


Chemical Weapons Working Papers Submitted to ENDC/CCD/CD 1969-1982

Between 1969 and 1982, approximately 175 working papers on various aspects of the Chemical Weapons Convention issue have been submitted to the Committee on Disarmament and its predecessors. These working papers have been reproduced in a three-volume series for use by the Department of External Affairs in Ottawa, Canada and made available to the Ad Hoc Chemical Weapons Working Group in Geneva during its 1983 session to facilitate its work.

This booklet has been developed as a result and provides three different indexes which may provide easy reference. The first index (Tab A) has been developed on a functional basis by grouping working papers under main headings. Though most working papers are mentioned only once, many cover a variety of elements. There is therefore a requirement to further refine the functional approach.

The second index (Tab B) lists the working papers chronologically and can therefore be used with the compendiums of working papers (volumes 1 and 2 and the volume containing the 1982 working papers). The third index (Tab C) provides a listing of working papers by nation and through the serial numbers provided can be correlated with the chronological listings.

These indexes and the compendiums they accompany have been developed to facilitate the research programme in Ottawa and are provided to the CD for use by individual members as they may see fit.




