weather of the past few weeks cracking the earth and rock, which were loosened and driven under by the heavy rain of the last few days. One can picture to himself this individual bringing around him the dying one, and the old ladies of the town to sit in silence as he reads them this precious bit of forgery, this terrible oath which once read and thought of, must awake good Protestants from their lethargy, arouse them to action, and force them to gird on their sword under the command of our inimitable warrior, "I. A. R. in the presence of Almighty God, declare from my heart that the Pope hath power to depose Heretical Kings, Princes, Estates, Commonwealths and governments, and being illegal without his sacred confirmation, and that they may be safely destroyed.
