Good Reasons for Hating It. A correspondent writing to the New

York Sun. savs:-Having in mind the letter with the caption "What Germany Owes the Kaiser," in the "World" of Sunday, Kaiser," in the "World" of Sunday, Aug. 16, I venture to call your attention to the fact that there are two monuments in this city which are a lesting reproach to Germany's autocratic rulers. One is the monument to Gen. Franz Sigel, on Riverside Drive, the other the monument to Carl Schurz, on Morningside Heights, bearing on its pedestal the beautiful motto, "A lover of freedom and a defender of human rights."

Both of these men, together with hundreds of enlightened and patriotic Germans, had to leave their native land simply because they were outspoken enemies of German absolutism. When some of their compatriots called upon King Frederick

William IV., the grand-uncle of the present Kaiser, with a request for a constitution, he declared that never would he allow a blotted parchment to come between him and Almighty
God. (This reminds one of "Me und
Gott.")

Again, when the liberal Frankfort Diet, in 1849, offered him the crown of Emperor of Germany, he refused it, saying that he would never stoop to Again, when the liberal Frankfort pick up a crown out of the gutter.
This remark showed his utter contempt for a gathering representative of the people. Later, when uprisings of the people occurred in Berlin and in Baden, he had them shot down like dogs, and no one distinguished himself more in this bloody work than the present Emperor's grandfather, who on this account was for a long while known as the "Cartridge Prince."

The Kaiser's father was a very sick man when he ascended the throne. and reigned only a few weeks. Kaiser William's first act on ascending the throne in 1888 was an address to his army and navy extolling them as the true pillars of his throne, while the address to the people, which followed only some days after, was very tame. Soon he made himself notorious by his threat to utterly crush whosoever would not bow to his will. Throughout his reign he never failed upon even slight pretext to rattle the sword in the scabbard to declare himself the divinely appointed ruler whose will was supreme, and to show himself the enemy of democracy by birth, by training and by instinct. London, Aug. 25 .- A despatch to he Daily Mail from St. Petersburg. says: "The German defence in East Prussia is based on four parallel and strongly fortified lines, running north and south. The Rifle Range on the South Side Hill will be in constant use, from daylight till dark, for musketry practice, until our Regiment leaves for England.


All persons are therefore prohibited from approaching the Rifle Range within 200 yards from either side, or within 1,000 yards of the targets to the eastward.
