



#### The City Committee.

The weekly meeting of the Civic Commission was held last evening. Mayor Morris presided and Councillors Vinicombe, Peet, Jackman, Collier and Hallett were present. After the Minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed, the following matters received the attention of the Board: Communications were read from the

Colonial Secretary as follows:-(1) Under Section 2 of the Consolidated Loan Act, 1921, an order has been issued to liquidate the temporary loans due the Royal Bank by the Council, and that same would now be included in the funded debt of the City; (2) That the Proclamation has been issued, fixing the dates for Nomination and Polling Days as December 5th and 15th respectively; also that His Excellency the Governor has been pleased to appoint Mr. F. J. Doyle as Returning Officer and Hon. F. J. Morris as Revisor of Voters' Lists in the

Municipal Election. The Inspector General, replying to the Council's communication and that of the Motor Association, in reference to unregistered out-of-town cars and drivers of same, stated that, if the Association was aware of such violations of the Motor Regulations, the matter should be reported more promptly, so that immediate action might be taken.

The Secretary of the G.W.V.A. forwarded a communication from the Executive of that Association, asking at sailors, soldiers and foresters Table for the Poll Tax, might be exampt from same from the time of demobilization, January 1st 1919 to December 31st 1924. The Council has not the power, under the Act, to make such exemptions, but legal opinion will be obtained in the matter.

Following up his last communic tion, regarding the removal of snow from the City streets during the coming winter season, Mr. Wm. White suggested that the manholes leading to the City Sewers be used for the disposal of snow. 



A book that confines laudatory orator, Cicero, tells us, when they appear to have been endowed—and subsequent events prove that they lar fitness for the opening up of a new ountry. They were possessed of an mitable courage, capability for querable determination — qualities which gave them special fitness to become founders of a race which, for urage and endurance, are second to no people in the world. I fail entirely to see the completeness of a history which, while devoting pages to the natural possibilities of a country, both present and prospective, entirely ig-nores the men who made these possibiliities a living issue in the history of the commercial world. Even the citizens of St. John's had much to contend against in the latter part of the eighteenth and early days of the past tury. The arbitrary and tyrannical laws of the Fishing Admirals were not entirely removed from the Statute book. They appear to have left their tyranny and oppressions as an heir-loom to their descendants, and they vored to the utmost of their ability, to carry out their commands. 

Mr. Bayly spoke well and distributed a large number of leaflets containing valuable information on Poultry questions, issued by the Newfoundland Poultry Association. He also left with of a model poultry house. Mr. G. R. Williams followed him and took for his subject "General Poultry Topics" covering the ground as fully as possible in the time allotted to him. Mr. W. R. Butler spoke on the subject of "Pure Bred Poultry" and illustrated his lecture by exhibiting a pure bred a bird of mongrel type and compared on the care of poultry generally and how poultry can be made to pay. It is hoped that when the next lecture will be given, the 60 lantern slides will be here so that the addresses can be illustrated with the aid of a lantern. The meeting closed at 10.30 with an expression of thanks from Rev. Mr. Facey who trusted that they would be privileged with another lecture later on in the season. Mr. A. J. Bayly offered two prizes for the best esway on "Poultry Culture" written by schoolchildren and the essays are to be sent in by the first of December. Mr. Harry Cowan of Topsail Road was also present and returned to his home with the visitors, who arrived in town shortly after midnight. The Newfoundland Poultry Association hopes to visit the remaining schools and give lectures on Poultry during the coming winter in the interests of the general farming public. 



Life is nothing if not piquant in Nairobi, writes Charles Dawnbarn, who is travelling in that country.

The latest British possession, in the terms of a Crown Colony, is a most lively infant, he says. She has had twenty years of life on one plane, but only six months on another. In the one stage she is was a Protectorate, in the other she is an appendage of the Crown of England. Of course, the second stage is more "grown up" than the first; but Kenya has no frown on her face as the result of it. Her sons and daughters are just as light-hearted as before. Though black care may ride behind the horsemen, his features are obscured. Whatever the future may have in store for Kenya, assuredly it is not a dull time. That is impossible in this vivid atmosphere, nearly 6,000 ft. above the sea. Nairobi has risen from a swamp and a few tin huts into a flourishing town of broad streets with fine avenues and solid public buildings.

And what contrasts life provides. Here is the pioneer type, bronzed of face, sturdy of limb. On his head is a cone recalling the Mexican hat; he wears a coat-skirt, khaki-colored, open at the throat and short-sleeved, with pockets in the front. His beard is black and stubby, his hair innocent of a comb. If he were at his farm, he would be spick and span of an evening, at least. But in Nairobi he seems determined to carry the atmosphere of the wilds with him. Perhaps it is a form of "swank" to show his freedom from convention.

Ladies Smoke in Public.

His wife is almost as brown as he. She is likewise dressed in khaki-colored clothes—a long coat, riding breeches and gaiters. Practically all women ride astride in Kenya, and thus adopt trousers or the divided skirt. And that very fact has an influence on behavior. Lovely women is not in the least austerish in this far-off country. Not only does she smoke in public, but in the street! I met a charming creature in the broad thoroughfare the very latest in masculinity. Upon her head was perched a mannish hat; she wore a man's shirt and coat, shorts, and polo boots reaching to the knee. The impression of the new sex was completed by the hands being thrust into the pockets of the shorts. And from cigarette.

As to the natives, their motions of ornament are strange indeed. Not only do they bind arms and legs with copper wire, which they steal from the telegraph lines (to the constant annoyance of the authorities), but they garnish the neck with the same forbidding material. Coil after coil is wrapped round the throat—a sort of perverted Elizabeth ruffle—and the outer rings fall upon the breast. The women, far more than the men, adopt this garnish. The latter generally content themselves by wrapping the wire round the forearm. Sometimes the flesh is dreadfully punished, but the wearer is as stoical as any nineteenth-century belle suffering from tight lacing. But more characteristic. They are formed also of coils of wire. The purpose is not "swank," but prevention of escape from the husband. Since the women, here as elsewhere in the black world, are workers, this wire ornament has an economic meaning. The Kikuyu that we meet here on

the further side of Nairobi, on the way to the Great Lake, are smaller and physically inferior to the rather flercelooking Masai, who inhabit the country of the great game reserve. The odd thing is that this tribe does not eat meat or hunt game, and therefore is ideal as guardian of the reserve. The scenery, too, on the way to the

Great Lake is most impressive. The railway line lies to a height of between eight and nine thousand feet. It is very cold now. We are glad of rugs and heavy overcoats to cover ourselves in our bunks. The view is superb: deep valleys and dense groves of wat-tle. At Lumbwa, the farming prospects are excellent. As we approach the Great Lake, the end of the line, we encounter new tribes, especially the Kavirondo, who are very black and quite naked. They are the most moral of any of the Lake inhabitants. Women, with figures like goddesses, wave shapely arms to us. Recently, the cult of clothes has possessed the young men, and at Kisumu (on Lake Vivtoria Nyanza itself) we hear of burglaries in which the white master's suits have formed the booty of the native Bill Sykes. This is an utterly new thing.


