KANSAS CROPS ENDANGERED BY DRY SPELL

Governor Hodges Asked to Set Aside a Day For Public Prayers For Rain, But Does Not Think That Prayers Prevail Against Floods or Drought.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Aug. 15.—(Can. Press.)—Prayers for rain were asked for in Kansas and Missouri today by citizens and clergymen, who believe that sporadic prayers are not sufficient to end the drought that has beset the southwest for more than three weeks.

The letters to Gov. Hodges were from all parts of the state. Some urged the governor to ask that every resident attend church Sunday morning and that everyone make a prayer of his own.

All the letters to the governor declared the writers and their families and friends and the preachers generally had prayed and are praying for rain, but the prayers have not been answered.

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# ULTRA-MODERNISM IN ART NOT WANTED AT EXHIBITION

### Cubists and Futurists Need Not Apply, But Otherwise Collection This Year Is Large and Wholly Satisfactory—'Story' Pictures Occupy Prominent Place in the Collection.

Anyone who goes to the Canadian National Exhibition with a view to seeing Cubist or Futurist pictures will be obliged to go to the Midway to find them. The canvases which advertise the freaks to be seen in the showrooms might be classified under this head. But no pictures of the future will be found in the art gallery according to the advice of Mr. E. Rimbault Dibdin, curator of the Walker art gallery, Liverpool, who has gathered a superb collection of pictures by British and German artists for display at Toronto this year. In his address Mr. Dibdin says: "I have avoided those eccentric who, by adroit advertisement, have somehow got themselves mentioned among the art pathmakers to the art of the future, post impressionists, cubists, futurists, and the like, because I have failed, after much honest effort, to find in their pictures any valid reason for their existence, and I do not believe they can lead to anything but chaos." Nevertheless the collection of pictures at the art gallery this year will reveal as has no other exhibition of the past, fine as some of them have been, the legitimate tendencies of modern art. The very best that is being done by the living painters of England, Ireland, and Scotland will be brought to the doors of the Canadian picture lover; and the gallery will also contain choice and representative collections from the brushes of the leading German and American painters of the day.

Where Artists Disagree.

For the past twenty years there has been much debate among painters as to what is known as the "story" picture; that is to say the depiction of an episode which implies a narrative. Some painters have held such works, however beautifully executed, to be bad art. The general public, however, has steadfastly adhered to its love for the "story" picture, and it is not dead to the mere aspects of tone, line and atmosphere. While "story" pictures will by no means monopolize the walls of the gallery there will be enough of them to fascinate the visitor who is not primarily interested in the process of interpretation. For example, a picture that will attract much attention will be John D. Batten's "Beauty and the Beast," a most wonderful decorative rendering of the ancient fairy tale, in which the depiction of the human being concealed within the beast is wonderfully suggested. Then there is George Wetherbee's "Aphrodite's Resin," which looks back in motive to classic legend, and the charming in tone, the noted painter of medieval subjects and fanciful themes, Byam Shaw, sends

## DIAZ READY IF WAR BREAKS OUT

### Says He Would Take Part in Any War His Native Country May Be Involved In.

BIARRITZ, France, Aug. 15.—(Can. Press).—General Porfirio Diaz, former President of Mexico, in a statement tonight, said that he did not desire to sit in judgment on the situation existing in his native country, but that he would like to proclaim as his most ardent hope that Mexico soon would find in peace a new era of strength and prosperity.

"Besides, I am not a man of words," said the former Mexican executive. "I always have been, and always shall remain, a man of action. I bow before the choice of administration made by my compatriots, and am resolved to maintain the strictest neutrality. No words shall be spoken by me which might give rise to comment or argument between the armies in Mexico. I wish to keep out of all discussions or discussions. But if, contrary to my expectations, a conflict should break out between Mexico and a foreign state, I could not remain indifferent."

## SULZER REFUSES TO ABDICATE OFFICE

### Declines Flatly to Yield Up Executive Chamber to Lieutenant-Governor Glynn.

ALBANY, N.Y., Aug. 15.—(Can. Press).—Preparations as if for a long siege were made at the executive chamber upon the arrival of Lieutenant-Governor Glynn at the capitol. The locks on every door leading to the chamber and the governor's private office were changed and an attendant was stationed at each entrance.

Secretary of State Mitchell returned from Saratoga this morning and called at the office of Lieutenant-Governor Glynn before the latter's arrival at the capitol. "I merely called to pay my respects," said Secretary Mitchell, "and to assure Mr. Glynn personally that I have decided to recognize him as acting governor of state. As I read the law I can see no other way to act constantly."

Furial demand for the surrender of the executive chamber and office, the private seal and all books, papers, records and documents relating to the executive department was made upon Governor William Sulzer by Lieutenant-Governor Martin H. Glynn.

Governor Sulzer refused to comply with the demand.

Included in Governor Sulzer's refusal, according to D. Cady Herrick, chief of his council, is a proposal that Glynn and Sulzer prepare an agreed statement of the facts in the controversy and submit them to the courts to determine who is governor of New York.

Control of the National Guard, access to the great seal, recognition by New York's secretary of state and by the governor of the neighboring state of New Jersey were prerogatives stripped from Governor Sulzer, impeached, by Lieutenant-Governor Glynn, who claims to be the acting chief executive. Possession of the privy seal, whose imprint validates all documents coming before the governor on affairs wholly within the state and occupancy of the executive chambers remained with Governor Sulzer.

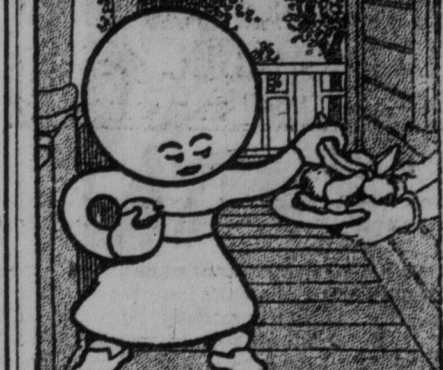

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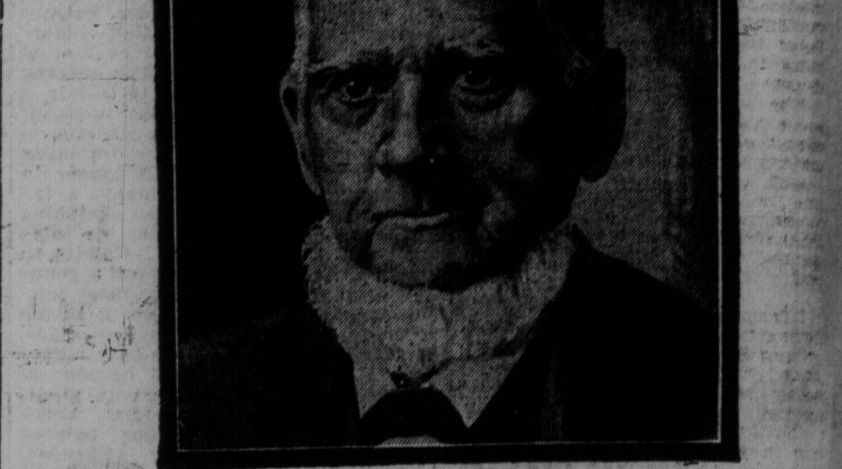

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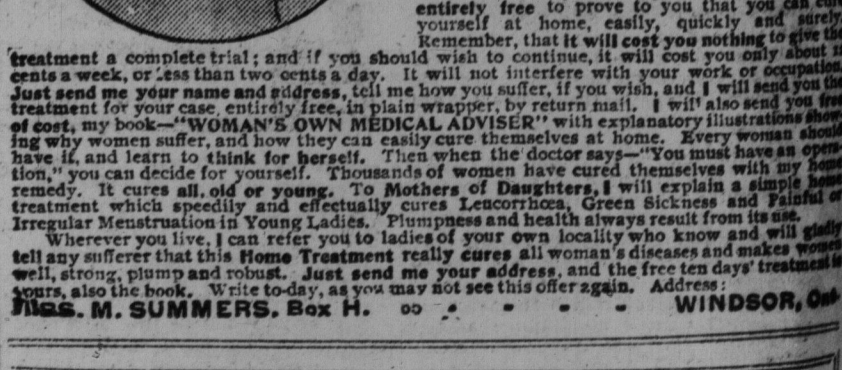

**HARBOR LOANS AND CITY FINANCES.**

It will appear to many people that if the demand in London for Toronto harbor bonds is so keen as some assert all that is necessary to get them would be to raise the offer a trifle. However, the commission has made an excellent and satisfactory sale of a block of \$1,500,000 to an American insurance company for investment purposes, and so far as the city is concerned there are no complaints to make. The price for 4 1/2 per cent bonds was \$91.25, and in the circumstances of the money market nothing better could be asked. The fact that the bonds are taken for investment and, therefore, removed from the market as a competing element with future city or harbor issues is a matter of considerable value.

The work on the harbor plans will be proceeded with as a business commission might be expected to carry it on. The contrast between the methods of the harbor commission and those of the city is a most valuable example for the citizens.

At the same time the city is doing better than it has done for some years. Mayor Hocken and Controller McCarthy have been able to reduce the finances, left by Mayor Geary and the invalided treasurer in such a manner, to something like order again. The present year's taxes have been well paid up, about \$5,000,000 having come in so far, and the city is in no straits. In this respect the Hocken administration has been a distinct triumph.

**STATE FIRE INSURANCE.**

New Zealand has a state system of fire insurance and its eighth annual report for the calendar year 1912 states that the result is a record one in two important respects—the profits being greatly in excess of those of any previous year, whilst the working expenses were the lowest on record. Profits, after adding \$13,000 to the reserve for unearned premiums amounting to \$20,000 as compared with \$26,000 for 1911. The next largest profit was \$12,000 made in 1910. For 1912 the total net income was \$280,000, an increase for the year of \$36,000, and the net premium was \$270,000 as against \$243,000 in 1911, while the net losses fell from \$137,000 in the latter year to \$125,000. The ratio of working expenses to premium income stood at 25.7 in 1912, as against 27.5 and the reserve funds are now \$246,000.

During 1912, the New Zealand state office purchased the whole of the debentures, amounting to \$10,000, issued in 1909 to provide funds for the initiation of the business. By so doing the office was placed in the unique position of having no liability

**PRESSURE WAS NORMAL**

Fire Enquiry Fails to Throw Additional Light on Alderman's Charges.

gauge report sixty pounds, or normal for that district.

The first stream was turned on. The water was thrown at a pressure that would reach a 60-foot high building and the pressure gauge remained at sixty pounds.

"That is normal for this district," Chief Thompson declared.

The second stream was turned on and was similarly satisfactory. The same result was obtained when the third stream was turned on. Each of the streams had a 60-foot height pressure and a sixty pound pressure.

"A lieutenant who has been in service twenty years turned on the water at the hydrant for the fire on Saturday," Deputy Chief Smedley stated.

"That demonstrates that there is nothing wrong with the hydrant," Ald. Burgess remarked.

Chief Thompson declared that there was no pressure at the pumping station during the fire. The pressure at the hydrant was normal, the trouble must have been in the mains," Controller O'Neill observed.

**Residents Complained.**

"The people in this section told me that the water pressure for domestic purposes was very poor on the morning of the fire," said Chief Thompson. "If the mains were choked it would have been freed when the fire engines went into operation at the fire. The pressure from the pumping station alone evidently did not free the main where it choked."

The end of the test was an inspection of the chart at the pumping station. The chart showed very little variation from sixty pounds pressure throughout the test.

**NO WIDESPREAD DAMAGE TO CROPS**

Western Grain Yield Will Not Be Affected by Storm That Raged Thru Manitoba.

Reports from western points of the storm that swept over parts of Saskatchewan and Manitoba point to damage to crops in isolated points, but to no widespread damage such as would materially affect the western yield for this year. The greatest force of the storm was felt in the Brooks district, where the crops for four miles north and south were laid by the heavy storm of rain and wind.

Altho the storm at Winnipeg was accompanied by a sensational down-pour of rain very little damage was done in the city beyond the leveling of a few fences and the breaking of some windows. Round Portage la Prairie, where the wind leveled telegraph and telephone wires, no considerable damage to crops is reported, altho heavy fields of grain were laid by the cyclone, and considerable delay will thus be caused to harvesting operations.

on capital account. The scheme is now supported entirely on capital accumulated in its operation and the department claims that in addition to having saved the insuring public an exceedingly large sum (approximately \$75,000,000) it reduced premiums, it has built up reserve funds from profits and unearned premium reserves, totaling \$240,000. Indeed, the position of the state insurance office today, the report says, must be regarded as extremely satisfactory and has been attained without the cost of a single penny piece to the taxpayers of the country.

Summing up the results of the New Zealand fire insurance agency, the report states that the substantial increases in the reserve funds of the office have been a pleasing feature of the last three annual balance sheets. No efforts, it adds, should be spared to further increase this sum in order that it may become ample to meet all claims which may arise in future.

The New Zealand department has, however, been peculiarly fortunate in its average loss ratio. For the past three years that has been only 50.16 per cent of the annual premium income—a considerably lower average than has been experienced in the fire insurance business of the dominion. Even the most watchful care in underwriting cannot ensure that this low ratio and corresponding enhancement of profits will be maintained. But the New Zealand experiment has undoubtedly justified its primary purpose, that of reducing fire premiums to a reasonable and proper amount.

**RURAL CREDITS.**

President Wilson has set his endorsement to the movement in the United States for the establishment of a rural credit system. In his issued statement urging action by congress the point is made that special machinery of a distinct system of banking must be provided for if rural credits are to be successfully and adequately supplied. Next winter the government commission that has been investigating European methods will have presented its report to congress, and the president expresses his confidence that its recommendations will result in the establishment of a complete and adequate system. Now that the increase in the population of the United States has not only relatively but actually outstripped food production it is evident enough that a radical change must occur in the methods of land cultivation.

To the president's mind there has been too little federal legislation framed to serve the farmer directly and with a deliberate adjustment to his real needs. These needs necessarily change with the natural evolution of the country and the time is past in the United States when its farmers can remain insensible to the disadvantages imposed either by law or by circumstance. President Wilson regards as one of the chief and most serious of those disadvantages that the farmer has not been able to secure the extended bank accommodations of which he every year stands in need except under burdensome rates of interest and the acceptance of oppressive mortgage obligations. The administration has not only charged a commission with the responsibility of reporting on European methods but thru the department of agriculture is engaged in a series of systematic studies of the whole problem of rural credits.

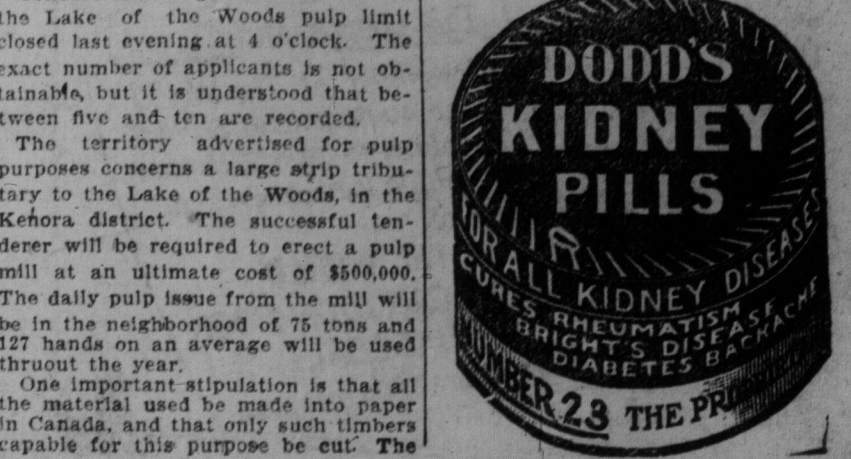
### TENDERS CLOSED FOR PULP LIMITS
