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## REPORT OF THE SESSION.

In presenting the Annual Report to the congregation, the Session are glad to be able to say as on former occasions, "The Lord hath done great things for us whereof we are glad." Our membership at the close of 1883, numbered 391, and during the past year, 76 new members have been added, 29 by confession of faith and 47 by certificate. There have been removed from the roll during the year, in all, 48 members, 5 by death, 25 certified to other churches, 6 who left without certificates, and 12 who have been placed on a retired list. The Session agreed to keep a retired list for those who might be only temporarily absent, and who were entitled to certificates if they should apply for them, so that the roll would represent the actual strength of the congregation. The net gain during the year is 28 members, so that the roll numbered at the end of the year, 419. Since the beginning of the present pastorate in July, 1880, 452 members have been added to the church, or an average of 100 members every year, and the Session believe that with the blessing of God and the hearty co-operation of the people this average ought to be maintained.

During the year we have lost one of our Elders, Mr. James Russell, by his removal to Winnipeg. He carried with him the esteem of his brethren in the Session, and we believe of the whole church; and we are glad to know that he is doing good service in the church he has joined in Winnipeg. Others who have left us through removal from the city or to suburbs too far away to admit of their attending our church, we follow with our prayers and good wishes. The sacrament of the Lord's Supper was observed seven times during the year, and was attended by a large proportion of the membership on each occasion. The December communion was a specially happy season, and was attended by the largest number of communicants ever present at the Lord's Table since the organization of the church.

The Session are pleased to report the continued efficiency of the Bible classes and the Sabbath school, and would earnestly urge parents to show their loyalty by sending their children to the school connected with their own church. The prayer meetings on Wednesday and Saturday evenings are not as largely attended as they ought to be, and the Session would affectionately urge upon the members to consider seriously their duty and privilege with regard to these meetings.

## SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT FOR 1884.

Your Sabbath School Teachers beg to submit herewith their 10th Annual Report, which, though evincing a less marked degree of progress than in former years, is, when considered in connection with the circumstances mentioned hereafter, encouraging to the teachers. The average attendance for 1884 has been 173, and the number of scholars on the roll, 201, a decrease of 15 and 42 respectively, as compared with the previous year. This falling off is accounted for partly through the removal from the city of several large families, the younger members of which were regular attenders at the school, and partly because of the transfer of about 25 scholars from the school to the Bible class. Against these depopulating influences, there has been only a very slight admission of children into the school, and as an obvious result, the attendance has considerably diminished.

The teachers feel, however, and the force of the assertion cannot but be manifest, that if the heads of families in the congregation would only send their children to the school connected with their own church, it would not now be incumbent upon the teachers to make a report of this nature. The teachers desire to impress upon parents the advisability of seriously considering this important matter, and as the present affords a very opportune time for having the names of children enrolled upon the books of the school, inasmuch as several of the classes are now being rearranged, the teachers will be pleased to welcome all new comers at the earliest day practicable. The grading system which has been in force for several years did not after a fair trial meet with the approval of the teachers, and has, therefore, been discontinued. Notwithstanding the fact that the attendance has been smaller, it is gratifying to be able to announce that the amount collected for the mission schemes, namely, \$100.90, is slightly in excess of last year's contributions, and that besides this, the scholars have paid \$50 towards a new organ, which is now the unencumbered property of the school, and \$37 for books for the library. During the year the school has received from the church the sum of \$71.37, being proceeds of three collections, for which the teachers desire to express their hearty thanks.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE YOUNG MEN'S BIBLE  
CLASSES FOR 1884.

In presenting the Annual Report of the Young Men's Bible Classes in connection with the church, we have pleasure in referring to the marked interest which has been shown by those attending the class during the past year, under the pastor's teaching; and whilst the material prosperity of the class has hardly been equal to that of previous years, nor the number attending as large as what it should be, considering the number of young men in connection with the church, there is reason to hope that during the coming year a decided improvement will take place. The number of names on the roll at the end of the year was 48, and the average attendance for the last quarter, 31.

During the year it was thought advisable to purchase an organ, which was accordingly done, and has greatly improved the service of praise in the classes.

In the month of July, the Pastor desired to be relieved from teaching for two months. The class was therefore divided into two divisions. Mr. Ross taking charge of the older members, and Mr. Anderson the younger members, the latter having been recently promoted from the Sunday school. Mr. Anderson's class meets in the vestry and has given him every encouragement since its organization. It began with a membership of six in July, and has now a membership of 13, who are very regular in their attendance.

The Pastor resumed charge of the senior class in September, since which time the attendance has been fairly satisfactory.

On the last Sabbath of the year, Mr. McLeod, much to the regret of the members of the class, signified his intention of resigning charge of it, finding the labour of conducting three services two much for one day. At his suggestion, the class decided to ask Mr. J. K. Macdonald, a gentleman well-known in connection with church work, to take charge.

Trusting, therefore, in the Great Head of the Church, we look for a continuance of the interest which has been manifested in the past, and hope that every member of the class will make an effort to bring young men to it who are not members already. It is also hoped that each member will assist Mr. Macdonald in every possible way, so that he shall be enabled to carry out the great end in view, to make the class what it is intended, and ought to be the future strength of the Church.

In presenting to you the Annual Report of the Young Ladies' Bible Class, the Secretary has much pleasure in congratulating both Mrs. Harvie and the Class on the large increase to its membership during the past year, and also on the many other signs that God's blessings is with it.

The number of names on the roll is 165, being an increase over the previous year of 46.

The average attendance for the year was 84, the largest number present at any one time, being 113.

The teaching that has been received from Mrs. Harvie has, through God's blessing, proved very beneficial to the members, a large number having made an open profession of their faith in Christ. God has been pleased during the year to take one of our number, Miss Mary McMoran to Himself. She died after a long and painful illness, firmly trusting in the blood of Christ.

The tract distributors have done good service in visiting the poor and needy who seem to take great pleasure in these visits, and in the tracts left with them. The Class has contributed, also to many of the charities and missions, both at home and abroad. We are sure that God will bless us in our efforts to spread the Gospel and to help those around us, for "God loveth a cheerful giver."

We feel that we are specially blessed in having Mrs. Harvie as our teacher, who ever takes the deepest interest in each member. We earnestly pray that she may long be spared to us.

We would thank God for His great goodness to us, and pray that He may continue to bless us in the future as He has in the past.

REPORT OF THE WILLIAM STREET MISSION.

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st DECEMBER, 1884.

The Teachers and Workers in the Mission have pleasure in presenting their Fourth Annual Report. We have to acknowledge with thankfulness, God's goodness to us, and also to the dear children committed to our care. So far as known to us, there has been comparatively little sickness among the children and no deaths.

We are thankful to be able to report that considerable progress has been made by the children in the knowledge of the Scriptures which is able to make them wise unto salvation. The teachers have endeavoured faithfully to sow the good seed of the Word in their young hearts, and laboured earnestly for their conversion to Jesus, and we are not without evidence that our labours have been blessed.

At the close of the year the number of scholars on the roll was 105, with an average attendance of 70, and 12 teachers, superintendent and secretary. As will be seen by the treasurer's report the Sabbath school has contributed \$38 88 towards the support of the mission, and the collections at the Sabbath evening service amounted to \$38.72, in all \$77.60, nearly an average of \$1 50 per

Sunday, which we think shows the interest old and young are taking in our mission work.

The teachers having felt the necessity of providing a library for the purpose of supplying the children with good reading, agreed that this want should be supplied, also that an Organ should be procured to aid in conducting the singing.

In order to provide funds for these objects, a series of entertainments were held during the year, the proceeds of which, with several donations from friends, amounted to \$79.30; this sum was expended in the purchase of a Library and Organ, both of which add greatly to the efficiency of the Sunday school and all the services of the mission.

The Sabbath evening service and the Thursday evening prayer meeting conducted by Mr. Goforth, have been well attended, and we have evidence that his labours have been greatly blessed to not a few. From the close of Knox college in April to the end of the year, Mr. Goforth made no less than 720 visits to the homes of the people in St. John's and St. Patrick's wards; in this way he had many opportunities of personal dealing with old and young about their eternal well being and a good many have been induced to attend the services at the Mission Hall from week to week. Several persons have given evidence of having been awakened through the faithful preaching of the Word, and desire earnestly to become Christians and to lead better lives.

We regret very much that, through the lack of funds, we are to be deprived of Mr. Goforth's valuable services, at least so far as remuneration is concerned, although he has kindly offered to give what time he can up to the closing of the college. We are thankful for his help and would here earnestly express the hope that, even yet the way may be opened up for continuing his services for next summer.

Some three months ago a Juvenile Band of Hope was formed in connection with the Mission, under the superintendence of Mr. Nicoll and a staff of helpers, this Band will be self-supporting and is likely to do a good work among the young people by training them up in temperance principles.

In conclusion we would say, that we appreciate very highly the valuable help rendered to us in our Mission work by the Central Church during the last four years, and wish to say that from this date we have resolved by God's help and blessing on our efforts, to assume all the responsibility of carrying on the Mission, and we earnestly ask for your sympathies and prayers, for a rich blessing on all our efforts.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE LADIES' AID SOCIETY.

This annual report of 1884, the fourth of our Society's history we have now to present to you, meagre though its record of service may be

Most of our work is of such a kind as to be chiefly interesting only to those who are engaged in it, but yielding a pleasure in the consciousness of quiet influence for good among those more immediately benefited, while we are participants in the joy that is found in giving rather than receiving.

We have had nineteen meetings during the year, most of which have been fairly attended and under the direction of the same officers as last year; our worthy President rarely, if ever, absent. Our attention has been given for the most part to the poor of the congregation and that field of much interest and marked progress, our William Street Mission.

During the year the chief financial effort has been that of raising a portion of the floating debt. The congregation has been divided into twenty districts, and twenty ladies have collected each

month. It will be for the consideration of the managers of the congregation whether it is advisable to continue the effort another year.

As for visitation in the several districts attention has been given to it by several of the ladies, and frequent visits have been made to the Mothers' Meeting in William Street.

The assistance of the ladies of our Society was given at the Social in May, and the managers have been pleased to acknowledge it by letter.

For the material on which our work has been expended thanks are again due to our warm friend, Mr. Spence, and to others who, with him, have always borne the burden of our anxieties in this matter.

In the light of the earnest practical addresses which Mr. Moody has given to the Christian workers of Toronto, and more than that, the love of Him who gave Himself that we might be rich, we have humbly to confess our great weakness, but trust all to Him who has said, "He that is not against us is on our side."

May He by His spirit's power enable us to yield Him a more full-hearted service to His glory and praise.

## REPORT OF MOTHERS' MEETING.

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The ladies interested in this branch of the mission work of our Church, feel that they have reason to thank God and take courage.

The first six months of the year the average attendance was seventeen; and the interest manifested in the meetings was very marked; Friday afternoons were evidently regarded as the very brightest part of the week. So far as we could judge, all entered most heartily into the devotional exercises, enjoyed Miss Cobban's readings, and fully appreciated the half hour devoted to refreshments and conversation.

A large quantity of yarn, cotton, sheeting, etc., was supplied by Mrs. Stephens, at wholesale prices, thus bringing many needed articles of personal and household use within reach of all.

During the months of July and August, the afternoon meetings were discontinued on account of the heat, and a short meeting was held on Monday evenings, to give opportunity to subscribers to the coal fund to make their deposits. These meetings were not largely attended, but early in September the afternoon meetings were resumed, with about the same number in attendance as in the early part of the year, and with an equal amount of interest.

Two who attended regularly during the winter fell into their old evil habits with the return of Spring, and we have lost sight of them, but for the most part, we have reason to hope that permanent good has been effected.

We would beg to suggest a continuance of visitors, from the Ladies' Aid, these visits have been a source of encouragement to the workers and pleasure to all. Two or three visits have been received from members of the Womans' Christian Temperance Union, and we believe arrangements have been made to devote one afternoon of each month to the subject of temperance.

Miss Ross has succeeded Mrs. McFarlane as Treasurer; Mrs. Stephens continues to discharge the duties of President with indefatigable zeal.

We cannot close without a word of thanks to Miss Mather for kindly enlivening our meetings with music, and also to Mrs. Mann, whose attention to the neatness and warmth of the room, contributed so much to the comfort of the meetings.

SECRETARY'S REPORT OF YOUNG WOMENS' MUTUAL HELP ASSOCIATION FOR 1884.

We have great pleasure in presenting this our second Annual Report. We feel when we review the past year and mark the progress, both socially and spiritually, which has resulted that we have great cause for thankfulness to God and much to encourage us to continue our pleasant and profitable gatherings.

Our meetings are held on the first Thursday of every month, varied by a social every quarter, and all are very well attended. Indeed, we may say that nearly, if not all, the young ladies, without homes in the city belonging to the congregation, have joined the Society.

There are upon the roll fifty-five names, with an average attendance of thirty-one. Twelve have left the city, most of whom are in communication by letter with either the President or some member of the Association.

During the year two of our number, who, from a protracted illness, were obliged to go to the Hospital for a time, were frequently visited, and were not a little cheered and gladdened to have the monotony broken by a little bright conversation, or led to forget their pain by listening to an hour's reading.

Our aim is to make the Church a home, and to bring the members in sympathy with the Church; work to establish such friendly feeling as ought to exist among those attending the same Church, and to be the means of practical benefit to any who might become sick, or be in need of a situation.

A number have made the Church their "home" by entering into communion with her, and seeking to labor for the Master by tract distribution, or by such other work as lay in their power.

At the organization of the Society, one of the rules was, to have no fees. The prolonged illness, however, of one of the members suggested the thought of a fund for any who might need a helping hand, either in sickness or convalescence, or for any other emergency, and after being discussed at one or more of the meetings, it was decided upon in October, when a fund was opened for any who wished to contribute. Miss French was elected Treasurer.

We wish to express our heartfelt thanks to all the friends who have so generously aided us in our socials and entertainments, and to ask Mrs. Harvie to accept our deep gratitude for her valuable advice and personal sympathy.

We would here cordially invite any young ladies in the congregation who have not yet joined, to come with us "and we will do thee good."

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### REPORT OF THE C. C. AUXILIARY OF THE W. F. M. S., 1884.

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In giving this, the third annual Report of our Society, we have much pleasure in stating that the interest in Foreign Missions has steadily increased amongst us year by year. The number of members on the roll is seventy-five, of these twenty-four are also members of the General Society, and four are life-members, this being an increase of nine General Society members since last year, and one new life-member, Mrs. McEwen.

There have been ten meetings held, and the average attendance has been fifteen.

In reviewing these monthly meetings we have reason to feel thankful and encouraged, as a greater number of members have taken an active part in making them more interesting than formerly.

We have the privilege of having in our Society, ladies who willingly take the toil and trouble of going to many of our towns and villages to form new auxiliaries, and they always give us an interesting and detailed account of how they have been received, and what new societies they were the means of forming, so that in this pleasant way we become well acquainted with the progress of the W. F. M. S. in Ontario.

In the monthly letters received from our lady missionaries in Indore, Mhow and Formosa, we are told of many little girls in the Mission Schools who have learned to love the name of Jesus, of successful Zenana visiting, and of Mother's Meetings where the native women join earnestly in singing the Gospel hymns. We also receive letters from Trinidad telling us of the conversion of the Coolies, and of the schools in which the children are being carefully taught and trained and told all about Jesus. We also have encouraging letters from our own N. W. T., where our Missionaries are laboring so faithfully among the Indians.

Our last meeting was a thank-offering service ; it was very interesting, the verses were so well selected and the gifts numerous, in sums ranging from five cents to two dollars.

Two pleasant evening meetings were held, our pastor presiding, when interesting and instructive addresses on Missions were given by the Rev. Prof. McLaren, Rev. Prof. Gregg, Rev. Mr. Burns, and Rev. Mr. McLaren. Several hymns were beautifully sung by Miss Gunther and several of the young ladies in the congregation.

On the evening of May 22nd, Dr. Cochrane very kindly delivered for our benefit his descriptive and interesting lecture on "Life in Japan."

In the statistics recently published, owing to the travelling expenses and outfit of our two new lady missionaries, Miss Beatty, M. D., and Miss Bell, and the opening out of new fields of labor in India, \$9,000 will be required next year to cover expenses. Will not every lady in the congregation be persuaded to join with us and aid by her prayers, and by her gifts, the efforts of our devoted missionaries who have so gladly obeyed the Master's command, "Go ye, therefore, and make disciples of all the nations, baptising them into the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost."

## MANAGERS' REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st DECEMBER, 1884.

*To the Members and Adherents of the Central Presbyterian Church:*

The Managers beg to submit the following as their report for the year.

At the close of the year ending the 31st December, 1883, there were 163 contributors by envelope, subscribing weekly an average of \$93.25. At the close of the past year there were 164 contributors by envelope, subscribing a weekly average of \$89.35.

The average weekly collections by envelope and loose contributions for the years 1883 and 1884 were as follows:

The total average per week from envelopes and loose contributions for the year 1883 was \$110.78. The total average per week from the same source for the past year was \$107.20.

You will remember that at the end of the year 1883 there was a surplus of \$4.88. At the end of the year 1884 there was a deficit of \$489.41, which has been reduced to \$178.91, by means of special contributions amounting to \$310.50, the result of an appeal on the part of the Managers towards the close of the year to members of the congregation.

At the close of 1883 the floating debt of the congregation was \$3,149.01. At the close of 1884 this debt is \$2,150, the same having been reduced to the extent of \$999.01 by special contributions to the fund, generally known as the Floating Debt Fund.

The thanks of the Managers are specially due to the ladies of the congregation connected with the "Ladies' Aid Society,"

The following Managers retire by rotation, and are eligible for re-election :—Messrs. Barr, Christie, Crawford, Donald, King, Paton, Petry, and Watson.

In connection with this Report the Managers beg to submit the Treasurer's Financial Statement for the year, together with a statement giving particulars with regard to the Floating Debt Account, both of which statements will be found appended hereto.

The figures given herein show that a revenue of \$5,478.20, or \$105.35 weekly may be anticipated for ordinary purposes during the current year of 1885, and the expenditure for the same period may be estimated at \$5,950 (or \$6,128, including the payment of the deficit now carried over), equal to \$118 weekly, and representing a deficiency of \$650, or \$12.50 weekly to be provided for.

The Managers would earnestly press upon the attention of the congregation the desirability of increasing the ordinary revenue during the present year, so that it may equal, if not exceed, the required expenditure, and thereby enable their successors to report a year hence that there is a balance remaining in the hands of the Treasurer.

The Managers would also urge the congregation to renew during the present year their efforts to reduce still further the Floating Debt, which has for many years been a source of considerable anxiety to the Office-Bearers of the Church, but which is now little more than one-third of the amount owing three years ago.
