either intended to mask movements at other points or are in motion in the process of feeling the way for the best opening along the Piave and the northern Italian line. The enemy movements are being put into effect principally on the Upper Piave where the River passes the lead between Monte Monfenera and Montello to the Venetian Plain, and on the Middle Piave where the enemy continues very active in constructing bridges to the middle ground of Grave de Papadopolo an island lying in mid-stream, which affords him a sort of half-way station.
