





ROME, July 13. The official communication issued by the war office to-day says: Yes- your dealer register your name. terday afternoon large enemy detachments began to attack our position on the Coronone slopes. Our garrison attacked the enemy with the bayonet driving him back to his trenches. Numerous dead were left behind. Sixtysix men were taken and four machine guns were captured.
