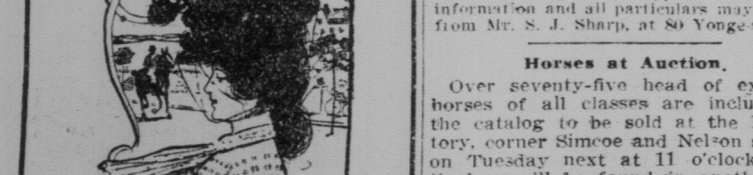

SIR WM. VAN HORNE IS MENTIONED

As possible Chairman of Committee, Which Will Consist of Three or Five Members.

Montreal, March 13.—(Special)—Sir William Van Horne may be chairman of the transportation commission which will be appointed within a very few days by the powers that be at Ottawa. Hon. Raymond Prefontaine, who was here today, would like to see the commission would be composed of either three or five members, and when asked if the commissioners would elect their own chairman, the minister replied that the nomination of chairman, as well as that of all his colleagues, would come from the government.

It was a policy, moreover, learned in a long period of opposition. Men like Blake, Cartwright and Mills knew that it was not only sound in principle but effective. Parliamentary investigations and discussions have been the most effective means, we may say the only effective means, of exposing maladministration and crimes against parliament and the people.

This policy was continued long after the House Committee ceased to try election petitions. The two things were sharply distinguished by the Liberal leaders and authorities on parliamentary procedure. But it cannot even be said that the trial of election petitions by judges has been such an improvement on the old practice. The law-off has almost entirely destroyed the usefulness of election trials.

ACCUSED NAMES THE TERMS. It is not good hypocrisy for Hon. G. W. Ross to contend that he favors a judicial commission for any or other reason than its assumed advantage to the party in power? Mr. Ross pathetically appeals to the leader of the opposition to facilitate the inquiry into the Gagey charges. The leader of the opposition responds. He proposes a committee of the legislature, and thereupon Hon. G. W. Ross clings to his judicial commission plan with more tenacity than ever.

Mr. Ross would like the people to believe that he is placing the investigation far above party lines. He wishes the province to understand that he is anxious to expose scandal in his government as any member of the opposition. If Mr. Ross is sincere in these professions, why does he accept full responsibility for the form of the investigation. The Gagey charges are above all party considerations, and if Premier Ross really desired an impartial inquiry, the findings of which men of all political shades would be compelled to honor, he would have accepted the co-operation of opposition leaders in defining the character of the enquiry. The Gagey charges might well have been made the subject for a joint conference in which members of the opposition would have a voice. The scheme of investigation thus agreed upon would command the respect of the province, and its conclusions would not bear the aspect of party or any other kind of bias.

Mr. Ross is fearful that the findings of a committee of the House might not be duly honored by the people. This anxiety he could have spared himself by consulting the accuser in the matter of appointments, instead of investing sole responsibility in the accused. All the gossamer generalities indulged in by Hon. G. W. Ross will not conceal the form of investigation he has determined upon to the people. Findings which involve Hon. J. R. Stratton would necessarily involve the Ross government. The Ross government is therefore upon trial as well as Mr. Stratton. In this position Mr. Ross has the advantage of the smaller detail of the investigation. Premier Ross has acted the part of dictator, and in this role he cannot hope to impress the people with his desire to give the fullest and fairest freedom to the enquiry.

STEVES VERSUS UTILITY. We freely admit the overpowering respectability of judicial commissions. They have only one fault; that they seldom or never discover anything. We freely admit the partnership, the heat, the noise, the unpleasantness of parliamentary committees. Their only merit is that they do discover things.

And this time the situation is such that the Ross government cannot be saved by a favoring breeze from the Three Norths.

If the Ross government falls to survive the Gagey episode Hon. E. J. Davis will meet his fate widely shrieking for peace.

Recognizing the achievement of R. R. Gagey, M.L.A., Mr. J. P. Whitney will probably promote the Island of Manitoulin to the rank of Archipelago.

Hon. J. Israel Tarte states that he will have something to say this evening. Such a surprising announcement should be communicated in homoeopathic doses.

How The Hamilton Times will give the investigation into the Gagey charges should blow the feathers of one of its beloved angels in the Ross government.

Guelph, March 11. HEROES OF LAKE ONTARIO. Battle 15 Hours With Winter Waves and Effect Daring Rescue. Washington, March 13.—On the requisition of Superintendent Kimball of the United States Life Saving Service, the Secretary of the Treasury has forwarded a gold life-saving medal to the keeper of the life-saving station at Charlotte, N.Y., for "extreme and heroic daring in saving life from the sea." Government Official, Law in His Duty, Seeks to End His Life.

Manila, March 13.—Batlett Sinclair, treasurer of Rizal Province, attempted to commit suicide to-day by taking poison in the office of the Attorney-General, when informed that the government intended to prosecute him for neglecting his office and permitting the peculation of funds. THE CHAIR AT THE CITY HALL

Works Committee Once More Recommends That the Ulster-Str. Extension Be Made.

ARGUMENT OVER JOHN-ST. CROSSING

An Effort Will Be Made to Persuade Metropolitan Railway Co. to Change Terminus.

There was considerable activity around the City Hall yesterday, two committees and the Board of Control being in session in the afternoon. The chief feature was the discussion of John-street crossing before the board, and it is not settled yet. The Works Committee again recommended that the Ulster-street extension be proceeded with, and steps will be taken to persuade the Metropolitan Railway Co. to move their present terminus from Yonge-street. The board of Control also tackled the draft estimates, and made some important cuts.

The Works Committee decided to recommend to Council that negotiations be made with the Metropolitan Railway Co. for the removal of the southern terminus of the road from the present place on Yonge-street. Aid. Richardson intimated that if the company refused there was likelihood of private prosecution against them for maintaining a nuisance.

The Bell Telephone Co. has erected some poles on Woodbine-avenue, and the City Engineer was asked to report what right they had to do so. The Fire and Light Commission held a brief session yesterday afternoon and nothing beyond recommending that a number of buildings be erected inside the fire limits.

The Board of Control in continuing their labors at the draft estimates chopped off \$3000 of an item of \$81,000 for administration of justice. There was an item of \$100,000 for the claims commission, and this was reduced to \$50,000 and \$6000 was added for consolidating the city records. The printing item of \$5500 was reduced to \$5000, and \$6000 was taken off the \$1800 item for civil legislation. Some other minor cuts were made.

The application of the G. T. R. for permission to lay a track across Front-street and seven tracks across John-street, the Front-street line branching into seven lines before crossing John-street, was presented. The Grand Trunk was represented by W. W. Pope of Belleville and Superintendent Jones, Barrister McMurichy and Manager Walker were in attendance to watch the interests of the Dominion Transport Co.

I personally think the Grand Trunk should have acquired more property on the northwest corner of John and Front streets, and that they would have more space west of John-street for track room, so that all unnecessary switching could be done before John-street was crossed, said the Mayor, who felt that, according to the present plans, John-street would be blocked by switching most of the time.

This view was corrected by Superintendent Jones, who said that it was the intention of the company to do all the switching at Bathurst-street yards and run the trains direct into the new yards, which will be on the site of the old Parliament Buildings.

Barrister McMurichy made some objections. He said that the company should represent the Dominion Transport Co., he said, but Mr. Pope suggested that really meant the C. P. R. This was denied by Mr. McMurichy, who said the Dominion Transport Co. was an entirely independent concern and its stock was held by widows and orphaned children. The company simply had a carriage contract with the C. P. R. and that was all. He opposed the proposal to block John-street unless the C. P. R. would pay for the deviation of John-street to Front-street in a south-westerly direction parallel to and north of the proposed G. T. R. switch. He felt sure that such a deviation could be ordered by the Railway Committee.

Controller Oliver doubted that the Dominion Transport Company have a stable on John-street, and claim that the crossing would mean much inconvenience to them. W. B. Rogers, who owns a house in the vicinity of the proposed crossing, said it would greatly depreciate the value of the property.

Ald. Richardson moved that the matter be reported upon in detail by the City Engineer and Assessment Commissioner, and the motion carried.

There was an interesting session of the Works Committee yesterday afternoon, and the committee room was crowded with members of two deputations, one in favor of the Ulster-street extension, from Major-street to Robert-street, and the other against it.

School Trustee Levee urged that the extension go thru, and said it would be a great convenience to school children and to the people of the neighborhood, particularly in regard to street car facilities. P. Cronyn said the extension would depreciate the value of Ulster-street property, thru the addition of another street between it and College-street.

J. B. Allen on behalf of Wilkocostreet residents, opposed the extension. Dr. Miller thought the extension would be a great advantage, and it would enable the people to use the belt line cars, which are much more comfortable than the cars running on College-street. He not only thought Ulster-street should be extended, but there should be another street between it and College-street.

Superintendent Bishop said at least 200 children had to travel three-eighths of a mile out of their way because there was no cross street.

Several other gentlemen addressed the committee, and it was eventually decided to re-recommend to Council that the extension be made.

INGEST ADJOURNED.

The Inquest on the body of Josephine Morrow, the 3-year-old child who was killed by a trolley car on Thursday afternoon at the corner of Queen and George-streets was opened yesterday afternoon and stands adjourned until the 26th.

UNCLE SAM'S NAVY

May Be Called on to Defend U. S. Subjects in Honduras.

The order is the outcome of a despatch received today at the State Department from Wm. C. Will, U. S. A request also came for similar protection from the U. S. Vice-Consul at Puerto Cortes.

Don't Want to Be Soldiers.

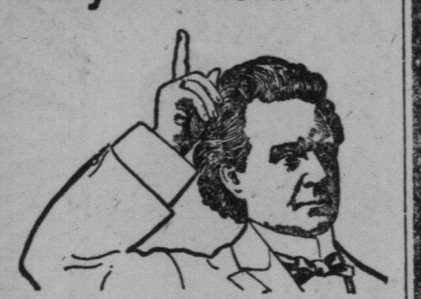

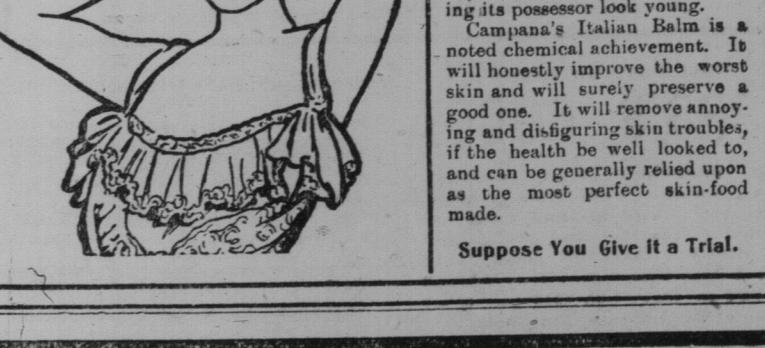

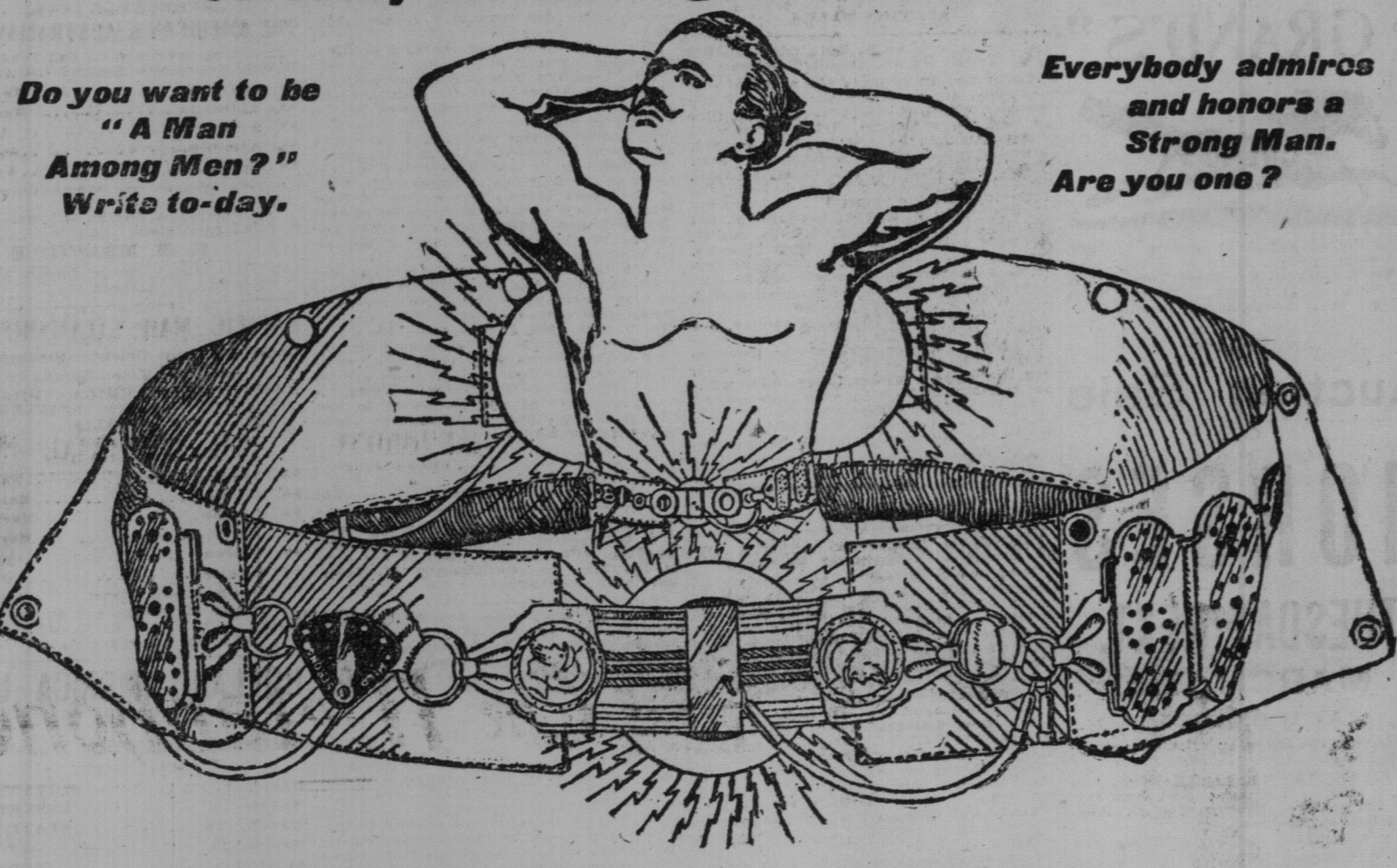

Fenced a Disturbance

H. D. Lundy was the first witness and stated that upon the request of Mr. Munns he had consented to act as a witness at the meeting advertising his candidacy. He asked for a good hearing for the speaker and thought the speaker was a distinct improvement on the night previous. He tried to keep good order.

Munns' Sad Story

William Munns gave a résumé of his activities in the North York campaign, which was the form of a speech and was in the nature of a plea for sympathy. He said that he had been a member of the Sons of Temperance, had been invited to give a lecture on the platform and had been arrested and taken to the police station.
