Paris, July 13—There was no infantry fighting of importance last night on the Verdun front or over the portion of the Somme front held by the French, says today's official report. "Intermittent artillery engagements occurred in the Somme sector. In the vicinity of Souville, Chenois and La Laufee, before Verdun, a heavy bombardment was maintained by the Germans. In the Champagne the French penetrated a salient of the German front and took prisoners. Two German raids in the Argonne were stopped by the French fire.

Retirement Before Russian Drive Is Admitted By Berlin

Berlin, July 12 (via London, July 13)—The Austro-German retirement from the Czarterysk salient just south of the Pinsk swamps having been completed, the opposing armies have come to grips all along the line of Stokhod River, where Von Linsingen has elected to stand and cover the approach to Kovel.

Fleavy fighting is already in progress along the Stokhod, but apparently it is merely an earnest of what later may be expected in the persistent and desperate campaign of the Russian commander, General Brussiloff, to reach this important railway junction regardless of losses.

The retirement, according to advices from Austrian headquarters, was for strategic purposes and the achievement is considered one of high degree. The Russians had worked well around the flanks of the old position and if material and units were to be saved the retirement over an almost roadless country had to be effected at a good pace. As it was, the Austro-German forces barely reached positions behind the Stockhod before the Russians were hammering at the crossings.





Last night's cables brought news that the British had retaken all the ground lost to the Germans in the Mamets. Wood, and had regained a portion of that ilout in the Trones Wood; while two German attempts to recapture Contalmaison were repulsed. Patsy Hagan, the navy champion lightweight, scored another win at the Arena last night, when he knocked out Charlie Sheppard of New York in the 11th round. Patsy again jabbed effectively in the third, but Sheppard countered cleverly, and partly landed some hard wallops, but Hagan covered up. Another heavy blow about the ribs in the fourth was felt by Sheppard, who, however, fought back vigorously. Patsy's left did further execution in the fifth, with Sheppard retaliating about the head. He evened up with the sailor in the sixth, and was continuing his good work in the seventh, until near the end, when Patsy landed near his jaw and caused his admirers to break into cheers. There was little to choose between the men in the next two rounds with both fighting lively and Sheppard more aggressive than before.

The tenth was the best round of the bout, and practically the one which brought about the final result. Sheppard had got Hagan against the ropes, and he not only dodged the oncoming blow, but he soon got his left in hard on the New Yorker's stomach, which made him wince, and towards the end he landed several blows about the head and jaw, which made Sheppard somewhat groggy. Hagan followed up his opponent in the eleventh and when one of his lefts to the stomach brought the New Yorker's head down he followed this up with a blow across the jaw and chin, which caused Sheppard to fall senseless to the floor, and he was counted out. Hagan was not in the least distressed, and as the band struck up "Tipperary" he made a flying leap over the railing about the rink.




