THE TOTAL MILEAGE OF RAILWAYS IN THE PROVINCE
OF ALBERTA at the last of the year was 3,055. The total mileage in Alberta at the end of 1905 was 1,060. ## WELLS DEPLORES THE **BUILDING OF MORE** DREADNOUGHTS

London, April 8.-H. G. Wells, in his second article on war, printed in the Daily Mail this morning, preaches the vanity of the "dreadnought idea" of British confidence. He says that "these obsolescent monsters" are unreasonable and threaten to lead the nation into tragical disillusionment. He continues: "It seems that for some years then

has been a complete arrest of British has been a complete arrest of British imagination in naval or military matters. The declining faculty, which was never very active or well exercised, staggered up to conception of the dreadnought and now seems to have set down for good. Its reply to every demand upon it has been 'more dreadnoughts,' As we seem to see it, it is an avenue of dreadnoughts, super-dreadnoughts and super-superdreadnoughts, getting bigger and biger in a kind of inverted perspective, but the ascendency of reat battleships in naval warfare, like the 'phase of huge conscript armies on land, draws to a close the progress of invention and makes both the big ships and the army crowd more and more vulnerable

army crowd more and more vulnerable and less effective."

Mr. Wells wonders whether the em-Mr. Wells wonders whether the em-pire of the sea may not already have slipped out of Great Britain's hands While the country has been dream-hypnotized by the dreadnought idea. War with the present armaments, Mr. Wells says, will show that the dread-noughts are useless because of their Wells says, will show that the dread-noughts are useless because of their vulnerability, and that the actual weapons to combat would be destroy-ers, submarines and waterplanes (especially the last named), in the hands of competent and daring men. Even if Great Britain were ade-quately equipped with these arms, Mr. Wells is still alarmed, as he is con-vinced that a new phase in warfare

Wells is still alarmed, as he is convinced that a new phase in warfare is opening. He continues:

"We are entering a period in which invention of methods and material are likely to be more rapid and more various than ever before. Knowing the tremendous imaignative indolence of my countrymen. I face the question with something near dismay."

Mr. Wells expressed doubts as to anything being done to anticipate the inevitable new developments. He says:

Nebraska's Blue Sky Land Law

Lincoln, Neb., April 8.—The Ne-braska "blue sky" bill, which promises soon to become a law, will in no way affect the sale of Canadian land in Nebraska unless the same is sold less than forty-acre tracts. Amend-ments tacked on the measure in the house after it had passed the senate cut out all the provisions for resistant cut out all the provisions for register-ing of agents and the inspection of the propositions offered for sale, limiting investment to real estate firms selling land located outside of the state in less than forty-acre tracts or, in-cases where the land companies were offer-ing to place improvements of one sort or another upon the land. The bill, as originally passed by the senate placed close restrictions as to registration, monthly reporting and the like upon land companies, but all this has been cut out, and indications are that the senate will concur in the house amendments and that the povernor will sign the bill in its amended form.

The only clause that lived through debate and which may affect the sale of Canadian farm lands, compels the Nebraska state conservation and soil survey to investigate the land of-fered for sale, if such land lies outside the state of Nebraska, when called upon to do so by any prospective pur-chaser. If the land thus investigated does not uphold the claims made by the sales agents, the attorney general is ordered to prosecute the agent for attempted fraud.

Wilson Studies Jap Question

Washington, April 8 .- President Wilson yesterday sought to avert a diplo-matic tangle with Japan over the bill pending in the California legislature, through which Japanese would be preented from owning property in state. The Japanese government had filed formal protest with the state de-partment against what it considered a proposed infringement of treaty obliga-The president conferred with First

The president conferred with First Secretary Lane of the state department, who halls from California, and later with Senator Works and Representative Wiliam Kent of that state. None would discuss the president's attitude, but it is believed he took occasion informally to communicate his views to the California legislators. The president is reported as believing that if anti-alien legislation is necessary, it should be made to apply to all aliens without discrimination. Such a bill, while it might eliminate the cause for Japanese protest, would leave for the courts, it is pointed out here, the constitutionality without involving any foreign government in the case.

"We do not want any more race problems in this country," was the only comment Representative Kent would make as he left the White House.

Meanwhile the state department is giving careful study to the probable effect of the proposed treaty between the United States and Japan.
