
Three indictments charging violations of the Mann White Slave Law, con-piracy to violate the United States cus-toms laws and smuggling have been re-turned against Captain Max Thierichens, who was commander of the German sea raider Prinz Eitel Fredrich, long interned at the Philadelphia navy yards.
Captain Thierichens is at present a prisoner of war, interned with the crew of his vessel at Fort Oglithorpe, Georgia. The indictments were the first government action taken against him as a consequence of the smuggling plot dis-covered by federal authorities some





Warm Debate in Toronto Methodist Conference on Importing Britishers

"Is Ministry a Union?"-Motion is Carried Asking Inquiry Into Fitness of Training of Clergy

(Toronto Star)

By an almost unanimous vote, To-ronto Methodist conference declared today for an inquiry into the training of Canadian Methodist preachers. This action was taken as the direct result of the action of the ministerial section voting by 104 to 30 to admit a British minister, Rev. Trevor Davies, to conference so that he could take the Metropolitan pulpit.

It was the warmest debate of the conference so far, and Rev. W. E. Wilson of King street east church, who started it. used some strong language that provoked much applause.

"When they can't find a man in Can-

"When they can't find a man in Canada fit for some of their pulpits there is something wrong," declared Rev. Mr. Wilson. "They got a chairman for the munitions board in Canada, and in the Methodist church. They got a minister of militia in Canada, and in the Methodist church. If Canadian ministers are not good enough for Canadian pulpits there is something wrong with our training. If you want pulpit orators, go overseas for them, but if you want men to shepherd your flocks, give us a chance. to shepherd your flocks, give us a chance. For God's sake don't ask me to spend iny life in the ministry and then tell me that I'm not fit for my job. There are big churches that take young men and lay down a policy for them. They have the money and they let the minister know it. It's not fair. I won't bow down to any golden calf any church may set up. If we are not being trained right, then for God's sake train us as we should be trained."

methods of obtaining and training men for the ministry would seem to be in-adequate, as is evident by the fact that everal times during recent years promnent churches have secured ministers from the old land; therefore, be it re-solved that we memorialize the general conference to appoint a commission to inquire into our course of study for pro-butioners, our colleges and everything connected with ministerial training, and

Audit Reveals Real State Of Provincial Finances

Report of Price, Waterhouse & Company Shows That Former Government, While Claiming Surpluses, Was Plunging Province Into Debt

That the Murray-Baxter government, while claiming surpluses, was steadily plunging the province into debt and attempting to conceal the fact from the people of New Brunswick is established strikingly by the report of Price, Waterhouse & Co. to Premier Foster, tabled in the legislature on Thursday evening. While the late government claimed a surplus at October 31, 1916, the fact is

that there was an accumulated deficit at that time of \$706,833. The various devices and practices to which the old government resorted are exposed in the report, which also makes valuable suggestions as to alterations in the method of accounting and bookkeeping, which changes would enable the public to know the real revenue and expenditure of the province when the provincial accounts appear annually. The report finally clears up the disputed questions as to the public debt, the interest charges, and liabilities, direct and indirect, and so gives the Foster administration a clearance and a new point of departure, The report refers to many expenditures which will doubtless be the subject
