GEORGE MORECROFT TO AGRICULTURAL SOCIETIES.

OFFICE OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE, Fredericion, Oct. 11th, 1881. THE attention of OFFICERS OF AGRICULTURAL SOCIETIES is directed to the following pro-vision of the Law relating to Agriculture in this Province, 43 Vict. Cap. 16:-

Province, 43 Vict. Cap. 15:--"2. It shall be the duty of the Officers of every "Agricultural Scoletay, in the month of October "in each year, to nominate one person suitable for appointment to the Board of Agriculture; " and the Secretary of every Scolety shall, on or " before the tenth day of November, tra smit to " the Provincial Secretary the Name an i Ad-"dress of the person so nominated;" And they are required to govern themselve

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
