FIRST DAY.

CORNWALL, JANUARY 25, 1887.

The Council met at 7 p. m.

The Clerk presiding.

The Reeves of Charlottenburgh and Mountain having been appointed Scrutineers, the ballot was taken, and resulted in favor of Mr. Anderson, whom the Clerk declared duly elected.

The Warden, after addressing the Council, made and subscribed to the declaration of office, and entered on his duties.

The following communications were then received and read:—

1st. From Dr. McDiarmid, Inspector of Schools of Glengarry, with reference to the loss of a registered letter, and the inability of the Post Office Department to recover it.

2nd. From J. P. Whitney, Esq., resigning the position of High School Trustee for the village of Morrisburgh.

3rd. From A. M. Rosebrugh, Treasurer of the Prisoners' Aid Association, making the annual appeal in aid thereof.

4th. From Beverley Jones, Esq., Hon. Secretary of the Canada Land Law Amendment Association.

5th. From Wm. Davidson, Esq., County Clerk of Perk, asking concurrence of this Council in a resolution with reference to a proposed Delegation of Engineers to interview the Government.

From J. T. Bell, Esq., County Clerk of Hastings, asking co-operation in memorializing the Government in the matter of providing better accommodation for the lunatics of this Province.

From Principal Grant, of Queen's College, drawing attention to the need of a School of Science in Eastern Ontario.

Moved by Mr. Ault, seconded by Mr. Doran, that a select Committee composed of Messrs. McKenzie, Sweet, Steacy, A. Stewart, A. Harkness, McArthur, the mover and seconder, be appointed to take into consideration all communications that do not properly come under the consideration of any of the Standing Committees. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Ault, seconded by Mr. Doran, that Messrs. Steacy, Snider, Bennett, McIntosh, McNaughton, McKenzie, Irving, P. A. Stewart, the mover and seconder, be a Special Committee to strike the Standing Committees, and report at to-morrow morning's session. Carried.

Moved by Mr. A. Harkness, seconded by Mr. Ault, that Messrs. Steacy, McKenzie, McLaughlin, Munro, McArthur, McNaughton, P. A. Stewart, the mover and seconder, be appointed a Special Committee, with instructions to report on the condition of the fund arising from the Scott Act fines, making such recommendations with reference to the disposition thereof as may appear to be in the public interest and in accordance with the law in that behalf. Carried.

Report of the Committee on Printing.

Present.—Messrs. J. Anderson, Banford,
Collison, Dr. Harkness, Hunt, McArthur,
A. D. McDonald, Myers, Snider, P. A. Stew-
art and H. J. Whittaker.

Your Committee beg leave to report that
the Minutes of 1886 reached the Clerk of
this Council in due time, viz: the 1st day
of December, 1886, and were promptly for-
warded by the Clerk to the various muni-
cipalities. Your Committee would recom-
mend the printing of sixteen hundred co-
pies of the minutes of proceedings of the
sessions of this Council for the current
year. Your Committee would also recom-
mend that the Clerk notify all the editors
of newspapers in the United Counties by
telegram or otherwise to send in sealed
tenders for this work, and also shall ask
for separate tenders for printing convic-
tions to be received at the same date, not
later than 7 p. m., of Thursday, the 27th
inst.; the lowest or any tender not neces-

sarily accepted. The workmanship and material to be equal to that of 1886, and to include the Rules and Regulations as attached to the minutes of 1886. All the minutes to be delivered not later than the first day of December next, save and except Sessional numbers for the use of members each Session. In case of failure to deliver the Minutes as above, there shall be a reduction made of twenty per cent. No payment to be made on the printing until the account be passed by this committee. The publisher to whom the contract of printing the minutes of this Council shall be awarded, shall give an acknowledgement to the Clerk of this Council that he accepts the contract subject to all the terms and conditions therein set forth. Tenders to be addressed to F. Anderson, Esq., Warden, who shall open them as soon as possible in the presence of the Clerk. Your Committee would recommend that the Clerk of the Council forward as soon as possible to the editor to whom the contract for printing is awarded the minutes of proceedings of each session.

Report of the Education Committee.

Present.—Messrs. Bennett, Casselman, Campbell, Crosbie, Doran, Fraser, Munro, McIntosh, Steacy, Sweet and McKenzie.

The Committee beg leave to recommend that the following gentlemen be appointed High School Trustees viz: Geo. H. McGilivray, Esq., and Alexander Hay, Esq., both of Williamstown, for the Williamstown High School; John A. McDougall, Esq., Alexandria, for the Alexandria High School; John Bennett, Esq., Athol, for the Cornwall High School; George Deeks, Esq., Morrisburgh, for the Morrisburgh High School; and for the same school, Wm. P. Millar, of the same place, in place of J. P. Whitney, Esq., resigned; J. H. Harkness, M. D., Irena, for the Iroquois High School; and that a By-law be introduced to make the appointments.

The Committee recommend that the following gentlemen be County Examiners: R. B. Carman, P. S. I., Cornwall; D. McDiarmid, P. S. I., Glougary; A. McNaughton, P. S. I., Stormont; and Arthur Brown, P. S. I., Dundas, and that the sum of \$135

each be allowed to D. McDiarmid and A. McNaughton, for travelling expenses, and \$145 to Arthur Brown; and the Committee further recommend that a By-law be introduced to make the appointments.

The Committee have had submitted to them a claim of the Board of Education of the Village of Morrisburgh, for One hundred and sixty dollars and five cents, to equal the Government grant to Morrisburgh High School, for the year 1886, which the Committee find is according to law; they therefore recommend that the said sum be paid to the Board of Education of Morrisburgh, and the Committee recommend that an equal sum be paid to the Board of Education of Iroquois—both sums to be levied on the County of Dundas.

The Committee have had before them an application of the Council of the city of Kingston, requesting the Council to join them in memorializing the Provincial Government to establish a School of Science at Kingston; the Committee recommend that the Council agree with the resolutions of the Kingston Council, and that D. B. McLennan, Esq., Cornwall, be appointed to join the Deputation from Kingston, to press the above on the consideration of the Government of Ontario.

Report of the Property Committee.

Present:—Harkness, Snider, Irving, Doran, McIntosh, Bennett, A. Stewart, A. R. McDonald, Atchison, D. A. McDonald.

Your Committee beg to report that they have examined the Gaol, and find therein five male prisoners, confined for small offences, some of whom will be soon discharged; and also one female lunatic who will shortly be conveyed to the asylum. The heating conductors throughout the gaol are nearly completed and ready for use. Your Committee beg to say that all the additional improvements that were ordered by the Committee of last year under the supervision of a small committee composed of I. R. Ault, Dr. Hamilton, and A. G. McArthur, have been completed, save and except the Judge's bench, which is under contract. This work will cost something in excess of our original intention, still we express a hope that when com-

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pleted it will meet our expectations and give general satisfaction.

As the heating was placed under the charge of a special Committee (with which the Chairman of this Committee was associated,) we beg to report that, although the recent flood has entailed a little damage to the basement and furnaces, and has caused some delay in completing the work by the contractor, everything will be in working order in a few days.

Your Committee have had under their consideration the irregular way in which officials contract debts for supplies, other than those for prisoners. No doubt many of these have arisen out of circumstances connected with our improvements and may never occur again; however, to protect our finances and to inaugurate a check on such expenditure, this Committee recommends for adoption by the Council; that no accounts for furniture and other supplies out of the usual course ordered by officials and gaoler, will be allowed, unless ordered under requisition of the Chairman of this Committee.

Your Committee also begs to define the duties of the Caretaker, Messenger, and Gaol Physician.

1st. That the duties of the Caretaker will be to take particular care of the furnaces and heating conductors; to look after the heating, lighting, sweeping and cleaning the Public or County Offices and Court House; to supply dry earth, and remove all refuse from any earth closets, if used in the Public Buildings, or adjacent yard; to keep in a proper condition of cleanliness the outward surroundings, and comply with the Town By-law in keeping snow and ice in the winter off the side-walks fronting the county property, on Pitt street, and to keep the basement free from filth of whatever description. The caretaker will be under the direction of the Clerk of the Council during the interval of sessions.

2nd. That the duties of the Messenger will be, to be in attendance and wait on the Counties' Council when in session, and all Courts, to attend to lights, fires, and closing the Court House after the evening session, etc., etc.

3rd. The salary of the Gaol Physician will be for the current year in full payment of all duties, including examination of lunatics, and including full payment of all prescriptions, drugs and medicines used

in his duties as Gaol Physician. Your Committee would here intimate to the Gaoler and Messenger, that they recommend the Finance Committee to refuse payment after this date, of any bills contracted by them for drugs and medicines of any description.

Your Committee, while not wishing to express an opinion as to the liability of this Council, in reference to this class of bridge, would recommend the Council to adhere to the system heretofore pursued, according to which the Councils immediately interested build the bridges of this class in the same manner as they maintain Township and Boundary Roads.

Report of the Committee re Distribution of Fines Accruing under the Canada Temperance Act.

Present Harkness, Ault, Steacy, McKenzie, McLaughlin, Munro, McArthur, McNaughton, P. A. Stewart.

Your Committee beg leave to report that they have had submitted for their consideration, applications from the Commissioners of the different License Districts, viz: Dundas, Stormont, Cornwall and Glengarry, for the following sums: \$406.67, \$466.67, \$400 and \$407.78, being in all \$1681.12,

and which is claimed to be two-thirds of expenses for the License year 1886-7 and due by Acts of the Provincial Legislature from these United Counties of said Commissioners.

Your Committee find that none of the fines under the above Act with the exception of \$600 from the Town of Cornwall and \$150 from Glengarry making a total of \$750 have been paid into the County Treasurer as was evidently intended by the Order-in-Council of the 28th September last and subsequent order.

Your Committee have reason to believe that considerable sums of money have accrued in the hands of the Inspectors, more especially of Dundas, Stormont and Cornwall, and which as yet have not been paid into the Treasury of these Counties.

Your Committee would further recommend that the Commissioners of each License District be authorized to draw out of the funds paid into the Treasurer of these United Counties from their respective License Districts, and which have been obtained from fines accruing from violations of law under the Canada Temperance Act, a sum not exceeding \$400 for each License District, and that the Treasurer be instructed to keep a separate account with each License District.

Your Committee would also recommend that the Treasurer be instructed to notify the different Boards of Commissioners of the action taken by this Council, and also to urge upon them, and through them upon Inspectors, the necessity of making a complete return of fines and money so as to enable this Council to further deal with the distribution of fines in the interest of the Canada Temperance Act.

1st. At the January Session instructions were given to the Clerk to advertise for tenders for the lot, and at the same time procure plans from D. R. Brown, P.L.S. so that offers might be received for the whole or such parts of the lot as might suit intending purchasers.

2nd. The lot west of the Gaol was to be sold at public auction on the 28th of February, so on that day the Committee met to open tenders. As no tenders had been received and the purchase of the lot to the west of the Gaol having been made conditional on the sale of the wood yard your Committee did not feel warranted in making the purchase. However, arrangements were made whereby the lot was purchased by Wm. McKenzie, Reeve of Morrisburgh, for \$1600.00, upon the understanding that if the Council desire they could take it over at this Session at the same price by paying the interest on the cost for the time and the necessary expenses of the transfer.

3rd. The Committee then instructed the Clerk to continue the advertisement for tenders until this meeting of Council.

4th. Your Committee regret that no offers have yet been received. The severe floods of the last two years that have inundated the lower parts of the town appear to have periodically affected the property which comes slightly within the flooded district.

5th. Your Committee believing this depreciation to be only temporary recommend that the property be held open for a time and the property to the west of the Gaol be taken over by the Counties and that a By-Law be introduced accordingly.

Report of the Road Committee.

Members all present.

Your Committee having had under consideration a petition from the Council of the Township of Kenyon asking permission to open two streets in the village of Maxville of a less width than sixty-six feet beg to recommend that leave be granted as desired and that a By-Law be introduced accordingly.

We have also considered a petition from the Reeves of Kenyon and Lochiel asking that a bridge be built by the Counties over river La Grass which crosses the Boundary line between the Townships. At the October Session 1886 a claim was made on behalf of the Township of Mountain to have this Council repair or build a bridge over the Nation river where it crosses the Boundary between that Township and Matilda, both claims, it appears,

being based on Sec. 532 of the Municipal Act of 1883.

While not in a position to determine whether these streams are entitled to be regarded as rivers within the meaning of the Act, we would recommend that as has been the practice heretofore in these Counties, the necessary improvement be made by the Townships immediately interested in the same manner as on roads on Township Boundary lines.

Report of Special Committee re Distribution of Fines Accruing under the Canada Temperance Act.

Present—Harkness, Ault, Steacy, McKenzie, Fraser, Munro, McArthur, McNaughton, Stewart.

Your Committee beg leave to report that that they have had submitted for their consideration applications from the License Districts of Dundas, Stormont and Cornwall shewing a deficit due for the license year of 1886-7 as follows:

Dundas. Deficit \$923.75, which with an estimated expenditure of \$1215.00 for year 1887-8 makes a claim of \$2138.75 (less fees for licenses \$90.00) leaving a balance of \$2048.75; two-thirds of which having to be discharged by the Counties makes an appropriation of \$1365.87 necessary.

Stormont shews a deficiency of \$387.28 for the year 1886-7, which with an estimated expenditure of \$1200.00 makes an amount of \$1587.28 (less fees for licenses \$90.00) leaving a balance of \$1497.28; two-thirds of which \$998.18 is due by these Counties.

Cornwall shews no deficiency, having drawn \$400 appropriated last Session. Its estimates for year 1887-8 amounts to \$950.00 (less fees for licenses \$50.00) making the amount required \$900.00.

Your Committee beg leave to make the following recommendations with regard to above amounts, viz:

1st. That the Dundas License District have placed to the credit of the License fund account at the Molson's Bank, Morrisburgh, the sum of \$1365.87 being the full amount of deficit 1886-7 and estimated expenditure for 1887-8.

2nd. That two-thirds of deficit of \$387.28 fro year 1886-7 being \$258.19 and a further

sum of \$400 on estimated expenditure 1887-8 be placed to the credit of the License fund account for License District of Stormont in Bank of Montreal, Cornwall, said amount to be paid out of fines accrued under Scott Act convictions in said License District.

3rd. That \$600 be placed in Bank of Montreal, Cornwall, to the credit of License fund account of the License District of Cornwall being full amount of estimate.

4th. That in the absence of either estimates or account of expenditure from the License District of Glengarry that the Treasurer be instructed to pay all funds accruing from Scott Act convictions from said License District to a sum not exceeding \$1000 (less amount already paid) into the Bank of Montreal, Cornwall, to the credit of License fund account of District of Glengarry.

Your Committee considered a petition from Police Magistrate Bow, of Dundas, asking for an appropriation to pay for use of halls while trying Scott Act cases, but they do not feel warranted in recommending any appropriation at present for such purposes as it appears to be within the province of the Inspector.

With reference to the request made to the Council by the deputation from a Branch of the Dominion Temperance Alliance that one-half of fines accruing from convictions under the Scott Act, at the instance of a private prosecutor, be paid to said private prosecutor, it is recommended that the request be granted and that the Treasurer be authorized to make payments accordingly, but only on the certificate of the convicting Magistrate. While recommending the grant in deference to the wishes of the deputation and in the hope that it may further the end wished for, your Committee are still strongly under the impression that the properly constituted authorities are the best channels for promoting enforcement of the Act.

Your Committee wish to express in the strongest terms possible their disapprovati-
on of the course pursued by the officers of many of the License Districts in not making proper returns, and especially in not paying over the amount of fines to the Treasurer of these Counties as the law so plainly directs; thereby causing this Council very great annoyance not only by making it impossible to keep a proper

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financial statement but also to know how to use the money to the best advantage for the purpose of the more effectual enforcement of the Act. For Example:

Dundas furnishes a detailed account of expenditure amounting to \$943.20 with a detailed account of receipts from fines of \$1400 but has neglected paying amount over to Treasurer.

Stormont sends account of estimated expenditure for year 1887-8 with deficits for 1886-7 but has paid over no money, neither furnished an account of receipts or expenditure.

Cornwall furnishes estimates for 1887-8, pays over fines, but furnishes no account of receipts or expenditures.

Glengary pays over \$250 but does not furnish either deficits, estimates or accounts of receipts and expenditure.

Report of Finance Committee.

Present—D. McNaughton, Dr. Steacy, W. M. Doran, M. O. Callaghan, A. M. Campbell, D. A. McArthur, P. A. Stewart, — Ault.

Your Committee have passed accounts amounting to \$1392.20—payment of which to be levied by By-Law.

Your Committee find that the Nation River Drainage account has been kept distinct from General Account, and all the monies paid out of the General Account at the earliest stages of that improvement have been repaid.

The Boundary Road difficulty between Winchester and Williamsburgh, with its attendant litigation, has drawn some \$1130 G1c. from the treasury, and if the appeal *re* Hall should be adverse, we fear a much larger sum will be needed to meet our obligations to the Courts. In that event it will be necessary for this Council or successors, to adjust these payments with the Townships interested.

Your Committee who had in charge the sale of the wood-yard and the purchase of the adjoining Lot on the west side of the gaol premises, have already reported that they did not receive any tenders for the wood yard—(the time seemed to be inopportune.) They did, however, secure the Lot on the west side at public sale, through

Mr. McKenzie, at \$1600. This purchase was necessary and contingent on the sale of the wood yard, as reported to Government and this Council by the Prison Inspector.

Your Committee therefore have to report that this purchase, with the large accumulated sums paid for heating, furniture, and the necessary improvements—(and not realizing cash from sale of wood yard)—will necessitate borrowing about eleven thousand dollars till the October session. Whatever sums may be needed at that date, over and above the usual \$12,000 levy, to cover ordinary expenditures, we recommend consolidating and issuing Debentures for a series of years, which will make the levy on the Municipality small and the payment scarcely felt. This sum may be very much reduced to the extent at least, of \$5000 or more, if a purchaser for the wood yard can be secured on or before our next Session.

Your Committee therefore recommend for adoption the accompanying By-Law to give power to the Treasurer and Warden, to borrow from some person or chartered bank of the Dominion, for the purposes above set forth, in such sum or sums as they may deem necessary, to the extent of \$11,000, at such dates as may be consistent with our meeting in October.

Report of Committee on County Property.

Present—A. Harkness, C. Irving, W M Doran, J. J. McIntosh, J. Bennett, J. B. Snyder, A. Stewart, A. R. McDonald, W Atchison, D. A. McDonald and Ault.

Your Committee beg to report that they have examined offices and gaol, and have decided to recommend that a 1½ in. grooved and tongued pine board partition be made in the corridor of the gaol, south of the doors opening into the male and female yards, and north of the door entrance into the west prison ward, with two windows on hinges opposite the outside windows, for light and ventilation, and a 1½ in. panel door. This partition is necessary for the comfort of the prisoners in the west ward in the winter, as the cold introduced into the corridor from the north door neutralizes the heat from the heating pipes. The

time has now arrived, the town water-works being completed, to supply the offices and gaol with water closet accommodation. Your Committee would therefore recommend that the closets be placed in the basement of the offices, flushed into the main government sewer, a distance of about one hundred feet, and that a receptacle closet be made at the east end of the centre corridor of the gaol, and flushed through the same pipe of the water closets with ventilating pipes. All this outlay will cost very much less than the credit we got from the contractor Johnston for dispensing with that work. As Mr. Hunter has been doing all our heating works, we have asked him to do this work in the best manner for durability and economy, to charge as he has been doing in the other works for material and labor. This rough estimate meets our approval, and we ask the Council to confirm this arrangement by adopting this Report.

Your Committee would recommend the passing of a By-Law to cover the purchase of the Lot on the west side of the gaol.

Your Committee notice that they imposed additional duty on Mr. Cameron, the caretaker of the offices, in their report of the last January session, by adding the Court House. We now release him from that duty, and hereby direct that the messenger, Mr. McMartin, do that work, under the supervision of the Sheriff, to whom it properly belongs.

Your Committee had a conference with Mr. Johnston, the contractor, for incomplete work, for which \$200 was retained to insure the completion of said work. We have compromised the matter by paying Mr. Johnson \$175 in full of all dues and demands, and releasing him from further obligations.

2. The Treasurer is hereby authorized to retire or renew such note, or notes from time to time as they may become due out of money which has been levied and collected for County purposes.

No. 817.—By-law to Incorporate the Village of West Winchester in the County of Dundas.

Whereas upwards of one hundred Freeholders and Householdors residing upon those portions of Lots number Two, Three, Four and Five in the Seventh Concession; Lots Two, Three, Four and Five in the Sixth Concession, and Lots Three and Four in the Fifth Concession of the Township of Winchester in the County of Dundas, hereinafter described and referred to; have by their petition prayed that those portions of said Lots beset apart from the said Township of Winchester in the County of Dundas and erected into an Incorporated Village by the name of the Village of West Winchester and that the inhabitants thereof be constituted a Corporate Body Politie, apart from the said Township under the name of the Corporation of the Village of West Winchester.

And, whereas it appears by the returns made by George Elliott, the Census Enumerator, appointed to take the census of the inhabitants residing within or upon the portions aforesaid of said Lots, that the requisite number of inhabitants contained within the said portions of said Lots exceed seven hundred and fifty;

And, whereas it appears that the residences of such inhabitants are sufficiently near to form an Incorporated Village, and it is desirable to grant the prayer of the said petition and incorporate the said portions of said Lots therein, and hereinafter particularly described, as the Municipality of the Village of West Winchester.

Be it therefore enacted a By-law of this Municipal Corporation of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

1. That from, and after, the first day of October next those portions of Lots numbers Two, Three, Four and Five in the Seventh Concession; Lots Two, Three, Four and Five in the Sixth Concession; and Lots numbers Three and Four in the Fifth Concession of the Township of Winchester, in the County of Dundas, lying within the limits and boundaries shown, and laid out in said petition, and the map or plan thereto attached, and hereinafter described, shall be set apart from the said Township of Winchester and erected and constituted into an Incorporated Village by the name of the "Village of West Winchester," and that the inhabitants thereof shall be constituted a Corporate Body Politie, apart from the said Township of Winchester under the name of "The Corporation of the Village of West Winchester"

ter," and shall have all such powers and privileges and liabilities as are now, or may hereafter be conferred or imposed upon Incorporated Villages.

2. That the said Incorporated Village shall comprise and consist of all those portions of Lots number Two, Three, Four and Five in the Seventh Concession; Lots number Two, Three, Four and Five in the Sixth Concession and Lots number Three and Four in the Fifth Concession in the Township of Winchester in the County of Dundas lying within the limits and boundaries hereinafter set forth.

3. That the Municipal Corporation of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry do assign as boundaries of the said Incorporated Village of West Winchester, the boundaries and limits set forth in said petition and map or plan thereunto annexed, and hereinafter set forth, that is to say:—

The South-east quarter of the South half of Lot number Two; the South quarter of Lot number Three; the South quarter of Lot number Four, and the South-west quarter of the South half of Lot number Five, all in the Seventh Concession of the Township of Winchester in the County of Dundas; the North-east quarter of the North half of Lot number Two; the North half of the West half of Lot number Three; the East half of Lot number Four; the West half of Lot number Four and the North-west quarter of the North half of Lot number Five, all in the Sixth Concession of the Township of Winchester in the County of Dundas; the North-east quarter of the North half of Lot number Three; and the North-west quarter of the North half of Lot number Four, both in the Fifth Concession of the Township of Winchester in the County of Dundas.

4. That the first election for Councillors in said Village shall be held at the building known as Sweet's Hall, in the said Village of West Winchester.

5. That Thomas E. Griffith shall be the Returning Officer to hold such first election.

6. That the said Returning Officer before holding the said election shall take the oath or affirmation now required to be taken by the Municipal Acts.

7. That the duties of the Returning Officer and the qualifications of voters and persons to be elected as Councillors at such election, and the proceedings and procedure to be observed at such election shall be as laid down on and as contained in the Municipal Acts relating thereto.

8. Nothing herein contained shall effect any taxes imposed for any debt heretofore contracted by the Township of Winchester so far as same shall effect the said Incorporated Village, but the said village of West Winchester shall only be liable to pay to the Treasurer of the said Township of Winchester in each and every year, until such existing debt heretofore contracted as aforesaid shall be satisfied or discharged, the same amounts as were, or ought to be, collected for the said existing debts within the said heretofore assigned limits, and boundaries of the said Incorporated Village of West Winchester for the now present or current year, and the said amounts shall be a debt against the said Village.

Your Committee recommend that the prayer of the petitioners be granted, and that a By-law be passed accordingly.

Your Committee beg to report that they have passed accounts aggregating \$801.47, marked schedule A. A By-law will be introduced to cover payment.

At the June session this Council by By-law authorized the Warden and Treasurer to borrow as needed to the extent of \$11,000 to tide us over to the October session, at which time it was thought we would be in

a position to consolidate our small debts and issue additional debentures. Your committee find it will be better to defer the consolidation of our debt till the January session, as the Dundas litigation is still undecided and debentures falling due in February, will be more easily met by the Treasurer out of monies levied on the several Corporations. Besides the Auditors will at the close of the year give a full report of our receipts, expenditures and liabilities, useful information for all the members of this board.

The Treasurer found it necessary to use discounts to the full extent of the sum named in the By-law, and by an approximate estimate, will no doubt need further discounts at short dates, till County rates are paid it to the extent of \$4,000. The payments anticipated are for transfer of prisoners, accounts passed by this Committee, Councillors pay list, Criminal Justice audit, Board of Magistrates Audit, Jury List, Convictions, Inspector's salaries, Etc., Etc. We therefore recommend for adoption the By-law herewith to give the necessary power to the Treasurer and Warden to borrow from some person or chartered bank of the Dominion for the purpose above set forth in sum or sums to the extent of four thousand dollars at no longer date than three months, or to the meeting of the January session of the Council. We may also state we have hopes that during the interval of sessions a sale of the Wood Yard may be effected thereby reducing our debt very much.

All of which we respectfully submit for adoption.

Report of Nation River Drainage Committee.

Your Committee beg leave to report that work on the river which began about the 20th of May this year has been proceeded with continuously until the present time. The quantities so far excavated and reported are 17,757 yards. This at 29½ cents amounts to \$5,282.71, which after deducting the 20 per cent according to agreement with contractors leaves \$4,226.22 now paid or to be paid during this week. There have been paid one thousand dollars on account of Grant from Dominion Government since the June session. This with the \$5000.00 authorized by By-law at that time would probably be sufficient with the Grant of three thousand dollars from the Local Government to meet all expenses likely to be incurred this year, but lest that money should not be paid in time to meet demands as they arise your Committee would recommend that the Warden and Treasurer be authorized by By-law to borrow the further sum of two thousand dollars or so much of it as may be required. All of which is respectfully submitted.

Report of Committee re Distribution of Fines Accruing under the Canada Temperance Act.

Present:—Messrs. Harkness, Ault, McKenzie, Fraser, McArthur, Munro, McNaughton, Stewart and Steacy.

Your Committee beg leave to report that they have had submitted for their consideration a detailed statement of account of the receipts and expenditures of the

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License District of Glengarry, which was unavoidably prevented from being submitted before, as explained in an eminently satisfactory manner by the Inspector of said District.

Your Committee would recommend that the full amount of \$853.33, being the estimated expenditure, including previous deficit, up to 1st May, 1888, be paid over by the Treasurer of these United Counties to the license fund of the License District of Glengarry.

Your Committee beg leave to report in reference to the License District of Cornwall, that a large sum of money accruing from fines under the Canada Temperance Act, is being held over by the officials in Cornwall, instead of being paid over to the Treasurer of these United Counties, and in view of the fact that an attempt is being made to divert said money from its proper and legitimate channel, your Committee would recommend that the Warden and Clerk be authorized to lay the matter before the Minister of Justice at Ottawa, and the Provincial Secretary at Toronto, requesting them to take such steps as will instruct the monies to be paid into the proper place, and that the corporate seal be attached to said communications.

Your Committee beg to acknowledge the receipt of Statements of Receipts and Expenditures for License year 1886-7, from Mr. Wm. Pollock, Inspector, showing a Receipt of \$1045, and disbursements to the amount of \$563.76, with a balance of \$564.76, deposited in the Bank of Montreal, to credit of License Fund.

Your Committee beg also to acknowledge an application from Police Magistrate Bow, of Dundas, asking for an appropriation of \$58 to pay expenses of travelling, hall rent, etc. Your Committee beg leave to report that, as it appears that the proper and legitimate way for payment of above amount is from the license fund, they cannot therefore recommend payment of claim.

Your Committee beg leave to acknowledge the receipt of Statement of Receipts and Expenditures from the License District of Stormont, showing forth fines collected from date of appointment of Inspector, to date of Order in Council, 15th Nov., 1886, amounting to \$775; also showing fines collected subsequent to Order in Council of Nov. 15, 1886, amounting to \$790, with disbursements of \$1124.65, which

with \$180 druggist licenses deposited in bank, makes an amount of credit as per Inspector's account of \$1304.65. Your Committee would recommend that said account be forwarded to the proper officials at Toronto, requesting them to tax said account, as it appears that portions of said account should be charged to license fund account, and other portions of which should come under the supervision of this Council.

Your Committee beg leave to report the receipt of statement of monies received by the Treasurer of these United Counties, and disbursements made from same as follows:—

Ross in Lot 38 in the First Concession of the Township of Lancaster; on the East by the line between Lots 37 and 38 in the First Concession of the Township of Lancaster; on the South, by the line between Lots 8, 16, 21 and 32 of the Village of Lancaster and the Glebe lands in the First Concession of the Township of Lancaster and in the First Concession of the Township of Charlottenburg in Lot K and L, by the line between the land of A. G. McBain and the South line of Beech Street of the said Village of Lancaster; and on the West by the east side line of the lands of E. S. McDonald in said Lot K and L in the First Concession of Charlottenburg—being

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less than five hundred acres.
 Be it further enacted that the Mechanics' Hall in the said Village of Lancaster shall be the place for holding the first election and John A. McLean shall be the Returning Officer.
