

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

Monday, March 10th. Hon. Mr. Knowling .- It is a pleasure o hear the way this subject is being lealt with. I see by the fourth clause in his Excelleney's Speech that the duty has been taken off tea, sugar, pork and beef. Well, that is no more than ought to be done. That we were promised four or five years ago, and it is most surprising to me, indeed, it is more than surprising, it is great shame that this has not been done before. To me it has too much the appearance of a death bed repentance. We have served our time, the Government think, and must do something to make up for past promises. 


