

D'ALTON PREACHES BLUE ROBIN

A BIG DEBATE WILL BRING ON ELECTIONS IN MARCH.

Third Party Meeting in Georgetown—The Leader Anticipates a Defeat of 55,000. 600-His Reply to Speeches of the Hon. Sir John Macdonald.

Georgetown, Dec. 10.—To-night Dalton McCarthy, M.P., addressed a crowded meeting in the Town Hall. Mr. McCarthy arrived from Toronto on the evening train, and, despite the inclement weather, he was met at the station by a crowd of admirers, who were accompanied by the town's brass band.

On the platform with Mr. McCarthy were: ex-Warden Scott, who has received the nomination of the McCarthy electors of the County of Halton, as a candidate for the House of Commons; A. P. Hunter, George F. Hunter (Milton) and Richard Graham, the latter of whom occupied the chair. The proceedings were harmonious throughout.

The Candidate for Halton.

Mr. Graham opened the meeting by introducing Mr. Scott, who thereupon addressed the electors for the first time. Ex-Warden Scott said the principal question which was agitating the minds of the people at the present time was the trade policy. The protective policy which had been in force for a number of years seemed not to have met with the approval of the farming community, nor even with the laboring man.

A protective policy has been the cause of reducing combinations and trusts which raised the prices of those things which were required, the farmer years ago, and he has supported the National Policy, but on reconsidering and examining carefully the workings of the policy, he has found that it had been detrimental to the best interests of the people all over the country. This way of working was to give the greatest good to the greatest number. Instead of the National Policy doing that it was making millions of the manufacturers at the expense of the people.

He thought the Roman Catholic people were standing in their own light when they advocated separate schools, because the children would receive a more complete education under the present system. He was in favor of a 2-cent postage, and announced himself as having been a temperance man all his life. 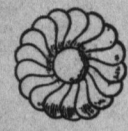
