





HERMANS WILL BE EXTRADITED.

What the Alleged Salt Lake City Preache

Caught at Pembroke is Charged With - Another Durrant Case. Salt Lake, Utah, July 15.—Great interest is manfested among the people of this Ont., of the Rev. Francis Hermans, who is wanted here to answer the charge of murdering Henrictta Clausen in May, 1896. Herman's was the spiritual head of the Scandinavian congregation in this city, and disappeared about the time the charred bones of the young woman were found in a furnace in the basement of his church. The authorities sent out a general alarm throughout this country and Europe, and a constant and energetic search has since dering Henrietta Clausen in May, 1896.

a constant and energetic search has since been kept up for the preacher. Several Were Arrested.

Several men were arrested on suspicion in different parts of the United States, but none of them proved to be Hermans. He had disappeared as completely as though he had crawled into the earth. Still the hunt was vigorously prosecuted. Photographs of the missing man were sent broadcast, and it is to this means that he had been parading about the little Canadian town under the name of Hamilton. Crown Attorney Metcalf of Pembroke had received a photograph of him. His attention was drawn to the striking resemblance of the picture to the man who had for several months been living in the neighborhood and acting as a preacher on his own responsibility.

The murder of which Hermans is accused was a most atrocious one. It was not unlike that which startled San Francisco a few months previously, and for which Theodor: Lurrant is soon to be executed. Both murders were committed in churches, and the victims in the two cases were girls, young, innocent and trusting. Durrant had two to his credit. Hermans is accused of killing one, and is suspected of having butchered another. Miss Clausen was the name of his alleged victim. She was a member of his flock. So was Miss Annie Samuelson, and her mysterious disappearance simultaneously with that of Miss Clausen led the police to believe that she, too, had fallen a victim of the preacher's knife. Hermans, it is claimed, used his office to allure and decoy the innocent young women of his parish and destroy them. He would employ a girl as a domestic in his household. He would win her confidence by cunningly assuming interest in her salvation. Next he would have her make a profession of faith. Then, say the Salït-Lake police, would quickly follow her compromise, ruin and death.

Miss Clausen was first a servant in his household. Hermans, it is said, caused her death and carred the body into small pieces and placed them in a small furnace in the basement of his church and under a hot fire cremated them. The door of the grate was so small that it is believed he had to dissect the head before he could force it through. Hermans' Alleged Crime.

His accounts were found to be in a muddled state, and the trustees of the church ordered an investigation. Finally two newspaper reporters, while prowling about the basement of the church, discovered the charred bones of the woman in the furnace. A knife and razor were also found in a heap of asbes. 
