





Dead in Western Diates Many friends in the city will regret to learn of the death of John T. C. McKean, which occurred at the residence of his son yesterday afternoon, after a lingering ill-ness. Mr. McKean was born at St.Andrews (N.B.), and was the youngest son of the late John McKean, of this city. His wife, who died some years ago, was the daughter of the late John Winters, of this city. Mr. McKean was well known as an architect, which profession he practiced in this profession at the office of Vaux & Withers, New York, a firm of high re-pute. He started in business in St. John about 1870 and the first year of his prac-tice he drew the plans for the fine stone house on Mount Pleasant, recently pur-chased by Henry Gallagher, known as the Kaye house, and the Hampton court house. In 1872 he formed a partnership with G. Ernest Fairweather and they continued in business together till 1880. Among the buildings designed by the firm were the Victoria school,West End; Normal School, Fredericton; City Hall, Fredericton; Mar-ket Building, St. John. Under the direction of the chief architect for the dominion government at Ottawa, the firm made the working plans for the Custom House. After the fire they did lot of work and have had numerous build-ings in St. John designed at their office, the most notable being the Masonic Temple in Germain street, and the Sands building in Prince William street, at present occu-pied by Comeau & Sheehan, and many others.
