## SLASH-BURNING BLOW-TORCHES

Used in Madawaska and Restigouche Counties Successfully This Season.

Fredericton, Oct. 25.—The demonstration of the use of the kerosene blow-torch in burning slash in wet weather which was undertaken by the Department of Lands and Mines, has been so successful that two more torches have been ordered and burning by this method will be extended. The serious losses in timber-lands in recent years which often were caused by fires started by settlers, directed attention to the fact that slash-burning should take place during seasons in which there is no danger of fire spreading. On the Pacific Coast slash burning takes place in the winter which is a rainy period, blow-torches being used to start the fires which when once started will burn themselves. It was decided to adopt the same method in New Brunswick. The Department had to arrange for demonstrations and procure the torch as the settlers would not go to the expense.

In Northern Counties. Madawaska and Restigouche counties where there has been much new settlement in recent years were selected for the demonstrations. The forest rangers have been demonstrating. One ranger is said to have burned sixty slashes in wet weather and others have done similar work. It is intended to extend these operations greatly. Wet weather is no hindrance to slash-burning when torches are used. Five gallons of kerosene are carried in a tank on the back and the torch is wielded by hand with hose-connection and throws a flame some two feet long.

In Use Locally. Last spring an area of some one hundred acres which had been logged for lath-making by Fraser Companies Limited in the eastern part of the city was burned by this means. It was a pronounced success.

## NEW GENTS FURNISHING STORE

Messrs. Ferguson & Wallace Now Occupying Up-to-Date Store On Water St.

With the occupation of their new store on Water Street here last Friday Messrs. Ferguson and Wallace have added another and more important chapter to their history as local retail clothiers. ## BONAR LAW NAMES CABINET

Sixteen Members of Ministry Are Chosen—Others to be Named.

London, Oct. 24.—Premier Bonar Law tonight issued a list of the principal members of his ministry. His own name is not mentioned in the official list, which leaves it to be inferred he has no other office than that of Prime Minister and first lord of the treasury, the latter being a post without duties beyond those attaching to the premiership. The official announcement of the new ministers does not specify which among them will be members of the cabinet. There is no fixed rule governing the number of cabinet members, or which ministers shall be included, the selection being at the discretion of the prime minister. Bonar Law is credited with preferring a small cabinet, but a majority of those announced will certainly be members. London, Oct. 24.—The British ministry as announced this evening is as follows: Premier and First Lord of the Treasury, Right Hon. Andrew Bonar Law, Lord President of the Council, Marquis of Salisbury, Lord High Chancellor, Viscount Croke, Chancellor of the Exchequer, Stanley Baldwin.

Secretary for Home Affairs, William C. Bridgeman, Secretary for Foreign Affairs, Marquis Curzon, Secretary for the Colonies, the Duke of Devonshire, Secretary for India, Viscount Peel, Secretary for War, the Earl of Derby.

First Lord of the Admiralty, Lieutenant-Colonel L. C. M. S. Amery, President of the Board of Trade, Sir Philip Lloyd-Greame, Minister of Health, Sir Arthur Griffith-Boscawen, Minister of Agriculture, Sir Robert A. Sanders, Secretary for Scotland, Viscount Novar, Attorney-General, Douglas Mc G. Hogg.

Lord Advocate, Hon. W. A. Weston, President of the Board of Education, Edward F. L. Wood, M.P. for the Ripon division of Yorkshire.

There are still several appointments to be made, and it is noticeable that the five offices held under Premier Lloyd George by Austen Chamberlain, H. A. L. Fisher, T. J. MacNamara, Sir Hanar Greenwood and the Earl of Crawford and Balcarres, who all joined Lloyd George in the wilderness, are not yet filled. It is expected that the office of chief secretary for Ireland will be abolished and that the ministry of labor will be merged into some other department.

SAY HARDING THINKS COUNTRY WILL REMAIN "DRY" FOR ALL TIME

Washington, Oct. 25.—President Harding was quoted by delegates to the conference of Allied Christian Societies who called upon him at the White House tonight just before the close of their two day meeting as declaring that the nation, in his opinion, would never depart from the eighteenth prohibition amendment.

## ANOTHER N. S. MAN IS SLAIN

Old Man Found Horribly Murdered in His Kitchen—Known to Have \$200 in House.

Annapolis Royal, N. S., Oct. 22.—Thomas Berry, 75, a bachelor and farmer of Guinea, near here, was found dead in the kitchen of his home there this morning, with his skull crushed on the left side from the temple to the back of the head and with his shoulders and wrists badly bruised. He was lying face downward. An axe and a small piece of wood both blood-stained were found in a back porch. The porch led to a lobby and the lobby to the kitchen. The handles of the doors were spotted with blood and there were pools on both sides of the kitchen door. The room was generally upset. This and the bruise on the wrist and shoulder of Berry tend to the belief that there was a struggle but it is also said that it looked as though the farmer was struck while attempting to enter the kitchen and close the door. Mr. Berry was known to have had two hundred dollars on his person recently. Chief Detective Horace Kennedy, Halifax will be at Guinea tomorrow morning to conduct an investigation.

The dead farmer's body was found following inquiry by the wife of his brother Edward Berry, who lived on the other side of the road, and who became worried at the failure of her brother-in-law to make any appearance Saturday on this morning. She had seen a light in his house Friday night.

### LUMBER TRADE

## FUTURE BRIGHT

Building Trade Activities Give Promise to Increase Demands for Lumber.

(Montreal Trade Bulletin)

We have recently referred to the improvement and activity in the building trade, and as the latter has to depend upon the lumber trade the two usually work in about the same groove. At any rate no sooner had the building trade in Montreal and other centres east and west, attained large proportions than the demand for lumber had increased rapidly, so much so that it is already scarcer, and holders are already demanding and getting better prices. The orders for building residences in Montreal cannot begin to be filled this fall, and a considerable portion of them will have to be carried over to the spring. Orders for a number of residential houses are being carried over till the spring, the land on which to build them having been bought, but there is not sufficient time to make much headway before the winter sets in. The future of the lumber trade is therefore as bright as that of the building situation. As far as securing raw material for manufacturing, it is stated by the trade, that it would be as well to anticipate as much stock as possible to last from now until the first quarter of 1923.

A bright feature in the trade was the increase in the lumber exports to Great Britain, which is July of the present year amounted to \$40,000,000 above June, and an increase of \$80,000,000 above July, 1921, all of which indicated better conditions for the Canadian lumber trade. As regards the building trade, a firm stated that it never was as full of orders since it went into business as it is today.

The Kemelst Army does not possess a single gas mask, but the British warships and batteries are equipped with thousands of asphyxiating shells, which could drench the terrain over which the Turks must advance steadily with fumes. The Turks possess field guns, but only a few batteries of six-inch guns and one battery of eight-inch guns, and practically no aviation, while the British dreadnaughts fifteen-inch rangers, aided by aeroplanes, could wipe out the advancing Nationalist infantry long before the Turk guns get within range, and the Kemelst cavalry successful against the demoralized and unfortified Greeks, would be worthless in the network of barbed-wire and machine gun nests employed by the British to protect Constantinople and Chalkis.

This, perhaps is an over-optimistic view. Nevertheless, history assures that if the Turk, fighting man as he is, goes out to meet British steel, the impact will be more formidable than that which resulted in a Greek army streaming back, demoralized, into Thrace.—Ex.

## IN FAVOR OF THE R. R. EMPLOYEES

### Majority Report of Board of Conciliation Favors No Reduction of Pay.

OTTAWA, Oct. 21.—That a reduction in wages of clerks, freight handlers, roundhouse, store, shop, station and other lesser paid employes on the Canadian National Railways should not be made, was the finding submitted to the department of labor yesterday, by the board of conciliation, appointed last August to deal with the question. The report is signed by the chairman, F. T. Costello and H. S. Ross, K. C., representative of the employes. Gov. D. Kelly, representative of the railways, did not concur in the finding and will submit a minority report. More than 7,000 employes of the Canadian National lines in all parts of Canada are affected.

The principal reason given for the decision was that any further reduction in wages of the classes under consideration would leave them without adequate means of supporting their families in a proper manner. The report stated that after full investigation of all available statistics it was believed that little or no reduction in the cost of living in Canada had occurred during the past year.

### STRAIGHT CALL FOR PARTY POLITICAL

Hon. Robert Rogers in Ottawa  
Conferring With the Conservative Leaders.

Montreal, Oct. 24—A straight call for a return to party politics and a dropping of all entangling alliances, either by the Conservative party or any other party, was issued here last night by Hon. Robert Rogers, ex-minister of public works, who is here conferring with some Conservative leaders.

As to the Progressive organization he said that in its last five years of existence it had "not contributed anything particular to the sane and sound section of our common country."

He gave the Liberals credit that they had not been able to restore their party to a better position than they formerly held and said that it remained for the Conservatives to organize in every city, town and hamlet, stating as his opinion that "no party ever had such an opportunity as has the Conservative party today."

\$50,000 IS PAID BY FOX FOR FOUR WORDS

"The World is Mine," Keynote of "Monte Cristo," Acquired From O'Neill Estate.

Baseball magnates have paid huge sums of money for baseball players, publishers have paid huge sums for books, trainers have paid great sums for race horses, but William Fox has set a record. He has just paid \$50,000 for the use of four words. That is a high yater mark.

That tidy amount has just been paid to the estate of the late James O'Neill actor, for the right to use the words that made O'Neill universally famous, "The World is Mine." The sentence is indissolubly associated, throughout the world, with the master play "Count of Monte Cristo."

Thousands of these patrons who never heard of the elder Dumas are familiar with the phrase used in what is called the greatest romance of all history.

Singularly enough Dumas did not write "The world is mine" nor does the line appear in any of the French editions of the novel. Its authorship is credited to O'Neill, who played in Edmund Dantes for a period of over a quarter of a century and appeared in all of the principal cities of the new and old worlds.

"The world is mine" as used by Mr. O'Neill at the finish of the second act of his play is generally rewarded by the generation just passing, as the greatest climax of the spoken stage.

Before William Fox commenced the filming of "Monte Cristo," which has just been released in Los Angeles and Boston, he acquired from the O'Neill estate the copyright of the actor's play. This film will be at the Opera House next Wednesday and Thursday.

The steamer was not one of large capacity in either freight or passenger but nevertheless gave valued service to the people of the lower river. The accident is one of a long series of steamers on the rivers which has taken a considerable toll of life.

#### PROHIBITION

Statistics which are divulged from time to time threaten to leave the opponents of prohibition with very little ammunition. A provincial paper points out that, while there were 14,417 convictions for drunkenness in Toronto in 1914 there were only 4,727 in 1921. Statements that prohibition has increased the use of drugs are frequently made, but the evidence on this point is not forthcoming. A need of proper city planning and less western paper points out that while there were 835 convictions in Canada under the Opium and Narcotic Drug Act last year, 562 were reported in the two "wet" provinces, British Columbia and Quebec, leaving only 273 for the rest of Canada. Of 237 drug cases reported in Quebec, all but 21 were in the city of Montreal, the western place in Canada.

It would be different to compile with any degree of accuracy—figures showing the condition in this respect in Campbellton. Drunks are not very frequently seen on the streets for the simple reason that the folks have learned that it is too expensive. There is always one big hand ready to clasp about the offender's wrist while the other wanders to the irregularity on his hip. Nevertheless there is an alarming quantity of liquor absorbed in this vicinity. It is a wonder that other places can get any at all.

There is no doubt but what prohibition has done considerable good in one way but again in another the present system is indirectly assisting the scuff of the earth (bootleggers and other reptiles) to amass fortunes from the illegal traffic which is being carried on. From this standpoint the present system is a deplorable farce. It should be remembered however that the present system is not prohibition. It apparently is merely the combined methods of a host of grafters who are making an unpardonable joke out of a really feasible prohibitory law.

#### A NEEDLESS LOSS.

Mr. J. Grove Smith, Dominion Fire Commissioner, addressing the Ottawa branch of the Engineering Institute of Canada a few days ago, pointed out that Canada's fire loss in 1921, not including forest fires, was \$45,000,000 or \$5.25 per each inhabitant. This sum, he declared, is at least ten times greater than that in any other country except the United States and he went on to explain that "the total expenditure incurred was \$130,000,000 paid out of the pockets of the people."

Commenting on Mr. Smith's striking address the Ottawa Citizen reminds the public that we are "sometimes prone to mistake bigness for greatness and take pride in mere magnitude, whether in connection with wealth, distances, areas or bulk. This is one example of magnitude that ought to produce a feeling of the direct opposite of pride." And further: "Because the losses continue to increase each year and few really effect-

ive steps are taken to eliminate them, a detached observer might be excused for believing that the staggering losses through fires had little effect on the minds of the people of Canada. This would not be an accurate assumption, however. For the truth is, they do have an effect. Every citizen who has given the subject a moment's thought will freely admit that such a tremendous fire loss is bad for the country, a reflection on our national habits and something about which somebody ought to do something. The distressing part of the thing is that he goes no further; he leaves the next step—that of carrying thought into action—to the other fellow, and we then go merrily on burning down forty million dollars' worth a year. Mr. Smith struck the root of the problem when he said the trouble was that there were hundreds of antiseptic regulations on the statute books, but because public opinion was not alert to see them enforced, they were never enforced. His conclusion was the logical one—public opinion must be educated to a point where it would demand that such laws be made effective."

Mr. Smith, in his address to the engineers, went on to emphasize the need of proper city planning and less "hazardous building material and construction." In his opinion it was strange that a nation where the doctrine of economy at any price in all branches of public and private enterprise is preached as it is preached in Canada, should be "the most wasteful and prodigal nation on earth." The Citizen declares that while this is a sweeping statement Mr. Smith was able to produce some fairly convincing proof of its truth. "While all hearts go out to the people of northern Ontario," The Citizen adds, "it can be said with justification that had they planned their towns and villages on the right lines, thinking not only of the moment but also of the future, they might possibly have escaped the fire with far less loss than they did. So long as houses are built of stuff that burns like tinder, and so long as public opinion remains unmoved by the facts, so long will Canada remain 'the most prodigal and most wasteful nation on earth.'"—Ex.

### SCHOOLBOY TWINS Baffles Teachers

As Alike As Two Peas and Think And Act Alike.

London.—The twins who not only look so much alike that they cannot be distinguished except by their parents but also such a remarkable similarity of brain development that they are baffling even their teachers are Willis and Frankie Allan of Windsor. They are nine years old, sturdy and clever youngsters who have travelled life thus far without the slightest individual trait being revealed.

J. R. Rae, their head master, reports their progress in eight subjects in school as so coincidental that their teachers are constantly mixing up their marks, but it matters little because they are always the same. They have passed with the identical average and they sit together and speak and act alike, though their father says they do not prepare their lessons together.

Mr. Rae suggests that it may be an extraordinary case of telepathy. When showing off the boys he asked them to spell several words separately and both made the same mistakes in the same words.

### GERMAN MARINE WAR LOSSES BRUIN PULLED FATAL STRING

German Publicist Gives Total Shipping Losses During the War. Nova Scotia Story of Robber Bear That Shot Itself With Trap Gun.

Berlin, Oct. 22.—With time at his command to make a careful investigation, and the disposition to delve into statistics, Dr. Christian Siegfried Toech-Mittler, a German publicist, has announced that a total of 19,900,000 of enemy mercantile shipping was sunk by German submarines during the war. Of this aggregate, he says 14,200,000 tons went down during the unrestricted campaign beginning on February 1, 1917, including 12,000,000 tons in English ships.

Dr. Toech-Mittler gives the total German shipping losses during the war as follows: One ship of the line, (the "Pommern," lost in the Skagerrak attack); seven armor-clad cruisers, (of which the newest and largest was the "Lutzow," of 28,000 tons and launched in 1915, also lost at the Skagerrak); 17 protected cruisers, ten gunboats, three special ships, two surveying vessels lost at Tsingtau, 48 large, 24 small and 38 old torpedo boats of various sizes; 29 mine-sweepers, 190 submarines, 17 auxiliary cruisers, 22 other auxiliary vessels, and more than 100 fishing steamers.

The sinkings at Scapa Flow are given as five large cruiser-sten ships, of the line five small cruisers and 32 torpedo boats. Dr. Toech-Mittler describes these sinkings as "a noble, self-chosen fate which atoned for the damage done the honor of the navy by the revolution and which manifested to the enemy the German defiance."
