"What is the trouble between your people and the American fishermen?" I asked of a merchant with whom I was in conversation. "The trouble is not that way," he replied. "We like them and they like us. The trouble is between our Government and the American fishermen?" Further inquiries among the fishermen of Buy of Islands falled to reveal anything but the most friendly feelings towards Gloucester skippers and their crews. In fact, I received positive assurance from the Government magistrate, Mr. Bartlett, that the Americans are considerably more popular among the Newfoundland fishermen than are their own kinsmen who resort to the Bay of Islands from Nova Scotia and other British possessions. The Americans are more hospitable towards the native fishermen, they generally treat the workmen better and pay more liberally for the fish.

The fall herring fishery of Newfoundland begins about the middle of October and lasts until the bays freeze over, which is usually near the first of the year. The fishery is carried on by means of nets by native fishermen from the vicinity of Bay of Islands, Bay St. George, Bonne Bay and other settlements on the western coast of the island. Under the law the herring may be admitted to this country duty free if brought in in American bottoms. MEDICAL INSPECTION IN SCHOOLS.

At the annual convention of the Canadian Medical Association in Toronto the medical inspection of school children was one of the questions of public interest which came up for discussion. While in some respects children in Canada are better cared for than in the crowded cities of Europe and the United States, there is no doubt that a medical inspection would disclose conditions which would justify its adoption.

A report of the medical inspection of British public schools, while it should not be taken as a criterion, presents many interesting features. The work of over 1,100 medical inspectors has shown that even bodily cleanliness of the children is neglected. In Bradford, only 30 of 1,000 pupils were clean, when the first in spections was made years ago. Recent inspections show great improvement, but even today nearly 200 in each thousand appear to be strangers to soop and water. In some of the rural districts many of the girls have unclean heads; and of the 900,000 pupils of London 16,000 are verminous.

The condition of English school children's eyes is better than that of the children of some other countries, yet about 19 per cent. meed the care of an oculist, while 5 per cent. suffer from ear troubles.

DEATH TAKES ONE OF CITY'S BEST SCHOLARS

Dr. W. P. Dole Passed Away on Saturday After Five Months Illness--Was in His

P., at home. One sister, Mrs. Wm. Spiller of Waterville, Maine, also survives him.

Dr. Doyle, who was born in St. John of loyalist descent, was educated in private schools here, and at the Kings College at Fredericton, now the University of New Brunswick. He graduated from that institution with honors, winning the Douglas medal for excellence in English composition. After leaving college he studied law in the office of the late Chief Justice Ritchie, was called to the bar, and practised at his profession for a time. But he had a strong bent for educational work, and in 1870, in association with the late Dr. Hutchinson, Thomas Stothart and Wm. McLean, now inspector of public schools, he opened a private school in this city. Later when the free public school system was organized he taught for a while in the city schools and was for a number of years school inspector for the district.

He was also for a time civil service examiner for the district of St. John. Of late years he hás conducted a private school which has enjoyed an enviable reputation for the quality of instruction it furnished young people.

Dr. Doyle was one of the foremost classical scholars of the Maritime Provinces, and a poet and essayist of distinction. His essays, many of which were published in American magazines, showed ripe scholarship, rich culture, and a fine command of style; while his original poems, and metrical translations from Anacreon, Horace and the French classical writers, earned him many eulogies. His ode on the jubilee of Queen Victoria, probably one of the best evoked by the occasion in this country, will long be remembered for the nobility of its conception and the beauty of its style.

Mr. Dole was a regular contributor to Stewart's Quarterly, a St. John publication that enjoyed a brilliant, if not very lengthy career. He also wrote numerous articles, and fugitive poems for the St. John Globe, the Telegraph and other periodicals.

As a teacher of the classics, Mr. Dole had few superiors, and his kindly disposition, and painstaking zeal, endeared him to all the pupils who attended his school and enjoyed the benefit of his tuition.

SAYS WE DON'T NEED THE SUNDAY MAILS

Secretary of Lord's Day Alliance Declares Proposes Opening of Post Office on Sabbath is Unnecessary

order as good as that of Winniper, into the Yukon and Dawson City, where formerly disorder and tumult reigned.

Referring to the recent action of the postoffice department in opening, or attempting to open the St. John postoffice, Mr. Hannah said that in the west on account of the springing up of new and thinly settled districts, postoffices had been kept open on Sunday. The alliance however, seeing the extra tax it put on all postmen and maling clerks agitated against it and now from Manitoba to the Pacific coast only those offices situated in the sparsely populated far north remain open. It had been claimed that convenience and a closely crowded population demanded a Sunday mail service at St. John, "Why is it then," he said, "that Toronto and Montreal, cities of over a quarter of a million population, do not demand it?"

Mr. Hannah stated further that in his opinion, policemen and fishermen should obtain rest on the Lord's Day. The alliance had secured so far the freedom from toil for 24 hours in the week of 100,000 toilers out of 150,000 who had had to work the whole seven days, and were gradually working toward setting free the rest.

"The methods of the alliance," said the speaker, "have frequently been bitterly complained of on the ground of their severity. The real case was quite different. Of those reported to central office, 98 per cent, were settled by correspondence, only 2 by force. These 2 per cent, consisted mostly of corporations, impelled by greed. Yet they were all given a fair chance before the law was called in. The alliance was rather too lenient than otherwise. The speaker closed with the statement that in the matter of whether the day of rest was ready Saturday or Sunday, they could provide full proof to all who would apply for it as to its occurring on Sunday.
