"Warsaw is much quieter today than during the previous German attack in October. The activity of the private banks continues normal, unbesieged by crowds of clients as formerly. By order of the municipal authorities the work of repairing the streets continues.

"The Germans have brought up strong reserves, but the Russians are offering a powerful defence and have taken the offensive successfully at several points. The pressure of the Germans on the Nadarzyn-Piaseczno line west of the Vistula is regarded as designed to prevent the Russians from withdrawing their attention from that section. While a certain economy of German effort is noted in the southern area of hostilities, where operations between the Vistula and the Vieprz have reached a stand-still, observers see the tendency on the part of the Teutonic allies to widen the sphere of hostilities towards the east. It is now regarded as certain that their aim is not only to destroy communications with Petrograd by the operations north of Kovno, but also, by driving against Brest Litovsk, get behind Warsaw's paround Warsaw?

The American Red Cross.

America, the largest neutral country, has sent a hospital unit to every deligerent country. The English units stationed in the American Women's Hospital at Paignton Surrey. The Trench unit is at Pau. The Russian init is in charge of a hospital at Kieven the Baltic. The German units conduct two hospitals at Glelwitz and Kosel. The Austro-Hungarian units are tationed at Vienna and Budapest. There

duct two hospitals at Gleiwitz and Kosel. The Austro-Hungarian units are stationed at Vienna and Budapest. There is a Serbian unit at Belgrade and a Turkish unit at Constantinople. In addition the American Red Cross is doing work in Mexico and in China, so that its activities are at the present moment world wide. The American ambassadors everywhere keep the Red Cross executive informed of conditions and needs in every country.

The Japanese Red Cross.

One of the most efficient parts of the world wide Red Cross organization is the Japanese section. It has a membership of 1,890,000 and an endowment fund of \$13,000,000. Its last annual meeting was presided over by the empress and was attended by 10,000 delegates. The American Red Cross society has a membership of 18,000 and an endowment fund of \$929,000. There is thus no country in the world in which there is so much Red Cross enthusiasm as in Japan. In all their wars, the Japanese have faithfully discharged all Red Cross obligations even to their own disadvantage.

Which controls the military hospitals. In Canada the relief of the wounded is greatly simplified by the status of the Red Cross as a state department. This also gives an additional guarantee to the public that the funds it contributes are efficiently and conscientiously administered.

Hospital Ship for Dardanelles.

In view of the need for hospital accommodation for serious cases at the Dardanelles, the French Red Cross a vessel belonging to the Messageries Maritimes, the Charles Roux, which is being fitted out as a hospital ship. The coal will be provided by the French authorities, while the French Red Cross will supply the beds, the medical stores, the doctors, and the nurses. But all other supplies, such as line, shirts, pyjamas, socks, handker-niefs and stores, besides comforts like ice machines and bed rests, must be furnished by private charity.



Striking Letter by Maine Soldier in Army in France

PRAISE FOR THE BRITISH

Holds Officers in High Esteem-Tells of Fearful Atrocities by Germans as Actually Seen by

Lance Corporal F. E. Goordich of Hallowell, Me., who is with the Canadian contingent in England and has recently been granted a two months' leave of absence to enter the Hall School of Aviation in London to qualify for a ieutenant's commission in the royal flying corps, makes the following interest-

ing corps, makes the following interesting observations concerning the fighting qualities of the British in a letter received by his father, A. F. Goodrich of Hallowell:

The British are holding forty-five miles of the hardest part of the firing lines in France; and the Canadian contingent of 32,000 men hold about three miles. The reason we lost so many men was because the Germans' tried to break the line which we were holding and it was up to us to stop them. Therefore we had to bear the brunt of the fighting. I know for a fact that there are over a million and a half of British troops in France. But where Germany has been preparing forty years for "Der Tag," England was very much the reverse and they are just beginning to wake up. We have plenty of men without resorting to conscription yet, what we need and must have are shells and munitions. England is an armed camp. There are must have are shells and munitions. England is an armed camp. There are plenty of soldiers, but there is no use putting them up against strongly intrenched positions that hold one machine gun to every four yards until we have the ammunition to break a way through for the infantry. And in the meantime it seems to be good policy to let the Germans break themselves against our defense so long as they will. When they abandon the offensive our time will come.




