Miscellaneous.

Diphtheria.

Dr. Franklin Staples, of Winona, Minn., after an extended correspondence with physicians in most of the counties of his State, has published a report on diphtheria, in which he classifies the disease as contagious and infectious, and demonstrates that it is on the increase, a fact due, in his opinion, to failure on the part of physicians in recognizing its self-propagating properties; to want of systematic nursing of patients suffering from the disease; to incomplete disinfection of premises attacked; and last but not least, to the frequent intercourse of convalescents with healthy persons. He maintains that strict regulations, rigidly enforced, are the only means to cut short its progress, and since individual power is unable to cope with it, urges that every city and town should devise efficient sanitary laws, and let them be enforced by intelligent medical officers, who shall also make it their duty to instruct the people in sanitary rules. To guard against contamination, he believes that filth, whether from dirty rooms, soiled clothing, defective drains and cesspools, ill-ventilated rooms, poisonous noxious gases, etc., should be rigidly excluded; that the apartment set apart for the patient should be divested of all furniture, carpets, curtains, and fabrics of any kind not absolutely required; that discharges from the nose, mouth, and throat should be carefully collected and destroyed; and that all personal clothing, bed linen, etc., should be thoroughly disinfected before being sent to the general wash. In case of death, all clothing and "unimportant articles" should be burned, the body should be immediately disinfected, and put in its coffin, which should be kept permanently closed. There should be no public funeral. He prefers disinfection by chlorine gas, which is to be set free in the room. Ventilation for a number of hours should be insisted on. Precautions falling short of these Dr. Staples considers to be useless in preventing the spread of the infection. — *Report on Diphtheria to the Minnesota Board of Health, 1881.*

Not Quite as Rich as Usual.

A young man who has long driven the milk wagon of one of the oldest established dairies of this county, and has supplied milk to its customers for years, came to his employer the other morning, and to his great surprise resigned his situation. He had no other place, had no complaint to make, was attached to his employer, liked the business, and all that, but resign he would. It turned out that this was the cause: Tuesday, the maid, whose duty it is to fill the cans of that day, poured them full of water as they stood in the wagon, and left them to stand twenty-four hours to sweeten, as is the rule. Before daybreak the driver brought out his team and hitched up to the wagon containing the cans of water colored by the remains of milk. Instead of a second wagon in which the fresh milk had been placed for him. Obvious of his error, he drove over his entire route and served all the customers with milk colored water. When, later in the day, he discovered his error, he resigned rather than face the battery of the complaints he knew was ready for him. "I can go up to a cannon's mouth," said he, "and let 'em shoot me in two, but I never want to set eyes again on a house where I served that water." His employer enjoys the joke hugely, and was busy all day setting things to right and explaining the error between his gasps for breath from too much laughter. Some of his customers remarked that they had noticed the milk wasn't quite as rich as usual.

No one can deny that such is the nature of the business which insists upon a discrimination in its favor, embodying the addition of a day more in which to inflict physical and moral injury upon men. Because there are large numbers of men who are not at work on those days, and who will play themselves with liquor until they have no longer any control over their wills. Then they are prepared

to commit crime. For the same reason the liquor saloons should be hermetically sealed Sunday. There are fewer men at work on Sunday than on any other day, and if several hundred saloons are opened for "business," they are likely to do business with vengeance in their peculiar and detrimental way. Liquor selling is a very peculiar and a confessedly dangerous business, and it should be dealt with in a very peculiar way—just like gunpowder for instance, which is carefully stored and locked up at isolated points for reason of public safety. It has come to be the rule that the bloodiest crimes of the week are committed on Sunday, and almost every one of them has its origin in Sunday drinking, with resultant quarrelling and violence either in the saloons or near them. There is certainly abundant reason why the amended Sunday law should be enforced.—*Exchange.*
