TAKING BEES TO BLOSSOMS. How the Austro-Hungarian Army Is Supplied with Fresh Horses.

The Hungarian state keeps altogether four studs, viz: Mezohegyes, with 1,646 horses of various breeds; Babolna, with 539 horses, and Fogaras, with 421, both for Arabian horses; finally Kisber, with 509 horses, principally for the importation and breed of British horses, racers as well as half breeds. The state keeps other depots of stallions at different places, having altogether 2,300 there in 1887, the latest year for which a return has been prepared. he Annual Going from Village to Wher the Wild Heather Blooms. 




