The result of the Nova Scotia elec-  
tions, if we were to make candidates by  
the organs of both parties previous to the  
contest, is defeat for the Government.  
But, the Government being in a transi-  
tion state, its reconstruction may be ef-  
fected in such a manner as to secure a  
small majority. Some of the unemployed  
members may be given seats in the  
Cabinet, or otherwise secured. Mr. An-  
drew has a genius for crises like the  
present, and may manipulate his minor-  
ity into a slender but secure majority.  
His failure would be a proof that minor-  
ity contracts and funds had proved insuffi-  
cient. Expecting success in this particu-  
lar the organs of the Government are  
already protesting to have come out of  
the contest triumphant.

We are favored in a morning paper  
with virtuous indignation against the  
Cumberland election against Dr.  
Tupper. Had it stated that three of Dr.  
Tupper's supporters and only one of his  
opponents ran his readers would have  
seen the proper value to attach to  
Purdy's vote. The Doctor declared on  
the hustings that he had no choice be-  
tween Black and Townsend, and yet  
the choice of Black is interpreted as a  
defeat for Tupper! Hypocrisy still  
flourishes.

The triumphant passage of the grant  
asked for the Government secret service,  
in the face of the opposition made by  
the opponents of Bismarck, shows that,  
although the Reichstag may resist any  
Ministerial encroachments on the rights  
of its members, it is ready to stand by  
the national policy of Prussia. The  
assertion of its dignity, and its de-  
clared intention of defending its mem-  
bers from arrest during its sittings,  
make its endorsement of the Ministerial  
policy all the more weighty.

At the Last.  
The San Diego, Cal., World of the 4th  
inst. in an appreciative obituary notice  
of Dr. Crosby, says:  
After leaving Panama and only three  
days out, he was attacked by a violent  
cough caused from the effects of a cold  
taken en route, from the effects of which  
he never recovered. Last evening, about  
six o'clock he was attacked with mem-  
orable of the lungs and only survived a  
few minutes.

The World quotes the following from  
the pen of Dr. Crosby, which was first  
published in The Independent with the  
title "At the Last":  
When I die,  
Lift not for me the mourner's sigh,  
Nor bid the bitter rain to fall,  
Let not the dark funeral pall  
Overshadow, as I pass away,  
The bright and bloom of perfect Day!  
And let no sorrowful sigh  
Nor cheer with plaintive accents,  
Recall Earth's scarce-remembered pain,  
Free and unmingled of my soul,  
Let Heaven's melodious music roll—  
No parting wail, no bitter cry,  
When I die.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 17.—An anony-  
mous communication was received by  
Mayor Stokely to-day threatening vio-  
lence if employment was not supplied for  
the starving poor, and complaining that  
Italians were working on the Centennial  
building, excluding active citizens. It  
was signed "Secret Six."

The committee of management, in con-  
nection with the Fairville lecture course  
—that have been held for the past three  
winters, feeling greatly encouraged by the  
success which has attended their  
efforts in that capacity, are holding an-  
other course of lectures this winter,  
which promises to surpass any of those  
that have preceded.—*Carlton Monthly.*

A compulsory education law is enforce-  
d in England. There is now a novel  
difficulty in London in the way of ex-  
ecuting compliance with its provisions. The  
holity pantomimes and spectacles at the  
Theatres employ a number of children,  
and the pay is six shillings a week. As  
the law for parents who do not send  
their children to school is usually but a  
shilling, they pay it when brought into  
court, as they are about once a week,  
and keep on breaking the law. Higher  
penalties are proposed.

Shipping Notes.  
Laid up.—The Govern ment cutter Bill  
(C. McLean) has been repaired and laid up  
for the winter. She has done a consid-  
erable amount of work since June last,  
having landed twenty cargoes of coals at  
the different fog wharves; supplied stores  
to the lightships along the coast; laid  
one bell buoy, carried two to Halifax,  
besides putting five spar buoys in their  
places opposite ledges in the Bay of  
Fundy.

Simpson, 814, and George K. Hatch, 385  
—both North side Cuba, at 17c.

Coastwise freights very dull, rates un-  
changed.

Two Schooners Wrecked.—A telegram  
from St. Andrews says that on Monday  
morning the schooner John Taylor went  
ashore on the northern side of the East-  
ern Wolf, and went to pieces. Part of  
the cargo was washed ashore and is piled  
on the beach. About the same time the  
schooner Allison, from Moncton for Pen-  
brooke, went ashore on the south side of  
the Eastern Wolf, and went to pieces,  
the crew narrowly escaping with their  
lives.

The G. J. Troop.—A special despatch  
from the Receiver of Wrecks at Sydney,  
says: "The communication yet with the  
wreck of the G. J. Troop. She is break-  
ing up, but all her crew are still on her,  
and also three of those who went to her  
from the shore." On account of the  
heavy snow on both sides of the strait,  
it was expected that she would be able  
to board her Thursday night or yesterday  
morning.

Ocean Race.—The ships America and  
John Bull, which sailed from San Fran-  
cisco on the 8th inst., for Liverpool, are  
both on their track, the captain of the  
former having made a bit of 81000 with  
the commander of the latter that his ship  
will be the first to reach Liverpool, and  
that he will be the first to reach the  
destination. Both are fast vessels, the  
former having made the round trip from  
Liverpool to Australia and thence to San  
Francisco in 120 running days. Both  
vessels toward our port.

Point Ledge, Dec. 19, 9 a. m.—Wind

The Court met at 11 o'clock this fore-  
noon, about thirty justices being in at-  
tendance.

The Reformatory Bill should have come  
up first, but on motion of Justice Gerow  
the consideration of it was adjourned for  
other business.

The committee in reference to the  
Bond of the County Treasurer reported  
that according to law they could not  
take a bond from the Treasurer of \$3000;  
the only bond they could take was for  
the full amount passing through his  
hands, viz., \$17,000. The clerk was in-  
structed to require bonds, after several  
justices expressed themselves as to the  
absurdity of requiring bonds of \$17,000  
from the Treasurer, when the only remu-  
neration he received was \$200.

The Special Lancaster Highway Com-  
mittee reported that they had called W.  
A. Quilton and William Gowrie before  
them, but the persons who gave the  
vouchers did not appear. The only one  
who appeared was William Campbell,  
bell who proved to be the wrong man  
and wanted a day's pay of \$1.50. They  
recommended that William Gowrie be  
discharged as he had worked himself on  
the roads and charged for the amount  
of \$83. Though the law did not authorize  
him to do work in this way still the Com-  
mittee considered the work done, and  
recommended that the amount be allow-  
ed, but Justice Mages and the other jus-  
tices charged against him. This was  
adopted.

Justice Robinson wanted an investiga-  
tion at once. The receipts had been  
called "bogus trash" and he moved the  
vouchers be returned, and the recogni-  
tances be withdrawn.

Justice Kennedy moved that the report  
be received and adopted.

Justice Baker moved that this Court  
go into the investigation of the question.  
The Committee had summoned all who  
had signed receipts to appear and they  
had refused. The motion was seconded  
by Justice Mages and carried.

A discussion then ensued as to the way  
in which the case should be investigated,  
and it was finally decided to allow those  
who had given receipts to give testimony  
under oath.

Justice Robinson was first called upon  
by having signed a receipt for \$7.50. As  
he is a Magistrate the oath was not ad-  
ministered, and he stated that the receipt  
under oath.

Justice Everett asked if this voucher  
ever came before the Committee, and if  
it was not included in the bill of costs.

Justice Baker asked when the money  
was paid Mr. Quilton, as the accounts  
appeared mixed up and it could not be  
found whether it was for '73, '78, or '74.

Justice Robinson made his explanation,  
and didn't think it fair that the Justice  
should take him up for a mistake of a  
year or two in a receipt. He made the  
correction and the receipt was admitted  
in the office of Mr. Quilton.

Samuel Cunningham, Jr., was sworn  
to testify to his receipt for \$25, on the  
16th August, 1873.

The Mayor (handing him the receipt)  
—Is that your signature?  
Cunningham—"Yes, sir."  
The Mayor—"Did you get the money?"  
Cunningham—"No, sir." (Sensation.)  
The Mayor—"What did you sign?"  
Cunningham—"Only a certificate that  
a certain amount of work was done. I  
never received the amount of money."

In answer to further inquiries he said  
that he did not read the receipt and that  
"Road Surveyor" was added after he had  
signed.

Justice Everett wished to know who  
the money was paid to. Was it in lieu of  
services rendered, or was it a proper bill  
to present to the Sessions? It was clear  
to him that it was no bill should pay.  
The receipt was not admitted.

Silas Atwood, Esq., testified to his re-  
ceipt for \$25. It was for professional ser-  
vices rendered on behalf of the Road  
Master.

William Campbell, who signed a receipt  
for \$10, and William Benton, who signed  
for \$7, were not present.

A long discussion ensued and some  
wanted the affair postponed. Mr. Quilton  
finally rose to explain. He did not  
think he had any right to bring witnesses  
before the Court. It was for professional ser-  
vices rendered on behalf of the Road  
Master.

The Recorder asked if the amount was  
charged with the work in the account  
that went before the committee. Mr.  
Quilton said it was, and a Justice dis-  
tinctly said the amount was not included.  
He moved that it be lay over until next  
meeting. Then ensued another discus-  
sion, the question being whether Mr.  
Quilton should enter into new recogni-  
tances or not.

Justice Mages moved that he should,  
and Justice Gardner seconded the mo-  
tion. On being put it was carried by a  
vote of 12 to 17.

It was moved that he be discharged on  
his own recognizance, and the motion  
was lost.

Mr. Quilton refused to give any recog-  
nizance, and said he would "go to jail."  
It was resolved that the recognizances  
should be himself for \$20 and one surety  
for the same amount.

Justice Robinson, who was Mr. Quilton's  
former surety, moved that Mr.  
Quilton be recognized in personal bonds  
to the amount of \$100 to appear. This  
artful dodge was seen through, and met  
with no favor.

On motion of Justice Kennedy, seconded  
by Justice Gleason, Mr. Quilton was  
required to give bonds, or be placed in  
the hands of the Sheriff. The bonds  
were not forthcoming, and Mr. Quilton  
was taken to jail.

The Committee on Appeals reported  
against the request of William Shives of  
Simons for a reduction of taxation.  
They recommended that Andrew Hunte-  
r's taxes be reduced from \$9 to \$5.  
Adopted.

The Committee appointed to enquire  
into the necessity for the special con-  
stantables recommended that notice be  
given them that their services would not

required after March 1st. Adopted.  
The Committee on the Metcalf claim  
recommended that the Sessions make no  
order in reference to it until a pending  
suit is settled. Adopted.

The Constable having reported that  
he was unable to arrest Thomas Burns,  
the warrant was made returnable in  
March.

Justice Gleason—"Is Hancock a const-  
able for Lancaster? If he is the war-  
rant had better be given him, as he can  
take care of most any one."

Daniel McNamee was appointed a  
constable for Simons.

Adjourned until the third Tuesday in  
January.

City Police Court.

There were six prisoners in the dock  
this morning, all charged with drunken-  
ness.

C. Anderson quietly confessed to drunk-  
ness when there was warm lodgings in  
and was fined \$4.

Charles Sears was given in charge by  
James Costigan for being drunk and  
breaking the windows of his house in
