"All appear to be perfectly satisfied with your apparent piety and great zeal, but there are other properties necessary to missionary success, which can only be acquired by patient study and daily effort. It is the desire of us all that you should go forth a workman thoroughly furnished, for it is quite obvious that the tests and privations of the missionary life, once fairly undertaken, preclude all opportunity for much personal improvement. Where there exists an ardent love for the Redeemer and the extension of his kingdom, and a burning zeal for the salvation of souls, there is great need of such a measure of christian prudence, as dwells alone with the wisdom that cometh down from above. You know what Jesus said to his disciples, the first Christian mis sionaries, 'Be wise as serpents and harmless as doves;' and what'l the greatest of all merely human missionaries said to his spiritual children. 'Let not your good be evil spoken of.' "
