

"DAY BY DAY IN EVERY WAY"

Dr. Coue, a Frenchman, who recently arrived on American shores, is making fame for himself by his theory that all fleshly troubles may be overby auto-suggestion induced by repeating over and over again words that reiterate the desired results. The theory has taken America by storm and half of the population of the continent upon retiring at night repeat for twenty times the words "day by day in every way I am growing better" and make the same repetition aloud, before rising each morning. It is said that the result is the restoration of bodily vigor without having to have faith. The same method is being applied to everything. The Observer suggests that all the people repeat for twenty times after retiring and for twenty times before arising these words, "Day by Day in arising these words, "DAY BY DAY IN EVERY WAY THE TIMES ARE GROWING BETTER.

It seems strange that a great many people resent being told that times are improving. Some people seem to believe that the soft times of 1919 and 1920 should return and remain permanent. They will not return.

To enjoy the full conviction that the times are growing better the people must learn to work and work hard. The people who are making the most doleful cry of hard times are wearing more patches on the seats of their pants than on the knees. This implies that the people have not got down to hard work as in the pre-war days. And hard work is not disgraceful. Idleness is. Hard work makes the body tired, but it gives peace to the mind and gives the man the right to walk among his fellows with his chin up.

During and immediately following the war the people fell into awful extravagence. They should return to more frugal ways.

To fully appreciate good times the the passing of the soft times.

Right at the present moment times in Carleton county are better than they have ever been. Business never on so solid a basis. With the ex ception of potatoes, the prices of pro duce averages about 100 per cent higher than ten years ago and the lath and lumber industry is distributing in Carleton county alone from \$75,000 to \$100,000 each and every week. This means from \$15 to \$20 for every family in the county. The times cannot be hard while such an inflow of hard cash continues, but every man has got to work to get his share. And there is work for every man.

It is most unfortunate that many farmers still owe for fertilizer and owe for automobiles and paying for these is indeed very much like paying for dead horses. The fact that they are so heavily in debt for these things result of the really hardest times that Carleton county ever saw That was the period when potatoes rought \$10 per barrel.

DEVELOP GRAND FALLS POWER

All up and down the St. John valley there is great interest in the rumors affecting the developing of the Grand Falls water power. There is no doubt in the world that if the provincial gov ernment or any corporation went a head with the development of the power and built a transmission line from Edmundston to Fredericton and elsewhere that great quantities of electricity would be sold all along the lines. The proposal of the International Paper Co., which is that they will develop the power if sufficient purchasers can be secured in advance, is not a sound or reasonable one. There are thousands of people who will use small quantities of electricity for light, heat, cooking and small power requirements after the supply is available. Of course these people will have to be sold on the proposition when there is something to sell. Even if large demands for power are not available at the present time there is a thousand times greater chance that Grand Falls power developed would yield a greater return than the Valley Railway or National Transcontinental and both of these were built withon guarantee of traffic

The provincial government will not make a mistake if it proceeds with the development of the Grand Falls pow er and proceeds without delay.



ADDRESS BY SEC. W. R. BELYEA

(Edmundston Observer) The following is the retiring secre tary's address to the Edmundston Board of Trade. Walker Belyea has been the efficient secretary of the Board since its inception and the success of the Board during the past year has been most largely due to his untiring efforts. We very much regret that he is leaving Edmundston, about which we shall have more to say later. We hope this address will be read by all the citizens of Edmundston, and we trust that the suggestions made theregain not only the attention, but the action, of those interested in the welfare of the town:

THE ADDRESS

As secretary of your Board I beg to submit my first annual report

Your Board was organized about one year ago with a charter membership of forty. During the year one member we have added twenty-six members to last, when it was learned that there

from Secretary of State at Ottawa, making a membership of sixty-three to date.

During the last year seven general neetings and five meetings of the excutive have been held in addition to everal impromptu committee meetings called by the President of Secre-

I am pleased to state that the attendance at the various meetings has been comparatively good. We have only once found it impossible to get the required number present to form quorum. This was in July during ery hot weather.

The object of a Board of Trade is to further the interests of the Town in which it exists in the matter of securing industries broadening of trade, assisting in bringing about public imy for citizens to discuss matters which affect the interests of the Town and to approach governments and corporations through non-political channels. A further function of a Board of Trade is to assist in the entertainment of distinguished guests who may be visiting within its jurisdiction.

During the past year the Board has endeavored to further the interests of the Town in many respects and I am happy to say that its efforts have met with some degree of success. I shall take the subjects up under the various

headings. RAILWAY MATTERS. Early in the Spring of 1922 the management of the Canadian National Railways moved from the Edmundsten Division the fast freight service which had been in effect for several years thus throwing out of employment upwards to seventy-five railway men resident in Edmundston. The Board immediately took the matter up with railway authorities and a delegation of members in in regard to market facilities will of the Board, at a sacrifice of valuable time, proceeded to Montreal and Ottawa, where they interviewed the President of the C. needed new public building to accome date Post Office, Custom House and Armory was one of the first subjects taken up by the Board. Correspondence was carried on direct with the Minister of Public Works at Ottawa, as well as through our Federal mem ber, Mr. Michaud placing before the Government the grave necessity of the nmediate erection of a Public Building. While the House was in Session delegation of the members of the interviewed the Minister of Board Public Works and the Minister of Finance at Ottawa placing before them the claims of Edmundston for a Public Building. The Minister promised to give the matter sympathetic consideration. We note with regret that during 1922 nothing was included in the Public Works' estimates for the purchase of land or erection of a Public Building for Edmundston, so it ehooves the Board of Trade to at once make plans to bring the matter before the Government as soon as the House of Commons assembles.

Fire Insurance Rates. Early in the year the Board communicated with the . B . Board of Fire Underwriters requesting a reduction in the existing rates in this Town, and resolutions were forwarded to the Town Council requesting that they take the matter up vigourously with the Underwriters, seeing that improvements demanded by the latter wer affected without delay. Early-in December the Underwriters' inspector made a new survey of the Town and his report is now being awaited with much interest by the Town Council and Board of Trade. It is necessary that the Board should take immediate action in regard to this important matter, should the inspector's report not be favorable to

material reduction. Visitors. During the past year Edmundston has entertained many important people and delegations. On June 5 and 6, the Maritime members of the Canadian Weekly Newspaper Association which is one of the largest Newspaper Associations on the American continent, together with the officials and members of the New Brunswick Tourists and Resources Associations were entertained by the Board. The majority of the members of these parties were paying their first visit to Edmundston, and from their personal expression, as well as those written in their various newspapers, we believe they were favorably impressed with Edmundston and its citizens. The most important event of 1922, was the completion and formal opening of the International Bridge, which took place on Labor Day, September 4. The Board co-operated with the Town Council and general committee in making this event an unqualified success. Included among the visitors on this occasion were Public men, officials and business men from both sides of the International border, whom we feel sure carried away good impressions of our Town. The New Brunswick Grand Council Knights of Columbus convened here during the Summer and although the Board was not concerned in any way the entertainments of the delegates,





ganized a race track built, and a con ination grand stand and exhibition building, constructed with assistance of the Provincial Department of Agriculture and it. the Fa's a County Fair was held, the agriculturial exhibits of which would have done credit to any County in the Province. This is a step in the right direction, but I believe that the merchants of Edmundston could improve their business by encouraging a Country Market and sell direct to the public.

The City of Fredericton is an outstanding example of what a Country Market means to a Town. Fredericton had a Country Market long before it had population as large as Edmundston's is today and the amount of trade that the Fredericton merchants do with the country people is amazing. On Wednesdays and Saturdays the farmers come to the market, which is merely the square about the City Hall, sell their produce to consumer or dealer for cash and proceed to spend a large portion of the cash in the stores before leaing the City. This Town now owns a splendid site for a Country Market-the lot adjoining the Town

To secure co-operations of the farm ers from the start, it would require that a committee be appointed to go to the rural communities, hold a few small meetings with the farmers, explaining the whole proposition. I feel confident that the Provincial Minister of Agriculture can be relied upon to support the movement

A Country Market would provide the citizens with a medium to procure vegetables, poultry, butter, truck gar den produce, firewood, hay, etc., which to the average citizen are often hard to locate, while there may be quanities in the country awaiting a market. On the other hand it provides the farmer with a market close at home where he immediately realizes cash for his goods. It is human nature to want to do shopping in the larger centers. This is where the Edmundston merchan would secure the farmers' cash bus ness. If this suggestions meets with the approval of the Board, I would suggest that a committee be appointed to meet the Town Council with a view to getting the movement started at once so as he Farmers may be pre pared to cater to the requirements of our citizens next Summer and Autumn

I wish to take this opportunity of thanking the officers, executives and members for their co-operation during the past year, and I very much regre that I am soon to leave your happy Town, but I feel confident that the members of the Board will carry on the work in such a manner that they will make Edmundston one of the most progressive Towns in Eastern Canada
