LOCAL MATTERS. —Thanksgiving day. —Westcott is yet without a Postmaster. What is the trouble? —The celebrated medicine man, Dr. Paul, paid Sackville a visit this week.

—A large amount of plank sidewalk has been laid down during the past week.

—The Boston Comedy Co., H. Price Webber, manager, opens at St. John this evening.

—Sackville has not been visited by Irving or Booth, by Anderson or Bernhard, but H. Price Webber is coming.

—Moncton has a population of between seven and eight thousand; in 1871 it was between eleven and twelve hundred.

—Mr. G. J. Trueman has purchased a building lot adjoining Mr. James Rainie's and will erect a cottage for his own use.

—Sackville wants more wharves and a harbor master. She has needed them for years. Will she get them before the Judgment day?

—The shipment of last season's hay from An Lun Store, Sackville, to about 300 tons. Mr. J. A. McQueen, who shipped this, has this season about 500 tons to press for shipment.

—We congratulate the Moncton cotton factory on its good showing for the past year. While \$490 net losses are not heavy, they are a proof of good management and promise of dividends in the future.

—Mr. J. L. Black has just threshed 53½ bushels wheat (60 lbs. to the bushel) from an acre and a half of land (measured), from a sowing of one and a half bushels. This is a return of thirty-six from one.

—Such is the progress of Sackville that a look-up is needed; not a small one either. Councilors Ogden and Lowerison, recently re-elected, should look after this matter at the next session of the County Council.

—Some of the lady passengers on the N. B. & P. E. Railway complain of smoking being allowed in the passenger car. Gentlemen might surely force their pipes and cigars, when ladies are present, during the time it takes to make the trip.

—The *Amherst Gazette* proposes to celebrate the completion of the twentieth year of its existence by donning a new dress, enlarging its size and reducing its price. To assist in carrying out these improvements a power press has been procured. We are glad to notice such evidences of our contemporary's success.

—Rev. C. S. Eby, of Japan, will deliver a lecture in this place on or about the 23rd inst. The subject will be Japan, and the lecture will be profusely illustrated with stereopticon views. More can be learned of a country and its people in this way in one evening than by a long course of reading. The Halifax papers speak very highly of Mr. Eby's lecture.

—Dr. T. W. Carruth, of Amherst, died at Abington, Va., on Monday, aged 54 years. He has been in failing health for a year and a few weeks ago sought medical advice in New York, and from there went South. He was a man of genial and kindly nature and leaves a wide circle of friends who will deeply lament his demise, amongst whom may be counted the Post, for which he has long been a correspondent and to which he contributed a number of letters since he went South, all breathing a gentle humor and reflecting in the pain of illness, the courage and spirit of the man.

SHIP RAILWAYS.—Mr. H. Matthews, C. E., who has for some time been employed in seeking a deviation from the ship railway line, avoid two hills near Tidnish, has been unsuccessful and returned to Ottawa a week or two ago. John Fowler, the Chief Engineer of the Chignecto Ship Railway has within a few days been knighted by the Queen, for eminent services as an engineer, his leading work being the largest railway bridge in the world, over the River Forth near Edinburgh. This bridge is to be about two miles long and is to have three clear spans of the unprecedented width of 1,700 feet each with piers of 300 feet in height.

—Forty-eight persons perished on Lake Superior, in a heavy snow storm, the steamer "Algonquin" during a blinding snow storm.
