## Statement of the Kirk Session.

*Brethren :—*

The various organizations of the congregation have gone forward vigorously, and the realization thus far of the promises made toward the Century Fund shows that the large things planned were not the result of a spasmodic interest. The spirit of brotherly love shown towards different communities in their suffering, the Indian famine sufferers in particular, is proof of the prevalence of a true Christian spirit in our midst.

We regret that we are not able to record proportionate progress in our Sabbath School work, and we would bespeak for our faithful and able workers there a far deeper interest on the part of the congregation. This, we believe, will do much to stimulate interest and to make this most important work more fruitful.

We are glad that, although we have suffered the loss of a larger number of members this year than ever before in a single year, our membership still shows a slight increase, one hundred and fifteen having come into full communion with the Church, of whom eighteen were from the Sabbath School, during the year.

Death has been busier than usual in our midst, and many loved ones have been removed. We express our sympathy with all who have known sorrow.

By the kindness of the late W. A. Gunn, Esq., ten shares in the \_\_\_\_\_ have been bequeathed to the Session of St. Andrew's Church, and this amount has been made the nucleus of a Session Fund.

Among the special services of the year to which we would refer, was that held for the designation of Miss Carrie A. Gunn, for work among the Chinese in British Columbia. It is cause for thanksgiving that another of our members has given herself to this great work, and we confidently hope that her example may be an inspiration to all of us to an ever-increasing interest in the work of the world's evangelization.

We enter upon the new century with confidence in God, inspired by His goodness in the past; for all of us the time for toil is growing briefer. Let us, therefore, work while it is day.

## Report of the Managers.

*To the Members and Adherents of St. Andrew's  
Presbyterian Church, London :*

The Managers beg to submit to the congregation their Fiftieth Annual Report, together with the Treasurer's Statement duly audited.

The total revenue received during the year from all sources was \$8,336.59.

The ordinary revenue shows an increase over that of 1899, as follows :

If all the circumstances for the year are taken into account, the showing is a good one. The opening of St. James Church, in the northern part of the city, the collection of the Century Fund and the India Famine Fund no doubt affected the revenue, and though there is increase of revenue, yet there is a

deficit for the year. The renovation of the Church entailed many extra expenses, which, at the first of the year, the Managers thought they could pay out of the ordinary revenue, in place of charging them to the Building Fund, to which they really belong. The furnace in the Manse had to be replaced, and alterations and repairs made to those in the basement of the Church. The board walks on Waterloo Street and to the Manse were replaced by cement ones, and the renovation of the basement of the Church was completed. The improvements are permanent, and will not have to be repeated for some years. Other extraordinary expenses lapse, and the Managers feel sure the deficit can be paid before the end of the year.

It is with the deepest regret that the Managers report the death, in August last, of Mr. Andrew Crawford, who for over thirty years was the faithful and efficient officer of the church. He was always of a kind and retiring disposition, cheerful, obliging and always ready to perform his duties. Mr. R. R. Nelson has been appointed church officer in his place.

The annual grant made by the congregation to St. George's Church, London Junction, some three years ago, has expired. That church has done wonderfully well, and the Pastor, Rev. G. Gilmore, deserves great credit for its financial position, but the congregation is not yet self-sustaining, and the Managers would recommend a grant of \$300 for the year 1901.

The Managers, recognizing the value of the services of Dr. Johnston, would recommend that his stipend be increased to \$3,000.

the study of work in the different Mission fields, and the second to sewing. Our meetings were always bright and interesting, a good programme being provided for each one.

Our Band has carried on a good work during the year, and responded liberally to various causes. A box of new goods, valued at \$33, was sent to the Portage La Prairie school, \$60 to the Presbyterial Treasurer and \$20 to the India Famine Fund. Our expenses for the year were \$6.35, making a total amount raised of \$119.35. Among the principal articles in the box were five beautiful quilts, one of which was made of sateen and valued at three dollars, thirteen pairs of mittens and twelve yards of rag carpet.

This year the Band adopted a new method of aiding the children in becoming acquainted with the names of our missionaries. Each member has taken the name of a missionary and answers to that name at roll call. This, we hope, will enable them to take a deeper interest in the work of our missionaries.

In May the Band, assisted by a few members of the Choir, gave a very entertaining concert, and repeated the same at the Aged People's Home and Home for Incurables, and was much appreciated.

In June Miss McColl, of Westminster, delivered a very interesting and helpful address on the "Importance of Little Things."

On October 14th our Annual Thank-offering Meeting was held, and proved both enjoyable and profitable.

We close this year feeling that God has blessed our efforts, and trust that they will be crowned with greater success in the future.

**REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT.**

---

A review of our Sabbath School work for the last year of the century now closed presents many reasons for thanksgiving to God.

The teachers and officers, many of whom are among our busiest people, have earnestly, faithfully, and profitably discharged their duties, and we trust the congregation will appreciate their services.

We are pleased to note that some eighteen of our scholars during the year made a public profession of their faith in Jesus as their Saviour, and have united with the Church.

We have to call attention to the neglect of many parents to assist their children in the preparation of the lessons at home. When it is remembered that the actual teaching time in the Sabbath School is only about half an hour each week, it is surely desirable, if indeed not absolutely necessary, that parents should see that their children give at least one or two hours each week to the preparation of lessons if they would look for much real progress.

We have had open meetings with good addresses quarterly, but the attendance of parents and friends have been very much smaller than we would wish.

The total number on the roll, including scholars, teachers and officers was 399, or 15 less than last year, while the average attendance was 272, or 39 less than last. The falling off has been mainly in two classes, one class each of young men and young women, due to the lack of suitable accommodation.

The members of the Chinese classes have attended quite regularly during the year with the exception of July and August, and appear to appreciate the faithful and patient instruction imparted by their teachers. They have also contributed \$34.45 for Honan China Mission, which sum will be remitted and applied as directed.

Our infant class has for some years been in charge of Miss J. Auld and Miss J. Nicol, who have done splendid work, but during the past year the room has been enlarged and nicely fitted up with suitable chairs and carpet. Mrs. J. Telfer has charge now, and has eight other assistant teachers. The smaller children will now receive much better attention and help than it was possible heretofore, and we look for good results from this department.

The collections for the year amount to \$389.60, which includes special collections for Children's Hospital of \$10.79; Century Fund, \$71.26; Chinese class, \$33.35, and \$1.00 on account of supplies, and has been apportioned as follows:—
