

## Wind Cramp.

If you keep any part of your body, such as your arm, in some cramped position for a long time you will find it difficult to move it from that position.

Now it seems to me that the same thing is true of the mind. Cramp the mind in some position for a long time, then remove the pressure, and you will probably find that the power to move the mind back to its normal trend is weakened or even gone—at least temporarily.

I am thinking especially of the mind cramp of economy.

Who does not know some of these unfortunate people who have been forced by circumstances to practise a cruelly strict economy and whose minds have become so rigidly set in that direction that even when the pressure passes they cannot relax?

I was talking with a woman of this type the other day. Someone spoke about a doctor's bill. A worried look came into her face. "Aren't doctors' bills terrible?" she said. "I have one coming on the first of the month and it worries the life out of me." Now I happened to know that the size of her husband's income is such that she has absolutely no reason to worry about doctors' bills. Her anxiety is simply a reflex of the days when such extras painfully upset the delicate balance that then existed between income and outgo. Those days have long since passed, and yet she can't shake off her anxiety over such expenses.

Another woman, a widow, for years practised the most rigid economy in

order to educate her daughter. The daughter has now married very comfortably and the mother's income, small for two but ample for one, is augmented by lavish gifts from her and by a small inheritance. And yet, last year this woman felt obliged to do without a much needed suit because she had to make some small repairs on her house.

There is absolutely no need of her saving and contriving and scrimping any longer, but she cannot stop. Her mind is so strongly bent that way that not even her daughter's pleadings can unbind it.

Still another case is that of a middle aged couple who are on the verge of separation. They used to be a singularly happy pair. During the years in which the husband was building up his business the wife was a wonderful helpmeet, especially in making one dollar do the work of two. To-day there is no longer any need for such economy; the husband wants to live in the comfort which they have earned; the wife refuses to let him; and the dissensions thus engendered actually threaten to wreck their lives.

Of course I do not blame anyone for wanting to live simply and without extravagance. I am the last to urge that expenditures should keep pace with income, but I do think that over rigid economy tends to dry up one's sources of happiness.

We are quick to relax the body when it is no longer necessary to keep it in a cramped position. The mind should be treated as well. Indeed, one should take even more care of it, for the discomforts of mind cramp usually have to be borne by others besides ourselves.

Why was it, she often wondered,



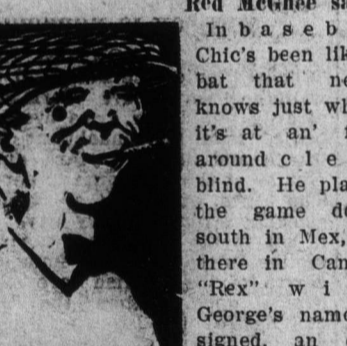



**A Big Deficit Faces Us.**

To-day the additions to the Tariff have been put in force, and sugar, tea, flour, beef, pork and kerosene oil are no longer on the free list. The Opposition while offering no partisan opposition to any measure which the Government may deem desirable to meet difficulties and situations arising from the war, reserve to themselves fully the right to criticize them later. The Opposition assumes no responsibility for anything of a financial nature the Government undertakes. They recognize that the Government has to be carried on, and they will not, during war times, hamper Sir Edward Morris in carrying it on. They reserve to themselves, however, the right of dissent and of full criticism at the proper time. The financial situation is serious and must be met. A very large deficit occurred on June 30th last. That deficit would have been, war or no war, largely increased next June 30th, added to by the short fishery, and would in all probability have reached \$500,000, inclusive of the \$200,000 of last June. The war has intensified these difficulties and it is likely that the actual shortage will not be less than \$750,000, and may be much larger. To meet this deficit provision must be made. The additions to the tariff will contribute in some way to meet this shortage, but other additions to taxation will have to be made and retrenchment in expenditure is absolutely essential. At the present time we do not deem it opportune to dwell on how the shortage has in the main arisen. We have emphasized it often in the past, and from this attitude on the Government finance we do not budge. At present, however, we merely point out that this shortage stares us in the face, and it must be met. We in no way modify our well-known opposition to the Morris Government finance. But we consider this no time for partisan warfare, however good the cause. We must lay party fighting on one side for the present and unite to face the common foe, the enemies of the King.

**Volunteers in Camp.**

Yesterday morning, the outpost volunteers numbering about 60, marched to the camping grounds at Pleasantville under command of Capt. A. O'Brien. In the afternoon about the same number from the city, who have been attested, marched down under command of Major Carthy. About 120 men were quartered there last night. Major Franklin is the commanding officer, and the others are Major Carthy, Assistant Commander, Captain March, Musketry Officer, Capt. O'Brien, Drill Instructor, Adjt. W. Rendell, and Capt. Crowfoot. Another squad will be attested to-night and will join those already at Pleasantville.

**BIG Russian VICTORY**

**Russia Seizes Heavily Fortified Positions at Lemberg --- Austrians Routed and Deprived of One Hundred and Fifty Guns.**

**9.30 A. M. To-Day.**

Special to the Evening Telegram. PETEROGRA, To-day. The following official communication was issued by the Russian War Office last night: "After a battle lasting seven days, the Russian army seized heavily fortified positions around Lemberg, about ten or twelve miles from the city. The Austrians then advanced toward the principal forts. After a battle yesterday which was fiercely contested, Austrians were obliged to retreat in disorder, abandoning heavy and light guns, parts of artillery and field kitchens. Our advance guard and cavalry pursued the enemy who suffered enormous losses in killed, wounded and prisoners. The Austrian army operating in the neighborhood of Lemberg, was composed of the third, eleventh and twelfth corps and part of the seventh and fourteenth corps. This army appears to have been defeated. During the pursuit by Russian troops the Austrians who beat the retreat from Gullia and Lipa, were forced to abandon an additional 31 guns. Our troops are moving over a road encumbered with parts of artillery and convoys loaded with provisions of all kinds. The total number of guns captured by the Russians around Lemberg, amounts to 150." The above despatch was sent direct from Petrograd by the St. Petersburg Telegraph Agency, a semi-official Russian news agency, and is the first despatch received at Halifax direct from the Russian capital, since the declaration of war.

**SOME APPOINTMENTS.** LONDON, To-day. Claude Graham White, the noted aviator, has been appointed a temporary Flight Commander of the British Navy. Richard T. Gates, who recently resigned from the Royal Aero Club, has been appointed a temporary Flight Lieutenant. Earl of Granard has been appointed to the command of the Fifth Battalion of the Royal Irish Regiment; Baron Sempill to the command of the Black Watch Regiment.

**10.45 A.M.**

**OFFICIAL FROM PRESS BUREAU.** LONDON, To-day. The Official Press Bureau issued the following this morning: Continuous fighting has been in progress all along the whole line of battle. British cavalry engaged with distinction the cavalry of the enemy, brushed them back and captured ten guns. The French army has continued the offensive and gained ground in Lorraine district. In other regions of the Russian army is investing Koenigsberg. A Russian victory which is now complete at Lemberg has already been announced.

**OUTLOOK IS HOPEFUL.**

LONDON, To-day. The editor of the Pall Mall Gazette writes: "We believe Germany has already put under arms every able-bodied man and child between fifteen and fifty-five years, and must now be at the maximum of her power. The allies, on the other hand, are growing stronger every day. France is not spent; Russia has not got into motion fully, and the immense reserves of the English are not yet drawn upon. Unless the Germans can destroy the French field armies, the investment of Paris will do her little good with a French army still in a solid front in the field. The British contingent steadily growing, with Russia coming many millions strong, and above all with British sea power supreme everywhere, we can lift up our hearts, though we have stern and severe trials, dark days and a long war ahead."

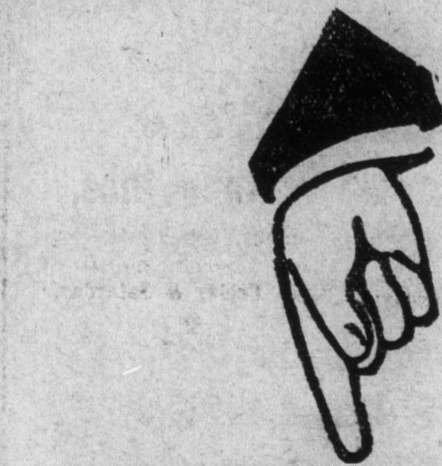
**Attempted Burglary.**

WAR SESSION OF THE LEGISLATURE.

At 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon the Legislature was opened. A large and representative gathering filled both branches of the Legislature, while a vast concourse of citizens were assembled outside. Lined up on either side of the grounds in front of the building were contingents from the Royal Naval Reserve, C. L. B. C. C. C. M. G. B., Highlanders, Frontiersmen and Constabulary. His Excellency the Governor arrived at 3 o'clock attended by Capt. Goodridge, A.D.C., and as he entered the grounds the A. Band played the National Anthem. 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## War News.

### Messages Received During the Night.

**GERMANS ABANDON MOVEMENT.**  
Special to Evening Telegram.  
BASLE, Switzerland, Sept. 2.

The Germans have abandoned their movement towards the French fortress of Belfort as a result of Russian offensive movement in Eastern Prussia. The great army of 150,000 German and Austrian troops which crossed the Rhine several days ago, accompanied by a large number of siege guns, has been withdrawn from Alsace, and has started North to replace the German troops withdrawn from the lines to North Lorraine and in the Department of Moselle and Metz. The French are now complete masters of Alsace. There are about 60,000 German reservists left in the upper part of the Province and it is expected that a French offensive movement against them will be undertaken.

**BRITISH TROOPS CAPTURE GUNS.**

PARIS, Sept. 2.  
A German cavalry corps marching towards the Forest of Compiègne on the left wing of the allied forces were engaged by the English on September 1st. The English captured ten guns. This statement is given out officially.

**LINES UNBROKEN.**

LONDON, Sept. 2.  
A Paris correspondent sends the following: "To-day I pushed up as near the front as possible, but could only get a general impression of the events of recent days. It must be borne in mind that although on the left the allied armies have been forced to withdraw their lines so far they remain intact; at no point has the enemy succeeded in driving a wedge into the circle which is drawing closer and closer around the capital and gaining in strength as it retreats. Amid all the woe of war the British troops have produced a great quality of efficiency. The spirit of Kitchener apparently pervades the whole British expeditionary force."

**TRANSFERS TO BORDEAUX.**

PARIS, Sept. 3.  
At midnight it was officially announced that the President and the Embassies of the Allied Nations had left at 10.50 p.m. for Bordeaux, where they will stay during hostilities. United States Ambassador Herrick, who has taken charge of the Archives of the embassies of all belligerent Powers, remains in Paris with First Secretary Bliss and the second Secretary. The United States will be represented at Bordeaux by John B. Garrett, United States Ambassador to Argentina, who left with the Government, accompanied by the third secretary, Capt. Parker. Mr. Herrick will remain here to afford protection to Americans, as the Ambassadorial residence is in neutral territory, where Americans can find refuge in case of need. It also makes possible for American banking interests, to continue here in view of the relief of possible distress from the United States.

**JAPANESE TROOPS LANDED IN CHINA.**

PEKING, Sept. 3.  
Japan has landed between 10,000 and 15,000 troops from 18 transports at Lung Kow, a newly opened port, about 100 miles north of Tsing Tau. This is declared to have been done in violation of China's neutrality. The German Legation has protested to the Foreign Office against an infringement of China's neutrality by Japan.

**HORRIBLE INHUMANITY.**

PARIS, Sept. 3.  
A despatch from St. Petersburg says that the Novoe Vremya charges that during the bombardment of Belgrade, the Austrians destroyed a Maternity Hospital over which the Red Cross was flying, killing 100 children.

**ON VERGE OF HOSTILITIES.**

LONDON, Sept. 2.  
A St. Petersburg despatch conveys a semi-official statement to the effect that in well-informed circles there the opinion is expressed that war between Turkey and Greece is now only a question of two or three days.

**BOMBARDING MALINES.**

LONDON, Sept. 2.  
A despatch from Antwerp contains the following official announcement: The Germans are again bombarding Malines, aiming at the steeple of the Cathedral. Certain movement of German troops in the direction of Assche, six miles northwest of Brussels, gave rise to the belief that the Germans were contemplating a movement towards Termonde, 16 miles east of Ghent. However, the Belgian troops have been reinforced on account of the necessity of preserving control of Waasland. The enemy advanced from Brussels to Assche yesterday but could not penetrate further north. Nine and Alost, 16 and 15 miles respectively from Ghent in different directions have been occupied by Germans. In the Province of Antwerp and Limbourg the situation is unchanged.

**RUSSIAN ARMY INVADES PRUSSIAN SILESIA.**

LONDON, Sept. 2.  
A despatch to the Daily News from Rome says: Besides advancing in East Prussia, the Russians are also invading Germany in Northern Galicia; their object being Konigsbutte in Prussian Silesia, whence presumably they will march on Berlin, via Breslau.

**NO MOTOR CARS TO LEAVE PARIS.**

LONDON, Sept. 1.  
A despatch from Paris says the Governor of the city has issued an order that no private motor cars will be allowed to leave Paris after to-day.

**ZEPPELIN FLIES OVER ANTWERP.**

LONDON, Sept. 2.  
A despatch from Antwerp says that another Zeppelin airship flew over the city last night.

**GERMANS MOVING TOWARDS ANTWERP.**

LONDON, Sept. 2.  
The Ostend correspondent of Reuters reports that an extensive movement of German troops towards the North has been seen from Brussels. It is believed the Germans are going to Antwerp where investment and bombardment is expected.

**KILLING THEIR WOUNDED.**

LONDON, Sept. 2.  
The Ostend correspondent of the Express quotes Leon Hard, a Senator of Hainaut, as testifying that "the Germans killed their own severely wounded men on the battle field, only tending to those who would soon recover. There are many signs, according to the despatch that the Germans suffered heavily at Mons. Returning remnants of those who were in the fight spoke bitterly of the British courage. 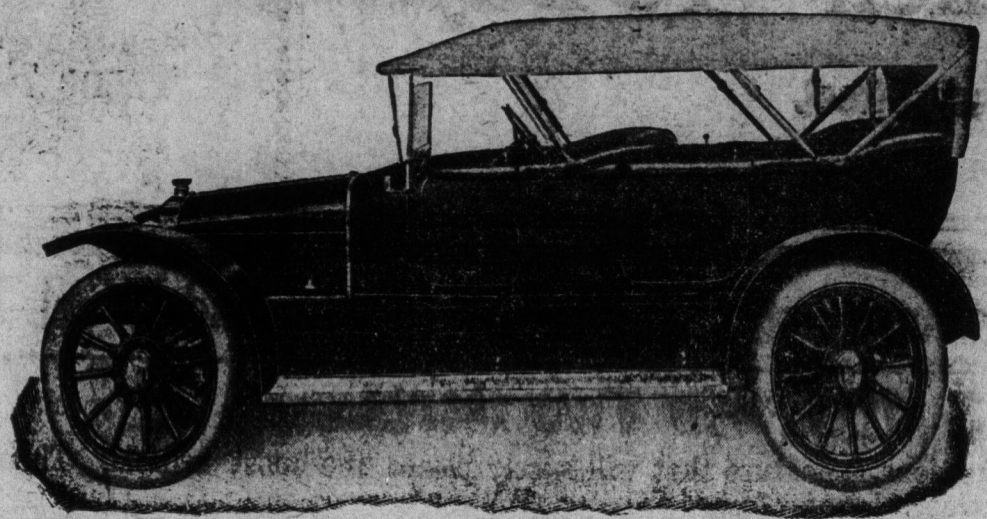

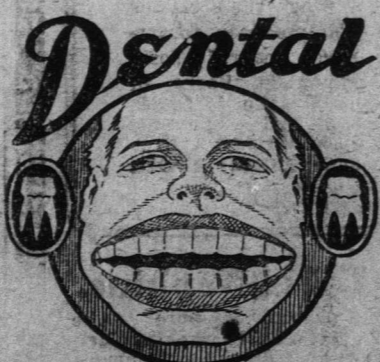
The Rifle Range on the South Side Hill will be in constant use, from daylight till dark, for musketry practice, until our Regiment leaves for England.

Any unauthorized person so doing will be liable to arrest, besides incurring serious danger from rifle bullets.

A number of red flags will be used to indicate the Danger Zone. This prohibition does not extend to any part of the Hills west of the 800 yards Firing Point.
