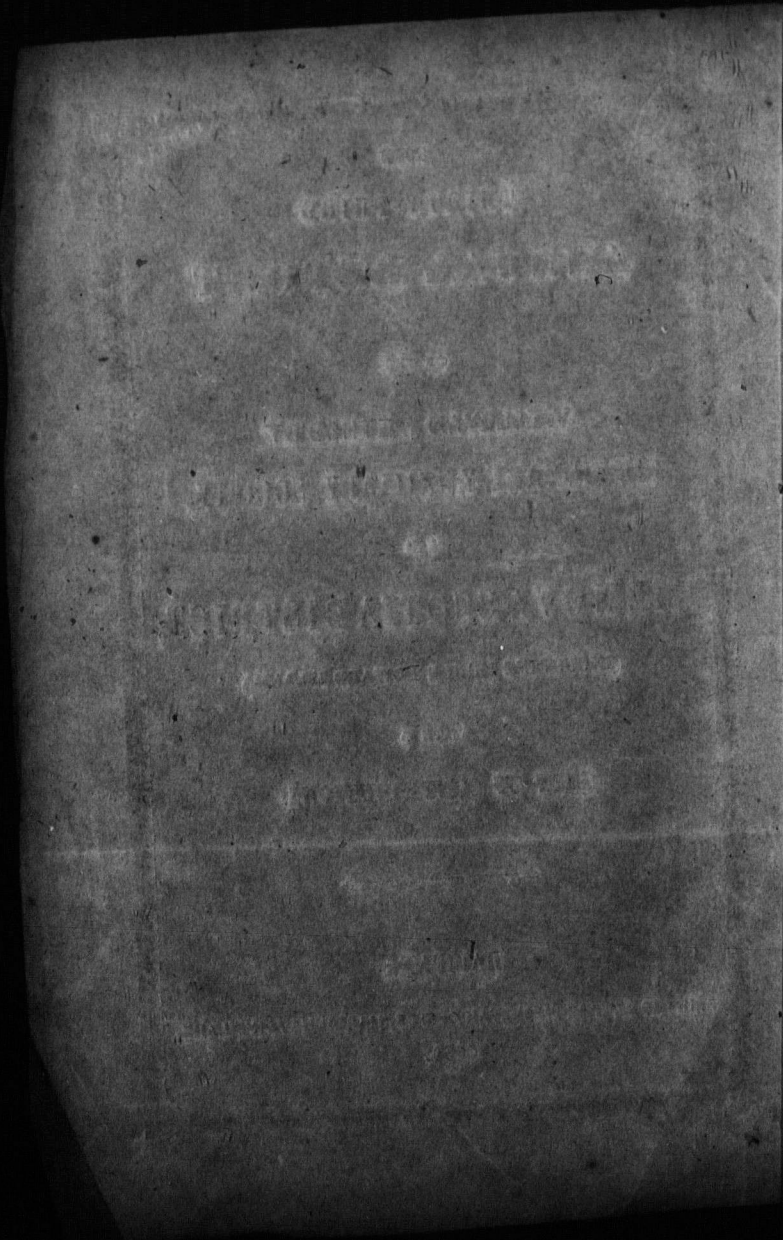

Wesleyan Methodist Missionary Auxiliary Society,
FOR NOVA-SCOTIA, CAPE BRETON, AND P. E. ISLAND.

Held at Horton, N. S., June 12th, 1850.

Rev. WM. BENNETT in the Chair.

Report read by the Rev. F. SMALLWOOD.

I. That the Report now read be adopted—and that this meeting acknowledge with devout gratitude to God the measure of success granted to this Society, and kindred institutions, during the past year.

II. That the state of the world is such, in regard to misery, degradation and irreligion, as to call loudly for the sympathy and co-operation of the Christian Church and every true philanthropist, that the gospel, which is designed to be a sovereign remedy for the ill affecting our fallen race, may be afforded them.

III. That as all human means must prove abortive, independent of the agency of the Spirit of God, we therefore agree to implore the more abundant outpouring of the Spirit on this and kindred institutions, their agents and operations, that God may be glorified in the salvation of souls, the enlargement of the church, and the universal dissemination of the Gospel of Christ.

REPORT.

NOTWITHSTANDING the recent exciting occurrences both within and without the pale of the Christian Church, the Committee of this Wesleyan Missionary Society, which is Auxiliary to the Parent Institution, are persuaded that they shall gain the attention of subscribers and friends to a plain statement of their views upon the subject of Missions in general, and also to the reasons why they call upon the Wesleyan family in *particular* to ascribe praise to the Head of the Church for His evident approval of their late operations.

The Committee regard the command which Christ delivered to His disciples, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature," as the great scriptural warrant for the Missionary enterprise; and they are strengthened in the belief of its divine origin and ultimate success by the labours and triumphs of His immediate followers who preached that gospel to the population of Palestine—to the people on the Grecian Islands—to those in the southern portions of Europe—and likewise to others in the various parts of the widely extended Roman dominions. But few in number, and destitute of the influence which wealth, station, and political ascendancy bestow, they went to the task of the world's conversion without the aids of human learning and secular authority, and although the opposition they encountered was united and active, and the scorn of their foes deep and bitter, yet, Judaism in many places submitted to Christian precepts—the public authorities of Pagan states saw the religion of the cross—in spite of edicts, persecutions and calamities spread nearly all over the civilized world, until in the beginning of the fourth century it was publicly recognised as the religion of the Roman Empire.

The conviction of the Committee that it is the duty of Christians to promulgate their religion on account of its early *triumph* over opposing forces, and which they regard as a strong evidence of its heavenly origin, is in our day sought to be neutralized by some of the most insidious champions of infidelity,—who tell us that Mohammedanism on that ground has an equal claim to belief and support. But although the assumed rapid diffusion of both systems is urged as a point of similarity, all beside are obviously complete contrasts. Christianity was introduced in the most enlightened—enquiring—and philosophic period of the world,—and has always had its home in the bosom of enterprise, wealth, science and civilization; and is at present most powerful among the nations possessing the greatest amount of knowledge and refinement. Mohammedanism took its rise amid the corruption and decay of the Christian faith, in a period of darkness, among a remote people, and when there was no established religion at Mecca either to canvass its claims or oppose its progress. The founder of the one had no family influence to plead, the other could boast an honourable descent, and an ample fortune acquired by marriage; the one enjoined chastity in heart, life, and conversation, the other made proselytes by giving a license to sensual indulgence; the one deprecated violence, and taught men to love their enemies, the other appealed to the sword, and carved a way, by its means, to a local and temporary ascendancy. Yet, the faith of the one took possession of many a heart during the

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days of His personal ministry, and now Christianity is rising with the march of science, and progress of liberty, as vessels rise with the swell of the tidal flood, while for ten years Islamism advanced by a slow and painful progress, only within the walls of Mecca, and now holds its adherents, by teaching that the sword is the key to a voluptuous paradise on the other side of death.

But while your Committee regard the early subversion of idolatry by the agency of the gospel as a corroboration of its being the ordination of God,—they look upon the various promises found in the Bible of its final triumph, as being from God *also*; and which must therefore be fulfilled, when the Church shall sue Him at the throne of grace on His own bond. If the word grew and was multiplied when it had to struggle against gigantic and pervasive systems of error, they believe that modern idolatry and superstition will be overthrown by the same means, and its advocates silenced, because they are not more hearty in their adhesion to these systems than the priests at Lystra were, at one time, attached to the service of Jupiter, or the craftsmen at Ephesus to the superstition of Diana.

This assurance that Christianity shall yet be the religion of all nations has impelled to action at different periods many who have held important offices in the Church, though *destitute* of a vital godliness. From her origin through all the dark ages down to the eighth century, (which was the maturity of anti-christ) the zeal of the Church led its members to prosecute the work of evangelisation to remote nations. Hence in the beginning of the sixth century, Gregory sent Missionaries to Britain to convert the people to the faith of Christ. Pantenus cheerfully relinquished the pleasures of civilized society to preach the Gospel to the half enlightened inhabitants of India. Frumentias, who had been taken a prisoner, and made a slave in Abyssinia, brought in the decline of his days "Ethiopia to stretch out her hands to the Lord." Iberia learned the theory of our religion from a pious woman who had been carried from her home in a marauding excursion. Boniface was engaged in publishing redemption to the Pagan population of Northern Germany, when he was treacherously murdered by those for whose welfare he toiled, and at a somewhat later period than this, attempts were made to propagate Christianity in Tartary, China, and the Islands of the Indian seas.

With the earliest maritime discoveries of the Portuguese, a passion was cherished to convert the heathen,—indulgences were granted to those who conquered pagan and infidel countries,—and even Columbus was strongly urged to the discovery of this continent, by a desire to disseminate among its tribes the religion of Rome. But the work of converting the heathen to a corrupt Christianity, was undertaken and prosecuted in that barbarous spirit which is peculiar to the system. The sword was the most efficient instrument employed in this boasted diffusion of religion. Conquest, and the gathering of the nations to Christ, were terms almost synonymous; an exchange of images was regarded as the evidence of regeneration; and a love of consecrated toys was to the Missionary a demonstration that the Pagan had obtained the love of God. Yet these unjustifiable methods, resorted to by the adherents of a spurious religion, with crusades, inquisitions, and jesuitism, do not invalidate the argument in favour of Christianity arising out of its early triumphs.

The slumbers of the Church were at length broken, and its darkness dispelled, by the light of the Reformation, and now the truth as it is in Jesus again shone forth in all its strength and beauty. But the Gospel which Paul preached, and the Reformation which Wickliff and Luther attempted, had to maintain a desperate conflict with the principles of Romanism, and as the religion of Protestants is hostile to depravity in the heart, and vicious indulgence in

the life, it was too frequently rejected; while that which sends the criminal for pardon to human tribunals, and sells a license to transgress for pieces of silver, was generally preferred by those around its ancient seat, and embraced in heathen lands.

The sixteenth century was about to close, ere the advocates of Protestantism could respond to the Macedonian cry which about that time was lifted up in various portions of the world. The opposition which they had to encounter in their own localities was earnest and protracted, leaving them neither the leisure to contemplate the necessities of the race, nor the means of sending the bread of life to barbarous shores. Inaction, however, was no longer to be tolerated, and enlightened herself by the Gospel of God, the Church of the Reformers aspired to the glory of extending the instrument of her own illumination to the regions beyond. Geneva boasts the first Protestant Missionary society, and by the successes of her agents in South America, she proved to the Churches the probability of conquest, should they begin again to act upon the aggressive principle. And now to North America, to the Islands of the Caribbean sea, to India, and to the shores of Africa, Missionaries were sent, and societies were formed for their support and augmentation.

The first Missionaries employed by the Wesleyan Conference were appointed to this Continent, and the Church they formed now numbers its Ministers by thousands, and its members comprise the largest body in the American Union.

The spirit of Wesley was emphatically missionary, and in this department of christian usefulness he embarked all his energies ere he was brought to a saving acquaintance with the truth of Christ. But like Luther, after he had taken up the position assigned him by providence, he had to resist the onsets of numerous foes in the land of his birth, and was thus prevented taking under his own immediate supervision those missions which bear his name.—Dr. Coke, however, prepared by God, bent all his energies to the enterprise, and continued in it till called to the rewards of heaven. Providence, which opened the way in the beginning, and then becked its chosen servants to suitable fields of labour, has, we believe, originated and fostered all our Missions to the present period. A full concurrence with the work is therefore required of us *individually*, without which we must be destitute of the family likeness, and act as schismatics in the Wesleyan body. Up to the present there has been perfect order in all our movements, though to some they may have appeared irregular. Nature works out for herself a perfectly orderly result in the midst of peals of thunder and the rocking of the gale; and the church of our salvation and vows, though cradled in storms, is one in a vast system of means employed for the accomplishment of the Divine purpose. From her origin to the present moment, she has held on her way, and guarded and guided by the grace of the Spirit, has outlived the fury of the tempests which have threatened her destruction.

Had God withheld from us those indications of his favour which mark every period of our history,—it would even then remain our duty to attempt the conversion of the world to Christ; but to neglect it *now* would place us beneath His ban and be the forerunner of our connexional ruin.—To refuse attending to a duty, the neglect of which is sure to bring upon us ultimate decay, amounts to suicide. To decline the delights of progress, and the joy of conquest, is to abandon present possessions, and to will our fall.—If marshalled hosts halt upon the margin of success, triumph will crown the stratagems of the opposing forces; and if, as Wesleyans, we refuse our aid, an interstice is produced in the hosts of God, or if we do not shout for the battle, and pant for the

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victory, we must have mistaken a passionless and voluptuous quietism, for the religion of our fathers, who laid deep and wide the foundations of the edifice which we have to raise and finish.

Our Missions, which are confined to no particular language or race, have outwined numberless unfriendly opinions, and have passed through all sorts of charges and assaults. Like the Rome of the ancients we have had at our gates the Gaul and Hannibal. Men, like the assassin who puts on the mask, and grasps the poniard, have assailed our glorious agencies, but as the eternal city calmly offered for sale, and sold at an undiminished price, the very ground on which the Carthaginian had fixed his camp, so the Committee, with equal calmness, calculates, that the ground the enemy now occupies will soon be the undisputed property of the Church, if she is only faithful to her trust, and sends the glorious Gospel of the blessed God to girdle with a belt of splendour the entire globe.

The Committee take this opportunity of expressing their entire confidence in the executive management of the Body, and rejoice in being able to state that the Lord has lately owned the labours of His servants in a signal manner, and amid attempts to agitate the Connexion, the people have signified their approval of our agencies and discipline, by an unprecedented augmentation of the income of the Society.

That same Gospel, by the alleged foolishness of which, it has pleased God to save them that believe, is, in the judgment of the Committee, the only remedy for the world's woes, and they are fully satisfied that those who have been employed by the Society, to make it known in foreign lands, are men who have received the requisite appointing for their great work. But during the year the parent society has been somewhat embarrassed, not on account of a diminished income, or the failure of their Missions, but because they have had to say "No" to many urgent appeals from different parts of the world for more Missionaries. The income of the Society, though larger than usual, is not adequate to the demand for additional labourers, and it is therefore hoped that this District will yield its full quota of support to our existing Missions, and likewise an increase on all former efforts of the kind, that the salvation of the Gospel may soon be offered to every people on the surface of the globe.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

Although there has been much opposition offered to our cause during the year, the Parent Committee announce an improvement in the financial condition of the Society, when compared with their circumstances at this time last year. The Debt was then stated to be £13,258 16s. 1d. from the deficiencies of Income compared with the Expenditure for 1847 and 1848. The Debt of the Society is now reduced to £10,841 13s. 2d. This reduction has been effected, in part, by a diminution in Expenditure; but chiefly by a very large augmentation in the Income.

With this sum the Committee have to lift up their perpetual protest against the base lies of Mahomet, and the pollutions of idol worship, at the posts already occupied by their agents, and also to extend the crusade of mercy and grace around the world.

All this array of instrumentalities has to be supported, and others added thereto, from year to year out of the sum of £111,000 per annum. Other churches have said again and again that the support of foreign Missions is the most expensive warfare they ever engaged in,—but if so much can be done with such limited means,—then the Wesleyans, believing as they do that the world is to be saved by means and not by miracles, ought to sustain their present establishments, and augment their number till the world shall be filled with the latter day glory.

IRELAND.

In Ireland, the Society's Missions are eighteen in number, scattered throughout the kingdom.

The Reports abundantly prove that the Society's operations are instrumentally productive of a large amount of benefit. The promised blessing of the Great Head of the Church renders the labours of his servants effectual in the conversion of sinners from the error of their ways, and in the edification of those who had previously been united together in church-fellowship in connexion with the Society. The pure truth of the gospel has not access to the mass of the population in Ireland; but it is a gratifying fact, that in many places there is an increasing desire for religious instruction manifested by the Roman Catholics.

GERMANY.

WITTEMBERG.—The operations of the Society are still prosecuted by Mr. Miller and his Assistants, in the midst of many difficulties. Weekly religious services are held at about 60 places, at which upwards of 1,000 persons are now united together in Church-fellowship.

FRANCE AND SWITZERLAND.

At Paris, a considerable improvement in the English Congregation has taken place during the year; but the French department of the work has not recovered from the shock received from the late political convulsions.

The Teacher at Bar-le-Duc is prosecuting his labours under circumstances of considerable interest. A great sensation has been produced in the neighbourhood. Several Roman Catholic villages are welcoming his ministrations.

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In some instances, the Municipal Authorities place themselves at the head of the movement, and offer the Parish-Schools, and even the Mass-Houses or Churches, for Protestant worship. The Priests have become alarmed, and are endeavouring to excite opposition.

SPAIN.

At GIBRALTAR, the schools are in efficient operation, and well answering the design of their establishment.

The foundation of an extensive Spanish work, it may be reasonably hoped, is being silently laid, by the religious training of so large a number of Spanish children. The process may be comparatively slow, but succeeding generations will witness the beneficial effects.

CEYLON AND CONTINENTAL INDIA.

The members in the Society have increased to twelve hundred and four-teen, chiefly native converts; and the Schools have received considerable additions to their number. Four new Chapels have been built during the year, and four more are in the course of erection. Considerable activity has been excited among the Buddhists in behalf of their own system, and in opposition to Christianity. This circumstance is viewed as a sure indication that the truth is felt to be powerful, and that the interests of the Gospel are advancing.

The manifold labours of the Missionaries, at *Jaffna*, in the *Tamul District*, *North Ceylon*, have been continued with encouraging results.

The opposition of the heathen has been aroused by the diligent and multiplying agency of the Mission. Lectures on Hinduism have been delivered in the temple of Siva, and some devotees of the prevalent superstition have become more ostentatious in their idolatrous worship.

The Educational and School report is full and satisfactory.

The aspect of the Mission in *Madras* has varied little during the year. The Congregations and Societies remain in the same state, but would be much improved if a more efficient subordinate agency should be raised up.

In the *Mysore District*, there has been a small increase in the number of Native Members in the Bangalore Canarese Station. They are all believed to be living in the fear of God; and their outward walk and conversation during the year have been consistent and exemplary.

The Missionaries in the District are bestowing much time and labour on the revision of the Holy Scriptures in the Canarese language, in which they are co-operating with Missionaries of other denominations.

AUSTRALIA AND POLYNESIA.

The local Reports from the Stations in *Australia* communicate a great amount of encouraging information. The York-street Chapel, in the Sydney North Circuit, now contains sittings for Twelve Hundred persons. The cause at Surrey-Hills has increased so considerably in importance, that it is deemed desirable to constitute a separate Circuit. A large place of worship is requisite to provide for the rapidly increasing population. . . . The general aspect of the work in the Melbourne Circuit, in the Colony of *Australia Felix*, or *Victoria*, is reported as "very encouraging." . . . The Society's Mission in *South Australia* is rapidly rising in importance, and extending its beneficial influence throughout the Colony. . . . In *Western Australia*, the Mission embraces as large a sphere as could well be occupied by a single Missionary. . . . The Hobart-Town and New-Norfolk Circuits, in *Van Diemen's Land*, are in a prosperous state.

The review of the operations of the Society's Mission, in *New Zealand*, during the past year, affords much gratification. In every department of the work there is activity and progress. The influence of Christianity is more

decidedly manifested among the people generally within the influence of the Mission, in the gradual enlightenment of their minds, and the elevation of their character; and, as a consequence, a growing improvement is taking place in their temporal condition. Nor do these views of the state of the work depend exclusively upon Missionary evidence. They are amply supported by the independent testimonies of others, who, from their position have the means of examining the subject, and are placed in circumstances which shield them from the suspicion of allowing their judgment to be warped by any undue bias or partiality.

In the *Friendly Islands*, some of the Missionaries and their families have been visited by affliction, which will probably render necessary their removal to a more salubrious climate. From *Tonga* the Missionaries write, that they realize the gracious promise of the Saviour to his faithful servants in the ministry of the Gospel, "Lo, I am with you always;" and this cheers them in the difficulties and trials with which they have to contend.

The Mission-work in the important District of *Feejee* has suffered serious interruptions from the diminution which has taken place in the number of faithful labourers, male and female, chiefly by the visitations of disease and death. The official Reports from the District contain much information, which is thus partly of a painful character, but, on the whole, warranting the most cheering anticipations as to the ultimate triumph of Christianity throughout dark and cannibal *Feejee*.

The inhabitants of the town in which the Missionaries reside in the *Naudy Circuit*, and those of another town about three miles distant, are all Christians.

SOUTH AFRICA.

CAPE OF GOOD HOPE DISTRICT.—The Report from *Cape Town* is very satisfactory. During the year a gracious visitation from above has been experienced, and the labours of the Missionaries have been attended with much success. A considerable number of individuals, having experienced the saving power of the Gospel, have become consistent members of our Religious Society.

The review of Missionary operations in the *Albany and Kaffraria* District, during the last year, is highly encouraging. The Mission Stations which were suspended during the war, have been, so far as pecuniary means would allow, resumed under very auspicious circumstances. An influence appears to rest upon the minds of many of the chiefs and people highly favourable to the Mission-cause, and were an adequate number of devoted English Missionaries employed in the direction of the native agency, and in the general management of the Missions, the anticipation of most important results might now be reasonably indulged.

At *Faku's* great place, (in the *Buntingville Circuit*) a public religious service is now held every fortnight, under encouraging circumstances.

The Mission in the *Bechwana* District has been exposed to severe trials.—Discontent has arisen between the Native tribes and the Colonial Government, and in the Eastern part war has prevailed among the Natives.

Thaba Unchu, the Missionaries thankfully report, partly in consequence of its distance from the scene of hostilities, and partly from the pacific disposition of the Chief, has been preserved in peace. The Members of Society at that Station have maintained their integrity amidst the temptations to which they were exposed.

WESTERN AFRICA.

The important Mission at *Sierra Leone*, continues to enjoy much prosperity. Through the blessing of God accompanying the appointed ordinances of religion, the work of religion both deepens and extends. There is an evident im-

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provement in the tone of personal piety among our people, and there has been a nett increase of Three Hundred and Fifty-eight full and accredited Church-members during the last year.

The number of Church-members and Scholars connected with the *Bathurst Street Chapel at Free-Town* is Eleven Hundred and Seventy-six; but the Chapel will not accommodate more than Six Hundred persons. The *Grass-Field Chapel* will only contain Seven Hundred, but the Church-members and Scholars alone amount to Thirteen Hundred and Seventy-nine; and the *Gibraltar Chapel*, also, is not half large enough to contain the congregation.—Exertions have been making for some time to raise a sufficient fund for the building of the proposed new “*Buxton-Chapel*,” and the sum of Seven Hundred Pounds has been contributed towards it by the people; but the amount received from all sources is not yet sufficient to meet the expense of the erection. The Missionaries write upon the subject with great feeling and earnestness, apprehensive that the work must eventually suffer if sufficient Chapel accommodation cannot be provided.

On the *Gambia*, the promising state of things at *St. Mary's*, which Mr. Badger reported last year, continues to realize the expectations which were then formed. The work has advanced. There has been a decided improvement in the tone of piety among our people; and a considerable addition to the number of Church-Members has been made.

The Station at *Macarthy's Island* has been placed in disadvantageous circumstances, owing to the ravages of the Small Pox, and the war which took place between the Mandingoes and the Local Government.

At *George Town*, The Missionary reports—“Our Society is rapidly improving. Of those who have been recently converted, there are eight persons now in my class, three of whom are Jalloofs. One of the latter is a Convert from Mahomedanism.”

The local reports from that interesting field of labour—the *Gold Coast*—are, generally, of a gratifying character. Six of the Native Converts have been recommended as sufficiently qualified to act as Catechists in the service of the Society.

A very gratifying testimony in favour of the Society's Mission in *Ashanti* has been given by Sir William Winniett, the Governor of the Gold-Coast, in the Journal of his recent visit to *Kumassi*, contained in a Despatch addressed to the Right Honourable Earl Grey, and printed by order of the House of Commons.

WEST INDIES.

The Society's Missions in the *BRITISH WEST-INDIES* continue to present an unfavourable aspect. The deteriorating influences which have been at work in these Colonies, since the alteration in the duties on sugar, still prove a serious counteraction to Missionary operations. Increasing poverty is injurious to the spiritual interests of the people, by absorbing many of them to such an extent in cares and anxieties respecting outward things, that they become negligent of the public ordinances of Religion; and, from the same cause, the pecuniary receipts of the Missions are so considerably diminished as to render it necessary to contract the sphere of Missionary effort just at the juncture when the peculiar circumstances of the people require for them increased, instead of diminished, pastoral attention and care.

BRITISH NORTH AMERICA.

The Missionaries continue to prosecute their labours under encouraging circumstances in all the Provinces of *British North America*, especially in *Western Canada*, where new fields of usefulness present themselves to view. By a series of movements which the God of peace has signally guided and

blessed, the members of the primitive and legitimate household of Methodism are again gathered into one fold, and are now beheld in harmonious effort, laying broader and deeper the foundations of their Zion, and expanding the influences of those ordinances by which their own souls have been edified and blessed. Throughout the field of Missionary labour, both Indian and domestic, which now invites the zeal, judgment, and sanctified talent of the Wesleyan body in Canada, never could its best friends have stronger grounds for holy exultation, when reviewing the past, never could they have greater cause for hope and excitement to duty, while surveying the present.

The net increase of Members in WESTERN CANADA during the year is nearly eight hundred. The Missionary department of the work is in a state of great efficiency, and the increase of income from the different districts which comprise the Conference is above five hundred and fifty pounds more than last year.

EASTERN CANADA.—The Chairman of this important District has been removed by death during the year. He died as he had long lived, in the faith of Christ. In many of the Circuits the Missionaries have been favoured with visitations from on high, but the unsettledness into which the community has been precipitated by the adverse state of things during the last few years, together with the many commercial embarrassments of the past year, have induced a large number of the Members of our Church to emigrate to the "far West." From the city of Montreal alone, One Hundred and Thirty-six members have thus removed.

NOVA SCOTIA.—In several Circuits the Lord of the Harvest has granted to His servants (what they have long prayed) a descent of the Holy Spirit. Many have been gathered into the fold of Christ, and the Church has peace in all her borders. There is required, however, a large increase of labourers to give permanence to the general work. This is felt not only on the main, but upon the Islands of Cape Breton and Prince Edward; and unless this deficiency is soon supplied, it is feared, that in the want of pastoral oversight, some who now rejoice in God, will become weary in well doing, and fall finally into the perdition of ungodly men.

NEW BRUNSWICK.—In this, as well as in NEWFOUNDLAND and HUDSON BAY Districts, the Missionaries have laboured with fidelity and zeal—and God has given His blessing to the efforts of an earnest church. The people of these lands are anxious to hear from Wesleyan Ministers the truths of Christ, old prejudices are about to close, and the Gospel of our common salvation to roll all over these parts of the work like a flood of glory.

CONCLUSION.

The Gospel of Jesus has been preached for eighteen Centuries, and millions by its agency, have been lifted up to the thrones of Heaven. But the world is still claimed by the common foe, and being powerful to do evil, he seeks to crush every remedial scheme of God, and of His Church. Men may talk of its insufficiency to convert the world, and detail the history of its failure in certain ages and localities, and we admit (as showed in the former part of this report) that its *professed* advocates have taught in some instances error for truth. But it were as consistent to reproach the sciences with the mouldy errors of their early adherents—Astronomy, for example, with its vortices—Chemistry with its philosopher's stone—History with its fables—Law with its cruelty and ignorance—or medicine with its rash and erroneous theories, as it is to attribute the foibles and defects of its *deluded* partisans to the Gospel itself. The "Good News" has done its work where and when

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ever it has been faithfully published; and now idolatry is quailing before the banners of Redemption in every part of the globe, and is predicting in its present dilapidations its speedy and final downfall. What is done for the heathen, who want it most, must be done soon. In many places various causes contribute to bring about an annual diminution of their number. They are retreating before the onward tread of the Saxon,—every throes of resistance hastens their destruction, and they look upon themselves as a doomed people. Let us therefore give them the Gospel which God has placed in our hands, that they may have a *staff* and a *torch* to support and cheer them in their retreat from the family of nations.
