

NEED NOT BE SO BIG TO JOIN ARMY

Local Orders Reducing Minimum - Dental Regulations Also Likely Lest Strict

Instructors have been received at the local recruiting offices advising that the measurements for volunteers have been somewhat lowered, and it is expected also that the regulations regarding dental qualifications will be lessened. Up to the present the standard for men joining the infantry had been 5 feet 3 inches in height, with a chest measurement of at least 33 inches; artillery, 5 feet 4 inches and chest 34 inches.

Winnipeg, July 28.—Edward Anderson, K.C., yesterday began argument before the court of appeal for an injunction restraining the Royal Commission from further proceedings. This is in reversal of the decision of Mr. Justice Ferguson, who refused an injunction. Mr. Anderson took the ground that the commission was ultra vires and should be restrained not only from taking further evidence, but should not be permitted to make a finding. He made all his contentions in the interests of his clients, Thomas Kelly and Sons, contractors for the Manitoba parliament buildings.

KEEPING THE LID ON.

With elaborate politeness, and an utter absence of abusive epithets, in very striking contrast to its tone of two days ago, the Standard of this morning tells Mr. E. S. Carter that if he will make a charge against any member of the government or legislature it will be at once investigated.

Two days ago the Standard told Commissioner Chandler that he could not properly investigate the charges made by Mr. Carter. Yesterday the Commissioner told Mr. Carter that the charges did not come within the scope of his enquiry.

But the government and its friends will not be able to keep the lid on Mr. Carter's charges as true, and will be substantiated in spite of the government's brazen refusal to have the matter investigated.

The government has been given the opportunity to prove the truth of its loud professions of a desire to expose and punish all political wrong-doers, and has proved instead its utter insincerity.

When all the facts are laid before the person who will understand why an enquiry has been refused. And the facts will be laid bare. Neither threats nor cajolery will prevent that result.

PUT TO THE TEST

The Standard can state on the authority of the government of New Brunswick that no member of the government, or of the legislature, has received, demanded, asked for or solicited any contributions of money from liquor dealers in the city of St. John, or from any other person; that no campaign fund has been received, demanded, asked for or solicited, directly or indirectly, from these people or from any others.

How does the Standard know all this, or the government either? Has there been a meeting of the government and members of the legislature and solemn affidavits made?

Let us see. The Royal Commission which conducted the Dugal enquiry discovered certain facts about Mr. Fleming. Before the enquiry was made the Standard gave Mr. Fleming frequent and emphatic certificates of character.

MORE RECRUITS NEEDED.

In the city of Halifax a special recruiting campaign is in progress with a capable publicity committee at work, and systematic effort to fill up the ranks of the Nova Scotia Battalion at Valcartier.

The city of Toronto has voted a large amount of money to aid recruiting. Other cities and towns in Ontario are giving the matter special attention, for the orders have gone forth to recruit more battalions in that province.

CHEERING CROP OUTLOOK

Canadian Pacific Railway officials are very optimistic about the crops in the west and the good effect a great harvest will have upon the country.

"In 1909 the crop in the west totalled 144,000,000 bushels, and was thought to be a bumper one. It is expected that this year the crop will be between 225,000,000 and 240,000,000 bushels—that is the figuring out of the agents who report regularly to the C. P. R. headquarters.

Mr. Bury, vice-president of the C. P. R., has found in the west that the increased acreage averages 25 per cent over the country. Mr. Morley Donaldson, the general manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific, said a day or two ago to The Gazette that he had seen a stretch of waving wheat 1,000 miles in extent, while in the reports received by the C. P. R. from day to day it is mentioned that in one instance there is a field 6,000 acres in extent—a single field of wheat, and the wheat 42 inches high and headed out.

The Gazette adds that there is a general conviction that the crop will be all that is hoped for, as the weather in most places is ideal. As to the effect it quotes another C. P. R. official as follows: "And the crop will make an immense difference to everybody in the Dominion. Everybody will be busy; the money will be coming in; the merchants will stock their stores; the farmers can pay their debts to the banks; there will be money in the general pocket, too, when the debts are paid, for prices will be high."





THE NEUTRAL RED CROSS SOCIETIES

It would be impossible to exaggerate the horror of the European situation if there were no neutral Red Cross Societies. Switzerland, Holland and Denmark are all situated geographically on the chief routes of communication between belligerent countries, and their Red Cross societies have played a special part in emphasizing the international character of the Red Cross. These neutral Red Cross societies mediate between the Red Cross societies of the nations at war and exemplify those universal principles of international charity, which more than anything else in the world today make for universal peace.

Holland effects the exchange of incapacitated French and German prisoners. The Swiss Red Cross keeps up a large exchange bureau by means of which French and German prisoners are returned to their respective countries, and Denmark does the same kind of service for Russia and Germany. Lists of prisoners of war are sent by the different countries to these neutral Red Cross societies which are thus in a position to answer all inquiries of relatives and to forward mail and parcels to prisoners.

To appreciate this department of Red Cross work one has only to imagine the terrible confusion that would result from the disappearance and silence of millions of men. Immense legal difficulties would arise everywhere in the absence of all information as to the existence or death of prisoners of war. Estates would be involved in legal tangles. Women thinking they were widows might contract new marriages. Every country would be full of Koehls, Ardens and disputes as to the inheritance of property.

The present world without the Red Cross would be unthinkable. The Red Cross typifies civilization itself.

The American Red Cross.

America, the largest neutral country, has sent a hospital unit to every belligerent country. The English unit is stationed in the American Women's Hospital at Paignton, Surrey. The French unit at Paris. The Russian unit is in charge of a hospital at Kieve on the Baltic. The German units conduct two hospitals at Ghelwille and Koesel. The Austro-Hungarian units are stationed at Vienna and Budapest. There is a Serbian unit at Belgrade and a Turkish unit at Constantinople. In addition the American Red Cross is doing work in Mexico and in China, so that its activities are at the present moment world wide. The American ambassadors everywhere keep the Red Cross executive informed of conditions and needs in every country.

The Japanese Red Cross.

One of the most efficient parts of the Japanese section. It has a membership of 1,000,000 and an endowment fund of \$18,000,000. Its last annual meeting was presided over by the empress and was attended by 10,000 delegates. The American Red Cross society has a membership of 18,000 and an endowment fund of \$22,000. There is thus no country in the world in which there is so much Red Cross enthusiasm as in Japan. In all their work, the Japanese have faithfully discharged all Red Cross obligations even to their own disadvantage.

Every well to do person in Japan joins the Red Cross. Even young children are enrolled as life members before they can walk or talk. The Japanese Red Cross member stands on the lintel above his door and it is said that house-breakers scrupulously respect premises so marked.

In the present war the Japanese Red

Cross in addition to the work at Tsing-tai has sent Red Cross units to Russia, France, England and Serbia, and has thus set an inspiring example to all other Red Cross countries. The tireless energy of our brown allies from the land of Nippon should spur our Canadian Red Cross workers on to further efforts. Our Canadian Red Cross should aim to secure the same reputation in the work of healing as our soldiers in the work of fighting.

Contributions and supplies are still urgently needed and there should be no diminution in the Red Cross activity which is steadily winning for Canada a proud place in Red Cross annals.

The Dutch Red Cross.

The Dutch Red Cross is very active in effecting the interchange of wounded prisoners of war who are incarcerated for further military service. Representatives of the Dutch Army Medical Service and of the Red Cross await the arrival of the British prisoners coming from Belgium. As the trains come in they are entered by Red Cross workers, and the Dutch ladies give the wounded food and refreshment in addition to small gifts and souvenirs.

The arrangements for the transport of the wounded to England are entirely in the hands of the Dutch Red Cross who have chartered hospital ships. Dutch doctors go with the ships until they dock in an English port, and lavish on the British wounded an attention that could not be increased were they of Dutch nationality.

Holland—not least of the neutral countries, has been faithful to the idea of universal charity which actuated the founding of the International Red Cross.

Canadian.

The Canadian Red Cross possesses one feature which distinguishes it from all other Red Cross organizations. It is a regular part of the machinery of the state. It is incorporated by act of parliament, 1909, and its officials are bound under severe penalties to make an annual report to the dominion minister of militia. In England there has been a certain amount of difficulty owing to the clear cut distinction between the Red Cross and the Army Medical Corps, which controls the military hospitals. In Canada the relief of the wounded is greatly simplified by the status of the Red Cross as a state department. This also gives an additional guarantee to the public that the funds it contributes are efficiently and conscientiously administered.

Hospital Ship for Dardanelles.

In view of the need for hospital accommodation for serious cases at the Dardanelles, the French government has placed at the disposal of the French Red Cross a vessel, belonging to the Messageries Maritimes, the Charles Roux, which is being fitted out as a hospital ship. The coal will be provided by the French authorities, while the French Red Cross will supply the beds, the medical stores, the doctors, and the nurses. But all other supplies, such as linen, shirts, pyjamas, socks, handkerchiefs and stores, besides comforts like ice machines and bed rests, must be furnished by private charity.

PREMIER BACK TO LONDON

Premier Borden, who recently visited the headquarters of the French, British and Canadian troops on the front line and who spent some time in viewing life in the trenches and hospitals, has returned to London. The premier visited the graves of his countrymen at Boulogne and planted seeds of the maple in a cemetery where Canadian soldiers are buried.

THE CITY AND STREET RAILWAY

Com. Potts Moves Far Action to Prevent Running of Cars Over Some Sections

At yesterday's meeting of the Common Council, Commissioner Potts reported on the condition of the street railway rails at Bridge street curve, in several places in Main and Mill streets, at Paradise row corner, in Charlotte street and at the intersection of the street with Princess and Carmarthen corner. He had written the company about the latter place, they having refused to respect the court's judgment, he found it impossible to protect the public from the dangerous condition of the tracks until this council takes such action as will compel the St. John Railway Company to respect the rights of the citizens. He moved that the council instruct the city solicitor to institute action against the company for an injunction prohibiting them from running over the sections complained of.

Commissioner Wigmore seconded the resolution to promote discussion.

Com. Potts said the city solicitor had advised him that the course proposed was the only method of action.

There was some discussion and then a private session at the close of which the mayor announced that the matter was left in the hands of the recorder for further action and advice.

BIRDS IN THE WAR.

Berlin, July 13 (Correspondence)—Experiments and observations made in the trenches at the various battle fronts by bird lovers have revealed some striking characteristics of the feathered broods that have not been frightened from their accustomed haunts by the war. Quite as unusual as any other conclusion is the showing that crows, from generations of experience, fear rifle fire but not artillery fire, while song birds, never having known the fear of the hunter and his rifle, break into song when the guns are fired, but are alarmed at the tremendous explosions of shells.

Even the trained artillery horses con-

tinued to show more fright at shell explosions than the birds. The crows, for instance, do not even trouble to take to flight when a shell lands near them, but does not explode, and only rise for an instant when it does go off. But when the rifles begin to pop they put as much distance as possible between themselves and the trenches.

Many of the soldiers have canaries in their trenches, and have conducted numerous experiments with them. Usually the discharge of a rifle is a signal for them to sing, and the sound of breaking glass will bring the same result. The same is true to a great extent of the wild song birds that abound, especially along the French front.

The birds of course display a sharpness of vision that even a powerful telescope will not equal, and many times the warning of an attack has come first of all from the crows and other birds rising in alarm at some movement that the sentries for all their watchfulness had not detected.

VALUE OF SUBMARINE AGAINST BATTLESHIPS

Paris, France, July 28.—The Temps quotes and compares the views of recently and M. Augagneur, French minister of marine, on the subject of the value of submarines as compared with battleships. M. Augagneur, in giving his opinions to the correspondent of the Corsiers della Sera, admitted that at the beginning of the war it was thought that judging by results in the battle of Jutland during the Russo-Japanese war naval development must be on the line of increasing the number and size of battleships. There was another school that prophesied that light cruisers and submarines would hold the field in the future and in the light of recent events it seemed that this latter view was the correct one. Great sea fights between squadrons had not taken place and battleships had to take refuge from enemies who were nearly always invisible. Asked if there was no way of meeting the submarine peril and whether the presence of submarines in the Aegean would retard the operations in the Dardanelles, M. Augagneur stated that a means of protection against submarines existed which gave remarkable results. With regard to the situation in the Dardanelles he said that though the losses sustained by the Allies were regrettable they were not heavier than had been anticipated. Count Reventlow, when addressing a meeting held in Hamburg by Dr. Solf did not give the impression that he considered that the submarine had ousted the battleship in naval warfare. It was a mistake, he said, to place too much confidence in what submarines could achieve. Submarines might challenge an enemy's claim to the command of the sea, but even German submarines could not conceal the sea, and if Germany increased the number of these craft, threefold she could not protect her colonies with them. What Germany really wanted, in his opinion, was a dozen or so more battleships for a policy on the surmise that no effective reply to the submarine would ever be discovered.





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OLD TIME SPORT. Local Men in Sculling Races On Kennebecasis in 1876.

On July 1, 1876 a regatta was held on the Kennebecasis river under the auspices of the Neptune Rowing Club. An account of the sport follows: The seven o'clock trial took out more than 900 people and the train which went out later carried out several hundred more. The morning was delightfully fine and the course was in splendid condition. The start in each race was made from a boat anchored off the cove. The managers determining that there should be no grumbling about delays, called on the professional scull race shortly after the arrival of the seven train. Dr. Walker was referee; Messrs. Daniel and Sturdes were the judges. The conditions of the race were as follows: Open to all comers distance three miles, with one turn; prizes, \$20 to first, \$10 to second and \$5 to third. The entries were: "Worrybarn," rowed by Edward Ross of Portland.

"Jeremiah Discoll," rowed by Michael Nicholson, of Portland. "John Haley," rowed by Patrick McAnulty of Portland.

Considerable interest was manifested in the race, occasioned mostly by the report that Edward Ross was likely to do wonders. Ross was only seventeen years of age and rowed much the same style as his brother Wallace. The oarsmen were given positions as follows: Nicholson, in shore, McAnulty next, Belyea third and Ross nearest the Judge's boat. The start was a very even one, the oars of the four touching the water at almost the same instant.

They had gone only about two hundred yards when it was plain to see that Nicholson was "out of the race." He rowed very roughly and with little force. The fact was that he was not in "it" and had entered only to help the filling of the entries. The race between the other three, was a very exciting one. Belyea seemed to have the best of it when they were about 300 yards from Appleby's wharf and when they passed that point he was length ahead. It was hard to say whether Ross or McAnulty had the advantage for second place. Belyea was then pulling thirty-seven strokes to the minute, Ross thirty-six, McAnulty, thirty-eight and thirty-three.

Belyea turned the boat (in charge of Wallace Ross) about length ahead of McAnulty, who was then about the same distance ahead of Ross. The latter made a very poor turn. Belyea had an easy race of it home, winning by three lengths. It was a hard struggle between Ross and McAnulty, but Ross secured second place. Belyea's time was 22:45.

THIEVING FROM FISHERMEN

HELPED TO BURY CANADIAN DEAD

Belgian Now in City on the Liner Messina

TWO OTHERS ALSO ON BOARD

One of Them Has Not Seen His Six Motherless Children Since The Fall of Antwerp

Dominic Tratsart, a native of Ostend, Belgium, and now a seaman on the Furness liner Messina which arrived this morning, was engaged in burying the soldiers who fell in battle along the western front in France and Belgium. "I buried lots of dead Canadians at Ypres," he said.

Tratsart was in Antwerp just before the city was taken by the Germans and he left before the Germans entered the city. On reaching London, he offered his services to the Belgian consular there, and with nine of his fellow countrymen was sent to France to help in the work of burying soldiers who had been killed in the heavy fighting following the German drive. The party operated at Neuport, Dixmude and Ypres and interred hundreds of men.

Whenever possible, the bodies were placed in graves which were hastily dug during a lull in the firing; but often it was necessary to burn piles of German who had fallen in mass.

Accompanied by gens d'armes, Tratsart and his companions crawled along the zones of flying shells and disposed of the bodies. They worked far into the night and were many times forced to stop before the movements of German cavalry.

The Belgians were many times hard pressed for food and depended entirely on the good will of farmers for supplies. Frequently after opening the day and half the night on the battlefield, they worked for farmers until morning in order to earn a living.

Tratsart has been ordered to report to the Belgian consular on his return to London and he expects to be sent to the front with the Belgian army soon after he arrives in England. He said the military authorities were not ready to accept recruits when he first offered his services.

John W. Decimal, brother-in-law of Tratsart and John B. Poeters of Antwerp, are also among the crew of the Messina. Poeters became separated from Tratsart in the fall of Antwerp and the youngsters, the mother of whom is dead, are missing. Decimal went from Antwerp to Rotterdam when the Belgian port was taken and afterwards returned to his native city; but he was unable to find means of livelihood and escaped to England.

REV. MR. STACKHOUSE WELCOMED

Former Local Pastor Here on Vacation—A Ulica Rotary Club Story

His old friends were glad to welcome Rev. P. J. Stackhouse yesterday on his arrival in the city to spend his holidays. His presence and Nova Scotia. Mr. Stackhouse says that the great bulk of the American people are in sympathy with the allies, but points out that at a meeting of Germans in Ulica this week resolutions were adopted protesting against the last American note to Germany, and calling upon other German states to do the same. He said many nice things about America, and intimated that there were many Italians in America who would return to Italy to join the colors, and who would be all the more skilful in trench digging because they had worked with pick and spade in America. The speaker was given a great ovation, after which he took off his mustaches and revealed the fact that he was not a gentleman from Italy at all.

Mr. Stackhouse hopes to have some salmon fishing in Nova Scotia, and will certainly have fishing somewhere. He has come, he says, to the real fishing country from one where there are several fishermen for every fish, although they do get some fine trout there at times. Incidentally he observes that he had to deposit some dollars at McAdam in order to bring in his salmon rod.

Mr. Stackhouse will be heard in his former pulpit in Amherst during his stay in Nova Scotia. He is in excellent health and delighted to resist the province.
