THE IRISH HOME RULE BILL.

GLADSTONE WILL MAKE LARGE FINANCIAL CONCESSIONS.

The Unionists have thousands of amendments and the Parliament will be rushed through the Committee. The Retention Question Will Be Carried.

New York, April 30.—The World's London cable says: The opening of the committee stage of the Home Rule bill has been deferred until a week from Monday instead of next Thursday.

The ministers intend to proceed with the committee work without a break as the only means of retaining the bill in opposition to the bill. In order to do this they must first get a quantity of imperative business disposed of.

The Unionists are flooding the measure with thousands of amendments, the vast majority of which are flimsy and purely obstructive.

The Parliament has also put down a quantity of amendments, some important, others impossible.

The Nationalists have not yet offered any and it is quite likely they may not do so at all.

Still there are two points in the bill which they regard as imperative and demanding alteration and improvement. One is as to the retention of the Irish members under limited conditions. The other financial.

As to the retention question, it is now certain that the proposal will be carried with the assent of the ministers.

As to finance, the ministers themselves will refer to an amendment making a large concession.

Home Rule Protestants.

GEORGE WATTERS' WIDOWS.

A LIFE OF DECEIT ENDS IN A PAUPER'S GRAVE.

A Toronto House Painter Who Became a Big Game and Sportsman, and Died of His Children—Two Years Spent in State Prison for Forgery.

In the early seventies George W. Watters and Hannah Watters, cousins, were married at Toronto. Watters, who was a house painter by trade, was a bright young man, and a bright young woman.

They lived happily for a while, two children being born to them.

After the birth of the second child Watters began to abuse his wife, and one day disappeared from Toronto.

Saturday he was buried in the pauper's lot of the Elson Cemetery at Lowell, Mass., the undertaker and grave diggers being the only witnesses, although he left behind a wife and two children.

Watters was buried as George W. Watters, the name which he was known by in his youth. His life since leaving Toronto had been one of intrigue and deceit.

From Toronto Watters went to Hamilton, Ont., where in 1878 he married Alice Torrey, daughter of Dr. Torrey.

The Toronto Wife Discovers His Porphyry. Watters went to work on the railway, and while coupling cars in the yard one day fell on the track, breaking his leg so badly that it had to be amputated. Dr. Torrey attended him.

In course of time two children had been born him by Alice Torrey. Then Watters got into trouble. He forged the paper of a sewing machine company, was convicted and sentenced to two years in the Missouri State Prison.

While he was in prison his wife Alice returned to her parents and one day a poorly-dressed woman with two children rang the bell.

It was Watters' Canadian wife and family, and from her Dr. Torrey learned the true character of his son-in-law.
