Who have died since the last Conference?

Answer,

1. JOHN GOODFELLOW.

John Goodfellow was born in the north of England, and was converted to God in early life. He received a good English and classical education As a Christian and a Minister he was of deep and fervent piety, exceedingly conscientious, a man of an eminently meek and quiet spirit; and so retiring in his disposition that his excellencies were only known by an intimate acquaintance with him. The urbanity and kindness of his manner secured to him the affections of the people among whom he laboured.

During his residence on the Omemee Circuit, the prodonged and severe affliction of his son, which resulted in death, so much impaired the health of our late brother, that he gradually sunk under his severe trials. His life terminated suddenly in Toronto, on the 22nd of July, 1861, in the 43rd year of his age, and the 19th of his ministry.

2. SAMUEL BELTON.

Bro. Belton was a native of Ireland, and was born on December 17th, 1790. He left his native land in early life for the United States, where under the ministry of the M. E. Church he was converted to God, and joined that Church.

He carly gave indications of usefulness, and in obedience to the call of God, he entered into the work of the Christian ministry in 1817. He travelled one year in the United States, when he was appointed to the work in Canada. He occupied various fields of labour assigned him by Conference, from Ottawa in the east, to London in the west. His

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Br fell a in Be years labours were acceptable and useful, and it was his honour and privilege to be associated with those who laid the foundation of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Canada; sharing their labours, privations and triumphs. He nurtured and sympathised with the church in its infancy; he lived to see it stand forth in a vigorous manhood. Increasing infirmities led him in 1847 to ask a superannuated relation, and he selected Hamilton as the home where he should spend his declining years.

Through all the years of his superannuation he suffered much from deblity, yet with great patience and deep piety. He employed his remaining strength in visiting surrounding circuits, and preaching as he had opportunity. The discase which terminated his earthly existence did not impair his mental faculties. His mind retained its vigour, so that to the last he was able to converse intelligently with his

family and friends.

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In answering the inquiries respecting the future, he expressed his unshaken confidence in the faithfulness of his Redeemer, in giving him the promised mansion in the house not made with hands, eternal in the Heavens. His recollections of past labours and triumphs with many whom he has now joined in the better country, were very affecting, and the names of some of these he mentioned but a few minutes before his death.

He continued in this peaceful and sometimes joyous state of mind (though suffering severely,) until the Divine Master gave him a final release, and he entered into the joy of the

Lord. He died on the 6th October, 1861.

3. WILLIAM WILLIAMS.

Died in the 8th year of his ministry, at the residence of his father, in St Thomas, C.W. His disease was lingering consumption. He endured suffering with great patience and resignation to the Divine will. His last hours were peculiarly bright, he passed through the vale of death resting on the staff of omnipotent love. His final triumph occurred on the 19th November, 1861, in the 32nd year of his age.

4. GEORGE JONES.

Brother George Jones, after a long and distressing illness, fell asleep in Jesus, on the 24th May, 1862. He was born in Beverly, Canada West—was converted to God at eighteen years of age, under the ministry of Rev. Hamilton Biggar—

gave evidence of fervent piety, and longed deeply to serve his generation by the will of God, and in the employment of his gifts and graces to win souls to Christ, In June, 1857, he was received as a candidate for the holy ministry. His amiability, unswerving integrity, and strict conscientiousness won for him the confidence and affection of his brethren, and gave him no small influence with the people to whom he preached the word of life. Soon after the last Conference he was obliged, through rapidly advancing disease, to cease ministerial labour He returned to the residence of his father on the Aylmer Circuit, where he lingered in peaceful and submissive waiting until his happy admission to the society of angels and of God Shortly before his death he employed what little remained of his much wasted strength to be present at the Love-feast and the Holy Sacrament, where he received, in unusual measure the baptism of grace, and, said returning, "God is preparing me for some great conflict— he always tries the grace which he gives." The conflict quickly came, and his was the triumph of one "coming off more than conqueror through Him that loved him " On each of his circuits he left a name embalmed in the grateful memory of some whom he led to Christ.

REPORT OF THE CHILDREN'S FUND COMMITTEE, JUNE 1862.

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Your Committee have pleasure in reporting the greatly increased accuracy, with which the returns from the Districts have been presented, making the settlement of the accounts a matter of little difficulty. The number of children provided for in the estimate made last year is only two less than the number now actually paid for.

In 1861 there has been a large increase in the number of ministers' children, as compared with the increase of church members—though the *ratio* of increase has not been as large as that of the last year.

The number provided for last year was 575, while the number for the present year is 628, an increase of 53. The members including those on trial is 53,867, on which the percentage of 34 cents with a balance on hand from the present year will be sufficient to meet the claims. This arrangement is recommended in preference to the only other available, viz., the per centage of 37 cents on each full member of the church.

The Committee have to present a balance sheet from the General Treasurer, which, with the General Schedule, will be published in the Minutes of Conference. A Minute Book has also been precured, in which the transactions of the year have been recorded, for future reference.

Sundry Resolutions have been submitted for our consideration, some of which complain that the present support of the fund is burdensome, and the per centage laid on the membership excessive—while others apply for a rule which will introduce a greater number of claimants than ever. Your committee are of opinion that it is inexpedient to adopt any change in the management of this Fund.

Your Committee call attention to the necessity of having a return of the precise date of the birth of each child

having a claim upon this Fund, in order to enable them to determine with certainty, the time at which such claims commence and expire. It is hoped that by next Conference the Treasurer will be put in possession of these returns from each District.

The amount of \$290 received as compensation will be invested according to the the law in the case, for the benefit of the fund. By these arrangements it is hoped that the management of this Fund will attain to perfect accuracy, and give general satisfaction to the comexion.

The Committee recommend the re-appointment of the

present General Treasurer, and Secretary.

As some inconvenience has arisen from the want of accordance between the present constitution of the of the Children's Fund, and the present usage, a subcommittee has been appointed to draft the necessary alterations, and report to this Committee at the ensuing Conference. The General Treasurer, the Secretary, Rev. G. Dorey, and T. S. Keough, compose this Committee.

REPORT OF THE SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

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Your Committee rejoice to report that our Sabbath School department of labour is steadily and delightfully From all parts of our widely-extended Church the reports sent are of an encouraging naturefrom some of them of a highly satisfactory kind. early and the latter rains' have been vouchsafed. has poured out his Holy Spirit, and teachers and scholars have been savingly converted to God. Bible-classes and prayer-meetings have been abundantly owned of God and crowned with his blessing. During the year, sixty-three new schools have been established. hundred and twenty-six additional labourers have joined Two thousand nine hundred and twentynine scholars have been added to our total. Thirteen hundred and seventy-nine of these have been converted to God, have joined our Church, and are now walking in the light of his reconciled countenance. To God be all the glory!

Your Committee would specially call attention to the fact, that in one of our Schools during the past year, fifty scholars were converted to God, while seventy-four scholars are returned from that same Circuit as meeting in class; and they would respectfully suggest whether similar or even more extensive success might not be universally obtained as the result of earnest, systematic effort prosecuted in the spirit of faith and prayer.

Impressed with the value and importance of Bible and Catcohumen Classes, your Committee would most carneally recommend their more general formation. Some of our ministers are laudably exerting themselves in this respect, but there is ample room for improvement; and in no other manner than by pre-eccupying the minds of our young people with the great truths of revelation, and implanting in their hearts a love for truth and piety, can

we save them from the pernicious influences of the frothy

and immoral productions of the age.

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While there has been no increase in the number of volumes in our School Libraries, it is very gratifying to find from the reports forwarded that the character and value of these Libraries are improving. Our own works, in which our harmonious and scriptural theology, and our own deep, clear, and happy religious experience are taught and exhibited, are superseding those works of a doubtful and imperfect religious character previously introduced. Your Committee strongly recommend that our Ministers use all their influence in increasing the circulation of our own publications, and banishing from our Sunday School Libraries calvinistical productions.

In some neighbourhoods Union Schools have prevented the formation of denominational ones. Our brethren deplore the fact, and we believe will try their utmost to establish Schools which shall be wholly under our own guidance and control, and in which our own invaluable

catechisms shall be exclusively introduced.

Your Committee would suggest the propriety of a more thorough and systematic effort at catechetical instruction. The early Methodists were fully alive to its importance in imbuing the mind of the young with correct views of religious truth and leading them under the blessing of God to the practice of its duties, and most strenuously were they wont to engage in this department of labour. We cannot do better than uniformly adopt the practice of our fathers; and we carnestly advise both ministers and people to return to the old paths and walk in the old ways.

paths and walk in the old ways.

Our Sunday School Advocate has far too limited a circulation for so valuable and interesting a paper. We submit whether its price might not be reduced, and thus it might be brought within the reach of many who are

unacquainted with its excellencies.

From a few Circuits no returns have been received, and from a few other very imperfect returns. Mere

statistics do not give as a just or adequate idea of the magnitude or value of our operations. Your Committee recommend that all Superintendents send in written reports of their Sabbath Schools to the May District Meetings of 1863, that we may possess full and satisfactory details of our operations in this field of godlike toil.

In conclusion, your Committee find ample cause for thankfulness and praise in connection with our Schools. Our beloved people are more fully awaking up to their importance, and are more cheerfully consecrating their time and talents to this work; the young themselves are througing to our Schools desirous of receiving instruction, and God is pouring out his blessing upon us and crowning the work of our hands with success.

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GOVERNOR AND CHAPLAINS REPORT.

The Session which has just closed has been characterized by great peace, concord and harmony, in our domestic circle. Nothing of any importance has transpired in the working of the internal affairs of the Institution, to produce any painful misunderstandings, or in the least degree alienate the affections of the Officers and Teachers from one another. The health of all in the College has been remarkably preserved, so that we have had no case of serious illness, and but few that required even medical attendance. Our domestic worship, consisting of reading the Scriptures, singing and prayer, has been strictly attended to morning and evening, with becoming reverence by all in the house; and in many instances, especially on the Sabbath, an unusual measure of Divine influence has been enjoyed, thus giving us the most unmistakeable evidence "that God was with The young Ladies boarding in the College have regularly attended public worship every Sabbath in the Churches selected for them by their Parents, unless excused on account of illness.

Fifty-five were registered as attendants upon the Wesleyan Ministry, thirty-three of whom have been meeting in Class, The most of them professing to have a knowledge of salvation by the remission of sins. Eight have been entered as members of the Episcopalian or Church of England, and one as a member of the Free Presbyterian Church. In addition to attending to Church twice every Sabbath when the weather would permit, unless excused on account of illness, every Student boarding in the College has been required to attend the Bible Class on Sabbath afternoons.

Thus we have been labouring to meet the expectations which were raised, and to redeem the pledges that were given at the opening of the College last September, viz.—that a sound religious influence should pervade every department, but especially the domestic department. In concluding this brief report, you will allow me to say in entering upon the duties of the office which I have held, I very soon found I had not only a comparatively, new but a very difficult and delicate task to perform, a task which would require much patience and forbearance, as well as firmness and strict impartiality.

In humble dependance upon God, I have endeavoured faithfully to discharge my duty, and must say that I am thankful for the measure of success that has crown-

ed our labours.

The Institution is now fairly before the country as an acknowledged fact. The efficiency and excellency of which will have to be judged of by its works. Present results I think are such as cannot fail to inspire hope for the future.

THANKS TO THE GRAND TRUNK DIRECTORS.

Resolved—That the thanks of this Conference be presented to the Directors of the Grand Trunk Railway Company for the renewed grant of Return Tickets made to the members of this body for the present year.

RESOLUTIONS RELATING TO VICTORIA COLLEGE SUSTENTATION FUND

 That this Conference is deeply impressed with the necessity and importance of general and systematic efforts to maintain the University of Victoria College, embracing,

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s of risitaas it does, not only an undergraduate course of University studies, but also an English and Preparatory Grammar School, imparting a thorough English and Grammar School Education to those youths who do not pursue the higher studies of the University.

2. That each Minster or Preacher pledge himself, independent of former subscriptions, to contribute at least ten cents to the support of Victoria College during the present Conference year, and use his utmost exertions to induce the members of our Congregations under his charge to do the same, since every member of our Congregations has as much personal and national interest in our College as his Minister.

That we affectionately entreat the members of our congregations to co-operate with us in this general and systematic effort to sustain with increased efficiency one of the most important institutions of our church and country.

4. That a copy of these resolutions be published in the Minutes and the Guardian and that each Superintendent of a Circuit be directed to bring them before the August Quarterly meeting of his Circuit

5. That the several sums raised in accordance with the foregoing resolutions, be transmitted to the Treasurer of Victoria College as soon after the first day of next January as possible.

6. That the subject of these resolutions shall, by the Chairman of Districts be brought under the notice of the Financial District Meetings, and that in the May District Meeting, the result of the effort on each Circuit and Mission must be reported, and recorded in the financial returns of the District.

RELATING TO THE BOOK-ROOM.

Resolved—That every Minister and Preacher is henceforth peremptorily required to settle his account with the Book Steward at or before the meeting of Conference.

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Resolved—That in case of any Brother who is indebted to the amount of \$100 to the Book-Room, the Book-Steward shall be authorized to draw on the Treasurer of any connexional funds on which that Brother may have a claim, to the amount of not more than 25 per cent of his claim annually, until his debt is paid; and that a like proportion prevail when the indebtedness is larger than the sum named.

Resolved—That Brethren indebted to the Book-Room, they not being claimants on the connexional funds, be required to settle all overdue accounts and pay the same within two years.

RESOLUTION OF 1859.

Resolved—That the Financial District Meetings shall examine into the circumstances and probable income of the Domestic Missions, in the same way as in respect to Circuits, and suggest the amount that should be appropriated for the support or assistance of such Missions.

CHAIRMEN AND DOMESTIC MISSIONS.

Resolved—That the Chairmen of Districts forward to the General Superintendent of Missions, the amounts recommended by the several September Financial District Meetings for the Domestic Missions, as soon as practicable, after the close of each meeting.

CANDIDATES' TRIAL SERMON.

Resolved—That this Conference requires Candidates for our Ministry to preach a Trial Sermon before the District Meeting by which they are recommended, or before a Committee appointed by the District Meeting, who shall report their opinion of the sermon, and embody it in the recommendation of such candidate to the Conference.

CONFERENCE ARRANGEMENTS.

Resolved—That the President of the Conference, the Chairman of the District, and the Superintendent of the Circuit where the Conference is to be held, shall be a Committee to arrange the religious services of the Annual Conference.

Ques. XXII. Where and when shall our next Conference be held?

Answer. In the City of Quebec, on the first Wednesday in June, 1863, at Nine o'clock, A.M.

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THE ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

CONFERENCE

TO THE

MEMBERS OF THE CHURCH UNDER ITS CARE.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN.

The Thirty-ninth Annual Session of our Conference reminds us of the accustomed duty of offering you our christian salutations and counsels. But while in this our epistle we hold fast the form of sound words. we desire that we may mutually be stirred up in the pursuit of spiritual things, which should ever be the object sought, in the use of whatever means Christianity sanctions. We bring to you no new revelation of truths, but that which ye have received from the beginning, To write the same things to you, to us indeed it is not grievous, but for you it is safe, and salutary, if received as a means of spiritual improvement. Suffer us then to review the past, and exhort you again for the future, to gird up the loins of your mind, and, by a renewed plighting of your vows to be the servants of Him who has called you to his kingdom and grace, seek so to fulfil the part assigned you, that you may at last obtain the reward of the faithful.

We give thanks to God who rules over the kingdoms of the earth, that our country has been preserved from the evils of war. The portentous cloud which at one time seemed to hang over our land, was speedily dis-

persed, and He who sitteth upon the circle of the earth, so controlled the passions of men, and guided the counsels of rulers, as to turn aside the threatened catastrophe of an armed conflict between two Christian nations. We devoutly recognize in this happy result, the answer to the effectual fervent prayer of the righteous. "Some trust in horses, and some in chariots, but we will trust in the name of the Lord: and whatever may be the apparent sufficiency of our military resources, we maintain as our shield and watchword, that "wisdom and knowledge is the stability of our times, and the strength of salvation: the fear of the Lord is our treasure."

Permit us again to remind you, dear brethren, that the chief end, and solemn import of our church relations and associations, is the promotion of spiritual religion in our own hearts, and its extension in subduing the world to Christ. The followship of the saints is the bond of our union, and the secret impulse of the Church's aggressive power. The spiritual life within pervading every part, must prepare its members for the exhibition of the activities of a purified nature, showing themselves without in such forms and modes of operation, as shall both impress and attract those who have not yet come within the circle from which the spiritual influence emanates. "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven."

The great end of the ministry is the conversion of souls. If this result does not follow our labours, we may well take up the discouraging inquiry: "Who hath believed our report." It will avail us little, that we have attracted large congregations, that multitudes are pleased with our ministry, praise our sermons, and manifest the highest regard for our persons and office. The peace and prosperity of our churches, in external things, may be preserved, and their numbers increased, and yet all this is as nothing in the accomplishment of the real work, nothing for God's glory, and nothing for

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our own ultimate and glorious reward, unless believers are edified, and the Lord add unto his church such as are saved. What we effect through the grace of God, in the conversion of the soul at first, and in carrying on that work to its full and final completion, and that only, will abide the test of the ordeal of fire, and be the crown of our rejoicing in the day of the Lord Jesus."

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But while we recognize the preaching of the Gospel by a living ministry, as the chief instrumentality amongst the agencies of the church, we would not fail to remind you of your relations and duties. As of old. the word preached may fail of its intended effect, not being mixed with faith in those who hear it. A spiritual ministry, and a saved, sanctified people, are essential to a true representation of the visible body of Christ. Hence the duties which your relations involve, are as binding and important in the sphere of your calling, as those of the minister in his; and if neglected or buried talents involve guilt in the one case, so also will unfaithfulness in the other, incur the displeasure of the righteous Judge in the day of final awards. Do not therefore hastily conclude when Zion languishes and the world around you remains unsaved, that all the fault lies above and beyond the limits of your own individual responsibility. Be candid, and faithful to your own youls in searching out the causes of spiritual dearth and abounding impenitence, even though it result in a conviction of your own short comings and unfulfilled responsibilities. The end approaches, and the Judge is at the door.

Permit us, dear brethren, to admonish you of some of the hindrances to your spirituality and usefulness. The Apostle warns the churches to which he wrote, that "thepride of life, is not of the Father, but is of the world." One of the forms in which the effect of a worldly influence is seen, is in the effort to heap up riches, in violation of the Saviour's command. The enjoyment of worldly good, in its proper sense, is one part of the promised inheritance of the saints, and is a blessing only when received as a talent given by the Lord of all, and held in trust for the Master's use. But "they that will be rich, fail into temptation, and a snare, and into many foolish and hurtful lusts, which drown men in destruction and perdition." Human nature has not changed since Moses admonished the Lord's people, to beware, lest their hearts be lifted up when their herds and flocks, and their silver and their gold, and all their substance were multiplied. "And thou say in thine heart, my power and the might of mine hand hath gotten me this wealth. But thou shalt remember the Lord thy God: for it is he that giveth thee power to get wealth, that he may establish the covenant which he sware unto

'thy fathers, as it is this day."

One of the most insidious guises under which the inordinate accumulation of wealth is sought, is for the ostensibly laudable purpose of providing a parental inheritance for children. We do not say that the desire which prompts to this is unlawful, when all the other conditions of the trust which wealth imposes, are intelligently considered and met. But to leave an inheritance to our children by robbing God of the tithes and offerings which are his right, and which he demands, is to leave them a snare and a curse, instead of a blessing. The parent who trains up his children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord, provides for their temporal wants, affords them all reasonable facilities for intellectual culture, and prepares them for some useful and lawful employment, has performed his duty, if he can do nothing beyond, without withholding the claims of the church and its benevolent agencies. And how much better the legacy left to children in the form and substance of an example of parental christian liberality, and a taste for the luxury of an equal distribution unto all commendable enterprises, than an inheritance obtained from the gains of the unfaithful steward; the corruptible riches, moth-eaten garments, and the cankered gold

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and silver, the rust of which shall be a condemning witness and consuming fire! As watchmen upon the walls we thus admonish you in words of divine inspiration. We rejoice in your temporal prosperity, in your smiling fields and well-stored garners, in your commercial success, and the rewards of your professional and mechanical skill and diligence; but we remind you that the Lord who giveth thee power to get wealth, lays all under tribute, and will establish his covenant with you only while that tribute is cheerfully rendered.

Another evil of the present times, is a tendency on the part of Christians to an undue intimacy with the We fear that the association of believers with the ungodly in social assemblies, is becoming unhappily more common and frequent than is conducive to the spiritual improvement of the one, or the salvation of the other. "Be ye separate from the world," is the Divinecommand. The neglect of this admonitory caution brings a snare. The world must be pleased, and the society of christians rendered acceptable by a careful avoidance of such conversation as is distasteful to an unrenewed nature. This leads to the cultivation of false tastes, the singing of such songs, and the adoption of other modes of social amusement which do not minister to godliness. Beware of the chilling and deadening influence of these associations. Abstain from the appearance of evil; and by the exhibition of a holy, self-denying zeal, and cheerful piety, seek to be the lights of the world, and the salt of the earth.

The last census of this Province furnishes a most significant answer to the question, what hath God wrought through the instrumentality of Methodism? having attained the first place in the number of its adherents, amongst the Protestant Churches of Canada. Let the success of the past incite to more earnest efforts that God, even our God, may bless us, and make us a thou-

sand times as many as we are,

The review of the past year furnishes reasons both

for humiliation and gratitude. Souls have been saved and the returns from the various Circuits and Missions show a nett increase in our membership of S41. The various connexional funds have received an increasingly liberal support. We have peace in our borders.

Our annual Conference has been one of unusual interest. We are more than ever determined to deal faithfully with each other, and to aim at the attainment of that "agreement in the faith and knowledge of God, and to that ripeness and perfectness of age in Christ, that there shall be no place left amongst us, either for error in religion, or viciousness in life." Will you, dear brethren, unite with us in our prayers to God for each other and for yourselves, that the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ may abound in all riches unto the full assurance of faith. To this end be diligent in the use of all the means provided for your edification and spiritual quickening.

During the past year one of our aged ministers has passed away to his reward, and died in the full triumphs

of the faith he had long preached to others.

And now, brethren, we exhort you to renewed earnestness in seeking whatsoever is pure, and lovely, and of good report; and by the cordial welcome of those who are sent to you in the name of the Lord, and by a faithful co-operation with them in all the enterprises of our church, seek to perfor n your part in building the temple of the Lord; that when the top-stone is brought forth, we may together join with the multitude of the redeemed, in shouting grace, grace unto it."

THE ANSWER

OF THE

BRITISH CONFERENCE

TO THE

ADDRESS OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CONFERENCE
IN CANADA.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN.

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We have received your affectionate Address with great pleasure, and desire to reciprocate the sentiments of esteem and love which it contains.

United by the ties of race and kindred, and sharing with you the blessings of the British Constitution, (the value of which becomes increasingly apparent as the progress of events presents aspects of unparalleled and ever increasing interest,) we gratefully recognize the still higher bonds of Christian affection and holy love. Holding as we do, "the form of sound words," and rejoicing in the spiritual life and power which accompany the truth, we feel that we are one with you in Christ Jesus,—

"Indissolubly join'd in heart."

We assemble in circumstances which call forth devout thanks to the God of all grace. The great Head of the church has indeed "made us glad according to the days whereinhe had afflicted us, and the years wherein we had seen evil." The visitations of the Holy Spirit have been unusually rich and abundant. In many places where the spiritual husbandman had long been called to "sow in tears," amid sterility and discouragement, indications of fertility and beauty meet the eye; while scenes which recall the "great awakenings" in the early part of the eighteenth century, and are not unworthy of the apostolic age, are by no means unfrequent. We

have the pleasure of reporting an increase of 9,471 members in Great Britain, with 23,271 on trial; and in Ireland, of 691 members, with 941 on trial. In this we feel assured, you will be sharers in our joy; and we hail with equal gladness the intelligence of growing prosperity which you are privileged to transmit. May they prove the harbingers of that day when the whole earth shall be

filled with the glory of our Redeemer!

We greatly rejoice in your extending field of enterprise. Your labours in the Hudson's Bay, in British Columbia. in your Domestic, Missions; and also among the French population of Lower Canada, we regard with much interest,-as tending to consolidate and perpetuate alike the blessings of constitutional government and of spiritual religion. Nor can we withold the expression of our gratification, that, among the other objects of your pastoral attention, the emigrants from Germany- "the fatherland of the Reformation"-have not escaped attention. It will afford you pleasure to learn that our own Mission to that interesting country is now re-enforced under the most favourable auspices. May Germany, released from the errors which have so long impeded her spiritual progress, and which have exercised their baneful influence far beyond the country from whence they sprang, soon emancipate herself from their toils, and prove herself worthy of the honoured names inscribed upon the page of the churches history !

The sentiments we expressed in our last communication, on the intimate connection which should ever exist between religious and secular learning, are only intensified by the result of observation, and the progress of events. To all educational schemes which exclude the distinctive truths and precepts of Christianity, we trust you will with us ever offer a respectful but firm resis-

tance.

We rejoice in the provision you are making for the education of the children of our more influential friends; and shall be happy to learn that you have been enabled to secure for Victoria College that degree of attention

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Like you, we have to mourn the departure of several of our revered fathers and brethren; and during the sittings of the Conference we have been called to follow to their final resting place the remains of our honoured father, the Rev. Samuel Jackson. He had been privileged to take part in our earlier sessions; and his unexpected removal was felt to be deeply solemn and monitory. His many virtues deserve to be affectionately commemorated. His fidelity in the season of Connexional trial, his eminent ability as a Minister, and especially his life-long concern for the spiritual interests of our youth and the cause of religious education, will long enshrine his memory in our affections. His honoured brother, our venerable Theological Tutor at Richmond,-mellow in piety, and mature in wisdom, retires from the public duties he has long and efficiently discharged, -followed to his more private circle by the most affectionate regards of many who love our Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity.

But "instead of the fathers" are "the children." We have set apart by solemn ordination forty candidates for our home ministry, whom we regard as likely to become "workmen who need not to be ashamed," and "good Ministers of Jesus Christ;"-while more than fifty have been received on trial, as probationers for the

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We have been favoured with the especial presence of our common Lord in our sittings, while our public services have been attended by large multitudes of spiritual worshippers. "The Lord of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our refuge." Never were we more fully resolved to hold and proclaim the doctrines so prominently displayed in the ministry of our fathers. We desire to preach them in our primitive mode, avoiding the speculative refinements of the present age. Nor de we doubt that now, as heretofore, the Great Head of the Church will give testimony to the word of His grace.

We are not surprised to learn how valuable have been the services of your beloved President, and the honoured brethren to whom you refer. Our prayer is, that their lives and services may be prolonged. We regret that we were not favoured with the presence of the Rev. G. R. Sanderson, whom we should have been glad to hail as your Representative. It gives us pleasure to accede to your request that the Rev. Dr. Stinson be appointed President of your next Conference, with the Rev. James Musgrove as Co-Delegate; and with equal pleasure we consent to the continuance of the Rev. Dr. Wood in the important and responsible office of General Superintendent of Missions.

We are now about to separate under growing convictions of deep responsibility to our Divine Master; and, as we/trust, resolved to labour devoutly, humbly, and in the spirit of prayerful dependence on His promised aid. The times in which we live possess no common significance. The hosts of truth and of error are marshalled on a scale of unprecedented extent, and the battle waxes more fierce. Of the issue we entertain no fear. If the prophecies of the holy writ are not a fable, and if the moral government of the universe is a reality, then "the kingdoms of this world" shall ultimately "become the kingdoms of our God, and of His Christ; and he shall reign for ever and ever."

In prospect of that day, let us quit ourselves like men, prove worthy of the name we bear, and live with habitual reference to the goal we hope to reach, and the prize we trust to gain.

We present our warmest expressions of fraternal regard; and pray that the God of our fathers may make you a thousand times as many more as you are, and bless you even as He hath promised.

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ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE

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OF THE

WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH IN CANADA,

IN CONNEXION WITH THE BRITISH CONFERENCE,

TO THE

CONFERENCE IN ENGLAND.

REV. AND DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

Your admirable reply to the address of this Conference was read by us with profound solemnity, and with mingled feelings of sorrow and gladness. Rejoicing always in that which gives you joy, we have experienced griefs at this time peculiarly our own. It has pleased Almighty God to prostrate with severe affliction the beloved brother who has been our President for four years past, and whose continuance in that responsible office had received your cordial approbation. You will sympathize with us in this our painful position, and you will readily perceive the reasons why most earnest and sincere supplications ascended to the throne of grace, that in this distressing emergency we might receive divine direction for remedying or diminishing the evils arising from an unforescen calamity. Looking for the gracious aid of him, "by whom we have received grace and apostleship," and recurring to the provisions of the discipline, we have believed ourselves, for the first time since our present happy affiliation with you, shut up to the necessity of electing a President. You will receive it as a proof of our unabated confidence in one whom you have so frequently delighted to honour, when we state that our choice has fallen on the Rev. Enoch Wood, D.D., for, many years the General Superintendent of our Missions, and whom we again desire may continue to occupy that

most onerous and responsible office.

With almost prophetic foresight, referring to our mutual possession of the "blessings of the British Constitution," you have said "the value of which becomes increasingly apparent as the progress of events presents aspects of unparalleled and ever-increasing interest." This is most evident under existing circumstances. While a fierce and bloody civil war is raging in the neighbouring republic, we are living "under our own vine and fig tree" peacefully and securely. When the rights and integrity of the nation were threatened, and there existed a probability of invasion, the right arm of England was stretched forth for our protection, and appreciating the promptitude and energy of British Statesmen, the loyal Wesleyans of Canada in conjunction with all classes of Her Majesty's subjects rallied to the standard of England. By the beneficent providence of God, international conflict was averted. The fervent prayers of Christians prevailed.

In the midst of fearful forebodings and anxieties, there came the sudden and saddening intelligence, that death had entered your palaces. Projecting plans of usefulness for the nation which he loved, and executing deeds of benevolence designed for all classes and many nations, the good and wise Prince Consort was removed from earth, by an inscrutable but all-wise providence. With the sorrow of our ever-loved and widowed Queen we mingled our tears and prayers. In the great and unprecedented grief of the national heart, Canadians fully shared. Nevertheless we how submissively to him who ruleth over all, and most earnestly pray that God may sanctify to the whole nation the afflictions which

have been endured.

You will appreciate the motives which have led us to

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refer to national events of recent occurrence, but you may be assured that the interests and prosperity of the Church of Christ are most dear to us, and therefore in your growing strength and religious progress we heartily rejoice. Distinguished and venerable fathers are called to their reward, yet the ranks of the ministry are unbroken-thousands of members are annually joining the church triumphant in heaven-yet through the power of the Holy Ghost accompanying the word of Christ the church militant augments its numbers and aggressive power against the kingdom of darkness and sin. are not exempt from the dangers of negative theology and speculative error to which you have referred, but we hold fast "the form of sound words," and have "determined to know nothing among men save Jesus Christ and him crucified," and "have hope toward God" that according to your prayer, he will make us a thousand times more than we are.

While the whole world seems to be in a state of agitation and change, which more or less effects our own country both religiously and politically, we are increasingly convinced of the truth, excellency, and power of the gospel of Christ. The heathen may rage and the people imagine a vain thing-restless and speculative minds may greatly disturb those who cannot be deceived; but we too, are, by calm conviction assured that the blessed Gospel of Christ as expounded by our fathers, and contained in our standard writings, is not only the safeguard of our own church, but the only ground of hope for a lost and deluded world. We rejoice to perceive in the Christian Catholic Church, what appears to us to be a growing unanimity of faith in the personality-presence and power of the Holy Ghost. We have joined the whole church on earth in earnest prayer for the outpouring of the Spirit; God has heard prayer, and we have shared in the fulfillment of the gracious promise, "I will pour my spirit upon thy seed, and my blessing upon thine offspring; and they shall spring up as among

the grass, as willows by the water courses." The aggregate increase of our Church in Canada is not as great as we had desired and prayed for. We have cause for humiliation before God, and have resolved with more zeal and fidelity to prosecute the blessed work of saving souls, by those means divinely appointed, "for we are not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth."

The total of our membership this year is 50,341, last year 48,281, being an increase of 2,060; but there is reported a decrease of those on trial, 1,219, making the aggregate increase 841. You will be gratified to learn that the Sabbath School department of our work has received the zealous attention of the ministry and members of the church. We have an increase of 2,538 scholars in our schools, the grand total this year being 38,711, of whom 1,379 are reported as meeting in class. The officers and teachers connected with 677 schools number 5,884, and great care is taken to protect our youth against pernicious doctrines and vicious literature, by the use of our Wesleyan Catechisms, and the selection of suitable books for our libraries.

In addition to the successful prosecution of our educational work in Victoria College, we are glad to state that during the past year, there has been opened in the city of Hamilton an institution of great importance for the religious education of the daughters of Canada. "The Wesleyan Female College, Hamilton," is founded substantially on the same principles as the Wesleyan College, Sheffield. Although recently established, the prospects of success and usefulness are highly encouraging, and, we are persuaded that this additional evidence of the growing power of Methodism in Canada will afford you much satisfaction. You will with us see the importance and necessity of multiplying and cherishing institutions of learning for both sexes, under the influence and control of Methodism, when we inform you that by the recent census of the Province, it is certain

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that Methodism is numerically stronger than any other Protestant denomination in Canada.

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To God we give thanks that our esteemed brother the Rev. Henry Wilkinson, the Co-Delegate of this Conference has been restored to health. Last Conference he was unable to be present for the fulfillment of his duties, but God having raised him up he has rendered essential service to the Church during the serious and protracted affliction of our beloved President.

With very great unanimity the Conference recommends, as President of our next Conference, the Rev. Anson Green, D.D. Dr. Green is well known to you by reason of his frequent official relations, as between ourselves and your own body, chiefly in effecting the happy union which now exists between us. For these, and the general reasons of suitable qualifications, we respectfully desire his appointment as President.

The Rev. John Carroll, has been nominated Co-Delegate of the President for the next year. His ardent piety, ministerial ability, eminent success, and affectionate spirit, have distinguished him for many years, and entitled him to the confidence of his brethren. We commend him to your notice, as worthy of the office for which he is thus designated.

Of the six valued brethren who were sent from England to our assistance in 1834, three yet survive. But only one of these now remains in the effective ranks of the ministry, namely, the Reverend John Douse. The Conference with great cordiality appoints him its Representative to the next approaching British Conference, and respectfully desires that the Rev. William Arthur, M.A., may be associated with him in that capacity. REV. AND DEAR BRETHREN,

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It affords us much pleasure once more to convey to you our Christian congratulations and fraternal salutations.

It has been to us a source of great satisfaction to learn from our Deputation which visited your last Conference, of the hearty and cordial welcome with which they were greeted, and of the kind attentions which they received from Ministers and people during their sojourn among them. We were especially delighted to hear of the successes and prosperity, in the great work of caltivating the vineyard of our Blessed Redeemer, of which they witnessed so many and so cheering eviden-We were not less pleased to learn from them concerning the interest which you feel, and the exertions · you are making in reference to the great and important subject of Education-Education based upon Christian principles, and therefore combining, at the same time, the culture of the intellect and the sanctification of the heart. We cannot too strongly express the emotions of satisfaction and joy we have felt in being favoured with the opportunity of welcoming in our midst two of the distinguished members of your deputation to our Conference, the Rev. Charles Churchill, A. M., your Book Steward and Editor, and the Rev. John Allison, A.M.,

Principal of your Female Academy. We had to regret the brief sojourn of these eminent servants of God among us, and will long retain a remembrance of the pleasing and profitable influences produced by their able and eloquent addresses and spiritual ministrations. Your answer to our Addresses received through them, was heard with deepest attention by the Conference, and produced in our minds feelings of devout thankfulness to the Source of all, good for the encouraging and delightful

intelligence which it furnished.

One circumstance, however, could not but produce saddened impressions, the absence from the Conference of the senior member of our Deputation, and to which your address makes such gratifying allusion. Our beloved brother, the Rev. Dr. Stinson, is by an inscrutable but all-wise Providence prevented from meeting with us in our present annual assembly. Although there are many barren wastes intervening between the outskirts of our respective fields, we will pray and labour on, scattering the seed of life, and making yearly inroads upon these several desolations, until we shall meet each other in the progress of our glorious toil, and are enabled to rejoice together as we witness them changed and beautiful as "the garden of the Lord."

"Grace be to you, and peace from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ. Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ who hath blessed us with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ." We pray the gracious guardianship of our Heavenly Father may be over you and the people committed to your care, and that the approaching session of your Conference may be one of great cordiality, holy fellowship, and richest blessing.

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN.

We greet you as brethren in the Lord. Your christian and fraternal letter was received by us with much joy and satisfaction, and we join in giving thanks to our common Lord and master who made us one in Him at the first, and has preserved us hitherto in the unity of the same faith and fellowship. Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who hath blessed us with all spiritual blessings, and has made

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manifest the savor of His grace through us.

It gives us unfeigned pleasure to remember that through the link supplied by our earlier history, an indissoluble bond of connection is formed between the Wesleyans of Canada, and the Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States, and it is our ardeut wish that this ancestral bond may never be weakened. It appeared providential that we should be ecclesiastically separate, but this offers no bar or impediment to the spiritual union of those whom God hath so significantly joined together. There live among us still, men who first brought Methodism from the States into Canada, and who, having received their appointment from Bishop Asbury, travelled from New York City to the Canada lines on horseback to reach their circuit. These few, honored fathers, still feel paternal yearnings for that

portion of the family resident within the imperial dominion, while the younger brethren early learn to sym-

pathize in the same feelings.

We have learned with heartfelt gratitude to God of your prosperity, and your delegates, the Rev. Dr. Stinson and Rev. Asahel Hurlburt, who were welcomed by us, gave us interesting accounts of your state, and that the hand of the Lord was with you for good. May the Lord still go before you, and the God of Jacob be your reward, and may He make you a thousand times so numerous as ye are, and fulfil in you all the good pleasure of His goodness, and the work of faith with power. We shall always be glad to hear from you, and to receive your messengers, as we were glad to receive those honored brethren who have visited us during our present session.

Of our own state our delegates, whom we have appointed to bear this message, will more fully inform you. The Lord hath done great things for us, whereof we are glad yet our work seems but just begun. We have now a membership, including probationers, of 974,345; served by 6,877 itinerant ministers. We have 9,305 church edifices, estimated to be worth \$18,822,640. In our educational work, we have 103 Colleges and Seminaries, containing above 51,616, students, and of an estimated property value of over \$3,000,000. Our Sunday Schools number 732,592 scholars, cared for by 139,299 laborers in that department. We have a copious and well supervised Sunday School literature, in books, periodicals, and tracts and requisites; our Sunday School book catalogue alone numbering 1,100 different volumes, while our Sunday School Advocate has a circulation of 200,000. Our Book Concern in New York and Cincinnatti operates upon a capital of nearly \$800,000.

Our periodicals are quite numerous and widely circulated. We have missions in Africa, China, India, Bulgaria, and Northern Europe, numbering 305 ministers and 122,033 members, besides the important work among foreign immigrants within our own borders.

These are but general facts indicating the compass and magnitude and varied range of our great and glorious system of evangelism. We should also state that we have two Biblical Institutions in successful operation, one with an estimated property of \$250,000, and the

other with over \$30,000.

We speak not these things with vain glory, but to suggest the instrumentalities, the enterprises, and we may add with solemn emphasis, the responsibilities, of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States. In all this great trust it is our greatest desire, as stewards, to be found faithful. Our country has had a brief, but wonderful history, and Methodism suits the genius of our Government and our people well, because it adapts itself to human nature and the real wants of society, and has a practical hand for all labor. They glory in it, and in the mighty achievements which have been wrought through it by the power of God. In all outward prosperity we are striving to hold to the old land-marks, as set up by the holy Apostles, and by our Methodist ancestors.

And now brethren, farewell. We commend you to God and the word of His grace. We exhort you brethren to "stand fast, and hold the traditions which ye have been taught" by the holy servants of God, and to preserve alive that system of doctrine and policy which And after having faithfully bears our common name. served our generation and fulfilled the will of God on earth, may we meet as fellow laborers in the kingdom and patience of Jesus Christ to receive our common reward in the glorious kingdom of our one Lord and Savior, to whom be glory and dominion world without end. Amen.
