Riddell, K.C., argued that Moore was guilty of contributory negli-gence. Even if the whistle were not sounded, if was the duty of Moore to exercise all reasonable precautions when crossing the rails. A little girl named Eva Wood, who was crossing the railway, saw the coming train and hence there was no reason why deceas-ed should not have seen it and avoid-ed it.
