"My farm," says he, "was so low in condition that it would not produce more than ten bushels of rye, or twenty of corn per acre and as I had no other income but what I could make upon this poor farm, I set about farming in earnest, I found it was in vain to attempt improvement without manure, so I contrived to get about 400 loads a year, 300 I made in the following manner. I have marl, though of very inferior quality. I cart about 100 loads of this into my barn yard, and by yarding my cattle upon it through the season, contrive to increase it to 200 loads. I also cart about 50 loads to my hog pen, on which I keep m; hogs the year round. 
