



REVENUE FOR MARCH.

The revenue statement for March published in Saturday Canada Gazette. shows that under the impetus of the fear of increased taxation the revenue has taken an enormous jump upwards, and the relative positions of revenues and expenditure for the nine months of the fiscal year have so materially changed since the 28th of February that there is now some chance of Mr. Fielding's deficit at the end of the fiscal year not being quite as large as was expected a month ago. The receipts for March were \$4,579,634, as compared with \$2,963,346 for the same month last year ; and expenditure, \$1,289-319, as against \$1,341,669 last March. This increase of \$1,416,288 in the revenue is made up as follows :-- Customs, \$673, 364 ; Excise, \$807,798 ; Public Works, including railways, \$7.298; miscella neous, \$31,027 ; Post Office, shows a decrease of \$103,000 which is probably due more to some change in book keep ing than to any great stop in posta revenue. The increase in custom revenue is probably due to the removal from bond of large quantities of spiri in anticipation of an increase in dury and the large addition to the excisi collections is probably lue to the same cause. 


