

Among the most useless things that are presented to royalty, are engrossed and illuminated addresses from public bodies and institutions. It is doubtful whether they are ever read by the personages for whom they are intended. If presented on some state occasion, they are immediately handed by the more or less distinguished recipient to an attendant, and that is the last that he sees of them. In ninety-nine cases out of every hundred, he does not see them at all. Thus, when King Edward died, the addresses of condolence to King George, and of wishes for the success of his reign, numbered upwards of 30,000. They came not only from every municipality, from every philanthropic association, They came not only from every municipality, from every philanthropic association, corporate body, public institution, and even mere clubs, in Great Britain and Ireland, but also from similar bodies in the various colonies. In fact, it would have been almost a human impossibility for King George to have read them all. It is reported that there are no less than 15,000 of them still lying unopened at the home department in Downing street, all hailing from different parts of Great Britain. At the department of the colonies there are nearly as many more still unpacked; while the foreign office has likewise its share of these testimonials of regard for the late king, and of good will for King George, from British communities and so-cieties in foreign cities and even from for-eign bodies.



### ST. JOHN HAS MUCH AT STAKE

What has St. John at stake in this election? The future of the port is involved in a very real and important sense. If the government were defeated there would be no shipbuilding plant, for Mr. Borden is opposed to a Canadian built navy, and Mr. Bourassa would have no part for Canada in even the British navy.

Not only would there be no hope of getting a ship-building plant, but the work at Courtenay Bay would not be carried out. A Conservative government would not dare to expend millions to develop the port for east and west trade when the United States by a stroke of the pen could destroy it—and that is what they tell us they believe the United States could do. Thus winter port development, as planned by Dr. Pugsley, would have to be abandoned under Con-

But St. John has still more at stake. If reciprocity were defeated the mills sawing Maine logs would be closed, and hundreds of people would be compelled to go elsewhere to find homes.

If reciprocity were defeated there would be no revival of the coasting trade. There would be no change for the better—no im-

The people cannot afford to "let well enough alone" and reject the splendid opportunity opening up before St. John under reciproci-ty and under continued Liberal rule.

### ST. JOHN MANUFACTURERS IN LINE

Mr. James Pender and Mr. Charles McDonald are two manufacturers who see nothing but good in reciprocity, and both have stated their views in a clear and business-like manner from the public platform. Mr. George A. Horton is also a manufacturer, and in a vigorous letter in today's issue gives his reasons for supporting the policy of the government.

A majority of the manufacturers of St. John are in favor of reciprocity. They are not disturbed by any fear that a free exchange of

natural products will injure their business. They know that the maritime provinces have not grown and developed as they should do, with their magnificent resources. They believe a larger free market at our doors for natural products will lead to rapid growth, and to a better home market for the products of the factories.
