HOW TO RAISE WAGES. Mr. Edward Atkinson, of Mass chusetts, Boston Wednesday, presented some powerful ruths in condensed shape. Every master manufacture, every master mechanic, every capitalist who desires to employ others, seeks to hire the man or woman who can make the largest product at the lowest cost. And now I beg to present to you a proposition which is very farreaching, very subtle, and of very wide application, but which is seldom considered unless attention is almost forced to it. It is this: So long as freedom of contract is not restricted or obstructed by statute law; so long as laws are enacted only for the enforcements of justice and order, the prevention of crime and punishment of fraud, and the accomplishment of purposes which cannot be worked by individuals, it will be found that high wages or earnings are

He then went on to show that as the profits of capital and the wages of labor are both drawn from the annual product the greater the product the greater the amount accruing to each. The more effective the machinery the less the number of persons employed and the greater the proluct; consequently the higher the wages. The greater the skill of the workmen the fewer there are needed to tend the mahinery, and again the greater the wages. The greater the production of goods at a ninimum price the cheaper the goods; hey will buy, are again increased. 

The library con-tains a collection of madrigals and part songs, manuscripts of Haydn's "Armida," the pianaforte score of "Eijah" in Mer elsohn's handwriting, manuscripts by Purdelsohn's handwriting, manus ripps by Arricell, Blow, Croft, Greue, Boyce, Arne, and others; letters from Donizetti, Boieldien, Mendelsohn, Lulli, Meyerbeer, Spohr, Weber, Rossini, Handel and others, and an extraordinary collection of theatrical and other treaties. In all the library contains about 5.000 volumes.

A Frenchman bought an island off the coast of Australia for about \$350, and announced his intention of founding a New France. There was 121 failures in the United States reported to Bradstreet's Journal during the past week, 11 more than the preceding week and 56 more than in the corresponding week last year.
