WAS MOORE HIS OWN VICTIM? IS RAILWAY CO.'S DEFENCE

Should Have Noticed Train Coming at Level Crossing—Appeal Being Heard.

Was Moore an elderly man, killed by a train at the Bloor crossing, guilty of contributory negligence? This was one of the chief questions argued yesterday afternoon in the divisional court, over which Chief Justice Moss presided.

On the night of Dec. 4, 1903, Moore, who had lived in Perthavenue, traversed the crossing in the direction of west Bloor-street. He was hit by a train and killed. Elizabeth Moore, the widow, brought an action against the railway, but the judge refused to pronounce judgment for either party, on the ground that the answers of the jury to questions submitted were contradictory.

The company appealed because they considered that the jury should have been directed, and that in any case the action should have been dismissed as a new trial ordered. It was also said that the answers of the jury were against the weight of evidence. Moore's counsel brought a cross appeal on the ground that she was entitled to judgment, having regard to the answers of the jury.

On behalf of the company yesterday, W. R. Riddell, K.C., argued that Moore was guilty of contributory negligence. Even if the whistle were not sounded, it was the duty of Moore to exercise all reasonable precautions when crossing the rails. A little girl named Eva Wood, who was crossing the railway, saw the coming train and hence there was no reason why deceased should not have seen it and avoided it.

A. R. Clute, K.C., appearing for the widow, urged that there were reasons for not expecting Moore to see the train. There was no reason for him to expect a train from the north at that hour. It was a foggy and misty night, half rain and half snow was falling. As the man was going west, he was facing the oncoming train, and the conditions were against the deceased observing or hearing the train, and that the answers of the jury were contributory negligence on the part of Moore.

E. G. Wood, who was with A. R. Clute, argued concerning the statement of the girl Wood, at the trial, and the court reserved judgment.

ALL THE POWER SOLD.

Industries Will Use Up the Kaminitiquia Development.

Port Frances, Sept. 26.—(Special).—R. S. McDonald, manager of the Backus-Brooks syndicate, is here from Minneapolis. He states that every unit of horsepower now being developed on both sides of the Kaminitiquia River has been spoken for. It is also asserted that President Elliott of the Northern Pacific Railway, who recently visited Port Frances, has given orders to lay the steel on the grade now completed, which will bring the present terminus of the road thirty miles within Port Frances. It is expected that the road will be completed early in the spring.

The importance of the Kaminitiquia development of 20,000 horsepower is shown when it is known that Minneapolis, with her great milling industries, uses only 27,000 horsepower. One-half of the power to be developed here will be retained on the Canadian side.

The new industries to be located in Port Frances will include the 600-ton pulp mill, large flour mill, saw and door factory, woodwren factory, saw mill, elevators and a score of other factories.

THE TUNNEL BENEATH THE BAY.

Elaborate Preparations are Making.

M. J. Haney & Co. have constructed a \$5000 wharf at Ward's Island to accommodate the \$100,000 worth of machinery which is to be used in the construction of the water tunnel beneath the bay. Machinery repair shops will also be constructed there.

MURDERED IN RAILWAY C.R.

Tunnel Tragedy in England Developed in Mystery.

London, Sept. 26.—The Merstham tunnel of the London and South Eastern Railway, where the brutal murder of Frederick J. Gold, by Percy Letrov, alias Mapleton, occurred June 27, 1881, has again been the scene of a mysterious tragedy, the details of which so far as ascertained are markedly similar to those of a quarter of a century ago.

In the present case the victim is a young woman, Mary Mosey, whose body was horribly mutilated. A long veil was tightly wedged into her mouth, and the police are confident she was murdered in the compartment of a train on which she was traveling and her body thrown from the car.

The fact that all the doors of the train on its arrival at Red Hill were closed is considered to prove conclusively that it was not a case of suicide. Miss Mosey left her home on Sunday evening, saying she would not be gone long.

The affair thereafter is a complete mystery. No ticket was seen, and no one has been able to explain under what circumstances the young woman entered the train, or where she was going. If she was murdered, as is supposed to be the case, the murderer disappeared without leaving any trace.

AUSTRALIA IS JEALOUS.

Canada Gets All the Notices in English Press.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable). London, Sept. 26.—T. A. Coghlan, agent general for New South Wales, in a report why emigrants avoid Australia, which he has presented to his government, says in 1885 twice as many British emigrants went to Australia as to Canada. Last year five persons went to the Dominion for every one to the Commonwealth. New York, Sept. 26.—A Havana dispatch to the Sun says that the Liberal party in Cuba is considering the question of sending a commission to Washington to ask for the re-establishment of the American intervention, or that the United States guarantee fair elections in the island.

Newfoundland Loan.

London, Sept. 26.—Sir Robert Bond, Premier of Newfoundland, has completed arrangements for the issue to-day of a loan of \$2,000,000 to be paid to E. O. Reid for the Newfoundland telegraph lines. The interest will be at 3 1/2 per cent.

Another Oil Gusher.

Leamington, Sept. 26.—The Lake Orion Oil and Gas Company brought in a big gusher in concession 6 of Merrea yesterday, which is flowing at the rate of over 600 barrels per day. This is the second gusher drilled in within the last few days.

Falls 200 Feet.

Quebec, Sept. 26.—Charles Windmager, an employe of the Quebec bridge, fell 200 feet to the ground yesterday and was killed instantly.

Austria's Budget.

Vienna, Sept. 26.—The budget for 1906 was presented by the minister of finance in the lower house of the Austrian diet to-day. It estimates the revenue at \$24,408,482 and the expenditure at \$23,828,442.

"Cranberry King" Dead.

Mount Holly, N.J., Sept. 26.—Capt. Martin Haines, who was known as the "Cranberry King" of New Jersey, died last night at his home in Vincenttown. He was a civil war veteran.

MORE VIEWS ON RECIPROcity.

Hon. Mr. Foster Continues His Article in Standard.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable). London, Sept. 26.—Continuing his article in The Standard Hon. G. E. Foster says reciprocity with the United States would react against the forward step taken in granting an imperial preference in accordance with the overwhelming sentiment of the Canadian people. Moreover reciprocity would change the lines of trade transport to be changed from east and west to north and south. Again a reciprocity treaty was only possible by fixed agreement for a set number of years. This would mean that for a number of years fiscal freedom would be practically prevented, and the dislocation of the agreement after a number of years would mean a large commercial loss to Canada.

After enumerating some of the reasons why a self-developing direction where there is increasing need of necessities and luxuries which will inevitably come from abroad would be various portions of the great empire to which we owe allegiance, and in which integrity and power we find our abiding security. Reciprocity with the United States cuts counter to all this, therefore, we will have none of it.

COLLECTIVE NOTE TO PORTE.

Six Powers Will Resume Control of Macedonian Finances.

Constantinople, Sept. 26.—A collective note from the six powers has been handed to the Porte declaring that their decision to resume international control of the finances of Macedonia is unalterable. There is increasing friction between the British embassy and the owners of British shows attacked by Arab pirates in the Red Sea. The embassy's latest note pointed out that unless the matter was satisfactory, it would be sent to the incident would assume a graver aspect.

Operates on a Duchess.

New York, Sept. 26.—Dr. H. Holbrook Curtis, who yesterday performed an operation on the Duchess of Marlborough, said to-day that the operation was not for throat trouble, as reported, but for a slight deafness which resulted from a fall received by the duchess in her youth.

Fire in Lumber Yard.

Gravenhurst, Sept. 26.—Fire started last night about 9 o'clock in the lumber yard of the Rathbun Company, and assumed large and alarming proportions, burning in all about seven million feet of lumber and two or three dwelling houses. The lumber was in a shed. The origin of the fire is unknown.

Bomb Thrown at Police.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 26.—Chief of Police Ivanoff, three policemen and three women were severely wounded to-day by the explosion of a bomb thrown near the gardens of Kevlornorth Russia. The thrower of the bomb escaped.

Treaty Before Storting.

Christiania, Sept. 26.—Premier Michelsen laid the draft of the treaty providing for the dissolution of the union between Norway and Sweden before the Storting to-day, and it was submitted to a special committee.

MAYOR ASSAULTED.

Attempted to Make Test and Was Resisted by Armed Citizens.

Mantowoc, Wis., Sept. 26.—An attempt of the Manitowoc Waterworks during a test of a river intake pipe precipitated a riot, in which citizens offered armed resistance to the plan. Mayor Stolze, who insisted that the test continue, after he had been informed that it would be necessary to open the river pipe, was assaulted by bystanders and knocked down. Other officials were also assaulted.

The riot is a culmination of a fight that started with the selection of Stolze as mayor on a platform of city ownership of the water plant. The test of the waterworks was directed by the council two weeks ago, and the water company claimed that in order to meet the requirements of a test it would be necessary to open the river pipe, which would flood the entire system with river water and would endanger public health.

DEBTORS AND CREDITORS.

Offer for Defunct Biscuit Firm—Machinery Man Assigns.

There is a United States biscuit concern willing to purchase what is left of the defunct Canada Biscuit Company, and in a few days the estate may be closed up by Assignee Oler Wade. An interim dividend has just been paid to the creditors.

No enough capital to make what is already in the business pay has caused F. A. Nixon, machinery maker, to assign to Oler Wade. Assets and liabilities nearly balance at about \$2000.

The estate of the late J. H. Wade's creditors will meet at Mr. Wade's office, Sept. 28.

E. J. O'Brien Dies Suddenly.

St. Catharines, Sept. 26.—Edward J. O'Brien, K.C., C.E., of this city, one of the best known civil engineers in Canada, died very suddenly at his home this morning after an illness of about one hour, the supposed cause of death being acute indigestion.

Mr. O'Brien was born in Dublin, Ireland, 28 years ago, and came to Canada in 1870. He had been on the engineering staff in the department of railways and canals for the past thirty years, the greater part of which he spent on the Welland Canal at St. Catharines.

Jerome in the Fight.

New York, Sept. 26.—District Attorney Jerome inaugurated his independent campaign for reelection by opening headquarters in the City Hall to-night. A delegation from the P.M.P. Club assured Mr. Jerome of the support of the club, and about 200 signatures to his nomination petition were received during the evening.

Campaign Against Licenses.

At a meeting held on Saturday night, the M.Y.M.A. resolved that they will enter actively into the work of reducing the number of licensed saloons in the City of Toronto, and will actively support the license commissioners in their efforts in that direction. This association has a membership of nearly 200 members.

Fire in St. Kitts.

St. Catharines, Sept. 26.—Fire broke out about 4 o'clock this morning in the basement of the wholesale and retail hardware store of Foy Bros. & Southcott. The firemen's prompt action prevented the fire from getting thru the main floor and thus saved the block, but the immense stock of oils, etc., made a hot fire. The loss will be between \$2000 and \$4000.
