teaching table setting and serving, laundry and dressmaking.

Mr. Burke declares roundly that the C. H. E., although so adversely criticized, has done more to stimulate interest in education and emulation in schools than possibly any other agency, and he submits that Newfoundland has not yet arrived at the educational stage at which these public can be dispensed with. He looks upon recent changes as advantageous to younger pupils by raising the age for admission to the examinations and by reducing competition.

As to Empire Day, Mr. Burke reports that it is observed by nearly all their schools, and that teachers and pupils take a keen interest in the observance. As to the Consolidation of the Education Act, he learns from an authoritative source, it is to be undertaken during the coming year.

In order to meet the intention of the Rhodes Trust to select scholars only from institutions of University standing, Mr. Burke offers this suggestion:

"We should be able to give the two years' university training required at home; and if a sufficient sum of money were provided so that the colleges could each secure the services of a specialist in certain subjects, who, in addition to some specified work in his own college, could also give lectures to a combined class of advanced students from all the colleges, the requirements would be met. Some of our public school teachers would also, I feel assured, take advantage of such an opportunity to do higher work, and the benefit which the whole Colony would eventually derive from such an arrangement would more than compensate for the required expenditure."

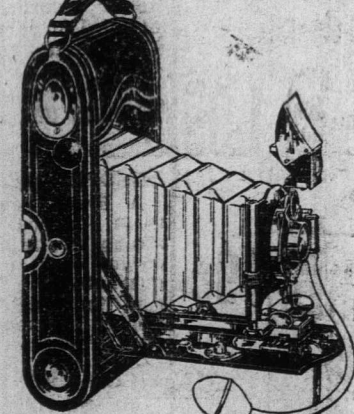

The Archbishop at St. George's.

The express train due at St. George's on Friday evening, 16th, and conveying His Grace Archbishop Howley, en route for Nova Scotia, was delayed owing to the bad state of the road, until 4 a.m.—Saturday. Hence the grand demonstration prepared, had to be postponed till Saturday night. His Grace and party detained and were welcomed and most hospitably received at the Palace by His Lordship Bishop Power.

On Saturday evening the whole town was ablaze with a general illumination. The Convent, with its large newly erected addition, looked very effective. The boys indulged in a display of tar barrels and a general salvo of artillery.

On Sunday a large congregation filled the elegant new Cathedral. The High Mass was sung in a splendid manner, in the Gregorian Chant. His Grace preached on the Mystery of the Holy Trinity—the festival of the day being celebrated. The Archbishop alluded to the Great Universal Jubilee of the Holy Cross to be commemorated during this year the 16th century of the triumph of the church under Constantine, and the Glory of the Holy Cross. His Grace, in feeling terms to his former sojourn among the people of St. George's.

In the afternoon the people assembled in the spacious "St. George's Hall," where addresses were presented, one from the people in general which was read by Mr. McDonnell, J.P., and one on behalf of the Star of the Sea Society read by the President Aloisius O'Reilly, Esq. The Archbishop replied in a few appropriate words and charges were given for the Bishops and clergy, etc.

After this the children of the Convent school in a large number, appropriately attired gave a most pleasing entertainment, consisting of songs and recitations and closing with a very excellent rendition of "The Flag of Newfoundland." His Grace complimented the children on the very superior nature of the performance, and felt very pleased and happy. The following are the addresses:—

To the Most Rev. Michael Francis Howley, D.D., Archbishop of St. John's.

Your Grace:—On behalf of the Star of the Sea Association we assure you of our honor for your presence, our admiration for your noble qualities, an honor and admiration second only to that of the people of your own beloved city.

We yield to them in this; we acknowledge them first in all Newfoundland in the ardor of their admiration, in their capacity for showing the respect they feel for your rank and dignity in the Church of God.

But in our love for you we decline to yield them first place; the humblest heart is capable of great love. Love is not a question of intellect, and, although we may be less demonstrative, we feel none the less deeply and cherish the thought of those we love none the less tenderly.

Many of us have received from your Grace, the waters of Baptism, many have been confirmed, married, prepared for death; many, at the grave-side, have heard your voice raised in the last prayers for our departed dear ones—many, many of us have been comforted in our distress and relieved in our want by your kind and generous heart.

In our love for you, therefore, we cannot yield even to the great-hearted people of St. John's the palm, and we believe and trust that in your affections we hold no secondary place.

Asks For Central Body To Advise on Imperial Finance.

London, May 15.—The interesting suggestion was made by Premier Watt, of Victoria, yesterday, that some "organism" should be established in the Imperial Government which would interest itself in the finances of the Overseas Dominions and give advice to help the ministers who came to London for assistance.

Mr. Watt did not want it to be understood that he was complaining of how financial London had treated any of the Dominions. Australia had obtained singularly favorable terms in the past, but all the same it did appear to him that when a representative of a Dominion came to the Mother Country he should be placed in touch with some organism that would guide and help him in the discharge of his public and financial trust before, if necessary, he saw any of the private financiers in London.

A recent editorial of the Saturday Evening Post, refers to the case of Andrew Toth, proven innocent of murder twenty years after a life sentence to the penitentiary.

The writer suggests the crying need of legislation which will provide redress and at least financial restitution to such unfortunate as Toth.

A few weeks ago a New York attorney, disbarred from practice for alleged misdemeanors, was shown guiltless of the charges up on which he had been deprived of livelihood, honor, friends and name.

It was not only the blindness of justice which wrecked this life, but the open-eyed conspiracy of a powerful corporation revenging itself upon an honest lawyer successfully prosecuting the damage suit of an injured child.

Time, the great solvent of lies, at last exposed the details of the vile plot. Documents, as well as confessions, established the fact that a great railway company was responsible for this outrage and that its officials indorsed the acts of the directly responsible subordinates.

Now, a broken, haggard, empty-hearted old-young man is "generously" permitted by the community to take up his work where "Justice" some twelve years ago, checked his activities.

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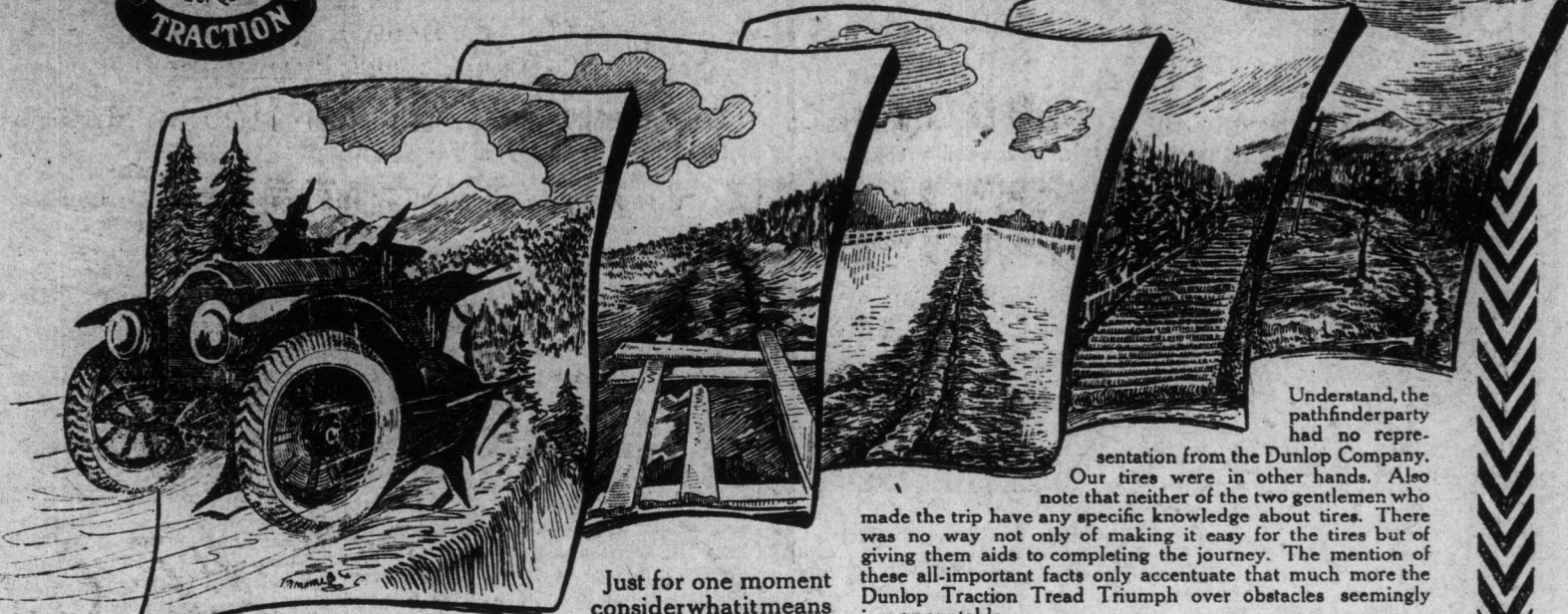

Ulster Warned to Obey the Law.

Dublin, May 17.—Considerable comment has been caused by the sermon preached by the Protestant Bishop of Ossory at the general synod of the Irish church before the leading clergy of the country. Although the Bishop's congregation was largely composed of those who openly advocate that home rule be opposed with armed force this church dignitary lectured his Ulster brethren upon the necessity of obeying the law.

"In the democratic constitution of modern states like our own," said the bishop, "the idea of the divine right of kings is not likely to be revived. For the law of the sovereign we have substituted—whether wisely or unwisely I do not now inquire—the law of the community. Law is no longer conceived as imposed by a superior upon his subjects; it is the expression of the will of the people. In those altered circumstances the precept, Render to Caesar the things that are Caesar's resolves itself into the principle that it is the duty of good citizens to obey the law which they themselves have made.

"And exactly here is the great problem of modern democracy?—how to preserve in the community a sense of the majesty of law, of the supreme value of its discipline, of the duty imposed upon each, of cheerful obedience for the sake of all. We cannot say that the problem has yet been

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.
TOKIO, May 21.
Since the news that the Californian Alien Land-ownership Bill had been signed by Governor Johnson, was received here, the Government has redoubled its efforts to pacify the people in the belief that Washington will find a peaceful solution of the problem. It is felt, however, that it will be extremely difficult to stem the tide of popular anger against the United States, as the Japanese generally regard the issue as one involving their national honor. Bankers and business men throughout the country favor moderation and are heading all their efforts to avoid a conflict. Considerable alarm is evident, however, in official circles owing to the attitude of the lower classes, who seem to desire war on any pretext and under any conditions. The old Samurai spirit appears to be reviving in the Emperor and his entourage, bearing in mind the success of the republican movement in China which has had such a strong effect upon the peasantry and workers in the cities—and Japan is afraid to resist it. Arthur Bailey Blanchard, Secretary of the American Embassy, called on the Japanese Foreign Minister yesterday and assured him that the United States would do its utmost to find a peaceful solution of the dispute, asserting again it was not an American but only a Californian dispute.

LONDON, May 21.

Lord Methuen, in the course of a speech at a meeting of the Army Temperance Association, warned society against the increase of smoking among women. He declared women did not know the sense of propriety the same as did men, when they began smoking and did not know where they acquired the craving, in which they indulged from morning until night. "I hope," said the speaker, "society will recognize an excess of smoking among womanhood as among men, is a danger that we must protect ourselves against—not only for ourselves but in the interest of our children who come after us."

MONTREAL, May 21.

The action of the underwriters of Lloyd's Marine Insurance Companies in refusing to insure the largest type of modern liners constructed for the Hamburg-American lines had the effect of compelling these lines to undertake much of their own insurance. The contention of the underwriters is that even if there be no serious casualty, the leviathans rarely make a trip without encountering some mishap sufficient to run away with the premium, which leaves the underwriters in an unsatisfactory position. The insurance question is therefore bound to have a tendency to limit the size of future ships; and it seems probable that with the launching of the new White Star liner Britannic which is under construction at Belfast the limit will have been reached as regards the size of the vessels which cross the north Atlantic.

LONDON, May 21.

The Standard asserts the military cause is practically bankrupt; and claims to know that the alleged huge war chest of the suffragettes of over \$500,000 is a gigantic bluff. The alleged \$75,000 subscribed at the last Albert House meeting consisted of dummy cheques, there being only \$4,000 in cash. The receipts from the sales of militant papers and subscriptions are also rapidly dwindling.

EDINBURGH, May 21.

A bomb exploded in the west dome of the Royal Observatory here at half past one this morning. The astronomical instruments were badly damaged, but the building itself escaped serious damage. The bomb consisted of an earthenware vessel filled with gunpowder. The militant suffragettes are suspected by the authorities as the perpetrators of the outrage.

**Drawn Into
Bread Mixer.**

Boston, May 15.—The prompt action of George Karpollus, a fellow workman, saved Stephen Saragittalis a baker living at 21 Richmond Street, North End, from death in a mechanical bread mixer in the bakery of the American-Greek Baking Co., at 136 Commercial Street, yesterday morning.
Saragittalis' arm was caught in the mixer and he was drawn into it screaming with fright. The big slabs were slowly pounding out his life when Karpollus sprang to the electric switch and turned off the current. Saragittalis was taken unconscious to the relief station. His body is covered with bruises and contusions, but it is said he will recover.

SNOWING AND COLD.—Yesterday for a while it snowed on the Topsalls and also last night. The past week it has been intensely cold right across country, and in some cases pools of water have frozen.

Supreme Court.

PRISONER CONVICTED.
The case of the Crown against Joseph Corbett, charged with carnal knowledge of a girl under sixteen years of age, was continued last night in the Supreme Court before Chief Justice Horwood, until ten o'clock when the prisoner was sentenced to two years with hard labour in H. M. Penitentiary, the period to commence from the day of his commitment.
At 2.30 p.m. Constable W. Greene, a Crown witness, was sworn and examined. Joseph Corbett, Mary Corbett, Josephine Conway, Bridget Guebie and Stephen Corbett, witnesses for the defence, were then sworn and examined. Mr. Squires, counsel for the prisoner, made an able address to the jury. Mr. Higgins then addressed the jury. After being charged by the Chief Justice the jury retired and brought in a verdict of guilty through their foreman, Mr. J. Hign. On being asked if he had anything to say for himself, the prisoner replied "No." His Lordship then sentenced the prisoner to two years with hard labour.

**Fell Dead During
Burial Services.**

The funeral of the late Mr. Edward J. Morgan took place yesterday afternoon and before the remains were consigned to mother earth one of the chief mourners at the obsequies, Mr. Henry Hiscock took suddenly ill and died. It was during the burial service conducted by Rev. Mr. Clayton, in the Mortuary Chapel at the Church of England Cemetery, that Mr. Hiscock was seized with spasms of the heart. He fell into the arms of Mr. Thomas Vavasour, who with Undertaker Carnell, took him outside but the heart of the victim was ceasing to beat and inside of three minutes he expired. When Dr. Anderson who was summoned arrived his services were of no avail and he pronounced death to be due to heart trouble. Mr. Henry Hiscock was 72 years of age, quiet and unostentatious, an estimable citizen and well known and esteemed in the community. Deceased who was a brother of Mr. Arthur Hiscock, of the Robinson Export Company, was a native of Trinity, and a cooper by trade. For about three years he was Keeper of the Government Oil Stores. Deceased was a prominent member of a number of societies. 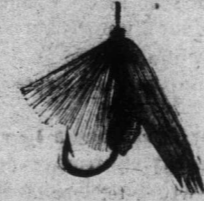

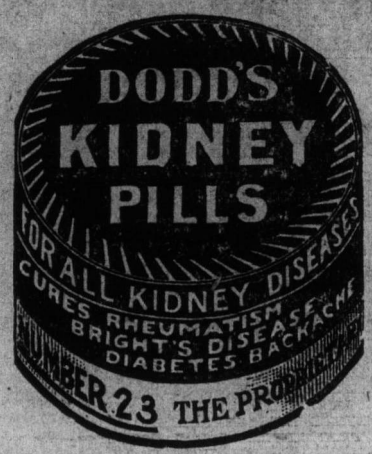

Reply of West End Liberal.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir—The doughty defender of the Premier and "Picnic Party"—"West End Voter"—in replying to me in Tuesday's Herald gets off the usual lot of Tory buncombe as to the popularity of the so-called "People's Party" (was there ever such a misnomer) and the "outbursts of loyalty to the Premier" well known as the Picnic Premier; and then avers that he does not hold a position under the Government, after which he gets down below Plimsol and used the ugly word "liar" with as much sang froid as he used "coward" in his first epistle. V. challenged me to use the language in the West End as to the Premier which I wrote in my first effusion, I told him I resided there and used it daily as I am not afraid nor ashamed of my convictions or sentiments; and then I told him I would use the same under my own signature if he would first similarly disclose his identity. He still however, retains his pen name and he has good reason to do for if he signed his real name the word "liar" as well as "coward" could be more appropriately applied than if it were to be directed to me. You're not a Government employee, W.E.V., oh, no; but I think I was not far out when I told you you were not living 1,000 miles from the G. P. O. No, you're no Government position, but your pickings realize you more than if you had one of the biggest snaps at the disposal of the Tories. You're paid well to champion Premier Morris and his backing of boodlers.

He is surrounded by sycophants of your sort who will indulge in "outbursts of loyalty" to him as long as he is in a position to dole out the "long green," and this won't be very much longer for his finish you can be sure is in sight in November next. The party he leads has had its little season. It is puffed up with such rotten supports as sycophancy and self-interest, decadence is written all over it, and when it collapses few true Newfoundlanders will regret it. When I wrote you first, Mr. Editor, I gave one or two practical illustrations of how the oily Edward in the past coded the people, samples which W. E. V. never attempted to rebut because they are too true and incontrovertible. Instead he uses abuse to patch up a rotten cause. Had he attempted to dispute them I could quote the words of the editor of the very paper in which his letters are written to justify and prove my contention. On the occasion to which I refer the Honorable P. T. was not then fawning on his friend and patron the Right Hon. Sir Edward. No, he was showing up and that not in the choicest diction either, what "a lovely liar" the redoubtable Edward was, he was "coding" the country and generally fooling the people in public and enjoying the joke in private. Oh, yes, McGrath's intemperate denunciations at that time of the man he is now beseeching with adulation would be interesting to read and if my friend, W. E. V. should like to see some of them in print later they will be furnished. One would imagine to read W. E. V.'s letter that fog alarms, telegraphs, breakwaters, lighthouses or public buildings much less railways were unknown quantities till Morris and the grabbers usurped the functions of Government. Did not Sir Robert Bond and the Liberal Party intend their share of public utilities. What about railway enterprise? What about the cross country railway? What about the enterprises that made possible one inland city of Grand Falls and kindred industries as well as Bell Island and other innovations? Like my challenge you conventionally slur these over, but let me tell you, Mr. "West End Voter" you and those of your ilk, have not things your own way in the West End this trip. If you have friends in that District so have I and mine are growing rapidly while yours are diminishing. Your idol last election got the fright of his life when for hours he was last on the poll. This time he will be there for keeps for the friends of other years have taken his measure and know now that not alone is he a colder but a deceiver. St. John's is Liberal to the core. Mr. W. E. V. and never was that spirit more evident than it is in the West End at present, not alone in the city but in the suburbs so that I would advise you to be careful. "Coward" and "liar" are unhandy and often dangerous epithets to bandy about too loudly in such a district, so you can infer the rest. You are the champion of the Tory Premier, permit me to say that I do not fear you in my humble way in upholding the honour against you of a better man, one certainly of unimpeachable honour, Sir Robert Bond. If your sentiments towards Premier Morris are as small as your abuse (for you use no argument) is volubrious, then has he a defender of which he must feel proud. Had I been looking for a job from either side I could have easily had one, for know you not, W. E. V., that the tempter is abroad in the land, the Premier is uneasy and votes if they can be had no other way can be obtained by patronage. Yes, W. E. V., not once but many times during the past few months I could have had a job, a remunerative one, were I to sell myself to the Tories, and there are others. But a true Liberal always stands to his colors. Can the same be said of the Tories? How many



are now preparing to come in out of the west? Thanking you for your space, Mr. Editor, and for the opportunity to defend myself and advancing my sentiments.

Troubled Outlook in the Money Market.

London Financiers Apprehensive of Heavy Borrowings in Near Future.
London, May 15.—As a result of the failure of recent loan issues in London, the question is being asked: Whence are all the millions to come to meet further borrowings in the near future?
Financiers, according to the Daily Mail, are regarding with considerable trepidation the outlook of the next few weeks, with probable heavy demands on their resources; China wants £25,000,000, American railroads require huge sums to bring them to a state of efficiency to cope with ever-expanding traffic; Australia is known to be anxious to raise a few millions in London. Finally the Balkan States borrowing, as an outcome of the war, is another factor.

"The situation," says the Daily Mail, "might be less difficult if investors were willing to lend, but the trade activity causes money which might otherwise be available to be locked up. Everyone who can make good use of his funds in his own business seems to have no desire to lend them to China, to American railroad magnates, or to Bulgaria."
Seeking a reason why the shares of some pushing speculative company with doubtful prospects may readily be subscribed, while first class investments are ignored, the Daily Mail says there is a possibility that the public has not been made sufficiently aware of the opportunities afforded by these good investments, adding: "As a rule because of the dignity or something of the sort of those responsible, loan issues are grossly underadvertised and not properly explained to the great public, and the issuing houses will not stoop from their pedestals to explain."
"Thus a sound loan is pushed aside by a more enterprising company moneer, market maker, or 'bucket shop keeper' who knows how to present his wares attractively."

Xmas Always On Wednesday.

Measure Introduced to Have Fixed Day For Holidays.

London, May 15.—The text has just been issued of the bill introduced into the House of Commons by Mr. Robert Pearce to reform the calendar by fixing the Easter and increasing the number of Bank Holidays. The memorandum attached to the measure, which is backed by Sir W. Bull and Sir Albert Spicer, states that the Bill is intended to regularize the quarters of the year, adjust the days of the week and of the month and fix Easter Day and other Bank Holidays and dates depending upon Easter.

With this view the first day of the year would be a Bank Holiday called New Year's Day, but not a day of the week or of the month or quarter. This leaves for the rest of the year, 364 days, which divide into four equal quarters of 91 days each, and into 52 weeks of seven days each. Each quarter will contain exactly 13 weeks divided into two months of 30 days each and one of 31 days. The ordinary quarter days would not be interfered with, and special provisions, as in the Calendar Act, 1750, would preserve days of payment, delivery of goods, expiration of leases, etc., and coming of age.
Starting in 1914, Easter Sunday and all the movable feasts and dates dependent upon it would be fixed so as to fall in every year on the same day of the same month as well as on the same day of the week. April 12 would, it is proposed, then and always be Easter Sunday. Christmas Day, December 25, would always be on a Wednesday. Each day of the month would always fall on the same day of the week. To provide for leap year one other Bank Holiday, to be called Leap Year Day, would in leap year be inserted between June 3 and July 1. It would not be a day of the week, month, or quarter.

MINARD'S LINIMENT USED BY PHYSICIANS.

Ministers and Suffragettes.

Special to Evening Telegram.

CARDIFF, Wales, To-Day. If the British Cabinet Ministers are exposed to risks of being mauled by militants at public meetings hereafter, they are likely to refuse to attend unless those in charge of the meetings are prepared to guarantee their personal safety. Because such assurances could not be given him, Home Secretary McKenna did not appear at the Welsh Disestablishment Free Church Conference, although he was announced as one of the speakers. It is understood the authorities had learned of a suffragette plot to attack the Home Secretary and Conference by a method which would not only jeopardize McKenna's life, but the lives of the delegates as well. The Home Secretary, however, addressed a large meeting in the evening, a Scotland Yard detective occupying a seat near him on the platform. Elaborate precautions were taken to prevent the admission of suffragettes and a big force of sturdy stalwarts were on hand to deal with disturbers. This did not prevent the male champions of the suffragettes from getting in, several of whom interrupted and were roughly ejected. McKenna concluded his address by warning militants that their methods would never succeed in frightening or worrying the Government into giving franchise to women. By their action, he said, they can bring nothing but discredit to their cause and punishment upon themselves.

MARSEILLES, To-day. A private message received here says the liner Senegal, Campagne des Messageries Maritimes struck, a mine and she was lying in Smyrna and was blown up. It is believed there were nearly 200 people aboard. No confirmation of this despatch has yet reached the company's office here.

LONDON, To-day. A Smyrna dispatch says tugs have gone to the assistance of the Senegal in the hope of saving life. The Senegal left Marseilles last Thursday with 60 passengers aboard and a crew of sixty.

The Hair Dresser.

The hair dresser is an expensive expert who can tell at first sight whether the owner of a head of inherited hair needs \$6 worth of dandruff extract or will be obliged to invest \$22 in a shuonous switch! As a rule, she recommends the switch and guarantees that it will not fade in the ad interim or any other spot.

Hair dressers are most generally frequented by women who are not able to do up their own hair or build the kitchen fire for tired husbands. Then there is a great difference in the texture and tractability of hair. Some people had curly hair handed to them in early youth without doing anything to deserve it, while others have to wrap their hair around the torrid legs of a curling iron six times a day in order to avoid looking like an Indian squaw.

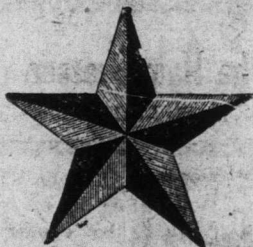
