Werner Von Siemens, the famous elec-Werner Von Siemens, the famous electrician, says: By well-constructed underground conduits, the danger of electric light wires can be overcome if low pressure currents are used, and the danger resulting from very high pressure can be reduced to a minimum in the same manner. There is no doubt at all that the greatest proportion of such accidents as has happened in New York will cease on the day when the last overhead wire is buried. No death caused by contact with electric wires has ever happened here in Berlin. Overhead wires should never have more than 500 volts pressure; undergound conductors, with transformers, 2,000 volts.

A London dispatch, referring to the sentence passed upon Editor Parke for libelting the Earl of Euston, says Parke failed to produce any evidence which afforded the slightest justification for the charge he could scarcely be surprised at the severity of his sentence. There were, however, two or three incidents connected with the trial which will doubtless give rise to comment. Newlove and Vech, the guilty persons now lying in jail, were not called by either side. They are supposed to have been acquainted with all the patrons of the Editor Parke's Trial for Libel.

The Crisis in Portugal.

Lisbon, Jan. 17.—Twenty royal marines have been arrested for making a demonstration against England. It is understood a British squadron will visit the Tagus shortly. Portuguese merchants contemplate boycotting England and refusing to receive English money.

The Minister of Justice delivered a declaration in the Chamber of Peers on the dispute with England. His remarks were similar to those made in the Chamber of Deputies by-Senhor Pimental, who declared the Government would protect its interests as far as possible and maintain its dignity absolutely. A recriminatory depate followed, but all agreed in denouncing the British ultimatum.

Several Colonial Governors, including the Governor of Mozambique, have resigned. Several leading English commercial houses here and at Oporto are preparing a protest against the English ultimatum. They regard the dispatch of British men-of-war to Portuguese waters as harmful to their business. It is stated the King and Queen cordially applauded the action of the Duke of Palmello in returning the Crimean medal which he received while serving in the British army. The Duke was an intimate friend of the late King.

A French captain named Trevier says that while aboard the British steamer Lady of Nyassa, on the Shire River, the Portuguese compelled the crew to haul down the English fing and hoist the Portuguese colors. Trevier declares the English have lost all prestige through their pacific policy. The natives ascribe the gentleness of the English to weakness, and think Portugal is the stronger nation.

The Paris Journal des Debats, commenting upon the controversy between England and Portugal, says the Shire and Ruo regions come within the mediation clause of the act of the Congo conference, and England had no right to disregard these obligations.

ADULTERATION OF MILK.
STRATFORD, Jan. 16.-Dr. McFarlane, dominion analyst, was the first speaker, explaining that his duties were with the Inland Revenue Department, under which the Adulteration Act is enforced. That act and Revenue Department, under which the Adulteration Act is enforced. That act really had nothing to do with milk supplied cheese and butter factories, but they had gained large experience in dealing with the gained large experience at the service of the dairymen. In this way he had assisted inspectors by milk analyses. It was suggested that the Adulteration Act by certain amendments might be made applicable to cheese and butter dairying, but the Dominion authorities did not think that desirable until the provisions of the new Burdett Act were more thoroughly tried. Evidence of adulteration had been found in about one-half the factories from which samples were taken in the vicinity of London. Prosecution under the Adulteration Act where foods or commercial fertilizers were adulterated, was a very costly affair, much of the money going into the hands of lawyers. Hence the department tried the plan of publishing the names of delinquents. He threw this out as one suggestion for milk on the basis of its contents in sufference and the Litis rather a premium on carelessness and dishonesty. Soil depletion not only works injury to farming but its terrible effects can be seen upon the inhabitants, who deteriorate in mental and moral power. Where then are the elements of success in dairy husbandry? Primarily in the soil. By a rotation of hay, wheat, corn, etc., I have estimated that in 50 years a man will draw from the field to the barn \$414 worth of plant food, chiefly nitrogen, plusphoric acid and potash. And yet the farmer complains that he can't sell his farm for as much as he used to. As near as I can find out in New York State the farmer takes back to the field from one-half to one-quarter of what is taken off. In experiments at our station at Ithaca we found out what loss horse manure suffers when

one-quarter of what is taken oil. In experiments at our station at Ithaca we found out what loss horse manure suffers when thrown out in piles unsheltered from the weather. How much? No less than \$1 03 per ton or 42 per cent., nearly one-half of its valuable fertilizing constituents in the course of six months! Why is it so hard to get farmers to stop this

TERRIBLE LEAR?

Because of imitative agriculture, throwing the manure out of the doors and windows into the open air as our fathers and grandfathers did. If a ton ot timothy hay is worth \$8 (the New York yield is said to be less than one ton per acre) for feeding purposes, then an acre of our "Sibley's Pride of the North" corn raised on the University farm, this year is worth \$40 for the same purpose. The corn was rowed both ways with 3 to 4 stalks in the hill; cultivated before it was up and frequently afterwards. Though wet and cold this season, we got \$5 bushels of shelled corn per acre and upwards of 15 tons of green corn, including

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

We admire Mr. Graham's pluck in resisting the infamous attack on his fair fame.

The fourth session of the Sixth Parliament of Canada was opened yesterday, with the usual formality of a speech from the throne by the Governor General. As was to be expect ed, the speech refers to Lord Stanley's visit to the Northwest, and comments on the progress made in that portion of the Doninion, though it is not fair enough to say that it was far short of what was prophecied for it when Tupper and Tilley were pleading with Parliament to add largely to the taxation of the country. Nor does it admit, as it ought fairly to have done, that but for the bungling of the land laws, the stupid railway monopoly, and the high taxation imposed by the Tilley-Tupper tariff, the Northwest would have been tarill, the Northwest would have been much further advanced in settlement and in the ability of the people to buy goods from the east than it now is. The Governor-General is made to acknowledge the loyalty of the people to the existing state of affairs. What was he taught to expect? There have been two rebellions in the Northwest within the past twenty years, not against British rule or the authority of the Queen's representative, not against Canadian institutions or laws, but as the direct result of the bungling, the mismanagement, the "cruel and callous neglect" of Macdonald and his asfriend of the present Administration at Ottawa has said. No one expected any other than loyal treat-ment for the Governor-General, and there was no special necessity for singling out the people of the prairies as his Excellency's

The constant evaporation from the surface rapidly cools anything that is wet, and the introduction of food with a temperature of 40° into a stomach where the natural warmth is 98° produces a chill that requires a good deal of the food consumed to overcome.
