## INSTALLATION AT ROTHSAY LODGE

### Visit by Masonic Grand Master. Evening Greatly Enjoyed by Fraternity

On Thursday night the officers of Rothsay Lodge, No. 85, A. F. & A. M., Bridgetown, were installed by District Deputy Grand Master H. B. Hicks, of this town. The brethren were upon this occasion favored by an official visit from the Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Masonic Order in Nova Scotia, J. Murray Lawson, of Yarmouth. The Grand Master in the course of an interesting address on matters of interest to the Order referred to the very fine work done during the course of installation.

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The Annopolis Town Council are renewing the water system with main pipe six inches instead of the four-inch now in use. This will double the capacity. The appropriation for this work is \$13,000. Sewerage extension is also contemplated up Commercial Street.

Capt. John A. Stuart, of Church Point, has left for Mobile, Ala. where he will take command of the four-masted schooner "Cachibos" bound for Key West. The "Cachibos" is a sister ship of the "Lewis Brothers" on which the late Captain A. Chute met a tragic death some weeks ago.

Silas L. Gates and son were looking into the question of a barrel factory for Middleton. It is understood they will establish such an industry and have purchased land from the Middleton Fruit Company, north of the railway lines, and the company's warehouse. The building will be of cement blocks 30x100 feet and work of excavating has commenced.

For the first two of the four shots Colchester Academy leads the Forty Five entrants in the Dominion with an average of 97.2 out of a possible 100 for the twelve men shooting in the Canadian Rifle League for cadets on miniature ranges. Calgary High School has second place with 97 and Vancouver third with 96. Halifax cadets hold fourth place with an average of 92.96. The fourth shoot must be completed this month.

Representatives of the British Empire Steel Corporation are resisting the passage of an eight hour bill introduced by Mayor D. W. Morrison, of Glace Bay, one of the Labor members for Cape Breton County. This in effect is to secure the passage of legislation to the end that with certain exceptions no person employed in or about a mine shall remain underground for a longer period than eight hours in any one calendar day.

The Rev. Edward Henry Hall, aged seventy-nine years, one of the oldest clergymen in the Province, passed away at Chester a few days ago after an active service of fifty-five years in the ministry. He was the first rector of the Anglican congregation at Mulgrave, N.S., and held a number of important charges including Springhill and Westville. In 1913 the degree of D.C.L. was conferred upon him by Kings College. He was well known all over the province as a devoted Christian worker.

It is reported by local shipping men that the lumber shipping market for this spring, shows little improvement over last spring. The freights are fairly firm with orders mostly for small vessels. The American market does not appear to be especially bright, and about \$6.00 is the prevailing rate. The English outlook is not promising, as large supplies are held on the other side by the British government, and little inducement is offered to local shippers. Deals are offered at \$5c for medium sized steampers, and \$8c for large ones. Progress Enterprise.

The excavation for the new \$17,000 Town Hall at Annapolis is now finished.

The schr. M. E. Haines, Capt. Ralph Haines, now at Westport, will proceed to Grand Manan, and load dry fish for Halifax.

The term schr. Cape Blomidon, Capt. L. F. Barkhouse, of Westport, which has been laid up at Parrsboro, has been chartered by J. Newton Pugsley, to load lumber at Apple River for Boston, at private terms.

Rev. H. Payzant, who has just completed his fifth year as pastor of the Yarmouth North United Baptist Church, has re-considered his resignation tendered about a week ago and will continue with the congregation.

The Anisile Hospital founded by Dr. D. L. McKinnon and conducted by him for some years at Truro will, it is announced, be closed on account of the refusal of the Town Council to increase the grant from \$500 to \$1,000.

Digby Amateur Athletic Association are actively canvassing and securing funds to help carry on the season's work, and report collections good and public interest high. The Athletic field will be put in good shape for the opening of the baseball season.

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## NEW CHIEF OF POLICE ON JOB

The new chief is an officer of considerable experience and has for five years been chief at Digby. He comes well recommended, is a man of good physique and doubtless will have no trouble in performing his duties with tact and efficiency.

On Friday morning, April 7th, 1922, Mount Hanley was shocked to learn that Mrs. Zebulon Elliott, the oldest resident of our place, had passed away. ## TENNIS CLUB AFTER GROUNDS

### Matter of Securing New Location Probably Settled Last Evening

A meeting of the Bridgetown Lawn Tennis and Quilt Club was held in the Board of Trade rooms on Thursday night. The principal matter to come up for consideration was the question of securing new grounds. This move was made necessary by reason of the sale of land from the old grounds which were merely rented from year to year. In all four possible selections came under review. One of these, the Fowler field at Carleton, while excellent in every way for play, was considered too far out of town.

The Orlando field on Church Street was also mentioned but no figures could then be obtained as to purchase price. The Foster field off Granville Street was considered a splendid location. Then there is the Chipman field further up which has been presented to the Club by Dr. Chipman, now residing in Montreal. The Foster field can, it is stated, be acquired for \$750. It would require some grading but not so much nearly as the Chipman field. However the other field is a gift and the only cost would be the grading and getting it into shape. A final decision in the matter of selection was held at a meeting held in the Board of Trade rooms at seven o'clock last evening.

In the experience of the Nova Scotia Employment service, March is the "slack water" month between winter and summer seasons. In other words, the employers make less demands upon the service for workers during March than in any other month.

JACK DEMPSEY ON TRIP TO EUROPE WITH HANDLERS

In his invasion of Europe, Jack Dempsey, who sailed on the Aquitania last Thursday, will be emulating the habit which most of the American world heavyweight champions have become addicted to since John L. Sullivan took England by storm.

During the month, however, the four services effected six hundred and one placements, one hundred and fifty-seven being in the women's division.

The Dempsey party will land at Southampton and proceed to London by rail to look around. Jack Kearns, the champion's manager, has no definite plans, but from a perusal of the newspapers the group is carrying.

Much unemployment continues in the larger centers of the province, such as Halifax, Sydney, and New Glasgow. This situation should be materially improved by the end of April, especially if the uncertainties of the coal industry can be cleared away.

At his hotel, witnessing the packing of his wardrobe, the world's heavyweight champion said he is more apprehensive of seasickness than of any other feeling that may be offered. Manager Kearns, Joe Benjamin, Pacific coast lightweight and friend of Dempsey, and Teddy Hayes, Dempsey's secretary, make up the party.

Under manufacturing, leather and goods continued to improve. Iron and steel dropped considerably, principally on account of the large lay off at the Sydney plant of the Dominion Iron and Steel Company.

MIDDLETON IS OUT FOR BANNER YEAR IN TENNIS COURTS

The annual meeting of the Middleton Tennis Club was held Thursday afternoon. The matter of an additional court was left over, as it was considered impossible to build until the athletic association had vacated the grounds permanently, which was not probable this year.

There was a general falling off in activity in the lumber camps during the month. The cut this winter will be about fifty per cent. of last. Employment in the mining districts of Cape Breton improved, particularly about Glace Bay. The New Glasgow and Cumberland areas held about the same level as February.

1921 AGRICULTURAL CUSTOMS \$1,917,370

CHANGE EPISCOPAL MARRIAGE VOWS

Recognition of the changed status of women by striking from the Episcopal marriage ceremony the promise to obey, and eliminating the compulsory giving in marriage, is proposed by the commission on revision of the book of common prayer, in a report made public.

However, the proposal to change the ceremony also provides for striking out the bridegroom's pledge, "with all my worldly goods I thee endow." The commission's report will be submitted to the triennial general convention to the church at Portland, Ore., next September. Members of the commission hope to see the changes finally ratified at the 1925 convention.

Other proposed changes include enlargement of the catechism and its transformation into a catechetical office of instruction; a form of service for the burial of a child; prayers of permissive use in commemoration of the saints and for the department; and a special form for missionary service.

The revision, said a statement issued by the commission, is designed "to adapt and make it more helpful in meeting the religious needs of the people in the life and worship of today."

The commission is under the chairmanship of Rt. Rev. Corland Whitehead, D.D., bishop of Pittsburgh. Rev. John W. Suter, D.D., of Boston, is secretary, and Robert H. Gardiner, of Boston, treasurer.

NATIONAL HOSPITAL DAY

The United States Public Health Service found the celebration of National Hospital Day so popular and so generally satisfactory last year that it heartily approves its repetition this year on Friday, May 12th, the anniversary of the birth of Florence Nightingale, founder of modern nursing.

On that day the public will be again invited to visit the hospitals in their vicinity as guests and to familiarize themselves with their atmosphere, methods and aims.

Surgeon-General Cumming, of the Public Health Service, points out that acquaintance with hospital workings will show, "first, that a hospital is not a place of suffering, sorrow and death, but a place of relief from pain, rejoicing, and restoration to active life. It will show, second, that a hospital is a great human laboratory where disease is studied and where soldiers are trained to save and to prolong life. Anything that furrows such knowledge marks a distinct advance in the war of wars—the war for health and life and against diseases."

The idea seems a most commendable one. Why not a Hospital Day in Nova Scotia to enlist and stimulate popular interest in our institutions for the care of the sick and the distressed?

While much may be said in favor of the "let drive," such as we have had from the beginning of highway traffic in our province, the rapid increase in the number of motor vehicles in use on our highways, as well as the growing influx of cars from outside during the summer months, has made the change not only desirable as a matter of convenience, but necessary in the interests of public safety on our highways.

For that matter, the change to a "right turn" will be the means of promoting business especially during the tourist season. More and more the motor tour is becoming the popular way of taking a holiday. With the progress of our good roads programme there will come from year to year a larger influx of foreign cars with hosts of summer visitors seeking the scenes of romance and beauty which Nova Scotia abounds. They will come more numerously, and their presence on our highways will be less dangerous, when the "right turn" for which their cars are equipped and to which they are accustomed becomes the rule of the road in Nova Scotia.

So long as our province was not included in the main routes of motor travel, there was no occasion for change from the rule we have hitherto followed, but the days of isolation in this respect are past, and the coming of the motor car and the prospect that in a very short time it will be the principal means of travel on the highways make the change imperative in the interests of our own people first of all.

The measure authorizing the change should not be subjected to any undue delay in its passage, so that the public may be advised at the earliest possible date when it will come into operation, and have time to accustom themselves to the change and make any adjustments thereto that may be necessary. The development of modern highway traffic has made it inevitable for Nova Scotia to conform to the continent-wide rule of the road, and the sooner the change is made now the better for all concerned. It will, we believe, be surprising how easily and smoothly the change will be brought into operation.

OPERA SINGER ROBBED BY GIRLS OF \$45,000

Madame Amelita Galli Curci, opera singer, was robbed at San Juan Capistrano, Cal., Friday, of jewels and valuables which two girls fled with a jewel case that had been left by the singer's maid in a safe restroom. The singer and her party had stopped there for lunch.

MUNICIPAL FORESTS

The latest municipality to announce its intention of reforesting a tract of land under the Ontario Government scheme is Ontario County, which is the first county east of York County, of which latter Toronto is the county town. This county extends from Lake Ontario to the south to the southern border of Muskoka district on the north, a distance of about ninety miles. At its last session the County Council decided to take up the reforestation of about seven hundred acres situated in the township of Uxbridge.

Grain harvests may be a complete failure one year and be compensated for the next year, but the destruction of a forest area by fire cannot be made good in half a century. Hence no efforts ought to be spared to keep fire out of the forest.

THE JEWETT CAR IS SOUNDLY CONSTRUCTED

Paige officials are receiving many compliments on the high type of construction revealed in the new Jewett light six which has just been introduced locally and is on exhibition in the Paige salesrooms.

The frame construction is unusually sturdy. Four cross members are used in place of the usual three and additional stiffening is given the frame where the rear motor supports are bolted to the frame brackets.

Examination of the driving mechanism back of the 50-horse-power plant also shows how well built the car is throughout. The clutch is a new dry plate design. Power is transmitted to the rear axle through a hollow drive shaft and two all-steel universal joints.

Both front and rear axles of the Jewett are Timken built. Timken roller bearings are used on the front wheel spindles and the weight of the car is carried on ball-truss bearings which makes for easy steering.

The manner in which motorists are taking to the Jewett is indicated in the report from the factory that at the present time orders for the Jewett cars total more than \$6,000,000. Mr. O. C. Jones is distributor for the Jewett & Paige cars for Kings, Annapolis and Digby Counties, and is expecting a shipment of these cars daily. PRAIRIE FARMERS PLANTING TREES

At many of the gatherings of farmers in the Prairie Provinces during the winter of 1921-22, the subject of soil-drifting was discussed and the remedy most often proposed was that of planting wind-breaks of trees across the path of the prevailing wind.

About sixty million little trees have been sent out from the Dominion Forest Nursery Station at Indian Head since it was established in 1901, and in spite of inevitable losses due to mistakes, accidents, and bad seasons a very large percentage are growing vigorously. Shipments for the season of 1922 will, it is expected, total five million and may run somewhat larger. In addition to preventing soil-drifting, belts of trees shelter the farmhouse and farm buildings and permit the establishment of gardens, where tree and bush fruits and tender vegetables can be grown.

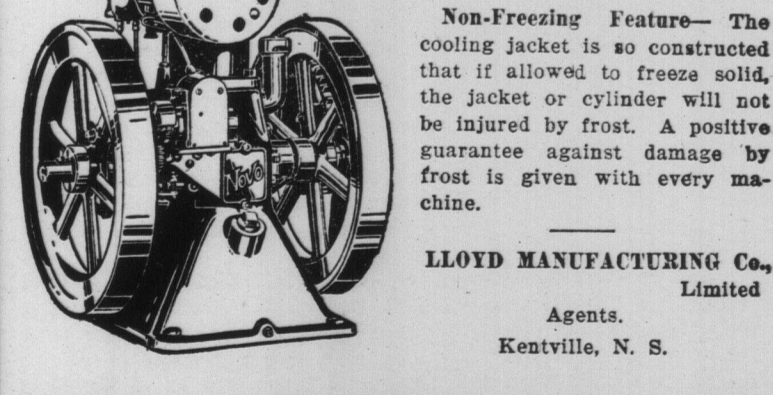

Proposed changes to be made in connection with the management of the Government railways possess some features which commend themselves to the various parts of Canada and especially to the Maritime Provinces, where naturally a removal of the Intercolonial Headquarters from Moncton to Toronto where officials in charge are to great extent not nearly so conversant as they might be with Maritime Province conditions, and hence neither able or willing to handle matters in this connection to the advantage of the Lower Provinces.

It is, perhaps, true to say that Canada is a country of vast extent, and no part of it has quite a thorough knowledge necessary for sympathetic consideration of the rest. The handling of the railway problem is one, if not the biggest issue which the government has to face. Neither of the old parties is clear of censure in connection with the policy of railway development in this country, but what is done, is done. The past cannot be recalled. The present and the future only are now of practical interest and it appears that the proper handling of the vast and varied interest in connection with our railway problems in units lies under a general control. Our I. C. R. unit headquarters as of old at Moncton with officials in charge who are men of tried records; conversant with Maritime problems and conditions and both able and willing to handle these to the best advantage not only from a local point of view but also from broad national view point. Sectionalism alone is a detriment and Canada has too much of it to-day. The West has always looked out for its own interests and properly so. Ontario, the banner province, has long considered herself the major part of Canada. It therefore, behoves the Maritime Provinces to stand together in all matters that affect their common interests. With a population, on the whole, practically stationary for some years back it becomes more and more necessary for the Lower Provinces to act in concert, if they wish to retain a proper measure of influence in the councils of the nation.

There has been no time in many years so opportune as the present for presenting reasonable consideration to the Parliamentary representatives irrespective of party appear to be rising to the occasion. If they do not continue doing so with unremitting zeal, opportunities will be lost never to return. The Intercolonial is only one phase of the matter but it is an important one. So far as possible, too, Canadian export and import trade should be directed through Canadian ports. It is poor policy for Canada to build up American sea ports while our own ports at Halifax and St. John languish for the business which should find its way through them in the export and import trade of this country.

TENTH ANNIVERSARY RIVERSIDE CEMETERY

The tenth anniversary of the Riverside Cemetery Company will be fittingly observed on the evening of April 25th (Tuesday) in Warren's Hall, and a number of important matters will come up for discussion, among which will be the question of erecting in Riverside Cemetery a suitable monument to the memory of the founders of the town. Ways and means will also be discussed for providing care for the older lots in the cemetery and also for increasing present taxes on lots. The financial report will be presented and addresses will be delivered by the various clergymen of the town. These will be followed by a refreshment interval after which there will be in all likelihood reading of messages and letters from persons abroad who have friends and relatives buried in this cemetery. These letters and messages

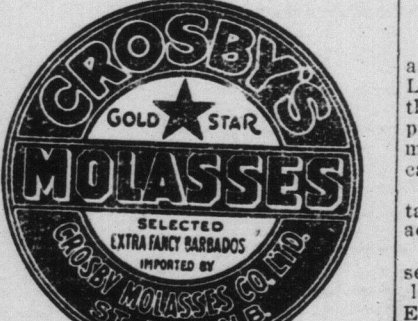

**TREASURE HUNTERS SEEK GOLD IN THE MANY SUNKEN SHIPS**

Gold and Other Valuable Metals Estimated to be Worth \$5,000,000 Went to Bottom of Sea During War.

Gold and other valuable metals estimated to be worth \$5,000,000 lost by the sinking of steamships during the great war are to be sought by treasure hunting companies now being organized in this and other countries, according to despatches received in Washington a few days ago.

Treasure hunting is spreading over the United States, England and other European countries just as it has swept the world after every great conflict.

Officials of the war and navy department are being deluged with requests for information as to the location of vessels sunk by submarines. The public records of the customs service of the United States, England and France are being scrutinized to determine which of the submarines and vessels carried gold and other valuables worth salvage expenses.

In France one treasure hunting corporation is soliciting the public to subscribe to stock on the grounds that the venture may bring in a profit that will reach into thousands of per cent of gain. In Washington government officials generally are not optimistic concerning the chances of success of the treasure hunting companies.

**THE LUSITANIA**

Probably the biggest treasure was lost with the Lusitania which was reported to have nearly \$1,000,000 in gold aboard when she was torpedoed. The Lusitania lies too deep to permit divers to work on her at the present stage of development of most salvage apparatus, officials say.

Engineers and inventors are working to perfect new and unusual diving apparatus, the records of the patent office show. Superdiving bells are planned to cover the treasure which lies too deep for the ordinary methods of salvage. One inventor recently experimented with a steel diving suit to protect the diver from the terrific pressure of the water at the Lusitania's level.

An English salvaging company is at work with suction pumps on the wreck of a Spanish vessel that sank off the coast of Scotland during the invasion of the Armada.

**THE FISHERMEN'S RACES**

The report that the fishing schooner Mayflower, built in the United States last year as a contender for the International Fishermen's Trophy and later ruled out of the races on the ground that she is too much of a yacht, has more than proved her worth as a deep sea schooner this winter while fishing on the banks. It is substantiated by the skippers of other vessels which accompanied her. Her cargo on her return to port after one trip out amounted to 110,000 pounds of fish, and it is declared that she not only stood up well in heavy weather but that she worked to windward with ease when other vessels were blown to leeward. In all respects, it is said, she is a fine sea boat. This naturally raises the question whether or not the ruling which kept her out of last year's race should stand this year.

The Americans have built another schooner designed to make a try for the honor of representing the United States in the 1922 races. She was launched recently at Essex, Massachusetts, and will be called the Puritan. She is described as a "smart looking craft" with fine lines and all the appearance of a very fast sailer. The Canadians, too, have another vessel on the stocks with the idea of entering her in the elimination races and, if she wins from the Bluesnose, the last year's victor, making her the defender of the cup this year. She is being built at Lunenburg, where the Bluesnose was laid down.

The races next fall will be sailed off Gloucester. This is in accordance with the terms of these contests. No doubt the American vessel will have some advantage on a home course, but after all water is water and wind is wind whether off Halifax or Cape Ann, and it may be expected that the fastest schooner will win as she did last year and the year before.

**VETERINARIANS MAY QUALIFY FOR ACCREDITED HERD TESTING**

Arrangements have recently been made by the Dominion Minister of Agriculture whereby practising veterinarians will be enabled to take part in the accredited herd work now being carried on by the Health of Animals Branch of that Department. By thus augmenting its regular staff the Department hopes to proceed more rapidly with the testing of herds for tuberculosis than has been possible hitherto, and thus keep pace with the increasing demand. Veterinarians who desire to take part in this work will be enrolled on the approved list after passing the examination prescribed by the Civil Service Commission, and becoming familiar with the technique under the supervision of a regular inspector.

The examination, of which full particulars may be had at any post office, will be held locally on April 27th. Veterinarians who have already passed the examination will be eligible on taking the prescribed training. Veterinarians on the approved list will not only be available for herd testing, but also for emergency work, as well as for permanent appointment when vacancies occur, provided they are under the age of forty-one years.

According to the story, the firm and others in Canada, mailed price lists of intoxicating liquors to persons in Boston, many of whom forwarded the prices asked, thereby bidding goodbye to their money.

Mr. MacLellan believed that those operating in the scheme are Americans working from a Canadian vantage point and familiar with the names of likely buyers in the United States.

**HERE'S SOME EGG**

In addition to his calling, that of building contractor and builder, Mr. Angus Steele, Brook Street, devotes no little attention to poultry, and, although not boasting of possessing the highest grade of poultry he prides himself in the quantity and quality of the product of his pens. A sample egg was shown the writer. It measured 7 1/2 by 6 1/2 inches in circumference, and was produced by just an every-day breed of hen.—North Sydney Herald.

The attention of the public is called to the following extract from "The Load of Vehicles Act" for the year 1918, Chapter 1, Paragraphs 7 and 8:  
Par. 7.—"No person shall operate a Motor Vehicle that is subject to the provisions of the Motor Vehicle Act of 1918, on any highways in any Municipality, after the twentieth day of March, and before the first day of May following, without the permission of the Engineer of Highways, or such other officer as may be appointed by the Provincial Highways Board, for that purpose, first had and obtained."  
Par. 8.—"Any person who contravenes any of the provisions of this Act, or any permit granted under the authority thereof, shall incur a penalty of not more than one hundred dollars recoverable under the "Nova Scotia Summary Conviction Act" which shall, when collected, form part of the Highways Tax of the Municipality in which such cases arise."

**TWO THOUSAND HEAR MORGAN'S FINAL ADDRESS**  
Dr. Campbell Morgan closed his series of Bible lectures in New Glasgow Thursday. At the afternoon meeting the theatre was as crowded as it had been previous evenings, nearly 2,000 people being present. At the beginning of the session Rev. F. A. Robinson gave an address containing some of his experiences as a Home Missionary in British Columbia, throwing light upon the work being done by the Presbyterian Board of Evangelism in Western Canada. Rev. Robert Johnston announced that practically the entire amount required to meet the expense of this campaign had been collected and that the surplus would be given to the Aberdeen Hospital.  
Dr. Morgan concluded his series of Bible lectures with an analysis of the Gospel of John. John was a mystic of Galilee. No doubt he had seen the manuscripts of the other three writers, but while Matthew had portrayed Jesus as the King, Mark as the Servant of the Lord, and Luke as the Second Man, the Perfect Personality, John looked at Him from an entirely different angle. This is readily seen by the consideration of what he has put in the story and what he has left out of it. The declared purpose of his writing is found at the close of the book. It was written that we might believe that Jesus is the Son of God. Not the Divinity of Christ, because Divinity is only an attribute of God, but the Deity of Christ because Deity is the essence of God.

**LONGSHOREMEN WON'T ACCEPT A WAGE CUT**  
Montreal longshoremen have refused to accept a wage cut of ten, twenty and thirty per cent. announced by eighteen shipping companies for various forms of night and day work, but war has not yet been declared.  
Practically unanimous opinion was expressed at a meeting of the longshoremen here that they would not accept the proposed cut.

**FOR GOOD HEALTH**  
The twenty-ninth annual report of the Department of Public Health for Nova Scotia, recently laid before the Legislature and made public, contains much valuable information and evoked high compliments for the Provincial Health Officer, Dr. Hattie, from members of the Assembly. Dr. Hattie is not only specially qualified for, but is highly enthusiastic in his work. He is supported and assisted by a well-chosen and capable staff.  
Although difficulties have been encountered, Dr. Hattie is able to report substantial progress in his department during the year, notably in the appointment of Public Health nurses, the establishment of County Health Clinics and the extension of the venereal disease programme. The death rate for the year was the lowest on record. Deaths from tuberculosis were fewer than for any preceding year but one. Infant mortality was considerably below the average. There has been a notable increase of public interest in the work of the department, which now has reason to feel that it is definitely moving towards better and more successful operation. It is hoped that a very few years will bring unmistakable evidence of improvement in the health conditions of the province. All of which is extremely gratifying and encouraging to the public as well as to the staff of the Health Department.

The Health Nurses have been most favorably received, and generally approved. The Department of Education has co-operated with them, and greatly strengthened their hands with valuable assistance. Although none of the nurses have been in the field quite a full year, statistical tables show that they have accomplished a great deal of work. They have examined and reported on 31,700 school children, and visited 2,500 homes in connection with child welfare or tuberculosis activities. They have freely co-operated in Red Cross and Women's Institutes' work and with other organizations. The Nova Scotia Society has undertaken to maintain a nurse in each county for a year to demonstrate the value of the service. Progress has also been made in the medical and sanitary inspection of the schools, and much is hoped from efforts in that direction. Many valuable suggestions are made with regard to improvement in the sanitary appliances, conditions and surroundings of schools. It is pleasing to be informed that interest in public health has been awakened both among pupils and teachers. It remains to arouse school trustees, for "it cannot be reported that very much change has been effected in the general sanitary condition of the school houses and toilets." Valuable suggestions in that connection are offered by the report.

A number of new County Health Clinics have been established during the year, which have proved of undoubted value to the communities which they serve. The readiness with which physicians and dentists have co-operated and assisted is reported to have been most gratifying and is highly commended. Three additional venereal disease treatment centres have been opened and six are now in operation. The department is in possession of plentiful evidence of the need of them and has assurance that they are yielding good results.  
The report calls for attention to the activities of other special agencies which have established and are rendering valuable service besides co-operating with the department. There has been a marked diminution in the ravages of diseases of various kinds. Smallpox has been practically eliminated. Full reports with regard to all infectious diseases, have not been obtained, but a distinct betterment in connection with them is noted. Physicians are coming to realize the duty of making proper returns concerning them.  
The report as a whole is highly satisfactory and most encouraging. Much care has evidently been bestowed on its compilation as well as in the collection of information and the discharge of the duties which it records.  
Dr. Hattie and his co-workers are to be highly complimented on what they have done and are doing. The public is to be congratulated on the success of their efforts for its benefit.

**TEA SHORTAGE MEANS HIGHER PRICES**  
During the war teas reached a very high level of cost largely owing to shortage of shipping. In 1919 and 1920, greatly increased production and unlimited shipping resulted in enormous quantities of tea reaching every market in the world, and a consequent fall in cost ensued. So serious did the situation become in India, Ceylon and Java that the various growers agreed to decrease their output during 1921 by 20%. This agreement was kept and the world is now faced by a shortage of tea, which has resulted in the market climbing week by week for the last eighteen months until it has now reached a level fully 15 cents a pound over that of October, 1920.

**WAS STRICKEN IN HIS OFFICE**  
The body of Robert Glasgow, well known Canadian editor and publisher, who died suddenly was taken to Toronto, former home, for burial.  
The body was accompanied to Toronto on Thursday's train by Mrs. Glasgow. The service at New York was conducted by Rev. S. Relaney Townsend. Many of the officials and members of the Canadian Club attended.

The sudden death of Mr. Glasgow came as a shock to his friends. On Tuesday he attended the reception given by the Canadian Club to the members of the Mendelssohn Choir and he appeared in excellent health. He was seized with a sudden attack of heart failure Thursday afternoon while conferring with several business associates in his office and died almost instantly.

Mr. Glasgow had been a resident of New York since 1918. The success of the "Chronicles of Canada", which he published while in Toronto, led him to go to New York to edit and superintend the publication of a similar series in that country, in the "Chronicles of America."  
In this work he was associated with Yale University, of which he was a graduate.  
The Yale University press has created at Yale the Theodore Glasgow Foundation in memory of a son, an aviator in the Canadian army, who was killed over the German lines in Flanders.

**HOPE FOR SPEEDY U. S. AGREEMENT**  
The text of the British government note accepting the claim of the United States government for maintenance costs for the American army of occupation in Germany was published Thursday at London. Commenting editorially on the British reply the Times said:  
"It is a pleasure in these troubled days of international rivalries and misunderstandings to be able to approve wholeheartedly of a diplomatic note. We are thankful the foreign office has given precise and adequate expression of the feelings of the British nation without the reserve and halting evasions which too often mar our intercourse with our best friends. We wish all moral claims could be so frankly and simply recognized."  
The British government's note says the foreign ministry is communicating with the governments of France and Belgium, hoping that a speedy agreement can be reached for the most convenient method for securing the desired ends.

**SKATER'S AND CURLERS' RINK**

On Friday afternoon the Provisional Directors of the Bridgetown Athletic Club, with members of the Executive of the Bridgetown Athletic Club, visited and examined places available and suitable for the erection of a Skating and Curling Rink.

The committee recommend that the site be chosen on the Athletic grounds, and the matter will be taken up at a full meeting to be held after plans are prepared for the new rink.

The new rink will cost around \$10,000 and its construction will round out Bridgetown yearly athletics and sports programme in a splendid manner.
